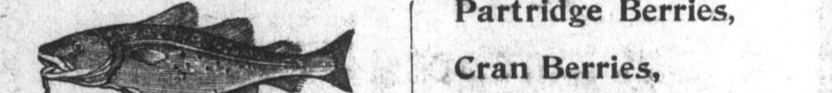

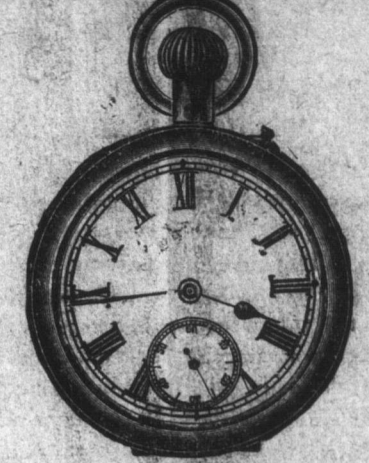

The Evening Chit-Chat

Are you a collector? Not necessarily of stamps or bird's eggs, or any of the conventional things, but just of something. If you aren't you are missing one of the sources of happiness that life has to offer.

Did you ever see a book collector exulting over some old folio he had recently added to his collection? Did you ever see two autograph hunters comparing notes on some new acquisition in the way of great people's hen track signatures? If you have, you have seen a simple way to get a lot of happiness.

The safest happiness is of course that which is founded on the most interests, because then it is not entirely destroyed when two or three of them flag or fail.

I know a retired newspaper man, one of the greatest interests of whose otherwise rather simple and colorless life is—the collection of autographs which he started when he began his newspaper work. All the notable personalities whom he met in the course of his long career were asked to put their names in the book and the result is a splendid collection in whose possession and enlarging he still finds continual pleasure.

A collection like this carries itself on by its own momentum. The only hard thing is to get it started, or rather to get it past that dangerous reaction that usually follows the enthusiasm of the start.

Of course a collection doesn't need to be intrinsically valuable to be a source of happiness. Indeed, I know few better things to collect than a scrapbook full of "quoted odes" and jewels five words long.

That on the stretched forefinger of all time Sparkle forever."

Why, I wonder, do so few people have the scrapbook habit nowadays? In our grandmother's day I think every woman had a scrapbook. Most of us have one of those books still tucked away in a drawer or cupboard—dear, time-yellowed old things, filled with clippings from "The Ladies' Repository" and "Every Saturday," and pages of copying done in the sweet old-fashioned writing that seems almost to exude a faint fragrance of rose leaves and Sweet William and mignonette from its quaint slants and curves.

And on the margins are the finger marks our childish hands made when mother let us take grandmother's scrapbook of a rainy afternoon. Tell me, pray, what are the grandchildren of this scrapbookless age going to do on rainy afternoons?

A gradual collection of sets of books is another source of much pleasure. Start your child with two or three of Scott's or Dickens' or Shakespeare's works and see what pleasure he will take in gradually completing the set.

And then the habit of collecting should be acquired for profit as well as for amusement.

For instance, there is no housewife but would do well to systematically collect all the good ideas and recipes and suggestions that she hears or reads.

There is no business or professional man who would not do well to build up a file of ideas and information regarding his business or profession.

There is doubtless some kind of collection that would profit or amuse you.

Of course I don't know what it is but you do, so why don't you start in to-morrow?

Or better still, to-day?

Hardly any better dusting cloth can be found than the old-fashioned red handanna handkerchief.

To let vines climb up on wooden walls will seriously damage them, as it promotes decay.

If an oven is too hot, the temperature may be lowered by opening the lid of the range a trifle.

When making panfried oysters it is essential to have the pan piping hot before putting anything into it.

When making sweet croquettes, add a little sugar to the crumbs in which the croquettes are to be rolled.

A pinch of salt and soda added to water in which tough meat or vegetables are boiled will make them more tender.

Celery can be much improved by soaking it for an hour in ice cold water in which a lemon has been squeezed.

