Board of School Trustees.

The Board met last night. Present—
Mr. Peterson, chairman; Messrs. Pirie,
Newton, Kennedy, Mitchell, Cuthbert,
Stevenson, Ball, Harvey, Watson, Mc
Guire, McKell, and Innes.

Mr. McNeil presented the report of the
School Property Committee. The report
states that they have had the desks and
seats removed from the school-rooms in
the East, South, and West Wards to
the new school building, also new furniture supplied to the Senior Girls' School,
in accordance with instructions from the
Board, and they recommended that a
caretaker be appointed to sweep, dust,
and scrub the school-rooms, cut wood
for, and keep the building thoroughly
clean; also light all fires, and perform
any other duty laid down by the committee.

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The report was adopted.

The committee presented the following supplementary report: That after conferring with the Printing Committee, they took the responsibility of advertising for applications for a caretaker of the Central School building, and received a number of applications which they herewith present. Report received.

After considerable discussion in regard to the duties of the caretaker, and whether he should have charge of all the public schools or those only in Day's Building, it was moved that the School Property Committee retire for a few minutes, and prepare a report specifying what his duties should be; and recommend what salary he should receive.

After being out for a few minutes, the Committee returned and presented the following report: That's person be employed to take care of all the public schools, viz., the Central, Grammar, and several Ward Schools, said schools to be scrubbed once a month, and swept once a day; the wood to be cut, and the fires to be lit; the schools must be kept perfectly clean to the satisfaction of the Committee, and that the caretaker shall perform such other duties as may be found necessary to keep the schools in order; that the salary for the due performance of said duties shall be \$250, in addition to house rent and firewood. All utensils necessary for the performance of the word of cleaning to be provided by the Board. Applications for the situation to be received by the chairman of the School Property Committee up to Tuesday, the 20th.

The report was adopted.

LONDON, April 12.—A meeting of the Conservative members of Parliament was held to-night. Over two hundred members attended. Mr. Disraeli was present and made a speech, in which he indicated the future policy of the party on the Irish Church question, and announced the amendment which would be proposed by the opposition to the Bill. on the Irish Church question, and announced the amendment which would be proposed by the opposition to the Bill, now pending in the House of Commons. These amendments are in effect that grants made to the Irish Church since the reformation are to remain intact, that glebe lands be retained by the present holders without purchase, and that the union of the Irish Church and the Church of England cease in 1872. Important modifications of the financial sections of the Bill are also proposed, including the establishment of a capitalized sum for the support of the clergy, instead of the granting of annuities and the application of a large portion of the Church revenues to the support of public worship, and to defray the expenses of the management of the Church. Final ly an effort is to be made to have all the lic worship, and to defray the expenses of the management of the Church. Final-ly an effort is to be made to have all the clauses in the Bill referring to the May-nooth Grant and regium donum struck out. Mr. Disraeli's plan was favourably received, and the proceedings of the meeting were marked by much enthusi-

New York, 13th.—The Herald's special says: It is well-known the Cabinet is not a unit in the question of Cuban-recognition. A meeting was held Friday in which the views of each member except Paulins were learned. Secretary Fish expressed very Conservative views. He sympathises with the Cubans—as much as any man could, but deprecated any official pronunciamento by the administration on either side. He believes Cuba's destiny was annexation. Spain would tire in resisting the mandates of fate, but if the United States interferes, then Spain will not only exhaust her own resources to prevent our acquisition of the island, but will draw assistance from England and France, and we will have to combat a combination of the most powerful military and naval focus of Europe. We need peace now not war. These are the Secretary's views.

Grant has great confidence in the Secretary of State, and though his private views may not coincide with Mr. Fish's, yet it is feared the foreign policy of the government will be shaped in accordance with them.

Other members are directly opposed to Mr. Fish and Beliver in prompt and vigorous action, urging the president to proclaim a bold and manly policy in regard to Cuba.

Gen. Sickles has declined the Mexican mission, and will be sent to Spain.

The Herald's special gives an account of an exciting interview between Senator Ross and President Grant in regard to the Kansas appointments, in which Senator Ross told the President to go to hell. The President ordered the Senator out of the room, thus terminating the interview.

"AN ENGLISHMAN'S VIEWS."

