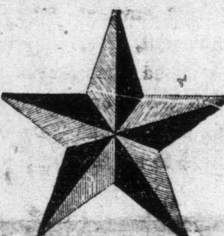

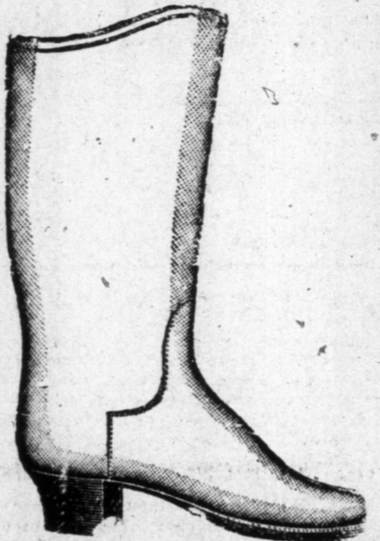

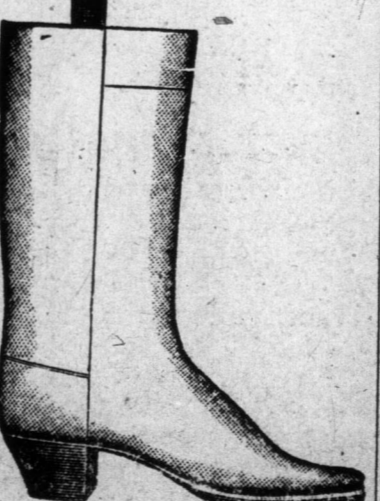

A Disagreeable Type.

"Speak well of thy neighbor or not at all." Not long ago I had the pleasure of meeting a man who had been travelling for many years as the ship's doctor on one of the coastwise steamers. It seemed to me that in the double capacity of doctor and traveller he must have met many unusual people. So one day I asked him to tell me about some of them.

"Well, Miss Cameron," he said, "there was a party of four, who sat at my table two trips ago that beat anything I ever struck. Now maybe you won't believe this, but I sat there with them for fifteen meals, and in all that time I never heard one of those people say a good word about anybody. They raked everybody on the boat fore and aft, made fun of them, talked scandal about them and ran them down generally. They had a bad word for every officer and every steward on the ship, and what they said about each other when any of them was rash enough to leave the table first, was a caution."

The other day I received a letter from one of my letter friends and promptly thought of the ship's doctor. "Some day you will please write something to suit such individuals as this," requested my correspondent. "I am going to give you actual conversations except for names. This individual is my next door neighbour. I was out one morning watching for the postman. My neighbour was on a similar errand at her front door. A stylish-looking woman, with whom I

have since become acquainted and found to be a model housewife, passed by. I remarked to my neighbour on the pleasing effect of her costume. "Don't you think it is awfully loud?" I don't believe she is much good either," she said. "I wouldn't say a word of harm about the woman for the world, but I have seen things that didn't look just right to me."

Just then a neighbour passed drawing some chicken feed in a child's wagon. She had been to the market and gotten it cheaper. "Look at that," said my neighbour. "I think I would be hard-up before I'd haul chicken feed through the street."

"Did you know Mrs. C. had gone to the Springs?" was the next remark. "Mrs. C.?—I'm afraid I don't know her." "Don't you remember—that woman who went up the aisle at church last Sunday with her belt pulled away from her skirt?" I had to admit that I had not noticed. I could keep this up indefinitely, but I have some regard for your time."

My letter friend suggests that I write something condemning these people.

I don't see much need of it. Do you? It seems to me they are self-condemned. No one who doesn't belong to their rank has any use for them, and even those who do, talk about them behind their backs, for there is no honour among character thieves.

But one thing I do suggest. Conditions like these have a beginning. These people weren't always as bad as that. They must have gradually grown worse. Now hadn't you and I better see to it that we never, never make the first start towards such a beginning?

have been put into their respective dishes ready for the dining room, the pans should be filled at once with warm water; they will be much easier to wash. The kitchen range can be managed in a way to save fuel. Upon rising in the morning, turn five the grate, open the draughts for a few minutes. When the coals begin to brighten the draught should be shut off. Then breakfast can be prepared and the fire used for an hour afterwards without replenishing. This method can be repeated at each meal. The oven heats more easily if the fire is clean and the fire box not more than half full of coal.

A Game of 'Bluff'

The Reid Newfoundland Company signed a contract with the Government to build a branch line of railway from Shoal Harbour to Bonavista. Included in that branch line was a Spur line, running from Jenkins' farm, near Gott's Cove, into the town of Trinity.

The Spur was not a separate branch and did not necessitate a separate contract, nor a separate plan; it was part and parcel of the Bonavista Branch and was so contracted for. The Government appropriated the land for the Spur and some of that land was arbitrated on and paid for two years ago. The remainder of the Spur right-of-way is, we understand, still unpaid for, though appropriated and some of it entered upon by the Contractor.

Just before the official opening of the Bonavista Branch last November a few crews of men were put to work and did some grading on either end. It was urged that the season was too far advanced to complete the work and that operations would be resumed the next Spring.