Pans greased with butter will make the bottom crust of pies soft and flaky and prevent them from being soggy.

If bread is wrapped in paraffin paper as soon as it is taken from the oven, it will keep fresh and moist much longer.

To clean a copper kettle, rub it with powdered bath brick and paraffine, and polish with dry brickdust or whiting.

When finely chopped nuts are needed for cake, salad or sandwiches, the nuts should be run through the mincing machine.

Instead of using soap and water to polish painted surfaces, boil a pound of bran in a gallon of water and strain it.

To clean chamomile skin so that it will be soft after the washing wring it out of the soapy water and dry without rinsing.

Before using the broiler for fish, heat and rub over with a piece of salt pork. It will make the broiling process simple.

Frazee, who is in town, says that the recent athletic tour netted \$62,812 for Jeffries and \$13,666 for Frank Gotch, the wrestler.

"I have closed negotiations for a world's tour to begin immediately after the fight," said Frazee yesterday. "The combination will include Jeffries, Gotch, Stanley Ketchel, James J. Corbett, Sam Berger and Battling Nelson or Ad Wolgast. We will begin with sixty days on the road, visiting all the leading cities in the United States and Canada. On Oct. 15, we will sail from New York to show in Great Britain and Ireland, then France and Germany. We may visit Turkey and later we will go to South Africa. Then the route will be through India, Australia, China, Japan and the Philippines.

There is no time limit fixed for this great trip. In Australia we can get a guarantee of \$100,000 for fifty days and a \$25,000 purse for a twelve round fight between Jeffries and the best heavyweight in the antipodes. DEADLOCKS.

The latest thing in deadlocks was created on Saturday last as a result of the London County Council elections. Fifty-nine Municipal Reformers were returned and fifty-seven Progressives, and two unannounced results are expected to go to the Progressives. Should these returns come out as expected there will be 59 Municipal Reformers to 59 Progressives, a result of precisely the same quality as that of the precedent established in Newfoundland in the Fall of 1908. It will be interesting to learn how the two parties will find a way-out. With us the electorate blazed a broad path out.

In the political world there is a strange mix-up. The returns came out as follows:—

In the matter of the Budget, a curious state of things exists. So far as can be learned the Government is in a decisive minority in the Lloyd George Budget. In favour of it are the Liberals and Laborites, with a

vote of 315; against it the Conservatives and Nationalists with a vote of 255. Here, however, enters the question of tactics, the Nationalists are not disposed to vote against it. If there is a chance of clipping the powers of the House of Lords sufficiently to put through a Home Rule bill, while the Independent Nationalists appear to be determined to oppose the Budget at any cost. If, however, there is no probability of doing this, both branches of the Nationalists will oppose it.

The question of tactics also enters into the course mapped out by Mr. Balfour. The King's Government must be carried on, and Tories are willing to vote for the Budget, if the clauses objectionable to them are dropped. Lloyd George declines to bargain on the lines of the objections made by the lords of land, &c. But he is in a hole, and is deferring Budget proposals to get over the financial straits by borrowings authorized by Parliament.

Neither the Conservatives nor Nationalists consider the time opportune to turn the Government out. They do not consider it politic to do this, nor will one part let the other do it at present. Redmond blocks Balfour and Balfour blocks Redmond, and meanwhile last year's Budget is out in the cold.

All this has a tendency to force the issues about the House of Lords to the front.

The leading Lords, the Conservatives and the moderate Liberals are agitating for radical changes in the constitution of the Upper House. The Laborites want to wipe it out. The Radicals want to draw its teeth and are not agitating for a change of membership. The London Times is advocating reform in membership and the abolition of its power over finance.

W. T. Stead believes that the more democratic ministers are in favour of reform on the following lines:—

First—Abolition of the hereditary element.

Second—The creation of an elected Senate with from 200 to 300 members.

Third—The second chamber is to have no right to amend or reject any financial bills.

