





The woman's interests should include her public responsibilities just as a man's interests should include his private responsibilities.

That a woman has no time to vote was proved to be no argument at all, but sheer rubbish. Personal influence is undersirable and here John Stewart Mills' reference to the backstairs influence of a favourite was quoted and the bad reflex influence on woman herself commented on.

That woman's vote would not make much difference, merely means that great reforms always work slowly and that we should be suspicious of re forms that work quickly. It is desirable that no sudden change should be brought about through the political influence of women.

That women do not want the vote, is untrue. That the comfortably placed and irresponsible woman does not hear the call to public service is true -but the heads of institutions and social service workers are keenly alive to the need of the woman's vote.

The illiterate vote is an argument against democracy, and not an argument against woman suffrage; because wherever women have the vote they immediately press for better educational facilities—which is another argument in favour of woman

Other so-called arguments against woman suffrage were laid low by Miss Cherrington, and our only regret is, that these few notes cannot possibly do justice to her fine, but all too short

In closing she pressed upon her hearers that though women might waive many of their rights, there are responsibilities to the community which are duties, and these, women must insist upon performing in the best possible way—namely, through the power of the vote. Miss Cherrington was then accorded enthusiastic
