Capitalizing the Minutes.

The manager of a small factory recently introduced a unique scheme for impressing upon the employees of his office, the value of their time during working hours. For years the office help had on time or another come in anywhere from one to fifteen minutes late.

Royal and Gracious.

Some little time ago we announced that His Majesty the King had graciously consented to take a personal part in the function of laying the foundation stone of the Home for Fishermen and Seamen on Water St. We stated that arrangements were being made to establish direct communication between Buckingham Palace and the Home, and that His Majesty on Coronation Day would touch a button in the Palace which would give a direct signal to His Excellency the Governor, Sir Ralph Williams, to proceed with the laying truly and well of the chief corner stone of the building. Much gratification was felt that our Sailor King, on such an auspicious occasion, should personally participate in a Coronation function in Newfoundland. Gracious and tactful as the act will be on its intrinsic merits, there is another feature of it, we learn, which makes it especially appropriate to the august occasion and most complimentary to the Oldest Colony of the Crown and to its loyal citizens. After the sacred, illustrious, and ancient functions of the Coronation have been solemnized in Westminster Abbey, the first public function he will perform will be the transmission of the Royal Signal to His Excellency at the Seamen's Home. In a way this is a Royal Recognition on the part of His Majesty of Newfoundland as the senior among the Overseas States, and the grace and goodwill of His Majesty will find an enduring remembrance in the hearts of the Vikings of the Empire.

Dogs Destroy Calves.

To-day a resident of Petty Hr. came to the police station and reported that last night the place was infested with dogs which roam about in packs and are vicious as they are mostly famished with hunger. Some of the people of the place had to leave their houses and drive them away. The man who made the report says that three calves already have been killed and eaten by the brutes, and it is likely the police will be instructed to shoot them all.

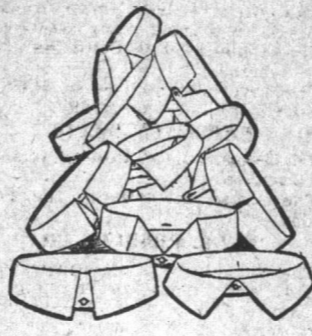

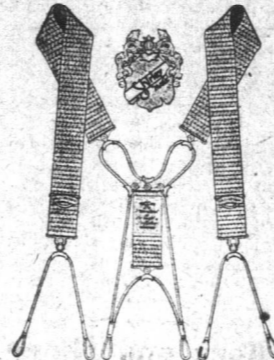

Seamen's Strike.

HAMBURG, To-day.
The Seamen's Organization here notified the strikers at Antwerp that Germans will not participate in the International strike because their demands have been satisfied. New York. American seamen in coastwise vessels, who have threatened to strike, sent a committee to shipowners yesterday to present their demands. The delegation will report to-night to a mass meeting of sailors, firemen, cooks and stewards. Vice-President Griffin of the International Seamen's Union of America said that 20,000 men would be involved in the proposed strike. The coast trade between Maine and New Orleans would be stopped, unless shipowners acceded to the union's demands. London. The C.P.R. made advance to the Seamen's Union as the White Star Co. did also. It is stated that these concessions will enable the Teutonic, Baltic and Empress of Ireland to sail on time.

Imperial Conference.

LONDON, To-day.
At the Imperial Conference yesterday, a discussion took place on the resolutions providing for cheaper cable rates throughout the Empire by laying an "all red" route, linking up all the British Dominions. Mr. G. explained the steps recently taken to secure reduction in Atlantic cable rates. In view of this the Government did not feel justified at the present time in incurring the expense of laying a new cable. A resolution was adopted that if considerable reductions in transatlantic cable rates are not effected in the near future, the project to lay a State owned cable between England and Australia should be considered at a subsidiary Conference.

LONDON, To-day.
The Daily Chronicle, says Carnegie, in a letter to an Arbitration meeting at Edinburgh, declared that Germany, France and Holland have expressed willingness to enter into a treaty to submit disputes to peaceful arbitration. The Daily Chronicle editorially doubts the statement that Germany has gone so far.