Fourth—When the two houses differ, they will sit and vote together.

Fifth—As an alternative, the veto of the Second Chamber shall be overruled if the House of Commons passes the same bill in two successive sessions.

proposed that if the Senate rejects any bill in one Parliament, it shall not be allowed to reject such bill if it is sent up again by the new Parliament after the question has been submitted to the electors.

Warship Loan.

Replying to Count Oppendorff's criticism of the Government's policy in the construction of warships on loans, and regarding the Krupp monopoly of armour plates, Admiral Von Tirpitz said that the system of loans for warship building would cease in 1916, after which no new ships would be built from the product of taxation.

LECTURE.
The educational progress of any community is not to be measured alone, by honours, marks and prizes, but also by its attitude of appreciation towards a higher standard of recreation and amusement.

The Lecture given by Mr. J. Crewe, Principal of the Anglican School, before the Literary and Debating Club, was entitled: "Knowledge is Power," and consisted of an exhaustive review of the history and influence of books from the time of Caxton to our own day. After dealing briefly with the early struggles of the inventors of printing against the prejudice of ignorance and superstition, the lecturer proceeded to show how from abysmal darkness the dawn of knowledge broke slowly into day. And then, in lucid sequence, the attentive audience was carried down the ages and was shown how at every step, improved methods of printing spread knowledge through the land, till men at length were able to think freely for themselves and to realize that knowledge truly is the source of power.

The address will be long remembered by the younger members for its practical suggestions on the use and misuse of books, on the good to be sought, and the dangers to be avoided; while all must have left the hall with a determination to profit in some practical way, by applying to their reading and storing in the treasury of their minds, some golden thoughts from such a wealth of friendly counsel and advice.

CONCERT.
On Wednesday, the following night an entertainment was given in the S. U. F. Hall to assist in defraying the expenses incurred in the painting of the church. The concert opened with a comedy entitled: "Chickens" (written for the occasion by a local gentleman), and an hilarious fifteen minutes of "courtship under difficulties," gave the night a merry start. The most noticeable features of the programme were a double quartet, "Come Where the Lilies Bloom," which was rendered with great taste and expression, and a song by Miss Jessie Miles, with mandolin obligato entitled: "Fleeing Years." An instrumental trio by Miss Rowell, the Rev. H. G. Pegg and Dr. Rutherford, adapted from Hayden's Toy Symphony, was followed by a sprightly duet by Miss Miles and Mr. Crewe, in which they tunefully wrangled on the eternal question: "What is Love?" Mr. Pegg made a hit with a song in Somersetshire dialect, and the "Old Vat Zow" received a hearty encore. One of the surprises of the evening was "The Bonnet Drill." Eight young ladies wearing Quaker bonnets, marvelously bedizened with lace and flowers, went through a series of india rubber evolution to the strains of a lively march. Callisthenics are all very well, but when after circling backwards for a while, the performers were seen to bring their heels in contact with the backs of their heads, one trembled for their vertebrae. The mystery was solved, however, when it was seen, that the reversal of the bonnet, with a mask attached to the back of the head, and an apron fastened behind, created the illusion of a squad of "boneless wonders"; lively farce in which men, women, boys and dogs were successfully thrown into a gaudy machine, from which there promptly issued yards of sausages. Messrs. John Miles and J. Rowell were infinitely in the title role; while the resurrection of the "Exploding Policeman" proved a lively finish to a good clean farce.

"Rule Britannia" in full harmony brought to a close a most enjoyable evening. There is one indispensable member of such a company, whose services go often unrecruited, but we do not hesitate to attribute much of the success of the entertainment to the untiring efforts and unflinching courtesy of the accompanist, Miss Blanche Towell. To Mr. and Mrs. John Rowell also thanks are due for the loan of their valuable piano.

Concert and social engagements are now over till Lent is passed; but we expect to have an instructive lecture from Dr. Forbes on March 1st, under the auspices of the Literary and Debating Club which without doubt will draw a large and appreciative audience.

