Commercial Summary.

THE JOURNAL has again to crave the indulgence of its readers the present week for any shortcomings that may appear. The trouble of moving so large an establishment is not slight. By next week we trust to be in better shape than heretofore, and shall endeavor to make ample amends.

SUMACH crushed or ground, as well as in a crude state, has been placed upon the free list at the request of the tanners.

AMERICAN potato dealers are in Prince Edward Island making large purchases for the United States market. They are to be shipped by steam from Halifax and Charlottetown.

THE receipts this spring from United States fishermen for licenses granted under the modus vivendi amount to over \$6,000, which is double the amount received during the whole of last year.

MR. PHILLIP MASSON, late of the Manufacturers, has accepted, the Quebec district agency of the Mutual Reserve, and Mr. D. L. Frigon the agency of the Three Rivers district for the same company.

THE Temiscouta Railway Company soon intend putting on daily trains between Edmonton, N.B., and River du Loup, Quebec, where close connection will be made with the Intercolonial railway system.



An Order-in-Council is proclaimed exempting from Canadian rules and regulations for twelve months all marine boilers constructed in the United Kingdom, according to the rules of the Imperial Board of Trade or through Lloyds, upon the productions of satisfactory evidence that they have been so constructed. Steamships which have been in Canada for twelve months, with boilers constructed in the United Kingdom according to the rules above referred to, are to be inspected by a Canadian inspector of machinery and boilers, according to the rules and regulations in Great Britain, and if necessary shall be inspected by a Canadian inspector of hulls, according to the Canadian rules and regulations pertaining to such inspection.

In the Maritime Provinces the failures for the week are very few. Geo. R. Strong, dealer in agricu.tural implements at Charlottetown, has assigned after an endeavor of several years to make both ends He has been struggling for some time past against the influences of bills of sale -Wm. Bannister, of Halifax, probably regrets that he ever left his late employers to start in the jewelry business for himself. His career from the start some four years ago has been slowly but steadily downward. He has been supplied chiefly by a local house. He is now offering to settle at 40 cents in the dollar spread over 12 months without security, on liabilities of \$6,000, an evidence of the confidence reposed in him when it is remembered that his capital at starting was only about \$1,000.

A CORRESPONDENT Writes:--" The crops in Bruce County, Ont., look fairly well considering the dryness of the spring, there having been no rain of any account here since the snow went away. The late frosts have done considerable damage to small fruits and early vegetables. Potatoes are selling at 10 to 15 cents per bushel. The Port Elgin Button Company (limited) has just obtained its charter from Ottawa. The capital stock is \$15,000, divided into 30 shares of \$500 each. The factory is in full operation and is turning out large quantities of vegetable ivory buttons.—Building operations are very brisk this year in Port Elgin; a handsome six-roomed public school is being erected and will be ready for use by September next, and there is also quite a number of really fine private residences in course of construction. All the masons, bricklayers, &c., are very busy. It is understood that the Government dredge will soon be at work in the harbor here, not only to clear away the sand which washed in during the winter, but also to deepen the channel on account of Lake Huron having fallen at least two and one-half feet lower since last summer.

THE casualties in Ontario for the current week are as follow:-E. E. Lyne of Clarksburg succeeded his father in general storekeeping, at that point some 3 years ago, the latter having got into difficulties at that time. The business has been controlled by one Toronto house. The young man, while well-meaning, has had too little financial strength .-- Chas. Cook, a tobacconist in a very small way at Toronto, has been battling with chattel mortgage for sometime past, and has at length assigned.—David Gilletly of Sudbury, builder, &c., has assigned and it is believed the estate will pay but the merest trifle .- W. H Garrold of North Pelham, Welland Co, general storekeeper, has assigned after a career in that locality extending over 18 months. He began with borrowed capital, and as everything was mortgaged he was unable to survive the fire in his premise on the 15th instant.-Thos Arthur, carrying on a small grocery business at Hamilton since the spring of '88 now regrets that he ever left his trade as a builder in that city. Some of his possessions, chattel mortgaged, were recently. sold by the mortgagee.-C. W. King of Madoc, late King & McCoy, dealer in cigars, biscuits and confectionary, in a small way, has also been struggling againsts chattel mortgages for some little time. His assignment is gazetted .- John A. Scott, brickmaker, of Menford, has also assigned.

THE business changes in the Province of Quebec during the current week, apart from the suspension of R. Smardon, noted elsewhere, are as follow:-L. M. Perreault carrying on a retail dry-goods business in this city, has assigned with liabilities of \$21,000. Henri Perreault, the son of the above, is the only member of the firm, and is acting as a cover for his father, formerly of Beauvais & Perreault, who dissolved in 1884. Perreault failed in September '85, and settled at 70 cents in the dollar; in December '88 he assigned. The estate was then wound up and has since been carried on by the son as above, a few houses in the city trusting them with sufficient goods to keep the stock assorted. -L. Deneau, crockery dealer, also of this city, is asking an extension

