

GREECE NOW PREPARED TO JOIN IN WAR AS A NATION Dominion Railway Commission Give Verdict in Favor of L. E. & N. Railway

A DECISION IS RENDERED OF THE UTMOST IMPORTANCE TO BRANTFORD

Dominion Railway Board Orders Grand Trunk and T. H. & B. to Grant Inter-switching Privileges to Lake Erie and Northern—All Factories Will Thus Have Three Railways Directly Available Instead of Two

Receives Deputation in Most Sympathetic Spirit.

FAVORS TUNNEL

Many Advantages to Be Derived From the Project.

London, Oct. 27.—(New York Herald cable)—The sympathetic spirit in which the Premier, Mr. Asquith received a channel tunnel deputation yesterday is the subject of leading editorials in to-day's newspapers. The Chronicle says: "For a quarter of a century, none but military considerations has prevented the construction of the tunnel, but the war has turned these the other way and it is our firm conviction that the new tunnel some day will be made and that after it has been working a short time everyone will be at a loss to understand how we got on without it and that sometime more immediately, a start can be made, but after the war will be better."

125TH RECEIVES BAPTISM OF FIRE

Pte. Wm. L. Uptgrove, of Brant Brant Battalion, Wounded

FIRST CASUALTY

Pte. E. Piper is Dead of Wounds

The first casualty among the men of the 125th battalion was reported this morning when the name of Pte. W. L. Uptgrove of this city was listed as wounded in the casualty list. Pte. Uptgrove, who is 28 years of age, a Canadian and married, residing at 76 Brighton Row, was employed formerly as a drill hand, but joined the Brant County unit in its early days. He was one of those drafted a short time ago from England to the front, and his wounding, reported this morning, indicates that a portion at least of the 125th battalion, has received its baptism of fire.

DIED OF WOUNDS

Mr. and Mrs. Piper, of 17 Richardson street, received a wire this morning conveying the sad intelligence that their son, Pte. Ernest Piper, had died of wounds in a hospital in England. This was the first intimation they had received that he had been on the casualty list. He had lived away from the city for some time and enlisted for Overseas Service with the Engineers at Ottawa. He was a very fine young man, intelligent and of a cheerful disposition, and his bereavement will have the sincere sympathy of the community.

WM. SMITH MAY BE DISCHARGED

Jail Breaker Would Now Avoid Sentence by Enlisting

Wm. Smith, jail-breaker and general desperado, appeared before His Honor Judge Hardy, in the County Court this morning, upon the charges preferred against him of jail-breaking, assault and theft of a bicycle. He was represented by Mr. H. S. Hewitt, who made a strong plea for leniency and for the dismissal of the charges upon condition of the prisoner enlisting. This was opposed by the Crown Attorney, who urged that a man with so many charges against him would be unmanageable and undesirable in any battalion. While favoring the suggestion of the defence, His Honor Judge Hardy did not see his way clear to accede to the request for the dismissal of the prisoner, and accordingly adjourned the case for a week's time, in which he will communicate with the Minister of Justice in the matter.

Attempt to Raid Channel

By Courier Leased Wire.

London, Oct. 27.—Ten German torpedo boat destroyers attempted to raid the British cross-channel transport service last night, but the attempt was frustrated. A statement issued by the British Admiralty to-day, two of the German destroyers were sunk and the others were driven off. The German destroyers succeeded in sinking one empty transport, the Queen. All the members of her crew were saved.

One British torpedo boat destroyer, the Flirt, is missing, the British statement adds, and another destroyer, the Nubian, was disabled by a torpedo and ran aground. Nine members of the crew of the Flirt were saved. "H. M. Torpedo Boat Destroyer Flirt, Lieutenant Richard P. Kellett, R.N., is missing, and it is feared she may be lost, but nine of the crew have been saved. "H. M. Torpedo Boat Destroyer Nubian, Commander Montague Bernard, R.N., was disabled by a torpedo and ran aground, but owing to the bad weather the tow parted and she has grounded."

