





High prices were realized recently at a sale at Christie's of the pictures of Sir Lionel Phillips. The most remarkable price was brought by a celebrated Gainsborough, "The Market Cart," which caused a good deal

The canvas fetched 19,200 guineas Its size is 4ft. by 5ft., and in the Gibbon sale twenty years ago it fetched 4,500 guineas. Yesterday bidding began at 1,000 guineas and the next bid was 4,000 guineas. Then came 5,000 guineas. Hundreds were offered closely, and then thousands. At 19,200 guineas there was no further challenge and Messrs. Agnew wer

The last high figure for a Gainsporough in this country was for the Duchess of Gloucester's portrait,

which, in the Duke of Cambridge's sale in 1904, realized 12,100 guineas. The three artists who now stand highest in the English auction rooms are Raeburn, Gainsborough and Hor

French Portraits.

A Lawrence portrait of Mrs. Siddons fetched 1,800 guineas. Reynold's Girl and Dog" was sold for 950 guineas. It came from the famous Wynne Ellis collection, and in the Duchess of Montrose's sale in 1894 fetched only 185 guineas.

Three Nattier portraits caused reat speculation. Three-quarters of a century ago a portrait by this French artist was hardly worth the value of the frame, but since then value from £50 to £3.000 or 4.00 given a start at 1,000 guineas, went o 3.100 guineas. The portrait of the Marquis de Flavcourt went for the high sum of 4,600 guineas, and the

same artist's portrait of Lord Brook sold for 3,200 guineas. The Lionel Phillips pictures rea

ized £40,000. Several other important picture vere sold at Christie's recently. Fo a very large portrait of "Lady Orde and Child," there was keen bidding and the final offer was 6.400 guineas. Raeburn's "Mrs. Wedderburn" was acquired by Messrs. Gooder for 800 ruineas, and Reynolds' "Lady An Fortescue" was sold for 1,200 guineas. Romney's portrait of "Mastern Thornhill" fetched 5.800 guineas, In 1894 it realized only 500 guineas. Mr. Balfour came in to witness the sale.

# No Better **Impossible**

#### Man Found Dead

Circumstances Unfortunate— Liquor the Cause—Enquiry will be Held. Joseph Bolger, aged forty-five, and anmarried, was found dead on the North Carolina, and centres around Thorburn Road within speaking distance from his home last night.. Deceased lived alone in a house on the Thorburn Road, near Baird's Cottage, a distance of between three and four miles from the city. He was in town yesterday and made some purchases, driving home at tea hour. Just as arkness was setting in Bolger called on by Stephen Sharpe and Patrick Hogan who had walked from town and who after a brief conversa-tion asked Bolger to drive them to their homes about four miles in the road. Bolger willingly hitched up his horse and drove off with the visitors. After reaching Maynard's farm, a distance of three miles, a stop was made, Sharpe and Hogan deciding to walk turned round his horse to go home and on his way collapsed. About 10.45 p.m. as Miss Tucker and Miss Hynes were going to their homes they saw a man under a horse's feet in the middle of the road. The animal was standing motionless and its driver was apparently dead. The females,

badly frightened as they were, ran to the nearest house and gave an alarm to Joshua Tucker, who in company with Patk. Parrell and Peter Oliver, went to the scene and after releasing the unfortunate fellow's body from its dangerous predicament brought it to J. Tucker's house. Bolger was on the verge of death but was breathing rapidly. His collar was opened and he was placed on a couch for the night, as it was thought it was a bad fall he got and would be all right in the morning. Parrell and Oliver stay-ed watching Bulger for nearly an hour and then left for home. They had scarcely departed when the unfortunate victim expired. Joshua Tucker immediately proceeded to Baird's Cot-

tage and telephoned the police autho ities. This was at midnight. Super intendent Grimes and Constable Whelan responded hurriedly to Tucker's house and after making enquiries of what occurred wrapped up the body and drove to the morgue with it, arriving here at 4.30 this morning. MONTREAL, June 9. The Cairntorr reached port this norning after being in collision with an iceberg off the Newfoundland coast. The crash occurred last Thursday during a fog. She has a dent in her bow, with the glass of several port holes broken.

LONDON, June 9. The Arsan squads of suffragettes set fire to the Club House at Hurst Park Race Course, last night. The damages was seventy thousand dollars. They also burned a boat house in River Lea, also the Grand stand of North Middlesex cricket grounds.

LONDON. June 9. The final sessions of the Balkan Peace Conference in St. James' Palace, ended to-day, with nothing decided on as to exchange of prisoners or other matters. The delegates agreed to leave all outstanding questions to their respective governments. Each delegation advised its government to conclude a separate convention with Turkey.

HALIFAX. June 9. 1 In a fog the fishing schooner Shamrock, from Newfoundland, bound here, with 1,100 barrels herring to J. A. Farquhar, ran on the rocks at White Point, near Canso. She quickly began to fill. Her crew of five Newfoundlanders took to the life boat and rowed ashore, and saved part of their belongings. The Canso lifeboat went to the wreck, and it is hoped she may be refloated. The Shamrock is 89 tons register.

WASHINGTON, June 9. The weather in the mid-Atlantic and New England States, the Ohio Valley and the Great Lakes region s the coldest ever recorded in June. The Gulf States alone have escaped of territory east of the Rockies. A high barometric pressure of great magnitude is the official reason for the unseasonable drop. Frosts are reported from Vermont, Central New York, New England, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin; and are predicted to-night for the Great Lakes region. North Atlantic States. and the Mountain districts of the Middle Atlantic States.

LONDON, June 9. All sorts of gossip surround the recent discovery of several cases of rifles at Belfast and Dublin. The Government's intentions are still unknown. It is now said that the seizure was entirely due to Customs officials, that the executive is not concerned and that the consignees mean to contest the legality of the seizure. Their names are not given. Everybody mentioned as knowing something about the incident disclaims knowledge of it. The idea that the whole thing was an expensive joke is borne out by the Daily Chronicle, which says that the Belfast consignment was practically useless, as some rifles were so antiquated that no existing cartridges would fit them.

LONDON. June 9. British directors of the Peru Amazon Company, of whom Sir John H. Lister Kaye, is the best known, as he was groom-in-waiting to King Edward, are held deserving of severe censure by the Commons Committee investigating the Putumayo Rubber atrocities. The report issued to-day, while absolving the directors from any personal acts for which they could be punished under the Slave Trade Acts or in connection with the cruelties which resulted in the deaths of so many natives, charges them with culpable negligence. The report says: "Directors who merely attend Board meetings and sign cheques cannot escape from their share of responsibility when gross abuses are revealed." The committee holds Julius Creaser, the "rubber king" and director, responsible for the atrocities: and expresses the opinion that the Putumavo incidents form but a shocking instance of conditions to be found over a wide area in South America; adding that the laws against slave-dealing need attention.

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
