

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



Frightful Murder

Of Mother by Her Son, Who Had Shown Signs of Religious Insan-

Copeland was brutally murdered about nine o'clock this morning at her home in the village of ewtonville, ten miles from this town,

was that the son quarrelled with his mother over a pocket handkerchief of his which he declared she had. When he failed to get it he made a vicious attack on her with a sharp bladed pocket knife and slashed her abdoand struck her down with it. It is said that he then proceeded to disembowel her and cut her open as he might have done if butchering an animal, both the knife and axe being stove. Both of her arms were cut off, and with the trunk of the body were placed beside the stove, with kindling wood around them.

The kindling wood was lighted with the apparent purpose of destroying the evidence of the crime, but the fire was extinguished before this was accomplished. Then the mutilated body was dragged into the yard. Copeland is a farm hand and has lived at Newtonville all his life, though not with his mother latterly. It is alleged that Copeland was religiously insane and had been acting strangely since Saturday.



THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE PREVAILS.

The sovereign will of a free people firm and unanimous in demanding their rights from the Legislature of this dominion, has resulted, in a victory for the popular forces. 



It has recently been discovered that the eggs of dog fish are as good for eating purposes as hens' eggs. Those of the larger varieties of dog fish are quite as large as ordinary hens' eggs. The empty shells or cases of these eggs may sometimes be picked up on the seashore. They are squarish flaps of leathery stuff, with the egg

in the centre. Turtle eggs are largely eaten in all hot countries. You find them on almost any sandy beach between latitudes 25 north and 25 south. The turtles come out of the sea, scrape a hole in the sand, lay their

eggs and cover them up. A hundred and fifty are often found in one nest. these eggs are about the size of M. MOREY hens' eggs, covered with a white, parchment-like shell, and, if fresh, of excellent flavour. They make capital omelettes, or can be fried or used for cooking, but they will not boil. 

In the centre is seen a cross -the emblem of the great sacrificeand surrounding this solemn token are the names of the officers and lads who have given their lives on the field of honour for the Empire. Each name is on a separate brass plate, with the name and date of death of many a gallant C.L.B. lad, who has given his all-the greatest sacrifice he could make. The War Shrine is most appropriate, and the name plates clustered around the cross, are emblematical of the faith they cach had in their Redeemer and the life of the World to come.