Peg Top Trousers are Now Barred

BERLIN CLAIMS

Berlin, Oct. 27.—via London.—Field Marshal Von Mackensen's forces pursuing the retreating Russo-Romanian armies in Dobruja have reached the district of Hirsova, approximately forty miles north of Tchernavoda, the war office announced to-day.

Greece Will Accede to Demands of French Fleet, and Maintain Order in Athens and Piraeus—Way is Now Clear, Says a War Leader, For Greece to Enter the Struggle as a Nation

Athens, Wednesday, Oct. 25.—p. m., via London, Oct. 27.—(Delayed)—The understanding reached yesterday by King Constantine and representatives of the Entente powers generally, is believed to be the immediate result of the conference of the military and political leaders of France and Great Britain at Boulogne on Friday last. The terms of the understanding include on the part of Greece: First—Sincere compliance with the demands of Admiral Fourlet. Second—Effective maintenance of order in Athens and Piraeus. Third—Guarantee of constitutional liberties to Greeks through the operation of the legal functions of their government. Fourth—No opposition to recruiting for the Venizelist movement which now is characterized as "Anti-Bulgarian" instead of "national defense."

CANADIAN SOLDIERS WIN HIGH HONORS FOR BRAVERY ON FIELD

Pte. Leo Clarke and Pte J. C. Kerr are Awarded the Victoria Cross, While Several Chaplains Receive Much Valued Military Cross

London, Oct. 27.—The following Canadians have been awarded the Victoria Cross: 73,132, Private (Acting Corporal) Leo Clarke, Canadian Infantry, for most conspicuous bravery. He was detailed with his section of bombers to clear the continuation of a newly-captured trench and cover the construction of a block. After most of his party had become casualties he was building a block when about twenty of the enemy, with two officers, counter-attacked. He boldly advanced against them, and emptied his revolver into them, and afterwards two enemy rifles which he picked up in the trench. One of the officers then attacked him with a bayonet, wounding him in the leg, but he shot him dead. The enemy then ran away pursued by Acting Corporal Clarke, who shot four more and captured a fifth later. He was ordered to the dressing station, but returned the next day to duty.

Private John Chipman, Kerr, Canadian Infantry, for most conspicuous bravery. During a bombing attack he was acting as bayonet man, and knowing the bombs were running short he ran along a parapet under heavy fire until he was in close contact with the enemy. When he opened fire on them at point-blank range he inflicted heavy loss. The enemy, thinking they were surrounded, surrendered. Sixty-two prisoners were taken and 250 yards of enemy trench captured. Before carrying out this very plucky action one of Private Kerr's fingers had been blown off by a bomb. Later with two other men he escorted back prisoners under fire and then returned to report himself for duty before having his wound dressed.

Brought Down Austrian Plane, Then Wrecked His Own Dirigible

Rome, Oct. 26.—via Paris, Oct. 27.—A fight between an Italian dirigible airship and an Austrian aeroplane at a height of more than three miles over the Albanian coast, resulting in the aeroplane being shot down and the dirigible afterwards being destroyed by its own officer inside the Austrian lines, was told to-day when King Victor Emmanuel conferred medals for valor on three members of the Italian air corps. On the morning of October 12, while off the Austrian coast, an Italian dirigible piloted by Captain Ecole, with Captain Corbelli and Captain Albino as observers, was surprised and attacked at a height of 16,000 feet by an Austrian aeroplane. The aeroplane on obtaining a favorable position turned its machine gun on the dirigible, mortally wounding the observers and disabling Ecole's left arm. Ecole, however, according to the official account, succeeded in overcoming the aeroplane and in killing the pilot, but the dirigible was obliged to land thirty miles within enemy lines. Captain Ecole destroyed the dirigible and after two days of wandering and suffering from cold and hunger, managed to elude the Austrians and, recrossing the mountains, finally reached the Italian camp on the River Tofusa. King Victor Emmanuel to-day conferred a gold medal for valor on Captain Ecole and silver medals on Captains Corbelli and Albino.

