## M'INTYRE, CON., BY 146

Ottawa Government's Program of Ceercion Gets Set-Back.

Old Warhorse, Greenway, Sent From Ottawa to Stump for the Coercion ists, Buried in Result in Constitu tuency He Held Year After Year by Increasing Majorities - Manitoba Shows That She Wants Her Rights.

Winnipeg, April 28.—Mountain, speaking yesterday for the united west, has declared against coercion by the Government at Ottawa.

Conservative Wins by 146 Majerity.
At the general election in 1903 the result was as follows: McIntyre (Con.) 567, Greenway (Lib.) 911; Wilson (Ind.) 254, or a total majority against the 567, Greenway (Lib.) 911; Wilson (Ind.) 254, or a total majority against the Provincial Government candidate of 598, while Greenway had 344 majority over his straight Conservative opponent. Now, McIntyre comes out of the contest with a majority of 146. Although the farmers are busy seeding and a bye-election rarely arouses much confusion to the topological process. enthusiasm, the thoroughly represen-tative nature of this result is shown by the fact that the total vote cast to day was little below that cast at the general election

general election.

Premier Roblin Remarks.

Premier Roblin said: "I have always had great faith in the patriotism and sound common sense of the people of Manitoba, and the election has more than justified that confidence. The Government fought this contest on the distinct issue of Manitoba's rights under Confederation, which are being trampled upon at Ottawa. Ottawa Liberals did their best to confuse the issue. They persuaded the eld warhorse, the late Liberal leader of this Province, to go on the stump in their interests the late Liberal leader of this Province, to go on the stump in their interests. He was appealing to men who had, year after year, returned him by huge majorities, but he appealed in vain. The people of Manitoba will not be coerced by anyone. We will not stand for equivocation and shuffling at Ottawa. We do not admit the right of Quebec to have a voice in our affairs, as invited by Sir Wilfrid Laurier; nor do we admit any right of that sort as appertaining to the uncreated Province of Saskatchewan or to the Province of Ontario. We want our rights, denied us for twenty-old years, and the Province to-day stands shoulder to shoulder for its constitutional position as a full member of the Dominios.

"I want to thank both independants and Liberals of Mountain personally, and on behalf of the Province, for their patriotism in this matter. We shall loyally adhere to the line that we have taken on this subject, and will not claim this election as an endorsement of the policy of the Government or its record in matters of purely local interest. We take it that they abandoned party lines and voted as Manitobans. We did not want this seat. The Province had given us a big enough majority without it; but we did want to see what the feeling of Manitoba was on the boundary issue, and whether we had the people at our backs in our fight for Provincial rights, or whether the organ owned by certain Ottawa politicians more correctly represented public sentiment on this question.

CHICAGO'S WORST STRIKE

Ricting in the City.

Chicago April 28.—With 2,100 teamsters on strike with constant accessions to their number, and with the express determination of the employers' association to take a firm stand for the "open shop" and to fight the Teamsters' Union to the bitter end, Chicago last night to all appearances stands on the eve of one of the greatest industrial upheavals in her history. There was rioting in various parts of the city yesterday despite the strong guards. of policemen and the number of private deliveries hired by the employers' association to protect their wagons. During the clashes three persons were seriously injured. Two of them will probably die.

### ALEX. WILLIS ARRESTED

Jury Suspects Him of Murdering Miss Eliza Lowry

Mrs. Elizabeth Covell Also Held as Having Knowledge of Who Committed the Murder-Three New Witnesses Break Willis' Testimony For Himself in An Important Particular -Why Mrs. Covell Is Charged.

Rodney, April 28 .- "We believe that Rooney, April 28.—"We believe that Eliza Lowry was murdered at the home of Benjamin Covell, about one mile north of the Village of Rodney, on the night of April 18, or the morning of April 19, 1905, and we strongly suspect that Alexander Willis committed the

that Alexander Willis committed the crime, and we believe Elizabeth Covell knows who committed the murder."

In fifteen minutes after this verdict, Willis was shackled, preparatory to leaving for St. Thomas jall. He was remanded until May 4. Mrs. Covell, too ill te be removed from her bed, was guarded by a constable. Both are charged with the murder of Miss Low-ry.

Denouement Sensational.