The Reciprocity Bill now has 60 votes in the States Senate. According to the White House count the Root amendment will be killed by a comfortable majority.

Owing to persistent rumors of invasion by Monarchists from the Spanish provinces into North Portugal the Portuguese Government made an inspection along the frontier. Quiet reigns but military precautions will be maintained.

Pleasant Episode At Petty Harbour.

On Sunday last, after the administration of the Sacrament of Confirmation by the Archbishop, at Petty Harbour, His Grace was treated to a real surprise, of a very agreeable character. The head teacher of the school, Miss Wood, on behalf of the children, invited His Grace to the school-room where all the children were gathered. On a table in the centre of the room stood, in its pot, a magnificent shrub of Pelargonium. It was about two feet in height and was one mass of rich and fragrant bloom. It was of the species *Sanquineum maculatum*. The great profusion of flowers bore petals of pure white, flecked with spots of crimson like blood drops. The teacher in a neat and graceful speech presented the flower on behalf of the children to the Archbishop. To say that His Grace was taken by surprise would not adequately express his feelings. He was simply overwhelmed with gratitude at the kindness and delicacy of the thought which suggested such a beautiful present. He thanked them in a few sincere and touching words. He said the present was a most appropriate one, coming from the children, and especially on such a day as this. In the morning their souls had been fed by the Bread of Angels, the Body of Our Lord, in the Holy Communion. Later on the Holy Ghost, the third Person of the Blessed Trinity, had descended upon them in the Sacrament of Confirmation, filling them with all His Divine Gifts. The pure whiteness of the petals of the flower seemed to him to symbolize the spotless purity and virtue with which the souls of each of them were adorned, while the crimson spots were clearly emblematic of the flame of Divine Love, enkindled in their hearts by the Precious Blood received in the Holy Communion. Thus the flower displayed in a living emblem the brightness of their unshaken Faith; and the glow of their ardent Love of the Redeemer. His Grace would cherish, as long as it would last, this beautiful token of their affection and sincerity. He felt sure there was no need to beg for prayers from hearts which had shown such token of love, and he could only hope to repay them by remembering them at the Altar while offering the Holy Sacrifice for them and their parents and friends, and he felt particularly grateful to the good teachers who had inspired the hearts of their little ones with such sweet sentiments of love and reverence to their Archbishop.—Com.

From Labrador.

BEOTHIC WENT AS FAR NORTH AS INDIAN HARBOR.

The s.s. Beothic, Capt. Parsons, arrived here from Labrador at 7:10 last evening. Capt. Parsons went as far north as Indian Harbor, calling at all the principal ports between Battle Harbor and that port except Emly, which could not be entered on account of heavy ice. The fishing crews and freight for Emly had to be landed at Smokey. The fishing crews for other places were all landed safely, but in many cases with difficulty. They had to travel ashore over the ice at many ports of call. At Cuthroat (upper), where the ship reached on the 12th, a heavy jam of ice was visible, extending as far north as could be covered with the glass. Seeing that it was impossible to get further north, Capt. Parsons came south. A heavy jam of ice was met in the mouth of Gross Water Bay, but the Beothic forced through it and reached Grady without mishap. The ice was not in tight to Capt. Parsons' boat. The pack was very close near Battle Harbor, and Capt. Parsons thought it best not to meddle with it but set his course for the run out side of Belle Isle, passing through growlers nearly the whole way. A gale of N. E. wind with thick fog and heavy sea prevailed all the way to the coast till Twillingate was reached on Wednesday last. Capt. Parsons called at King's Cove, Catalina Cartoneer and Harter Grace. He reports that only two schooners had reached Labrador up to last week—the Minnie Tulk at Wolf Island, and the Constant at Griffin's Harbor. Capt. Parsons says there is no trout in the destination stories, and that all the residents on the coast at the harbor he visited are well after the long cold winter.