Russo-Romanian Forces Gain

Bucharest, Oct. 27.—via London.—Russo-Romanian troops are engaged in successful fighting along the Rumanian-Transylvania frontier, according to to-day's war office announcement. Austro-German attacks in the Tughees and Bicoz regions and in the Trotus valley were repulsed, while in the Uzul valley the Rumanian advance is continuing. Heavy losses were sustained by the Teutonic troops which vainly attacked in the region of Dragoslavel, adds the official statement, which also chronicles the continuation of the fighting in the Predeal region and announces a withdrawal of the defensive forces towards the southern Transylvania frontier in the Jiu valley.

Will Not Pardon LIEBKNECHT

German Democrat-Socialists Plead for Their Leader

Berlin, Oct. 27.—via London.—A committee of the Reichstag has rejected the petition of the Social-Democratic minority that proceedings against Dr. Karl Liebknecht be suspended during the session of the Reichstag. Dr. Liebknecht was sentenced for military treason. While his appeal was pending, another court-martial began action against him on the ground that he incited soldiers of the Thorn garrison to rebellion.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN HOMESTEAD WEST LAND REGULATIONS. FIFTEEN sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a vacant land in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, Ag-ricultural District. Entry by proxy may be made if any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A suitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 80 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. NEW NATIONAL COMMISSION

Body Which Rules Organized Baseball May Be Remodelled

Chicago, Oct. 27.—August Herrmann, of Cincinnati, chairman of the National Commission, is in Chicago to-day for the purpose of holding a conference with Ban Johnson, president of the American League and member of the National Commission. THE SITUATION

News with regard to Roumania is better. In the face of stubborn resistance it is reported that the forces of both Falkenhayn and Mackensen have latterly made slow progress in their respective drives on the Transylvania and Dobruja fronts.

On the Verdun front, the Hunns continue their violent counter-attacks to regain lost ground and the Crown Prince has hurled masses of men to their death in this endeavor, but without result.

When the Teutons reached Constantza they found little booty as Russian sailors had destroyed just about everything that might be of use to the foe.

In the British House yesterday, Premier Asquith stated that in addition to Great Britain, Russia, France and Italy are taking concerted action to support Roumania.

Both the Serb and the French forces have made gains on the Macedonian front and the former have captured the Cerna Height.

AN IMPORTANT DECISION

Without doubt one of the most important decisions ever recorded with regard to Brantford interests, is that which has just been handed out by the Dominion Railway Board.

The Grand Trunk and T. H. and B. railways had refused inter-switching privileges to the Lake Erie and Northern, which is practically a branch of the C. P. R.

The consequence was that goods consigned for instance, to the new Dominion Steel and Products Company, could not be unloaded on the site of that plant, but had to be teamed from the depots of one or other of the two roads named.

Take another case which recently came under the notice of the Courier. A well known firm wished to get a car to make a shipment, and neither the G. T. R. nor the T. H. and B. could supply one.

They phoned the L. E. and N. who had one available, and they had to team the stuff to that depot.

All this will be changed now. L. E. and N. cars can, under the terms now directed, be run to any factory and every industrial establishment will have the advantage of three railways in a direct haul in or out, instead of two.

Commissioner McLean, in rendering his views says: "It seems to me that it is in the public interest, in view of the established industrial character of the city, that it should also have the additional facilities which will be afforded by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company through its subsidiary line, the Lake Erie and Northern Railway Company."

Everyone will agree that this is sound, common sense and realize that the other railways had no case whatever in attempting to block the advantage sought.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

There are rumors of a disgruntled state of affairs in the Liberal ranks the refusal of Sir Wilfrid to join the National Service Committee having disgusted many of his English speaking followers. There is no cause for wonder in that.

The lack of stiffening in Uncle Sam's backbone, as the leading neutral nation, was spoken of in plain terms in the House of Lords, although Grey made it clear that the fact was Washington's own affair.

The British Government is said to be considering a minimum wage for all workers. Some of the pay over there is certainly entirely inadequate to the cost of living, even without war prices. That is one of the blessings of Free Trade.

Boot polishers in Philadelphia are now charging fifteen cents for putting the glisten on tan shoes. Most people are thanking providence that air is still on the free list.

