


GERMAN EAST AFRICA.

A new bogie has been nipped in the bud-as Sir Boyle Roche would have said. According to our contemporary, the Illustriertes Briefmarken Journal Messrs. Schulke and Mayr entered into a contract with the German Government by which they were to conduct the postal service on or about the lakes within the confines of German East Africa. The stamps bear the name of the firm at the top, numeral, and view of a lake in a circle inscribed "Afrikanische-Seecn-Post," perf. 111/2. 5 cents, rose; 10 cents, orange; 25 cents, blue; 50 cents, green; I dollar, brown. A firm having made inquiries of the Colonial Administration received the following reply:

IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT OF GERMAN EAST AERICA.

DURESSALAM, 30th Sept., 1803.

"Gentlemen,-In reply to your request for information, dated 25th August of this year, I have to inform you that the Imperial Government made a contract with the firm of Schulke and Mayr with reference to postal communication with the Victoria Nyanza At the expiration of a year the contract was not renewed. The firm also requested of the Post Office Department of the Empire permission to introduce stamps, but the request was refused.

Consequently, according to the information which I now give you, the stamps which accompany your letter, and others similar to them, were never in use,

> "(Signed) VON SCHELE. " Imperial Governor."

These stamps may therefore be consigned to the limbo where "Sedang" and others of the same class have preceded them .- Stamp News.



HELIGOLAND REPRINTS.

It is not generally known that there were three different printings of the reprints of Heligoland.

The first reprinting was done at Berlin, where the stamps were printed, and it is difficult to distinguish these the most dangerous reprints from the originals: the paper is slightly thinner, and the tone of the colours slightly different.

The second set of reprints were done at Lubeck, the paper in this case being appreciably thinner, and the gum whiter. If these reprints are placed face downwards all the lettering can be read from the back of the stamps.

The third reprints were manufactured at Hamburg on still thinner paper, very different indeed from the originals. The gum is thin and pure white, while the embossing is not nearly so good. These last reprints are the common ones, and not at all dangerous.

The perforation of all the three reprints and the originals are identical. Of course it is established that the 2s. and 6s. do not exist perforated as originals. The rouletting of the originals and the reprints is likewise no guide.

THE days of the oxidised stamp are numbered. It can be restored to its pristine beauty by a chemical process; at present the new process is a secret, but it is known to one or two leading collectors, Mr. Bacon amongst the number. It has been tried and found to be absolutely safe and unquestionably successful. Mr. Bacon has tried it upon the Newfoundlands in the Tapling collection and it has turned badly oxidised stamps into brilliant copies. The discoverer of the new process is I believe, a philatelist. It is to be hoped that he will as soon as possible, place his discovery at the service of Philatelists generally. Of course we have heard from time to time of cures for this insiduous stamp disease, but there seems to be no doubt of the latest medicine being really effective.—(Edward J. Nankivell, in American Journal of Philately.)

WE are in receipt of a lengthy communication from that well known philatelist of San Francisco, who signs himself "Lewis the Light" from which we take the following words of warning. "The way of the transgressor is hard; Philatelist, beware! The punishment or trial of J. R. H. was caused, mark you, for monkeying with his majesty, Lewis the Light, dominator of the world. Boys it won't pay you to ignore or lie about Lewis, there is no fun or life in it for you. Philatelically I amuse myself, and the very best thing you can do is to centralize on me, for I'm the light of this world."

THE Marquis of Ripon, who is Colonial Secretary, has administered a wellmerited rebuke to the Government of the Straits Settlements for unnecessarily surcharging their stamps. This colony (or rather group of colonies) is however far from being the only offender in this matter, as collectors, to their cost and distraction, are well aware. Those colonies which have had the good fortune to escape this time would be well advised to take warning and mend their ways in due time, less chastisement rather than remonstrance should be their lot.— *Stamp News*.

