It will not be claimed by any one that the work of development by way of railways has reached a finality, and we think also that consideration will show that the claim put forward in some parts of the Eastern provinces, that the time has arrived when the Dominion government should step its hand in assisting railway enterprises, is untimely, and would, if acted upon, mean a complete reversal of the policy which has met with the approval of the whole people ever since the inauguration of Confederation.

The policy of the past has given Canada a system of railways which connects the two oceans and gridirons the settled parts of the Eastern provinces and Manitoba. There remains to be opened by such means of transportation by far the larger part of the Dominion, and we believe the part best adapted to support population and make of the Dominion a nation among nations. Shall this policy be arrested now, or shall it be carried on until we have a complete system of roads whereby every part of our vast domain, suitable for settlement, is placed within the reach of enterprise? We think when we say it must not be stopped, but must be continued, we voice the sentiments of the people of this province, and we believe those of the greater part of the population of the Dominion.

Possibly our readers will bear with us if we devote at least another article to the consideration of this important question.

A Single Tax Town

(From North America)

Comparatively few persons know that there exists a community in this country where the single tax is a practical test. Nevertheless, Fairhope, in Baldwin county, Ala., a flourishing town of 200 inhabitants, is now in the only single tax town on earth.

Founded in 1895 by a group of adventurous adherents of Henry George's philosophy, numberless members of the town today is a thriving agricultural and manufacturing community, where industry is unknown and prosperity and material comfort are within the reach of all.

There was a single tax club in Des Moines, Iowa, half a dozen years ago, who met weekly to discuss the single tax. Ernest B. Gaston, editor and publisher of a single tax journal, the Fairhope Courier was at the head of the movement.

They chose the abandoned site of Alabama City, in Baldwin county, on Mobile Bay, about four miles inland from the city of Mobile. Under the laws of the State of Alabama persons are allowed to acquire land as they see fit, and secured options upon 1,200 acres.

No man was allowed to own a foot of the land within the jurisdiction of the settlement. But he could lease for twenty years, with privilege of renewal, as much land as he desired.

He might then proceed to erect upon the land a dwelling, store, factory or mill, as he chose. His mill store or factory could increase rental.

In exchange the association bound itself to make roads and maintain them, furnish water and guarantee him from all taxation.

The town thrived. To-day two hundred people live there. There is a good school-house, employing two teachers, and attended by twenty-five pupils; there are three stores—a drug store, a grocery store and a saw mill and a shipyard, employing those who labor. There is also a church founded by the "Disciples of Christ," but the building is upon private property where under the state law, it is exempt from taxation.

The town now numbers forty substantially-built houses, many of them architecturally pretentious. The streets are regularly laid out and graded. A water works is being constructed and water will be distributed free.

There is a library, with 1,500 volumes, a Women's Christian Temperance Union Club and a Women's Suffrage Club; for he who knows the Fairhope believe in the equal distribution of civic duties, rights and honors. Each woman member has a vote in the election of officers and in the referendum elections.

Each certificate entitles husband and wife to a vote each. The president is George M. Barroff, the vice president is W. W. Foster. The secretary is active woman's suffragist in Iowa.

The town is governed by an executive council of five members, who serve without compensation, with the exception of the secretary, who receives \$200 a year. The treasurer is paid \$25 per annum.

THE WATERLOO.

A Camp McKimney Review says:

The splendid showing in the Waterloo is the talk of the camp, and Superintendent W. Boyd is receiving congratulations on all sides. Since he took charge of the mine on November 12 last, little information has been given to the public until recently. Now the mine has a showing that it can be justly proud of—six feet of solid quartz, with values ranging from \$10.60 to \$888 in gold and silver.

Since the new superintendent resumed operations a 60-foot winze has been sunk from the No. 1 level, at a point in 150 feet on the west drift. The mine started with about 16 inches of clean ore that gradually widened out to six feet between walls. The north wall is as smooth as the side of a building. From time to time as the winze made depth an average sample clean across the ledge was made, with the following highly satisfactory results:

Gold and Silver. 4 feet \$ 19 40 8 feet 24 40 30 feet 388 00 48 feet 10 00 60 feet 40 75

At a depth of 60 feet, after sinking a 15 foot incline to the west, all in quartz, instructions came from Stockholm to open up a second level east. This level has been started and is in 20 feet with a full breast of quartz, with every indication that the vein will retain its width.

The ore taken from these workings is stored in the east drift on the No. 1 level, from the collar of the winze, a distance of 80 feet. When the spring opens there is an available supply of water, and the stamp mill will be started, and by that time there will be several hundred tons of quartz ready for milling.