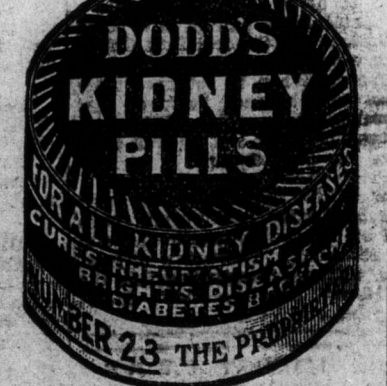
Spring came and went; Summer likewise; and now Autumn is with us and fast slipping into Winter, and no work is being done on the Spur. As a matter of fact even the west-harrows that were left behind last year have been removed elsewhere.

What does all this mean? Bluff! Bluff! Bluff! The Government has bluffed the people of Trinity; the Contractor has bluffed certain members of the Government, and members of the Government have bluffed one another and the only persons who have not done any bluffing are Hon. R. Watson and Mr. Grant, both of whom have been consistent advocates of the Spur from the start.

Much more than bluffing is involved in this apparently trivial Spur line, however. The questions arise as to whether a Contractor can take his own time to complete a contract; whether the Government can appropriate people's land and wait for years before compensating them; whether the Government and Contractor understand one another in this game of bluffing the people of Trinity and whether they purpose trying the same game elsewhere.

Why haven't the Government and the Contractor the courage to tell the people of Trinity straight that the Spur line will never be built. This is being said for them, over and over again, by understrappers and officials. Is it all "bluff"? And how long is this "bluffing" to continue? Trinity Enterprise, Sept. 28, 1912.

Household Notes.

Chiffon veils can be washed by mixing two parts of finely powdered starch with one part of powdered borax. Spread the veil out and rub the mixture well into it. Shake out and repeat until there is only enough left for one last rub. Spread this on the veil and let it stand for twenty-four hours. Then shake it out, and the veil will be as fresh as ever.

Black linen, to be washed successfully, should first be dipped in cold salt water, one teaspoonful to each gallon of water. Wring out of this and put into a tub of clean warm water, to which some soap suds should be added; then wash with the hands, not on a board. Put through two rinsing waters to which salt has been added. Then starch on the wrong side.

A delightful way to serve tartar sauce is to cut a lemon in half, clean out the inside thoroughly and then fill the halves with sauce. One is served to each guest. When fish is served, the little lemon cups are

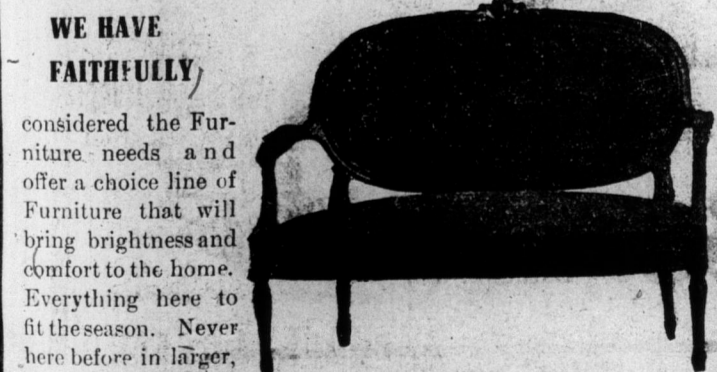

The Morris Party's Broken Pledges.

More than four and a half years ago, Sir Edward Morris announced himself as the leader of the People's Party. The name, however, never caught on. The people were sceptical about the appropriateness of the title for a Morris-Morison Combine, and the record of the doings of that party since that time has fully justified that scepticism.

The promise that there should be established Cold Storage for Bait, in such a way that the advantages may be generally participated in is on record. But fishermen are wondering where the Bait storage is in which they may generally participate. So far from assisting the fishermen to get bait the Bait Service on the South Coast was disorganized this year in order to give the Governor a trip.

The promise to afford an opportunity to the people to elect Road Boards and to manage their local affairs has not been carried out. Instead of this, the way outport grants have been spent in far more objectionable today than it ever was.

Potting Plants For Winter.

Of course you desire to have some blooming plants for the long winter days, and I will tell you how to have them with the least expenditure of time and money. By the time this article appears in print the days of the outdoor plants will be over, and it is from these that you can get a supply to replenish your indoor pots for winter.

You should not use old plants, especially of the geranium (by far the best winter-blooming house-plant), but only those which were grown from cuttings, struck last spring and grown outdoors during the summer. Plants which were in the house and which were set out in the beds the past summer will be too much weakened to make good blooming ones the coming winter.

Those which were grown from cuttings last spring will hardly have reached that period of best bloom before the frost will kill them, but you must get them out of the soil and into pots before they have been touched by the frost.

Select the small, stocky ones; those with plenty of branches, and take them out of the beds with a ball of the soil about the roots, after the soil has been watered thoroughly so as to get as many of the fine, feeding, fibrous-roots as possible. You are sure to tear loose quite a large number of these, and on this account, and also in order to make the plants more branching back to two buds or "eyes."

