They anticipate no trouble whatever on March 4, which is settling day all through the country. Railroad officials state that business is exceedingly brisk, and that the outlook is for a record business

Former Gesto, Ont., Minister Now Occupies Pulpit in Michigan Town.

DENIES HE RAN AWAY

Turned Over Alleged Missing Funds, and Gave Ample Notice of His Leaving.

It is true that I met my wife and children in Detroit, but that was pre-arranged and known in Wouldn't it be singular, if I Gesto. were running away from some wrong-

doing, that I would go only about 50 miles away: "The report that I failed to turn over \$210 of the Gesto church funds, money collected for missionary purposes, is absolutely false. That money was regularly sent to the Toronto board, and I received a receipt for it. That receipt will be found on file with other church records at Gesto. money was forwarded by me

Left Some Debts, But Not \$1,000. Mr. Hicks admitted that he left ome debts unpaid when he moved from Gesto, but that they did not amount to near \$1,000. He said that he has arranged for the sale of his horse, buggy and two cows, the proceeds of which would take care of all his indebtedness except \$150 he owed for groceries, and this he expected

soon to pay.

As his reason for leaving his Gesto charge, he said that he had that it kept him driving a great deal of the time, making his work inconvenient. He regarded the call to Corunna as offering him a much better opportunity to improve his work and





## POOR MEN CHARGE THAT COUNCIL IS PERSECUTING

Object to Have to Put Up Dog Tax and Buy Muzzles at the Same Time.

The poor man, with a dog for his kiddies" is not enamored of the recent dog legislation, especially that portion of it that compels him to pay \$2 immediately for the dog license, or \$4 if the pup is impounded without a tag. This is the time of the year that the average workingman finds it somewhat difficult to obtain the money, and it will necessitate the killing of many dogs, and consequent sorrow in the family, as a large number of them find

it impossible to get the money.

They claim that the scare is exaggerated, and that in a short time conditions will be normal. They consider it persecution to have a dog-catcher camping on the highway to pick up any dog that might have pulled the muzzle

A Hardship. "A large number of poor men will find it impossible to raise money for a dog tag at this season of the year," said inspector Sanders. "Some of them find it hard at any time, but at this season it is particularly hard, owing to the lack of work. It will mean that many will have to destroy their dogs. 

Washington, Feb. 23.-Her imperial wearing more and more silk every year. and more than ever is she wearing American-made silk in preference to the manufactures of foreign lands. Certainly the females of Uncle Sam's domain can successfully compete with their sisters of the nations in the matter of being the best silken-clad women on earth, for last year, it is estimated by Government officials, the value of silk used by the country was

the value of home-manufactured silk \$5,000 assets. used in the United States, the balance, \$33,000,000, being the value of silk imported into the country during the

Unmanufactured silk imports made their highest record in the history of the nation in 1909, their total having been \$75,500,000, against \$73,000,000 in 1907, the high value record, while the quantity imported in 1909 exceeded that of 1907 by over 40 per cent. Remarkable has been the growth of the American silk industry. Raw silk imported, in 1870 amounted to \$738,-381 pounds. The figures for 1909 were 22,250,000 pounds. Measured by value, the growth has been from \$4,000,000 in 1870 to \$74,000,000 in 1909. In the same period the average price a pound of raw silk decreased from \$5 25 to

\$3 33, or 37 per cent.
The rapid growth of importations of raw silk is in marked contrast with silk manufactures. In the period from 1870 to 1909, the value of raw silk importations increased \$70,000,000, or more than 16-fold, while the manufactured silk importations increased only



#### Music Hall To Open in September Will Be Largest in Great Britain.

London, Feb. 24.—On the site where Hengler's circus used to stand in Argyll street, Oxford street, a variety theatre is now in the course of erection, which, when ready for opening in September next, will be the largest music hall in Great Britain. It is being bullt to seat about 5,000 people, and when finished will, including the price paid for the site, have cost \$1,000,000.

The auditorium will consist of stalls, boxes and two vast tiers, the width of the floor space being no less than one hundred feet. 
