No troops in the world could have resisted it. The last critical moment was late the same night and early Sunday morning when the Germans made desperate attempts to recover Douaumont by attacks, first from Louvemont along the road leading up to Bras village on the plateau, and second, by a later and less determined stab at turning Douaumont from the south by advance across the plateau near Vaux.

was weakened by the Germans having to climb a narrow ravine and descend on a narrow front, affording them an easy mark, but the Bras fighting was quite a different affair and might have been very serious, if not actually critical.

The Germans advanced they were sheltered in the ravine from our guns on the plateau to their left, and by the Poivre and Tatou spurs from our batteries across the river, but it was the latter on Charny heights that finally smashed them when they reached charging distance. I saw them myself. It was just as if the plateau edge had been mined. The explosions were so continuous that the whole section was covered with a cloud of smoke through which one saw flashes.

some distance; then our batteries joined in, and they simply lay down in rows. The Germans may talk of their howitzers, but our artillery is infinitely better. The gunners literally fire to an inch. At Verdun it was especially well organized. The commander is a wonder. You know '93. He showed the Germans what French artillery meant at the first battle of Verdun in 1914 when he smashed a whole Bavarian division with three batteries of "seventy-fives."

Many Strikes Now in Spain

Rioting at Valencia—One Killed and Many Injured.

Madrid, via Paris, March 1 (delayed).—Strikes and disturbances have occurred in most of the provinces of Spain as a result of the increased cost of food. A general strike was proclaimed in Valencia, where serious rioting took place, one person being killed and many injured. There is a general demand that the government take steps to lower the prices of food and to start public works in order to provide labor for the unemployed, and thereby avoid a serious crisis.

Commerce Raiders, Not Submarines

Boats Like the Moewe Will be Most Effective Against Merchantmen.

Amsterdam, via London, March 2.—Captain Persius, naval expert of the Berliner Tageblatt, discussing in today's issue of that newspaper the new German campaign against merchant shipping, makes the assertion that it will be carried out, not so much through the medium of submarines, whose activities are hampered by difficulties, as through disguised commerce raiders, like the Moewe, which has already sunk a number of vessels of the allies and which sent the Appam to Newport News with a prize crew.

LETTER FROM SOLDIER OF THE FIGHTING 10TH

Wife of P. C. Barr Has Brother in Connaught Rangers.

TELLS OF LIFE IN THE EAST Not a Fighting Lad Left in Sligo—All Are at War.

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Barr wife of P. C. Barr, from her brother, Joseph Taylor, of the Connaught Rangers. The writer of the letter has three brothers on this Continent, one in Philadelphia and two in Brantford. Of the two here, one, William George Taylor, is a sergeant in the 125th, while the other, Harry, is the prominent left back of the Cavalry football team, which won the Courier, Expositor and John Hill trophies last season.

The Connaught Rangers is the famous 10th division which saved the Allies from disaster on the retreat to Saloniki. The letter follows: THE LETTER

British Med' Exp. Fore. My Dear Sister and Brother: In answer to your most welcome letter which you sent in October last, I just got it yesterday, 28th January, 1916. I would have got it two weeks ago but I was away in hospital. I was sent to Egypt, as I was a bit done up. But thank God, I am quite well again now and back with my unit again. I was delighted to hear from you, I am a lot farther from home than you are, and we had a lovely passage when going to the Dardanelles. But I have had a rough one since I left the Dardanelles. We have lovely weather here. It is as hot as summer at home. But the nights are frosty and very cold. We have got heavy coats, sheep skins, like Brian O'Linn. This country is full of goldfinches. It's just lovely to hear them sing. I have seen some terrible sights since I left the Old Country last July, and thank God that I am so well. There has been some hot strapping out here, and the 10th Division has covered itself with glory. The old Connaughts are the talk of the country. Sligo is fairly screened out now, not a fighting lad left. I am writing this by the light of a camp fire outside my dugout. There are three of us, all Irish, in this dugout, and we are as cosy as if we were in a drawing room again. Our dugout is on the side of a hill overlooking a lovely lake, and plenty of birds to keep us merry. The enemy is far away just now, so we are on our ease. The pride of old Ireland is out here, and we will show the world how we can fight and die for the Old Country. I came out here to make the other fellows die, not myself. It takes a touch of war to make a man sensible. No more mad pranks for me when I get home again. And I can tell you that I won't be very particular as regards my appearance when I get home, anyway. If you had seen some of the boys, how they were mangled with shrapnel, and how brave and noble they are in the hour of death. Poor lads, how they stick the torment.

You knew Capt. Cooper from Marce Castle. Well, he is in command of our company. Does Douglas play any Rugby out there. We don't play any faster out here. And please write very often to me. And tell William that I have more medals than I can wear when the war is over. They send me plenty of tobacco from home and cocoa and all that stuff. Well, I guess I won't be making you weary. I will close now, with fondest love.

EGYPT IS TOLD NOTHING OF ITS OWN FRONTIER

Suez Canal is Being Carefully Guarded Against Danger.

CANAL ZONE A RESTRICTED AREA Much Activity in Vicinity of Canal Throughout the Winter.

Cairo, Egypt, March 2.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Egypt is still very much in the dark as to what is going on along its frontier. Rumors of the most sensational kind are circulated, but there can be no doubt that the military authorities are running no risks, as far as the defense of the Canal is concerned. The Canal Zone long ago was made a restricted area in the most restricted military sense. Any person desiring to travel by railway to any station within the Canal Zone is required to obtain a special permit, which is only obtained after searching inquiries on the part of military officials. The permit may be either temporary—for one trip only—or permanent—for such as require to pay frequent visits to Port Said or Suez for business reasons. Any permit is revocable on the instant at the will of the officials.

In the case of foreigners, application must first be made to the proper consular authority, which is then forwarded to the Public Security Department for investigation. Before returning from any place in the Canal Zone, the traveller must obtain a return permit, properly stamped by the Governor of Port Said or Suez or the Manur of Ismailia. Similar restrictions apply to persons residing within the Canal Zone and desirous of travelling to any station outside of it.

In many ways the Canal zone is ideal for defensive purposes. The railway runs along the west bank of the Canal from Port Said for sixty or seventy miles. There has been no heavy fighting throughout the entire canal belt throughout the winter.

German Goods Will be Banned and Preference Given to Colonies. London, March 2.—The Daily News learns that the inner circle of the cabinet will recommend the incorporation in the budget of an announcement that German imports will be prohibited after the war, and also that measures will be taken, probably in the purpose of encouraging exports from the British colonies to the countries of the Allies.