JOHN R. Hooper has been committed to jail by the magistrate at Three Rivers, Que., to be tried at the June Session of the criminal court for attempting to drown his wife. WHEN the Postal authorities of Prussia determined to issue stamps the king drew a design for the stamps, which consisted principally of the Arms of Prussia. The authorities did not consider the design satisfactory and prevailed upon the king to allow his portrait to appear upon the stamps On the succession of King William I. the design was altered to the Eagle of Prussia, which remained on the design until the foundation of the German Empire.

THE registration stamps of Queensland and New South Wales have no value expressed, but it was six pence. Some of the latter came watermarked, with a large numeral "6." Many other stamps have no value stated, such as the early Barbados, Trinidad, Mauritius, Ionian Islands, Austrian newspaper, etc., the denomination on the Spanish official stamps indicate the weight they carry, but no money value.—*Philatelic Monthly*.

THE envelopes of Prussia when cut for adhesive purposes were not sold to the public but had to be placed on the envelopes by the officials of the Post Office by whom alone, according to the decree authorizing them, they were allowed to be used as adhesives. They were used principally for registered letters.

AT a recent meeting of the Philatelic Society, London, Eng., a number of the 4d English stamp, watermarked large garter apparently on the safety paper were exhibited and found to be the ordinary stamp on white paper, changed to blue by some chemical process. They came from Switzerland.

QUEENSLAND NOTES.

From the Australian Stamp News.

What becomes of all the used Australian stamps that are sent away to dealers in Europe and other countries? It seems incredible that they can all be used up by collectors. One dealer, a short time ago, sent to England in a few weeks, 250,000 Id. and 2d. Australians, to fill one order. Now this is an enormous number, and it is almost impossible for anyone unacquainted with the stamp trade, to thoroughly grasp this quantity, but to form an idea of the number, I may state that it would take a person who could count 4,000 per hour, over six days of ten hours each, or practically one week.

Enormous however, as this quantity is, it was only sent from one individual dealer to another, but as there are other dealers in each colony who handle these common stamps, the total number exported every year from Australia must be millions.

A curious provisional came under the notice of the writer a short time ago, this was used by some postman in N. S. W. He had run out of stamps, and had used postage due stamps, he had then written over the top of them "No other stamps on hand.

A. C. F. Henty P. O."

And then postmarked them over the writing with the obliterating stamp No. 1371. Speaking of this to one of the officials of the G. P. O. he told me that he had seen the same thing done before.

Any variety like this should have the envelope entire to be satisfactory. This plan however is not always adopted, as a short time ago the Postmaster of Norfolk Island ran out of stamps, and the letters for Sidney were all sent unstamped, and the money sent with them, the letters were then stamped at the G. P. O. and sent on to their destinations.

Misprints are being collected very carefully in some places particularly in America. We have a very fine example of this sort of stamp in the 1C. provisional Tasmanians, printed in Hobart; by some means the plate got damaged and the right hand bottom corner stamp of the sheet shows a white place about 36ths of an inch long by 36th wide, running up to a point from the bottom of the stamp.


A misprint may also occasionally be found amongst the registered envelopes of N. S. W. and I have a very fine example of the 3d. registration which is printed about half on the body of the envelope. This, however, is easily accounted for, as each stamp is printed separately, and of course is entirely dependent on the skill of the machinist in placing it correctly in position under the die, which in some cases is not done as carefully as it might be-

One of our Sydney dealers had lately a fine block of 2d. Queensland 1861 issue, watermarked large star; they were perforated horizontally, but imperforated vertically, and are certainly very rare, and I should say unique, but alas! like nearly all the good things that are found in the Colonies they have gone to Europe, buyers in the colonies in these hard times have either too little money, or not sufficient pluck to invest in high priced stamps. Collectors may be quite certain that stamps like these are a good investment, besides having the pleasure of possessing something no one else has got, if they are kept for a few years and then misfortune or other cause brings them into the market, one is pretty sure to double their money, whereas stamps of a common grade will never realize what they cost.