The Pennsylvania Railroad will have 900 steel day passengers cars and 500 steel mail and sleeping cars in its equipment when present orders have been filled. It is announced that the company is about to place in service on the New York-Chicago route the first solid steel passenger train ever operated on a railroad anywhere—a train constructed of non-combustible material from the locomotive pilot to the rear platform.

The famous Lena collection of art objects and antiquities was recently sold at auction in Berlin, and the top price was brought by a bumper made of hammered tin, which sold for \$8,000. It is known to the collectors of the world as the Breslau tin bumper, and is supposed to have been made in Breslau in 1500. It is octagonal in shape, and on its sides are scenes from the lives of the evangelist.

Items of Interest LABRADOR.

Its Discovery, Exploration and Development—By W. G. Gosling.
PAPER II.
A great number of books have been written on Newfoundland and Labrador. The bibliography in my History of Newfoundland covers thirty pages of small print, and only brings the list of works down to the nineties. It can be confidently stated that amongst this multifarious literature there is no extant work on Labrador that can be compared with Gosling's book as a compendium of the history of the great Peninsula, the story of its development, its progress and economies up to the present date. One remarkable episode in the History of Labrador, the invasion of the coast by a horde of American fishermen in the last century, is given with every detail, the cause of its sudden rise and the reasons for its rapid extinction. In dealing with Americans, Newfoundland always encounters the most unscrupulous rivals; they evade all laws and regulations and lie out of every difficulty. On the West Coast, although all the winter herring are caught by our people and bought from them by the Americans, every barrel is passed into the States under a solemn declaration made before the Custom House officer that they are the sole product of American industry. At the time of their invasion of Labrador they could only use harbors that were not occupied by Newfoundlanders. The law was a dead letter; they always evaded it, entered every harbor that suited them and cured their fish ashore. The story of our Labrador fishery, its wonderful development and gradual extension right down to Cape Chidley, is admirably told, and its changes, vicissitudes, success and prosperity is something abnormal. In my first paper I mentioned that Cartwright and his three volumes of journals was the Labrador subject that interested Coleridge, Southey and Boswell; so in our day the one pre-eminent attraction about our great dependency for the modern world is Grenfell. Mr. Gosling is a friend and in hearty sympathy with our wonderful doctor. The adventure told in this book about Grenfell's escape a year ago is a most extraordinary story. If it had happened in one of Jules Verne's marvelous tales critics would at once declare that it was unnatural and absurd fiction. Travelling with his dog team across a frozen bay he suddenly found himself on soft slish ice which would not bear his team, and in which he could not swim. After immense difficulties he managed to get one dog on a small pan of ice, and hauling himself along by the dog's trace he also contrived to get on the very small pan and to pull up the dogs. He soon discovered that the ice was moving out of the bay and that he and his dogs were at sea. The awful horror of such a situation would have scared most men to death. There appeared nearly the grim certainty of starvation and an awful death in the dreadful Arctic night. It was the supreme test of Grenfell's courage and resources. Nearly every one in such a dire strait would have despaired. Grenfell is not that sort. He set to work at once and killed three dogs, skinned them and wrapped the skin round his body. With the leg bones he made a staff on which he hung his shirt. Fortunately he was seen from the shore in the late afternoon and rescued just in time. Space will not permit me to go more into detail about this more interesting book. What I recommend my readers is to get the book and peruse it themselves. I heartily congratulate Mr. Gosling on his great work. D. W. P. March 7th, 1910.

King Was Asked For Guarantees.

London, March 1.—Despite the Premier's denials, it now seems that he asked King Edward indirectly for guarantees that the House of Lords should not be permitted indefinitely to block Liberal legislation. These the King refused to give, not desiring to be the last hereditary institution in England, and expressing doubt as to whether the country had signified a wish for any drastic treatment of the House of Lords.