Stabbed With Knife.

JOHN WILLIAMS IN HOSPITAL— CUT WITH KNIFE USED BY GEO. LAMBERT.

Shortly after 7 o'clock last evening a lad named John Williams, of Bond Street, was stabbed in the chest by a knife used by George Lambert, of Boncloddy Street, in the East End Postal Telegraph Office, where both were messenger boys. Shortly after the affair occurred a Telegram reporter went to the office and learned the facts from Mr. A. Fraser, the superintendent at the office, and Mr. Willar, the checker there, of 25 Prospect Street. Mr. Fraser was inside the screen checking up his day's work and did not see the actual occurrence, though he heard the boys arguing and the subsequent scuffle, and asked them to desist. Shortly before the scuffle, Williams came to the office and found Lambert at the drawer of the table opposite the floor. Williams spoke to him, and as he was claiming to have the chair of this table, ordered Lambert away from it. Lambert replied that he had as much right to be there as he (Williams) had. Williams then said, "I will take you out of here," and seized the boy by the shoulders, lifting him from the chair in which he sat. Lambert then struck him on the chest with the chair, and Williams took the chair he had wanted. Lambert then addressed some hot words to Williams, when the latter struck him on the chest and struck the other. The boys grappled and in the struggle Williams put up one of his knees as if to ward off a blow. Williams then hit him and immediately said he was hurt and placed his hand to his stomach. Willar then took Williams outside when he raised his clothes and it could be seen that he had been cut with a knife on the left side of the stomach above the groin. The implement had gone about a half inch in width and was inflicted. From it part of the bowels protruded. Mr. Fraser said that, on examining the boy he found that the wound was a nasty one, and consulting with Mr. Fraser it was deemed advisable to inform the police, and the doctor was "phoned." Superintendent Grimes and Sergt. Byrne came quickly to the office and put Lambert under arrest. In the meantime a cab was called and Williams was driven quickly to the Hospital, where he was given every attention. The wound is an ugly one but not necessarily dangerous, and the opinion in the Hospital last night was that the boy would be about again in due course. Supt. Grimes received the facts of the case from Mr. Fraser and Master Willar, who said he saw Lambert take a penknife which he had been using on a lead pencil from the table, but he could not say that he saw him actually stab the other. The belief is that in the scuffle Lambert momentarily forgot he held the knife and that it accidentally cut the other. Both boys are of respectable connections, and a sad feature of the case is that Lambert's father is very ill and fears for his recovery are entertained. The police have the knife which Lambert had in his possession. At the Hospital last night the doctors attended the wound and it is thought that nothing of a serious nature will result. The affair is an unfortunate one for all concerned. After the accident occurred, J. G. Sullivan, who was at his office, received all the facts of the case. Lambert seemed to be greatly concerned over what had occurred.

GOT AWAY QUICKLY.—The Carthaginian was rushed away quickly yesterday afternoon, leaving at 4 p.m. The passengers and crew are hopeful that they will reach England in time for the Coronation.

VALENCIA, June 15. The entrance to the Cathedral here has been shattered by a bomb explosion. The building has been damaged.

ASCOT, June 15. The Gold Cup has been won by Willony; Charles O'Malley came second, and Declare, third.



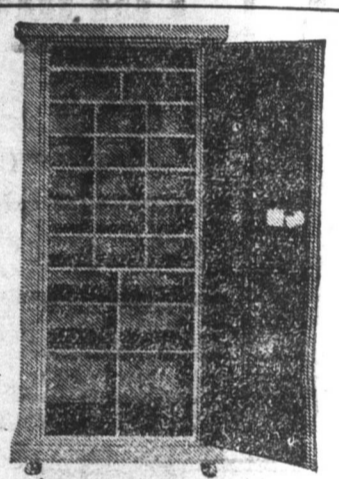