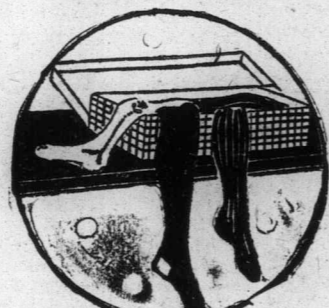

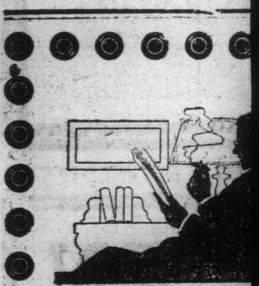

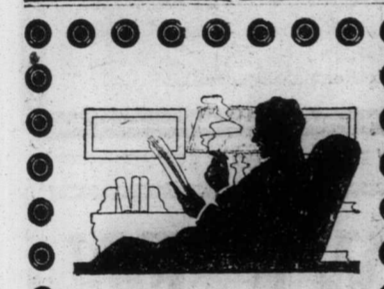
FIRST BREAK

Labor Famine in Chicago

Chicago, Oct. 27.—Chicago faces a famine in common labor, according to the inspection department of the Illinois state employment agency, Canal street, near Madison, one of the greatest markets for common labor in the United States is slowly being deserted by employment agents, who for years congregated in that locality. Instead of men paying for positions, it was said to-day, railroads and other big employers are hiring agents who go out and search for men. Railroad laborers are receiving practically double the wages which prevailed a few years ago, according to officials of the state employment agency.

Seal Herds are Growing

By Courier Leased Wire. Seattle, Wash., Oct. 27.—The seal herds on the Pribilof Islands in Behring Sea have increased so rapidly since killing of the fur-bearing animals was prohibited, that the government will begin to kill them regularly next year, according to a statement made by H. J. Christoffer, assistant agent for the United States bureau of fisheries, who has returned from an inspection trip to the islands. Mr. Christoffer made the trip on the steamer Ellhu Thomson, which left here September 5, with water supplies for the islands. The Thomson brought back 7,000 skins which were taken from seals killed to supply food for the natives on the islands. The skins will be shipped to St. Louis, where the government will sell them at auction.

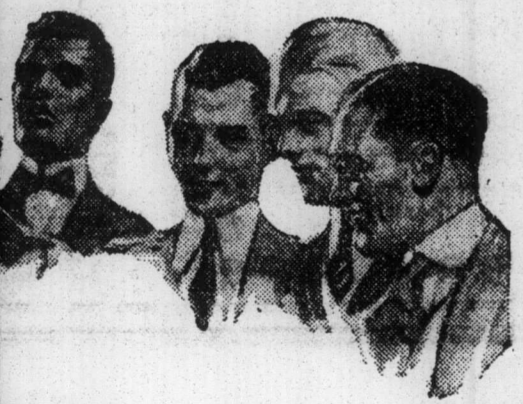

**UNITED STATES CHARGED AIDING
 WARFARE OF GERMAN U-BOATS**

**Lord Beresford Shows That American
 Warships on Coast at Time of U-53's
 Raid Committed a Breach of Neu-
 trality**

London, Oct. 21.—Some utterances of the feeling that the activity of American warships in rescuing passengers from the vessels sunk by the German submarine U-53 off the American coast amounted to a breach of neutrality were made today in the House of Lords by Baron Beresford and Baron Sydenham.

Lord Beresford is recognized by the country as the spokesman for the navy in the House of Lords, and Lord Sydenham's varied activities have included the authorship of books on naval affairs.

Baron Beresford stated that the action of American ships did not appear to be quite within the bounds of neutrality, and that he thought the British were bound to take notice of this fact.

The submarine question was brought forward by Lord Sydenham, who asked if the particulars of the sinking of the British steamer Stephano and the others had been received, and whether the circumstances were in accordance with the German pledge to the United States. He referred to the "activities of the U-52 under the very eyes of the American navy" and to the declaration of President Wilson which had resulted in the German pledge. Lord Sydenham declared: "Even before the exploits of the U-53 that pledge was torn to shreds. Yet the Government of the United States has made no sign whatever, that the sinking of neutral ships goes on almost every day. The Norwegians have lost 18 vessels in this one month, and what most small neutrals think of their powerful representative."

