The Creation.

The story of 'Creation' will be told by modern mechanical appliances at the Opera House in five consecutive divisions commencing next Tuesday. Part 1 is exhibited Tuesday, Part 2 Wednesday, Part 3 Thursday and Part 4 Friday, evenings at 8 o'clock. No admission price is charged, no collections are taken. The whole work is supported by voluntary contributions alone. The bringing of this most elaborate and beautiful drama to Wolfville is due in large measure to the public spirit shown by Mr. J. E. ON CURRENT COMMONPLACES.

DEAR MR. EDITOR.—Prior to the 'catastrophe incalculable' the plunging of nearly the whole of the civilized world into the whirlpool of war, the possibility of a world war in the 'Peace-century' was unthinkable, inconceivable.

A 'great miscalculation' has precipitated the very nations which, during the past forty years or so have striven to preserve the peace of the world, into what promises to be, judging from present indications, the Armageddon of almost discarded prophecy.

What a spectacle for the lesser enlightened nations of Christendom, and the peoples of the now Christian world to behold! It is only by a great mental effort I am able to realize that the Kaiser, than whom the world has produced no greater, no more ardent Apostle of Peace,—but deeds speak louder than words—has by an interesting, by violating the Law of Hæc among nations, plunged his sword to the hilt into the very heart of our boasted civilization; being drunk with the sight of power, he has committed a crime against the greatest in one hundred years—crime against humanity.

To have the last of a 20th century war staged in that part of the world which we had thought, with good reason, was the grave of the last great war between enlightened nations, flashed across one's consciousness in, to say the least, staggering. That this hot-headed, cold-hearted autocrat, who, if any person should be held responsible, the Kaiser is that person, should escape the fate that thousands of his innocent subjects have met with, is indeed surprising.

To murder an individual in a crime even in the eyes of war-like nations, and yet these very nations, armed to the teeth, on sea and on land, are perpetrating the same crime, intensified a millionfold in the present titanic struggle for supremacy. The thought haunts me that war, regardless of nationality, past greatness, present prestige and power, is hell; the 'laughter of innocents'; the wounded, sick and dying; the widows and orphans, the waste and loss of lives and property, is truly appalling, to say nothing of the inevitable poverty, pain, distress, commercial depression, industrial paralysis, and general hard times and the hellish bankruptcy, to face a state of national bankruptcy.

But with Britain and Germany opposing each other the problem becomes complicated in my thought. Two nations of common origin, bound together by ties of blood, by centuries of peace and a thousand years of friendship, with interests, religious, cultural, industrial, and commercial so interwoven that the gain of one means gain to the other, while the loss to one would mean loss to the other.

It is humiliating to think of these two prosperous and progressive nations, leaders of the world's thought, being in a state of war, one against the other, bringing to an abrupt termination that mutually happy and helpful intercourse of kindred spirits who are wont to silently look on while Mars determines the destinies of Empires.

Surely the ardent longing for universal peace is not to receive a death-blow as a result of this war. There is every reason why the two Empires should agree to foster friendly relations and settle their disputes and differences by having recourse to force of arms. May the respective rulers and peoples be convinced that unity and jealousy, suspicion, and mistrust are unjustifiable and unworthy of either nation.

Professor Harnack has concluded us that peace is a fruit of the spirit. This and differing with who regard peace as a duty, having recourse to force of arms, and people be convinced that unity and jealousy, suspicion, and mistrust are unjustifiable and unworthy of either nation.

There is but one way of moral conduct to which some would be amenable as well as individuals. Any appeal to force is condemned as morally wrong in a court of law, but in international relationships it is not.