The denouement of the tragedy proves scarcely less sensational than the murder itself. For the past few days suspicion has rested more or less heavily on both prisoners, but when three witnesses were produced to prove that Alexander Willis had passed their house a mile and a helf nearer the Company. that Alexander Willis had passed their house, a mile and a half nearer the Covell homestead between 6 and 7 o'clock on Wednesday morning, an hour at which he affirms he was in his bed, the jury felt that a case against him was assured.

INTERCHANGE CERTIFICATES.

Washington, April 28.—F. Gourdeau, Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries of the Dominion of Canada, has sent the following telegraph from Ottawa to Secretary Metcalf of the Department of Commerce and Labor:

"Order just passed by the Canadian Government to accept United States of inspection on board United States steamers in Canada, except se far as will enable inspectors to ascertain that the condition of the vessel, her boilers and life-saving equipment are as stated in the certificate of inspection. The order in court leaves for Toronte tenight (last night) for His Excellency's signature, who will act te-merrow (this) morning.

This practically cencludes negetiations which have been pending for a long time, looking to a reciprocal exemption of vessels from inspection by both the United States and the Canadian Governments. THE LIMITS OF JIU-JITSU, Like many other excellent things the art of jiu-jitsu promises to suffor from having too much claimed for it, points out the Ottawa Citizen. Since the study of jiu-jitsu became a popular craze in some centers, it and boxing were to become obsolete But these enthusiasts overlooked the fact that one of the chief elements of success in the Japanese invention is that of surprise. In order that a jiu-jitsu expert shall exert his wizard-like power on an opponent he must first get close enough to "clinch" his opponent. It looks very easy, and is very easy, for a jiu-jitsu artist to dive at a man, catch him by the wrist with one hand and mwot him in the throat with the edge of the other, provided his opponent is not on the alert and has never beard of Jiu-jitsu. But under ordinary circumstances if the preliminary negotiations of a personal encounter have reached the ultimatum stage, the jiu-jitsu man who sprang at his antagonist would collide with an uppercut or a right swing on the jaw before he could close and work his highly ingenious grips. It is reasonable to suppose that a man who is rushing in on an opponent with the design to catch hold of him in a certain fashion is not also going to have his hands in a position to guard his own face, and the neglected first blow of even an average boxer is very liable to land in a manner that will put the recipient

Undoubtedly jiu-jitsu is very useful for handling persons who have only brute force and no science. But recently the claim that it was superior to the art of the boxer or wrestler has been proven incorrect. George Bothner, American lightweight wrestler, went into the ring with Professor Higashi, a Japanese jiu-jitsu professional and threw the latter three times without trouble. When a Jap goes against a professional pugilist the contest will be as one-sided as a man with a rewolver trying to overcome an opponent with a rifle at 500 yards range, Before the short-gun man got close enough to be barmful he would be



### A VAST COAL AREA.

nd by George McKenzie of British Columbia in Lonely Walk Down

In a land of magnificent distances like Canada there have been not a few remarkably long walks, but one of 400 miles over snow, just accomplished by George McKenzie, has characteristics that render it unique. He traveled on foot alone across the rugged interior of northern British Columbia, an undertaking few men would care to face, but he speaks of it as a holiday trip.

McKenzie is a true westerner of the late Jim Wardner type, ever seeking new mineral fields to conquer. He is at home in minings camps of the real

new mineral fields to conquer. He is at home in minings camps of the real Wild West type. Last spring, finding that the Boundary country was becoming too effete, he, with Edward Sullivan and H. B. Thorne, left it to find something fresh in the way of life and minerals in the Far North, to which so many ploneer eyes are turned to-day. The three went overland from Vancouver, B.C., via the Simil-kameen, the Cariboo road Quesnel and the Dawson telegraph traft.

They spent months placer mining, prospecting and trapping, and at length they discovered a coal area of remarkable richness. McKenzie will not disclose the location, but he says it is within convenient distance of where the Grand Trunk Pacific Rallway must run. He says the seam is

where the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway must run. He says the seam is 100 feet wide, between sandstone and conglomerate formations, and in one place is cut by a stream which exposes a depth of 50 feet.