Warships Abetted Violation
 No life, he said, was because of the presence of American warships. Lord Sydenham took the position that the presence of American warships actually enabled Germany to defy what he said President Wilson had described as a sacred and indisputable rule of international law.

Baron Beresford expressed the opinion that Germany intended to bring America into the war, so as to be able to say she could not fight

the whole world, and also because the United States would be a valuable asset to her at the peace conference. He continued:

"The United States are really rather aiding and abetting this rather serious state of affairs. If the United States had not sent their ships, which for some extraordinary reason happened to be on the spot, to save life, the Germans would no doubt have broken the pledge to which their attention had been called. I think we are bound to appear to be quite within the bounds of neutrality, as far as the United States are concerned."

Foreign Secretary Grey said: "We have no understanding with the United States Government as to what information they are going to get or what they will do with the information when they obtain it. All we can do is to obtain information for ourselves from such sources as are open to us, and these sources in this case, I imagine, are officers in charge of the merchant vessels sunk, or passengers, in one case at any rate aboard the merchant vessels, all of whom have survived and to whom we can have access and from whom we can get their individual statements of what happened."

Pledge is Ignored.
 "These instances are occurring in different parts of the world. If he asks whether they occurred off the United States coast the other day, that is a matter on which I cannot pronounce any opinion until we get the facts; but if he wishes to know whether they are occurring elsewhere it is undoubtedly a fact, and we have published instances quite lately of its occurring in the Mediterranean and elsewhere."

"I see no use at this moment of discussing the question. The pledge was one which passed between the Government of Germany and the Government of the United States. It is not a pledge given to us. I do not think that at the present moment we can do any good whatever by discussing the question of what the policy of the United States is or ought to be towards the German Government in regard to that subject. That is a matter for the United States itself. I do not think allied interests or the interests of these merchant vessels could be served by raising any discussion in this country at the present moment with regard to a matter which is one between the United States Government and the German Government, and which is a matter, of course, in which it is for the United States Government, not for us to decide the policy and what is the action which the circumstances of the case require that the United States Government should take."

"That is what is being done on the other side, I understand. Full reports, I trust, will reach the Admiralty in due course as to the statements of survivors, and when these reports are received I cannot imagine any reason why they should not be made public in this country, or that there will be any reluctance on the part of the Admiralty or among the departments concerned to make public the facts, which we shall have got for ourselves, as to how the vessels were sunk and treated by the German submarines."

Lord Sydenham continued: "Viscount Grey, 'quoted statements made by Lord Crewe in August of the number of vessels sunk by German submarines since the German government gave a pledge to the United States Government in May, of last year, up to the middle of August in circumstances which were apparently not in accordance with that pledge, which included firing torpedoes at ships without warning and insufficiently providing for the safety of the crews or passengers when the ships were sunk. I am sure the Admiralty (indeed, I think it has been made public), can multiply instances which have occurred since the middle of August and are occurring every week of allied or neutral merchant vessels having torpedoes fired at them without warning, and in some cases loss of life occurring from crews being placed in open boats as the only chance of safety when the vessel is sunk."

 Mr. Commissioner McLean:
 I am of opinion that the application should be granted, the exception being upon the Lake Erie and Northern Railway Company. In granting the application, what weighs with me is the established industrial character of the City of Brantford. There are already facilities afforded by the Grand Trunk and the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Companies, and it seems to me that it is in the public interest, in view of the established industrial character of the City, that it should also have the additional facilities which will be afforded by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company through its subsidiary line, the Lake Erie and Northern Railway Company.

There should be contained in the Order a clause setting out that where the traffic is between Brantford and a shipping point or destination common to the Grand Trunk and the Lake Erie and Northern, or to the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo and the Lake Erie and Northern, or to both the Grand Trunk and Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo and the Lake Erie and Northern, where inter-switching facilities are provided, the Company upon whose line, including private sidings tributary thereto, the traffic is loaded, shall be entitled to the line haul and to the privilege of effecting the required delivery on the line of the other company by means of inter-switching at destination, provided that the said company can afford facilities and privileges, equal to those of the competing carrier at no greater charge.

