THE ATTY.-GEN'S DEFENCE

MR. RICHARD WEBSTER'S MEMORIAL SPEECH.

His Honor vindicated but Criticism Not Withstood. Mr. Chamberlain's Speech An Answer to the Government and the Side on Two Important Irish Questions.

New York, March 21.—Mr. Smalley calls The Tribune from London: The Attorney-General of Ireland has been on the whole for some little time past the best abused man in England. The charges against him may be summarized: The Attorney-General stands in a private counsel for the Times while the chief law officer of the Crown stands in his general conduct of the case before the Commission; should it be justice to permit Pigeot to be a witness, knowing him to be unworthy of belief; sinned in voting for the genuineness of the letters and in advising the appointment of a Commission on the strength of that belief. The Attorney-General has dealt with the other matters in a speech which will be memorable. He showed that he had, every Attorney-General has always had, his own private counsel, and that he was in a private counsel in any case in which thought fit to accept a brief. He denied a suitably having ever reached for the genuineness of the letters. There was no, he was the shadow of a foundation for the suggestion that the Government had acted on his opinion or advice in proposing or constituting the Commission. He was discharged with having adopted in court tactics of secretaries and not the issue of witnesses. "I acted," replied Mr. Richard, "under the direction of the Hon. and with their full knowledge and approval and this charge is a charge against court, not against me."

He then charged with putting Pigeot in the box, knowing him to be unworthy of credit. There was nothing, he replied, in a letter to suggest that Pigeot did not believe the letters to be genuine.

Lastly come the Times' withdrawal of letters and its apology. "I framed it," said Mr. Richard. "If I were to do it again should draw it as nearly as possible to the same terms. I went to the extreme verge of my duty. It was a matter of whether or not too little." I doubt whether this point Mr. Richard carried the House will carry the public with him. He is a lawyer, a professional opinion on his side. I should purely and entirely as a lawyer refer to the conduct of a case in court, to public opinion outside. Whatever may be thought on this one point, there can be doubt as to the speech as a whole. It is worthy of the great days of the Bar, and an aggressive and oratorical effort, worthy of the House of Commons. It is Mr. Richard Webster has done nothing to equal so this. There was no lack of merit in the speech. It does not excuse all criticism on Mr. Richard's handling of the case before the Commission, nor was it meant to. But his speech, which touched all these points, which touched his honor whether professional or personal.

An Amazing Misstatement.
London, March 21.—The Times, while alluding to the Times, writes to call attention to an amusing and important misstatement in reference to Pigeot which was made by Mr. Chamberlain in the House of Commons on the 19th inst. He said in referring to Mr. Webster as having been placed by Mr. Chamberlain's hands, five days before Pigeot's evidence, in the witness box, a letter from Mr. Seames, solicitor to the Times, to Pigeot and to Mr. Seames, in which Pigeot admitted that he feared to undergo the examination, was withdrawn. It is a misstatement to say that Mr. Chamberlain had not been the solicitor for Pigeot until Pigeot had disappeared.

Proposed Irish Legislation.
London, March 21.—The Birmingham Post, the organ of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain announces upon authority that the Government has decided to deal with the Irish question early in the parliamentary session 1899. The lines of the measure to be so drawn that they will admit of no modification as the result of discussion in the House of Commons. The bill will be followed at the opening of the session of 1899 by a measure of Irish local government, the details of which are probably the same as those published in the Post last year.

The Statist's View of the Paris Crisis.
London, March 21.—On the Stock Exchange the past week's progress was very much restricted. The small rise which the Paris collapse had on quotation here shows a great undercurrent of uneasiness, however, of immediate failure connection with metal in London and great caution is exercised. American rail securities were dull.

The Paris Crisis Recovering Its Feet.
London, March 21.—The Bourne year was firm throughout on the recovery of credit shares and in sympathy with prices elsewhere.

Mr. Bright suffers a serious Relapse.
London, March 21.—John Bright has a serious relapse. He was attacked to-day at a shaving. A doctor is in attendance.

Mr. Gladstone Goes to Scotland.
London, March 21.—Mr. Gladstone has left London for Scotland tonight.

A Herce of Beets.
Paris, March 21.—M. de Lonlay-Gerault Richard fought a duel to-day. The former was slightly wounded. M. Richard had attacked M. de Lonlay-Gerault in an article charging him with being a work of M. Duval.

Rome, March 21.—In a duel with today Deputy Carlatto slightly wounded.
