Adventures of "The Duchess."

There are many masterpleces or the walls of the Royal Academy this year, but their newness will probably not be a sufficient bait for the picture-stealer, who likes something "old and crusted," as a rule, with a pedigree and a price that runs to five figures.

There are collectors who are ready to buy a painting they want without being too inquisitive as to how the seller came into possession of it. Some collectors have even been known to become the thieves themselves, so great is their craving to own certain works of art. Though what use such possessions can be to them is difficult to imagine, since they must always remain hidden away through fear of detection. Undoubtedly the most sensational theft in the history of Art was that of Gainsborough's famous "Duchess of Devonshire," known to everybody by innumerable reproductions.

This masterpiece, by one of England's greatest painters, was offered at Christie's sale rooms in King Street, St. James's, where the Red Cross Sale was recently held, for ten thousand guineas. That was on May 6th. 1876, just forty-four years ago. Some days later they placed the picture on exhibition in their Bond Street galleries, and on May 26th, when the place was reopened, it was found that the famous "Duchess" had disappeared. The picture had been cut out of its frame with a knife, the edges, of the canvas being left in the empty frame.

Hidden in a Cellar.

For twenty-five years the affair remained a mystery, and it was feared that the picture was gone for ever. At least, so the public thought, al though there were some who knew otherwise. But whether it would ever be restored was in doubt to the very last.

The chief thief was a hyphenated German-American, named A.d a m Wirth, a clever crook. His helpen was a man twice his bulk, an Englishman named Jack Phillips. Being a small man. Wirth climbed on Phillips' shoulders. The night was dark and Bond Street silent. By means of the awning, the German reached the window-ledge on the first floor, and gained an entrance to the gallery. There he carefully cut the picture from its frame, rolled it up, and departed by the way he had come. But the masterpiece was no use to him. It was known to dealers in every city. To show it was to give the game away. Wirth got into touch Advertise Bolshevism with some solicitors, and held the picture to ransom.