This will take the strain off the roots, and allow them to remake the fibrous ones lost in taking from the ground and make the whole plant more branching. Keep in mind the fact that the more branching the plant is the more flowers there should be in bloom at one time.—Samuel Armstrong Hamilton in Woman's World for October.

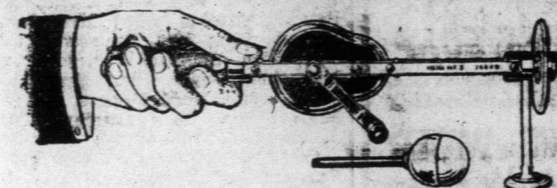

The revenue, wrung from the hardy toilers, who are ever risking their lives to secure bread for their children, often bravely dying while seeking comforts for their little ones, as witness the many sorrowful cases of this nature during the present year, and all this, Mr. Editor, while Sir Edward and his army of Government officials are being over-worked (?) with many of them only three hours a day in their laborious (?) work, their health generally breaks down, and they are compelled to seek leave of absence for a couple of weeks or maybe be months to recuperate, as they call it, and their pay going on all the while.

No, Mr. Editor, I cannot cut politics out of my letters, not even to please a few of the city folks, such as the one Tom was speaking to.

There is quite a lot of interesting news to tell you, and as Tom has not got much else to do now for a couple of weeks until potato-digging time, he is going to get all the crumbs he can and bring them home for me to send along.

But right here in this town we have our Inspector of Police keeping a boarding house, and that to the disadvantage of a few struggling hotel keepers. I have it on pretty good authority that it was at the Bailey Hotel that Inspector General Sullivan put up while here. Now, my Tom, wanted me to "take a house" on the street for boarders, but what's the use?

We have had policemen here keeping cows, and supplying a lot of people with milk, and we have another Government official here who is running a large farm and supplying vegetables to people on Bell Island ten per cent. cheaper than our farmers can do it. All this to the disadvantage of the poor farmer.

A People's Party man who is apparently sick of the Party is mentioned as raising a pair of wings so as to be able to fly over to the Liberal side the first chance. But Tom says he will never vote for anything with a smell of Toryism about him, and there are others of his calibre (I saw that word in a sporting advertisement) and not a few.

Before I close there is another matter I want to touch on so as to put people on their guard, and a subject I want to refer to at greater length before long, and that is the Old Age Pension Scheme. From what I can learn there is more in that than many people may imagine. A report comes to me by wireless that an old man here applied to headquarters for the pension, and being a little under age his plea was that he was not well able to work. After a little consideration it was decided to give him a little allowance—four dollars a month I think, but not the pension. In this case, of course it is, (wrongfully I am sure) called pauper relief, and he is thus deprived of his vote. The chances are that all such allowances will be reserved for Liberals, so my husband, wise old man that he is, requests me to draw attention to this fact, and warn all Liberals that if they accept an allowance in lieu of the pension they will be disfranchised, perhaps I ought to make it plainer, they will be paupers and not allowed to vote.

Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, Sept. 30.

The Near East situation is considered in diplomatic circles here, as distinctly pessimistic, although officials are disposed to be optimistic. This feeling is widely shared, in consequence of the lateness of the season, and the fact that the Powers are working in concert, and tendering advice to the Balkan States to keep the peace. The stoppage of the passage of Servian ammunition by the Turks is regarded as the most serious incident so far recorded. The Servians take this as a grave affront, and demand its immediate release. The Servian charge d'affaires here states that Servia is just as ready on the point of demanding reforms in Macedonia, Turco-Grecian relations have improved since Turkey apologized to Greece for firing by Turkish troops on a Greek steamer. The British proclamation of general mobilization has, on the other hand, added fuel to the Balkan fire.

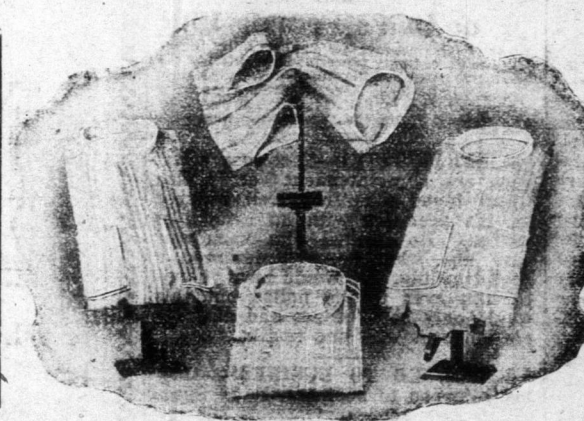

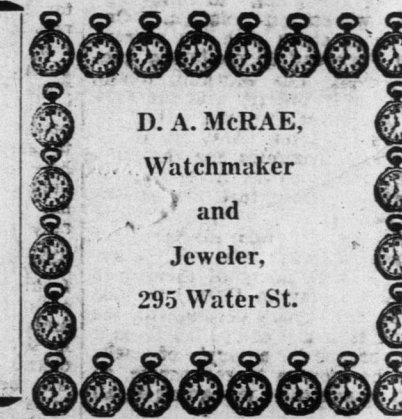