Mr. Jowett, M.P., chairman of the Labor party, denounced the King on Sunday last at Bradford. Liberal newspapers now contain similar hints. This revelation cannot improve the condition of the Liberal party in the eyes of the country.

GREAT BIBLE WORK.

New Edition of the Revised Version--
Thirty-Seven Years Task.

After thirty-seven years of work, the enormous task of drawing up full marginal references to the Revised Version of the New Testament will reach completion by the publication from the University presses shortly a new edition of the revised version—an edition which all clergymen, ministers, and biblical students in every corner of the world will desire to possess.

So far back as December 1873 the New Testament Company of Revisers requested the late Dr. Scrivener and Professor Moulton to undertake the task of compiling the references. The work progressed slowly, however, and in the edition of the Revised Version of 1893 only abridged references were published. Since Professor Moulton's death the entire work of compiling the fuller references has been carried out by Dr. A. W. Greenup and Dr. J. H. Moulton, son of the professor.

Dr. Greenup is now Principal of St. John's Hall, a college of divinity in Highbury. A conversation with him discloses the enormous amount of detailed work that has had to be accomplished. For instance, to many verses in the Gospels and Epistles have been added nearly a hundred marginal references, each bearing on the text and meaning of the verse. Innumerable commentaries and Testaments in English, French, German, Greek and Hebrew were read by Dr. Greenup for the purpose.

Ten Years on One Verse.

"I was engaged upon the task for thirteen years," said Dr. Greenup yesterday. "When I first undertook the duty I was rector of Alburgh, in Norfolk, and had more time than than afterwards, when I came to St. John's Hall. I have often worked ten and thirteen hours a day during my vacations. I used to go for the vacation work to a place I had in the country, Bram's Hill, Eversleigh—Charles Kingsley's old parish—taking with me two huge boxes filled with commentaries and books to read."

"I think I have read every commentary published upon the Testament as well as many different issues of the Authorized Version with marginal references. In my work I came across many curious volumes. There was, for example, a big Bible with large marginal references published privately in two volumes by Mr. John Rylands, of Manchester. Hearing of the work I was engaged upon Mrs. Rylands was good enough to give me copies of this volume."

To aid Dr. Greenup in his task very large sheets were printed with the Gospel texts in large type, with very ample margins. On these margins he compiled his list of references. "One verse may have taken me ten years to complete," said the doctor, "by my returning to it again and again. It was extremely trying work, and at one period my eyes gave way and I had to cease work for a time."—Daily Mail.

"Intellectuals" of Massachusetts Denounced

Declaring that a war against ideals, a war of corruption of sacred principles, was being waged on every side, Archbishop O'Connell, of Boston, denounced the folly of Massachusetts "intellectuals" who were said to be leading that war.

"Men who call themselves leaders in the intellectual world have openly and candidly and frankly avowed that one of the greatest steps of progress in our times is the destruction of all organized religion. I could name these men; I prefer not to do so. Everybody knows them. The war is more clearly against us of the Catholic Church than any other religion. It is a war against ideals, a war of corruption of sacred Christian principles, and it is going on on every side. These men declare that Christianity is a failure. These men are not in France, but here in Boston.

"I ask them: What will you give us in place of Christianity? You intellectual men must give us some scheme in its place, so that society may live and prosper. To this question, which is all important, there is no definite answer. They give us specious words about 'new thought,' which is as old as infidelity.

"We can argue very clearly what will be given us. They have to give us the omnipotence of the state. That is, we are to rise and work and study and read and eat for the state and

pray, if pray we do, to the state. All this we are to do by law. That is the first very agreeable condition. That means no human liberty left. We are all to be slaves! For what are we to live? We amount to nothing, merely ants in the ant-hill. What comes to me out of this? It is all for the glory of the state. But who is the head of the state to receive this glory? There is no head; it is all mere impersonalities. Nonsense! We human beings cannot live and work and die for impersonalities.

