DAYLIGHT SAVING A MATTER OF LATITUDE RATHER THAN LONGITUDE

The following appears in the cablegrams during the past few days or so:

"BRITAIN MAY ADOPT DAYLIGHT SAVING PLAN."

London, May 3.—Sir Henry Norman presented a motion in the House of Commons yesterday for the adoption of the daylight saving plan in Great Britain. The Morning Post says the Government favors the suggestion.

On the principal that misery loves company St. John and Halifax people are rejoicing over this intimation, but their rejoicings are about as senseless as was their original proposal.

Daylight saving in England might be a sensible proposal, but here in New Brunswick it is nonsensical for the very reason that the English proposal might be sensible.

Why this difference? Because daylight saving is governed largely by latitude rather than longitude.

Zone time is governed by longitude. Daylight saving time is governed by latitude and New Brunswick is not in the same latitude as England.

Every school child knows that the nearer we approach the equator the shorter the period of dawn and twilight.

In England for example it is possible to read a newspaper in mid-summer out of doors at ten o'clock at night, but such would be improbable here in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

In the extreme north of Scotland there is scarcely any night in mid-summer. Twilight fades at a very late hour into a brief interlude of night only almost immediately to gradually dissipate into the glories of a dawn.

There is some sense in England, a country, which has practically adopted one zone time taking advantage of the long twilight and dawn.

The same is also true of the Canadian north-west, which has the latitude, but not the climate of Labrador.

In Germany which is further south in latitude than that of the British Isles daylight saving was adopted for purely economical reasons caused by the stress of war.

England is better situated for daylight saving than Germany because of the reason stated.

Here in the Maritime Provinces the argument is the other way. The British Isles lie in the latitude of Labrador, but the Maritime Provinces lie in the latitude of mid-Europe. Hence the advantage here is so brief in duration, that it is of doubtful advantage in light-saving compared with the disturbance in time saving.

If Great Britain, however, officially adopted daylight saving time and abandoned zone time, the newspapers here in the Maritime Provinces would be so hampered by the adoption of daylight saving time because, the time changes would be equalized on both sides.

The veteran shipbuilder, Leander Graham is making preparations for building a schooner of 375 tons register, and Capt. James Pettis will build one about the same size. Both vessels will be three-masted and will be built at Port Greville.

Mr. W. R. Huntley expects to lay the keel for the new schooner at Riverside, Parrsboro, this week. This work will give employment to 25 or 30 men; and the demand for bottoms together with the high freights should inspire others to get the adjoining shipyards to work. There is ample room for this industry to develop.

Windsor after a very brief trial at the Daylight Saving Scheme has rescinded their resolution favoring and abandoned the proposed new time.

A Montreal paper understands that the art collection of the late Sir William Van Horne has recently been valued at \$10,000,000, and adds that this valuation ranks it as the finest collection in the Dominion of Canada.

Lieut. Bramley, who for the past eleven months has worthily assisted in carrying on the operations of the Salvation Army in this town, received word last week to proceed to Kentville. During her stay here the Lieutenant has made many friends who will regret her departure whilst wishing her success in Kentville, where she is to be commanding officer. —Hants Journal.

Rodman Wanamaker will attempt a flight across the Atlantic in June in a 1000 horse-power hydroplane. This announcement has been made by Allan R. Hawley, President of the Aero Club of America. The machine is nearing completion in the Curtiss factories. It is similar in type, but more powerful than the "America," in which Wanamaker was planning a flight just before the outbreak of the war. The "America" was later destroyed in trial flights. The new plane will carry twenty men.

CYMRIC TORPEDOED IN ATLANTIC.

Liverpool, May 8.—11.04 p. m.—The White Star Company, from reports it has received, believes that the steamer Cymric was torpedoed about noon today. The steamer carried no passengers. The Cymric is a steamer of 13,000 tons, considerably larger than the Empress of Britain.

London, May 8, 10.40 p. m.—The Exchange Telegraph Company understands that the Cymric was torpedoed by a German submarine in the Atlantic.

New York, May 8.—The Cymric when she left New York on April 29th, carried a crew of about 100 men, none of whom, so far as is known here by the White Star Line, is an American. She was commanded by Captain Beadell, an Englishman.

According to the line's officials the Cymric was in their service, denial being made that she had been taken over by the British Government. She carried a general cargo, which according to the officials, did not include munitions of war, so far as they knew.

The Cymric was not armed, they said. She was due in Liverpool today. No word had been received from the line's office in England that the vessel had met with mishap. The Cymric discontinued carrying passengers some time ago, it was stated here.

Ottawa May 8.—The Press censor states there were no Canadians aboard the Cymric.