It was in order to interest capital in the coal mine and also to learn the value of some quartz finds that Mc-Kenzle made his 400-mile trip over the northern mountain ranges on snow-shoes. Leaving his negtices in camp northern mountain ranges on snow-shoes. Leaving his partners in camp last February, he turned his face Paci-flowards, carrying a 50-pound pack and samples that weighed 25 pounds. Not a human being did he meet for 200 miles. He crossed four mountain ran-ges, and for 20 consecutive nights he slept in the snow without even a tent

slept in the snow without even a tent to cover him.

In order to travel as light as possible, he took no gun, and his only weapon of offence in case of attack by wild animals was an axe. The only game he sought for food was rabbit. It took him just 40 days to reach Port Essington at the mouth of the Sleven. Essington, at the mouth of the Skeena Essington, at the mouth of the Skeena River, where he caught a steamer for Vancouver. He looks as though the trip did him good, and he is recommending it to his friends for the benefit of their health. He plans to return in a few days. He will take the Hudson's Bay Company steamer up the Skeena to Hazelton, and from there he will have to walk 250 miles overland to where his partners anxiously await will have to walk 250 miles overland to where his partners anxiously await his report. He says the district he is prospecting bears no evidence of ever having been visited by white men before. He claims to have been the first white man to make this trip, and nobody seems inclined to dispute the assertion.

It Is Reputed to Have Originated With the Apostles.

At Seville in Spain, the dances of the "seises" are gravely reputed to have originated in the apostles having followed the example set by David and danced around our Lord after the last supper. While St. Augustine contemped the dance devotional, St. Chrysostom is said to have taken part in it, and, notwithstanding a prohibitory de-cree of 692, it was exceedingly popular in Spain at the commencement of the seventeenth century. During certain ceremonies the seises dance daily before the high altar of Seville cathedral in the presence of enormous crowds, including the archbishop and all the "Now," writes and eyewitness, "the dancing boys are dressed in the costume of Philip and Mary's days, with short capes, an abundance of streamers, plumed hats and white silk shees. 

## TO BE SEEN IN LONDON

TREASURY OF BRONZES AND VASES IS BRITISH MUSEUM.

Alma Mater For the Instruction of the Student in Art-Egyptian Bronzes Remarkable For Theosophical Meaning and Fascinating Form— Babylonian and Assyrian Relics in Bronze-Specimens of Greek Art.

Not only is the British Museum a treasury for the researches of the archaeologist; it is likewise an Alma Mater for the instruction of the student of art. The antiquary can inspect wonderful vestiges of vanished empires, the artist the most exquisite examples of his own craft. It is specially exemplified in the opulent store of bronzes and vases.

empires, the artist the most exquisite examples of his own craft. It is specially exemplified in the opulent store of bronzes and vases.

Many of the Egyptian bronzes are remarkable for theosophical meaning and fascinating form. The third room, devoted to memorials of that ancient people, contains a rare collection of figures representing gods. Foremost in beautiful craftsmanship is the Osiris, with the eyes, beard, and collar embellished in gold. Another effigy of the same delty shows him enveloped in feather work, formed by the wings of the hawk god, Horus; and another striking work is the Khonsu studded with gold, wearing disk and lunar cresent and horns. Also can be seen the gods Nefer-Aunu, wearing on his head a cluster of papyrus plants; Lem-hetep, seated and holding an unfolded roll of papyrus on his knees; and Ptah, inlaid with gold. Notable examples of Egyptian skill in bronze work are the human-headed hawk, emblematic of the soul wearing figures of kings. In the wall cases, 119-182, filled with bronzes of the gods, one feels the profound sentiment that permeated the heart and mind of the ancient Egyptian in relation to his conception of the Divine government of the world. The cases 127-130 concentrate exceptional interest on Osiris, and those whom Dr. Budge describes as the gods' "Divine company." Poetic ideas and artistic skill mingle in the representations. There is a seated figure of Isis suckling her son Horus, with an inscription on the pedestal, "great one, good mother," very captivating.

From the bronze and other writings on brick posterity learns the ruler was patron of two temples and the eldest son of Nabopolassar, a Babylonian king. The rosette designs on the doorstep indicate skill and refinement. Most interesting, too, is the figure of Arad-Sin, son of Kudur-Mabug, who ruled in Babylon two thousand three hundred years before the rise of Christianity. Yet the Assyrian artistically transcended his forerunners, alike in strength, grandeur, and refinements. In the latter features, proof is afforded in the beaten patterns of shields, bowls, and other vessels. Well worthy study is a group of helmets, framework for the side of a throne, and a bronze slab which formed part of the model of a castle, showing the position of embrasures and battlements. Noteworthy were bronze relies brought to modern light from Nimrud by the magic of the mattock. Among them are various bells, dagger, sickle, spearhead, and sword sheath, heads of the Demon of the south-west wind, and the foot of a throne in the form of a lion's feet. Of special interest, likewise, are mirrors, sceptre head silver plated, two-pronged fork, and admirably designed bowls.