 Interchange connection tracks between the tracks of the Lake Erie and Northern Railway and Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway and the Lake Erie and Northern Railway, and the Grand Trunk Railway, at Brantford, File 6713.120, Heard at Brantford, Sept. 20, 1916. The Assistant Chief Commissioner, The Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway and the Grand Trunk Railway have for many years had facilities for handling traffic at Brantford by private sidings at many of the industries of the City, and by public team tracks and freight yards.

The Lake Erie and Northern Railway Company's tracks at Brantford were constructed through Brantford and the railway of the Company is now open for traffic to and from that City.

The railway of the Lake Erie and Northern crosses the tracks of the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo and the Grand Trunk in Brantford, and it is quite feasible to construct interchange tracks between the Lake Erie and Northern and the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo and the railways of the other two companies. There is in fact, now a connection between the tracks of the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo and the tracks of the Lake Erie and Northern.

The applicants for the interchange tracks are a large number of manufacturing concerns in Brantford. Many of them are served by either the Grand Trunk Railway Company or the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Company, by private siding. The chief object of their desire is the interchanges to enable them to get prompt shipment in or out from, or to Canadian Pacific Railway points. The Lake Erie and Northern is controlled by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and will doubtless handle as much C.P.R. business to or from Brantford as possible.

At present the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo interchange with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company at Hamilton. The Lake Erie and Northern connect with the Canadian Pacific Railway via Galt. It was contended by the applicants that the Galt connection would be much more expeditious and that much time would be saved on shipments. The strongest evidence in this regard was given by Mr. Matthews, of the Matthews-Blackwell Limited, meat packers. Mr. Matthews stated that prompt delivery was so essential in the live stock business that they did not buy on Canadian Pacific Railway points north and west in Ontario, because of poor facilities for obtaining shipments. If this interchange was put in, his company would be able to buy cattle and hogs on the C. P. R. line west of London, and on the Teesewater and Guelph and Goderich Division of that Company. Mr. Matthews further stated that his company would also be benefited by the proposed interchange, as it would open up to his company the territory south of Brantford on the

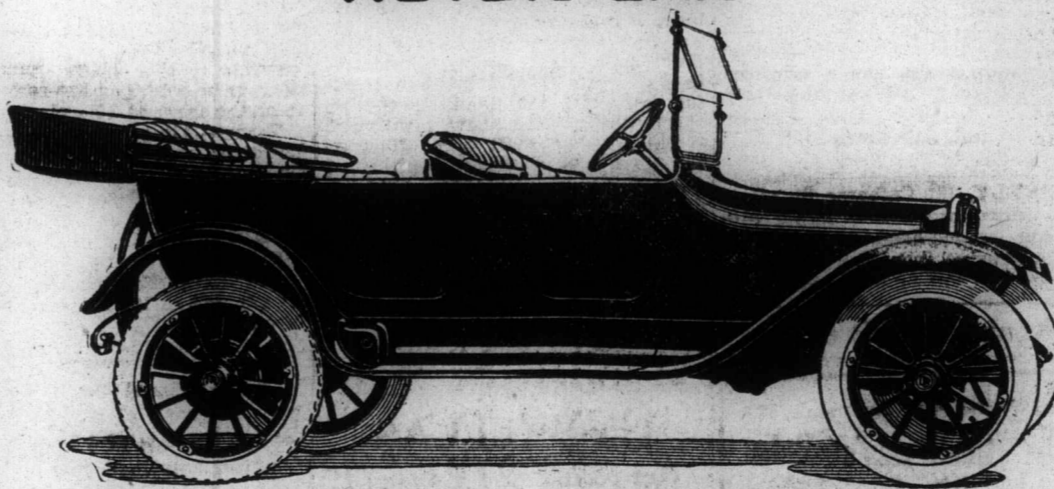