BRITAIN BUILDING ZEPPELIN AIRSHIPS

London.—That England is building airships of the Zeppelin type was disclosed in the house of commons today by Thomas James McNamara, financial secretary of the admiralty, in reply to the question of a member.

Mr. McNamara said that it was not in the public interest to say how many such aircraft Great Britain possessed.



### GERMANS TRY TO ADVANCE ON VERDUN

#### Repulsed by the French

Paris, May 9—After a violent bombardment of the French positions of Hill 304, on the Verdun front, the Germans attempted to advance at 3 o'clock this morning. The War Office announces this afternoon that the attack was repulsed completely.

French counter attacks East of the Meuse drove the Germans from certain positions they had captured. The positions recaptured by the French consisted of some parts of trenches Northwest of Thiamont.

An intense bombardment was conducted by the Germans in the sectors of Eix and Chatillon and between Douaumont and Vaux.

There was a grenade fighting at Apremont and in the valley of the Fret.

South of Autrech, near Soissons, the Germans attempted an attack, but were repulsed.

At Bolante, in the Argonne, the French captured two small German positions, killing all the occupants.

Elsewhere on the front there were no important developments.

### CARSON AND REDMOND CONFERRING OVER DISARMAMENT.

John Redmond and Sir Edward Carson, conferred yesterday on the question of disarmament, in Ireland Mr. Redmond favors the disarmament of everybody, except soldiers; Sir Edward Carson put forward a counter proposal, the details of which have not been made public. It is presumed however, that he does not desire that disarmament measure to apply in the same degree to the Ulster and Nationalist volunteers.

steps be taken to have the old  
time restored.

**PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS**

**Liberal-Conservative Candidates for Kings County:**  
Lieut. J. D. Spidell, of Kentville.  
J. Everett Kinsman, Farmer, of Centreville.

Spidell and Kinsman will be the rallying cry.

The Local Legislature will likely close its session this week. The elections are probable in June and we will see what we will see—a new Executive at the helm in Provincial affairs. So strong is the tide of public feeling against the corroded and barnacled Government that Liberals are not likely to carry more than a baker's dozen of the seats in the Province.

It is to be regretted that Mr. F. A. Parker of Berwick found it impossible to answer to the call of the Conservative party and remain in the field as a candidate. But Kings County people recognize that the farming interests are the most important in this County and have passed over several other good and very strong candidates to get a farmer representative. Mr. J. Everett Kinsman is one who has made a great success in his agricultural and fruit growing work and will be a worthy representative of the industrial life of Kings Co.

The Local Government followers in this County have not yet decided upon their candidates. A convention was to have been held a fortnight ago and the printed notices of Ward meetings for selection of delegates had been distributed. But there is a warm time on among the leaders in the party. Several offices in the County are vacant such as Registrar or Judge of Probate, Official Assignee, appointment to the Legislative Council in place of Hon. A. P. Welton, deceased, and a permanent appointment to the Registry of Deeds office.

The last two offices are the most serious problems the Liberals have to face now. The party has made up its mind that Dr. Covert, M. P. P. cannot again be elected and if he is to relinquish the position, he demands the seat in the Council so that he can move to Halifax and practice his profession there. Then again the list of applicants for the position of Registrar of Deeds shows that the Liberals have decided that the office must be filled before the Local Elections, as after that date a Conservative Government is sure to be in power and the Liberal aspirants will miss the office. But as to which of the many applicants will get the plum is causing the party much deep thought and worry. Hence the delay in selecting candidates until it can be decided who can be turned down with the smallest loss of votes from the different aspirants to office.

Liberals themselves are growing heartily tired and sick of the thirty-four year old Murray Daniels combination that has misgoverned Nova Scotia. The thought of a Province like this with all its wealth in coal, iron and other minerals, crown lands and other sources of income which have all been filtered away and we stand with a debt of nearly fourteen million dollars and nothing to show for it. Our farmers and laborers who are finding it hard to meet expenses in these war times are met with increased and direct taxes levied by the Murray Government. Being obliged to work harder and eat less they do not relish the extra taxes to help impoverish them. The Murray Government spent \$44,000 last year to induce twelve families to come into the Province and

settle here. These settlers were advanced money by the Government to repair buildings fence farms put in crops, buy fertilizer and seed, buy implements and provide stock. Nearly \$4,000 per family paid for these settlers whom we welcome. But a Conservative Government would assist our own people, who have the first claim upon us and not tax them so high that they leave our own Province to seek a home under another flag. It is not to be wondered at that scenes of Liberal farmers will vote against the Murray Government and their candidates in Kings Co.

**HOUSING**

A meeting of the Committee of the Board of Trade on Housing was held last night when it was decided to make a thorough canvas of the Town and immediate vicinity for the purpose of gathering information as to the number of rooms that can be rented for lodgers or boarders. Suitable forms have been prepared and each tenant will be called upon to state what they can do.

