# GREECE NOW PREPARED TO JUIN IN WAR AS A NATION

Dominion Railway Commission Give Verdict in Favor of L. E. & N. Railway

Dominion Railway Board Orders Grand PREMIER FAVORS switching Privileges to Lake Erie and Northern-All Factories Will Thus Have Three Railways Directly Available Instead of Two

FORTY-SIXTH YEAR

Mr. W. S. Brewster, K. C., Solicitor for the Dominion Steel Products Company, Limited, has received the finding of the Dominion Rallway Board, under which the Grand Trunk and T. H. and B. railways have been ordered to grant interswitching privileges to the Lake Erie and Northern Railway. The community owes a debt of gratitude in this regard to Mr. W. P. Kellett, President of the Company named, who took the initiative in the matter.

When the Commissioners were here Mr. Brewster appeared for said Company and there was a hearing of some two hours. The city was not represented at the hearing, but Mayor Bowlby afterwards wrote and asked among other things, for interswitching wim the Municipal Railway system.

Messrs. John Muir, G. S. Matthews and W. H. Whittaker on behalf of the Brantford manufacturers were also at the hearing and gave valuable evidence.

The application was strongly opposed by Counsel for the Grand Trunk and T. H. and B.

The decision is one of the most important that has been rendered in Brantford for many years. It means that the Lake Erie and Northern Railway and the Canadian Pacific Railway will be directly available for every factory in the City of Brantford. Or in other words that these factories will have access to and be served by, three railways instead of two.

It means also that the Holmedale District will be opened up as an industrial centre, as any factory locating there will have service

Greece Wiil Accede to Demands of French Fleet, and Maintain Order in Athens and Piraeus - Way is Now Clear, Says a War Leader, For Greece to Enter the Struggle as a

Athens, Wednesday, Oct. 25 .- p. m., via London, Oct. 27-(Delayed)—The understanding reached yesterday by King Constantine and representatives of the Entente powers generally, is believed to be the immediate result of the conference of the military and political leaders of France and Great Britain at Boulogne on Friday last. The terms of the understanding include on the part of Greece: First-Sincere compliance with the demands of Admiral Four-

Second-Effective maintenance of order in Athens and Piraeu Third—Guarantee of constitutional liberties to Greeks through the operation of the legal functions of their government.

Fourth-No opposition to recruiting for the Venezelist movement which now is characterized as "Anti-Bulgarian" instead of "national defense."

The Forward, the royalist organ, to-day strikes the keynote of "The Boulogne conference has opened the way to a larger understanding between the powers and Greece."

#### THE SITUATION

News with regard to Roumania is better. In the face of stubborn resistance it is reported that the forces of both Falkenhayn and Mackensen have latterly made slow progress in their respective drives on the Transylvania and Dobrudja fronts. Before the Roumanians at Cernavoda retreated, they destroyed the great bridge which spans the Danube at this point and thus put a decided kink in the advance of the Teutons.

On the Verdun front, the Huns continue their violent counter-attacks to regain lost ground and the Crown Prince has hurled masses of men to their death in this endeavor, but without result. The total prisoners taken by the French have now reached over five thousand and they continue to successfully hold what they so courageously gained.

When the Teutons reached Constanza they found little booty as Russian sailors had destroyed just about everything that might be of use to the foe.

In the British House yesterday. Premier Asquith stated that in addition to Great Britain, Russia, France and Italy are taking concerted action to support Roumania.

Both the Serb and the French forces have made gains on the Macedonian front and the former have captured the Cerna Height.

#### AN IMPORTANT DECISION

Without doubt one of the most important decisions ever recorded with regard to Brantford interests, is that which has just been handed out by the Dominion Railway Board.

The Grand Trunk and T. H. and B. railways had refused inter-switching privileges to the Lake Erie and Northern, which is practically a branch of the C. P. R. The consequence was that goods consigned for instance, to the new Dominion Steel and Products Company, could not be unloaded on the site of that plant, but had to be teamed from the depots of one or other of the two roads named. This is just an illustration. Take another case which recently came under the notice of the Courier. A well known firm wished to get a car to make a shipment, and neither the G. T. R. nor the T. H. and B. could supply one. They phoned the L. E. and N. who had one available, and they had to team the stuff to that depot.

All this will be changed now. L. E. and N. cars can, under the terms now directed, be run to any factory and every industrial establishment will have the advantage of three railways in a direct haul in or out, instead of two.

Commissioner McLean, in rendering his views says:

"It seems to me that it is in the public interest, in view of the established industrial character of the city, that it should also have the additional facilities which will be afforded by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company through its subsidiary line, the Lake Erie and Northern Railway Company."

Everyone will agree that this is sound, common sense and realize that the other railways had no case whatever in attempting to block the advantage sought.

#### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

There are rumors of a disgruntled state of affairs in the Liberal ranks the refusal of Sir Wilfrid to join the National Service Committee having disgusted many of his English speaking followers. There is no cause for wonder in that.
