

Washington, Feb. 14 .-- Reports of the piling up of freight destined to Europe, the temporary shutting down of grain elevators and the other evidences of the effect of the new submarine campaign upon neutral commerce are regarded as part of the accumulation of aggravations which are expected to lead to action by the United States.

So far, the Government has received nothing official to indicate any change of submarine policy by Germany, and can only believe that American lives or ships may be sacrificed at any moment.

Vigorous denials were made today to reports of a split in the cabinet over the question of furnishing guns for American ships. Naturally, it was said, there may be differences of judgment, but it was declared that members of the cabinet will stand solidly behind the president in any decision he may make.