To make a success of the scheme the Committee have in mind, will require the patriotic assistance of every citizen of the Town. Roughly the idea is to have a Housing Bureau with a permanent secretary in charge where soldiers and visitors may be told where they can find accommodation. Complete records will be kept of the data gathered by the Committee and a trouble or delay to the visitors largely eliminated.

The Committee will start their canvas today and finish by Monday night and we would ask that everyone in town give this matter their earnest consideration.

It is not so much a matter of dollars and cents as our welfare for the town and in the case of the soldiers our duty to our country.







**EXPERIMENTS MADE**

Experts of the Minnesota Agricultural College have proved that it is the horse that is behind on the evener that draws the greater part of the load. The experiments showed that, if the load is a ton, the horse that keeps its end of the evener eight inches ahead of the other end, pulls only 988 pounds, whereas the slower horse pulls 1,012 pounds.

Another interesting point investigated at the same time was a trial of milking two or three a day. The results showed no advantage in milking three times daily, and the extra labor was considerable. Moreover, the morning milk of cows milked three times daily was often poor, and below the 3 per cent limit.

**GERMAN "U" BOAT SUNK IN BLACK SEA.**

New York, May 8—A despatch from Amsterdam today to the New York Journal says: "Berlin advices received today state that a German submarine was recently sunk by a mine in the Black Sea off the Bulgarian port of Varna. Most of the crew were saved by a destroyer despatched from Varna."

New York, May 8—A news agency despatch from Amsterdam today says: "General Townshend, commander of the British forces that surrendered to the Turks at Kut-el-Amara and four generals of his staff, have arrived at Baghdad, according to Constantinople despatches today."

London, May 9—The German Government has already issued new orders to the commanders of German submarines, in accordance with the concessions set forth in the reply to the American note, according to the Daily Telegraph's Rotterdam correspondent.

**THE POULTRY KAISER'S OPPORTUNITY**

The Present Market Outlook Warrants Greatly Increased Production During 1916

From present indications Great Britain will require all the eggs and poultry Canada can produce during 1916. Last year, as a result of greatly increased production, Canada was able to ship to Great Britain the largest quantity of eggs exported since 1902, and at the same time reduced her imports for home consumption by nearly a million dozen.

Canadian eggs have found favor on the British market, and the prospects are that, providing they are available, much larger quantities will be shipped this year. The unusually high prices prevailing at the present time are largely due to this anticipated export demand.

Prices for poultry are also high, and will likely continue so for the rest of the season. Last fall and winter all the surplus Canadian poultry was exported at highly profitable prices. Between fifty and sixty cars of live poultry were shipped from Western Ontario to the Eastern States alone, and in the Maritime Provinces, particularly in Prince Edward Island, the export demand for canned poultry has greatly enhanced prices to producers.

Although some uneasiness has existed on the part of the trade as regards transportation facilities in view of the high freight rates and the shortage of boats, it is now reasonably certain that an even greater demand for Canadian poultry and eggs will occur this year. It is important, therefore, that every poultry producer takes to profit thereby, by hatching as many chickens as possible this spring.

Now is the time by hatching early, by hatching everything possible in the month of May, to guard against the marketing of so small, undersized, poorly finished poultry, which annually becomes a drug on the market in the fall of the year. Again it is only by hatching now, and giving the chickens every possible chance to thrive and grow, that a maximum supply of eggs can be obtained in the winter time.

Given their proportionate amount of attention, the growing of poultry brings quick and profitable returns to the farmer. With the increasing cost of meats, milk, butter, etc., there is a constantly increasing demand for poultry and eggs. The labor problem is not critical, as the boys and girls on the farm can readily take care of the poultry. The cost of feed is nominal, prices for poultry and eggs are high,—the highest in fact, for many years. It is obvious thereafter, that Canadians have a patriotic, as well as an economic duty to perform in making the year 1916 the banner year for poultry production in Canada.

**THE VALUE OF RAGS**

Don't Burn Them; They Are Worth Money Now.

A paper famine is threatened in Canada—in fact all over the continent—and rags and old paper are being eagerly sought that the supply of paper may be kept up. Even in the Maritime Provinces strong efforts is being made to conserve the waste supply, and the minister of trade and commerce at Ottawa is calling upon all Canadians to help. In New York a bundle of rags is now worth its weight in bread, according to the United Hebrew Charities of that day, which arranged to collect bundles of rags from 300,000 homes on Wednesday, announcing that for each pound of rags received a pound of bread will be available for the poor. The paper mills are waiting for the rags, and the bakers are all ready to supply the bread.—Ex.