But Assyrian decorative art in bronze has a culminating masterplece in the ornaments of the temple gates built at Tell-Balawat by Shalmaneser H, and which were discovered in 1879 by Harmuzd Rassam. The site laid to the south-east of Nineveh, and the king, whose battles and conquests the decorators recorded, reigned from 366 to 825 prior to the birth of Christ, contemporary with Anab and Jehu. The designs form remarkable pictures, and a captured city in fiames. There is genius in the way these "small masters" of bronze convey impressions of processional movement and the energy of men in battle, as great as that of the sculptors of the Scente slabs depicting the wars of Ashurnasirpal.

In the Bronze room proper will be found exquisite, and also many im-

In the Bronze room proper will be found exquisite, and also many impressive, examples of classic art. The Greek specimens contain nothing finer than the entrancing head generally identified with Aphrodite, from Trebizond, noticeable for its life-like expression. Among the statuettes should be noticed a fascinating figure of a woman with diamonds in the eyes and drapery inlaid with silver. The winged head, generally supposed to be the god of sleep, is a masterpiece of beauty. There is in the finest Greek style a youthful heroic figure, seated, and Greek mitrors, supported on the heads of women, all fascinating

works are the statue of Apollo, the satyr Marsyas, Silenus standing on a triangular base, bearing on his head a basket florally decorated; the sace hus from the Payne-Knight collection, and the right leg of a statue wearing a greave, with a Gorgon's head is relief. In the cases 44-47, among other noteworthy specimens, are Venus stooping over her sandal; a charmin! Bacchus; Hercules in the Hesperides garden; a bust of the Emperor Luctus Verus; and another of the Emperor Clandius. It is a work of superb art, a piece from Epirus, the "Two Love Gods, Anchises and Aphrodite, on Mount Ida," a bronze scarcely to be surpassed for poetic sentiment and exquisite workmanship.

How far the ancient Greek was penetrated and inspired by a sense of beauty in his art can have no greater proof can in the vases he shaped and embellished. The collection at Bloomsbury is perfect in its variety and aesthetic charm. Examples shown in the rooms specially devoted to the heautiful treasures have, been discovered in the course of excavations.

in the rooms specially devoted to the beautiful treasures have been dis-covered in the course of excavations

at Athens and other places in Greece proper, but chiefly on those islands and shores of the Mediterranean peopled by natives of the mother country in, or before, the sixth century prior to the Christian era. Numbers of vases came from Rhodes, Cyprus, Cyrene and Naucratis. Subsequently an active manufacture sprung up in the Greek cities of southern Italy. Studious attention soon gives at Bloomsbury a knowledge of the evolution of this striking and exquisite branch of Greeian art. Ine arrangements at the British Suseum in every way conduce to this object. The first vase room shows the beginnings of the potter's art in Greek lands. The second gallery contains examples of a development of a single style of Athenian skill practised in black figures on a red ground. The fourth chamber includes specimens of the Italian potters.

In the third room will be found some of the finest specimens of Greek art. Here their vases possess matchless simplicity of drawing, and delightful grace of form. The examples, indeed, are "things of beauty." Stories and scenes depictured from mythology and life are given with the greatest feeling and airliness of touch. Most striking are the faces on the kylix (drinking crup) signed Pamphalos, of the winged figures raising the body of a dead warrior; and on the vessel formed like a knucklebone, a group of girls seeming to hover in the air, is represented with faschating spontaneous power. A very noticeable example is the rhyton (drinking horn), representing as a seated sphyax in the most delicate colors—red. vernallies white and gold. A charming cup is that giving the story of Glaucos and Polycidos, full of poetic sentiment and grace. One of the finest masterplees is an Athenian vase of the fifth century, presenting the story of Peleuis surprising Thetis in the sea, remarkable for the remains of vivid colors, white, blue, green and gold. 
