



THE BOUNDARY DISPUTE.

Upon this mestion there has been some discussion for a number of years, and the controversy has become more acute since the Dominion Parliament added Ungava to the Province of Quebec. Newfoundland has been claiming that the boundary line strikes the coast considerably further north than the Canadian Government and the Government of Quebec have been willing to concede. It is now announced to the court that the question will be a wide one, reading as follows: "What is the location and definition of the boundary as between Canada and Newfoundland in Labrador Peninsula, under the statutes orders in council and proclamation."



The agreement recently made between the British and Persian Governments is one which has given rise to many international heartburnings and jealousies, the press of other countries declaring that the Imperial au- ment House this morning, at 11 thorities have gone in for more aggrandizement at the expense of the Shah and his kingdom, and with an ultimate possibility of making Persia into another British protectorate. "Land grabber" is a charge hurled at Great Britain by hostile observers of her pact with the Persian administration, and harsh criticism of the agreement have been indulged in by the majority of French journalists.

Apart from the minor details of the new Anglo-Persian treaty, the main points are but two: Britain lends Persia British army officers to reorganize her forces and establish order, and conjointly with the Indian Government, advances to Persia the sum of two million pounds, which loan is secured on the Persian customs. 1857, there stood in India as gallant

and resolute a little army as ever fared forth on a desperate enterprise. The picture was an inspiring one with its glittering phalanx of lancers, the massed squadron of Sikh horsemen in turbans of blue and red; the turbaned and hawk-eyed regiments of Punjab infantry; and the waving sea of Highland plumes and tartans. "Ninetythird," said Sir Colin Cambell, "we'll bring the women and children out of Lucknow, or die wi' you in the attempt," and from the grim line of kilted Kighlanders came back the reply: "Ay, ay, Sir Colin!" It was indeed a desperate venture to send 5,000 men to the relief of a garrison shut up in a fanatical city of 700,000 inhabitants, and besieged, as it had been for four nonths, by 60,000 flerce and pitiless sepoys. For three quarters of an hour the British connon battered the tough brick wall, under a perpetual blizzard of lead from hundreds of loop-holes. Gunners by the score fell at their posts to be instantly replaced by others, and all the while crouching infantry were straining like dogs at a leash, to nake their rush, only to be restrained by Sir Colin's command, "Lie down, 93rd! Every man of you is worth his weight in gold to England to-day." Prince Kropotkin went to Russia after the fall of the Tsar's regime. On various occasions he had been reported imprisoned and persecuted by the

Bolsheviks. He says in his letter: "Nevertheless protest with all my strength against any armed intervention of the Allies in Russian affairs. Such an action would result in an outburst of Russian jingoism. It would give us again of government, which lends itself to a jingo monarchy—the signs of which are already looming-and, mark it well, it would stir up amongst Russians in general an attitude hostile to Western Europe, which could not but have the most unfortunate consequences. The Americans have grasped this already.

"People imagine, perhaps, that they are supporting a Liberal Republican party in Koltchak and Denikin. That in itself is a mistake. The Aranmore was ordered from Flint Island to the scene. Strathfillan is bound from Glasgow to New York, and the Pioneer from Montreal to an American Atlantic port. The steamer Yellowstone sailed from Halifax on Friday last for Havre, while the Seneca left Port Hawkesbury yesterday. The two Coast Guard cutters were asked to join the search by the American Consul here, at the suggestion of Mr. Harvey, Marine and Fisheries agent here.

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