Under this heading, a person styling himself an Englishman, has a long letter in the New York Tribune, in which he expresses his views with that free and easy impertinence with which peripatetic philosophers of his class have always a superabundance of. "Having recently returned from a visit to Canada," he writes, "I have formed some opinion upon the question of annexation;" and the result of his visit is the conviction that the North American Provinces should cease to be British. The reasons he gives for the formation of this opinion are that under extreme protection we are growing torpid and petulant, and need either independence or annexation to waken us up. "An Englishman" also says that the people of the Dominion give no encouragement for poor men willing to work; who may chance to go among them. This is a falsehood; but most likely the writer was one of that beer-drinking class who come to Canada with the idea that their worth is so great that the colonials will eagerly take hold of them and givethem positions commensurate with their self-importance. Finding their mistake, they hang about the bar-rooms in our towns and cities, muddling their brains never too clear with beer and ale, and taking a peculiar pleasure in decrying the country in which they have arrived, although they know nothing about it. It is fellows like these who have the impertinence to put forth their uncalledfor views as to how Canada should govern herself, attributing their nonsucess in life to the form of government which she chooses, and not to their own laziness and pomposity. There is lots of room here for poor men able and willing to work, and they will have every opportunity given them of pushing their way; but from the class which this writer in the Tribune belongs, we earnestly pray to be delivered.

The Extent of the Hudson's Bay "AN ENGLISHMAN'S VIEWS."

THE EXTENT OF THE DOMINION.

The transfer of the Hudson's Bay territory to the Dominion of Canada will considerably affect the relative position of the latter among the countries of the world, as may be seen from a few highly important facts which we-take from "The American Yearbook" and "National Register."

The valuable table of comparative statistics in this work shows that British North America, when united, will be, in point of area, the fifth country of the universe, being only exceeded by the Russian Empire, the Chinese Empire, the remainder of the British Empire and the United States. In point of population, it is as yet only the 28th among the political divisions of the world, but—as shown in another place of the Yearbook—if the rate of increase continues in 1961, or in less than a hundred years from today, will be 80,000,000. These figures alone suffice to foretell the future fate of British North America.

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COTTON OPERATIVES IN ENGLAND.—The papers show a bad state of affairs in the manufacturing districts. During Friday and Saturday last 1,500 were relieved at the Blackburn office, and during the five previous days there was an average of eighty per day. Gloomy and distressing accounts of the homes of the operatives are given by those in the habit of visiting, and the prospect not reassuring. There is a tendency in favour of emigration among the operatives, nearly sixteen thousand of them will be thrown out of work, the masters having fully made up their minds to abide by their original decision. It is distinctly stated that the bulk of the masters are, and have for some time been, losing money. No six of them, it is said, are working to a profit, manufacturing property has become a drug, and there are some 'mills in the town which cost upwards of £40,000 sterling, which are in a good condition, but which cannot be held for anything like half that amount. All those mills making cloth, gray shirtings, &c., for the Indian market, are losing money on account of the depressed state of business in that country, and at present there is not the slightest sign of an improvement.

The Rob Roy Canoe on the Sea of Gallier.—Every hour of my day is

The Rob Roy Cange on The Sea of Galillee—Every hour of my day is filled up with pleasant duties. Yet one can scarcely imagine a more delightful tour. Often I have a long ride and a walk, and a paddle and a sail all in one day. Take, for instance, my first day on the Sea of Galilee. We are camped near it by the Jordan, and a crowd of Arabs accompany the Rob Roy to the river. Gliding down the winding stream I soon float out upon the wide lake of Gennesaret. A hundred hills and vales, and rains and bays, all familiar to the student of biblical geography, are suddenly present around me in actual life. I turn east wards at once, and coast the shore with an eager gaze downwards into the clear glassy water, looking for relies there which could not be seen from land, and which have never been thus searched for in the water. Careful records are made of each buried column, each hidden pier or quay, or fallen stone, and my lunch is taken by a pebble beach with sunlight glinting under the wavelets that ripple to the soft and balmy breeze. Stretching but then to the centre of the lake, I recline in my cance with the wonderful anorama about me, gorgeous in color and graceful in outline, sacred in deep realities, and powerfully stirring the mind. Here I read the sixth chapter of Sr. John's Gospel, which tells how Christ taught on that plain, and fed the people on that hill; how He went alone for prayer on that mountain, while His disciples went by boat across this bay; then the night came on and they were trilly in rowing, for the wind was contrary.—Rob Roy,' in Land and Water.