"What are the compensations they offer? One is free love! Don't be scandalized. They preach divorce as much as you like! This is very alluring for men who are only to be slaves. And this is given out as a mark of progress. This is taught, I learn from magazines that are considered reliable, to young girls in institutions of learning—young girls in this state of ours—that sacramental marriage should be abolished. What else? In the end there must be suicide, homicides of various kinds, and, finally despair.

"This is the creed which the intellectuals of Massachusetts are handing out as the substitute for the religion which Jesus Christ came to earth and died to give to men. And are we to be silent and let these doctrines spread among those given to our care.

"Only a few days ago I heard from one who saw and heard—an eye-witness—that a number of the fashionable ladies of Boston listened to an illuminating address on the Oriental harem, women of fashion and intelligence. Some one was brought to enlighten the Christian women of Boston on the delights of the Oriental harem! This is a fact! Twenty years ago; yes, ten years ago, Christian women here would have driven out of the town any such person, but that day is gone. We have progressed!

"We are not talking myths. There is a danger to the faith. It is no longer a danger; it is a reality. Hundreds of thousands have been swept out of their churches. We are, at least, not responsible for them, but we are responsible for our own, and we will not stand by to see our own swept down without a solemn and public protest. More! We gather our forces, and shielding them under the banner of the church, we remind them of what they promised when in baptism they renounced Satan with all his works and pomps."

PREPARING FOR REFORM.

London, February 25.—The House of Lords, apart from Lord Rosebery's motion, are discussing steps to reform themselves. Conferences are going on among the Unionist Peers, while Lord Lansdowne has also invited expressions of opinion from leading men of the Upper House. It is understood that the conclusions thus tentatively reached differ materially from the proposals made by Lord Rosebery's committee in 1908.

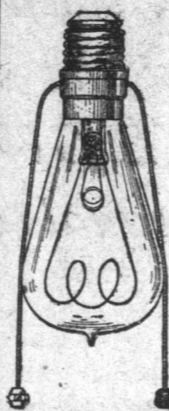

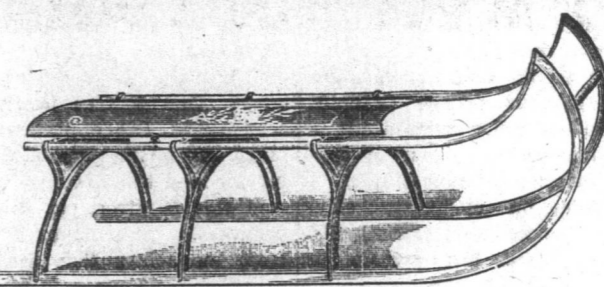

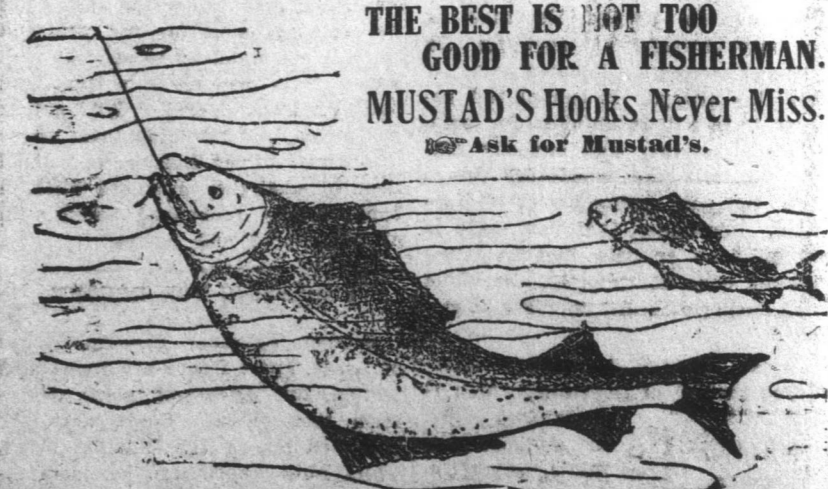