A FAILURE AND A MORAL .- Obscure places occasionally give birth to remarkable men. The majority of our wealthy or prominent people first saw the light in places seldom or never heard of outside their immediate vicinity. Salmon River, in Digby County, N S., (for there are two places of that name in the Province) furnishes a case in point. Messrs. Foley & Deveau, two young men of that place, began business about three years ago with no capital, no business experience, little or no education and very little native ability. They do not appear to have made any substantial headway from the start. A short time ago they contracted to build a large vessel, and in their simplicity agreed to do so at a figure a long way below actual cost. The result may easily be imagined. Having got themselves into difficulty, like the goat in the well, the problem was to device some means of getting out. Messrs. Parker, Eakins & Co., a leading firm of Yarmouth, were creditors for upwards of \$8,000; John G. Hall & Co, of Boston, claimed upwards of \$5,000; Charles Burrill & Co., of Weymouth \$550; E. K. Spinney, \$1,500 and others, besides a large amount due mechanics and workmen on the vessel. The total liabilities are probably over \$20,000 and the assets are very small. Parker, Eakins & Co., and John G. Hall & Co. were neck-and-neck in the race for security, which resulted in the former's getting a confession of judgment, and the latter a chattel mortgage and bill of sale of the stock. Both firms have consequently entered into a combination to carry on the business in the store, employing Foley as clerk until the concern is





wound up. E. K. Spinney for his \$1,500 has a builder's certificate of the vessel on the stocks, and a bill of sale of a schooner, and will probably save himself, as he was part owner in the vessel under contract. The two former firms above alluded to will probably get a portion of their damage, but other creditors will not be likely to get a cent. Altogether it is one of the rottenest failures that have occurred in that part of the country for some time, and shows pretty conclusively the necessity for some legislative provision for the equitable distribution of insolvent estates. Thos. Foley, brother of Wm. Foley, gave his note to the Bank of Nova Scotia Agency at Yarmouth sometime after the failure in order to retire two drafts of \$300 each, drawn by Foley & Deveau and discounted by the bank, and which the agent accused somebody of obtaining under false pretences. The threatened criminal proceedings were stayed through the interference of his brother, who gave his note for the amount. The parties concerned are all well-known in the county, and one of them has been the recipient of municipal honors. It is evident that recklessness has prevailed on both sides concerned, but the "enemy," which was the curse of Cassio in the play, doubtless also played no unimportant part.



AGRICULTURE AS A PROFESSION.

The interest which the condition of the growing crops possesses for most business men at this season, naturally diverts more attention to the subject of agriculture generally as a pursuit in life. The country at this period of the year is more attractive and makes the cooped-up city man turn his thoughts to green fields and shady groves or forest preserves till he longs to possess a few acres of his own in addition to his city house in a terraced row, with its area in the rear sufficient to hold his winter's heap of ashes and the accumulation of rubbish which the meeting of the snow reveals in all its hideousness and vulgarity. His thoughts may next take a turn to the picture of the farmer and his family as he may have seen them in a trip through the country, or as he caught a glimpse of them from his comfortable railway seat as he whirled by on a dreary day in February and contrasted their ways of living with the comparative luxuries of his own city home. In June he wants the fresh air, the green fields, the shady pathway along the country roads, but these would not suffice without the many city comforts to which he is so accustomed, and which seem impossible of attainment in the house of the farmer.

But revenous a nos moutons. It is the economical aspect of agricultural life and not its amenities with which we are now concerned. One might expect from the influences of our model and experimental farms and the general knowledge spread all over the land by means of the abundant literature devoted to agriculture, to find greater improvement than is witnessed in farming operations. The rapid introduction during the last twenty-five years of labor-saving machinery should enable the

farmer to give more attention to the teachings of modern agricultural chemistry. Instead of this being the case, he usually follows the old rotation, and if in a few instances he is led to attempt some modern improvement, he is easily discouraged and abandons it after a perfunctory trial. But it is in farming as in other pursuits: some men will succeed at anything they undertake; the majority make a mere living at it, or fail entirely.

Much of the want of success in agricultural pursuits is due to the endeavor to cultivate too large an area. The "land hunger" which so many people feel, leads them to the purchase of more land than they can cultivate. Superficial cultivation is the consequence, and the result is that we resemble our American neighbors rather than those in similar pursuits in Great Britain, in being what a writer in Harper's recently termed -"a nation of poor farmers." With lands comparatively new-we do not here refer to the virgin lands of the Northwestwith energy and pluck-with all modern farm appliances, the yield per acre of wheat in the older Provinces is little over half what it is in England. The question with us is, not what a farm yields per acre but how many acres the man has sown. Grain growing and stock-raising are the principal pursuits of the farming community; but these branches have largely been driven west, far from the populous centres and away from markets. It probably has not occurred to many eastern farmers that as profitable results could be attained in the immediate vicinity of their market by an expenditure of the difference in the cost of transportation. All the old land cannot be employed in the production of fruits, vegetables, milk, &c., which necessitate a close market. The one or the other, however, especially dairying and egg and poultry raising, call for more minute attention to details. Profitable farming is not satisfied with what is called "tickling with the noe," plowing four inches deep and scratching with a harrow. A maximum of labor with a minimum of land will win against the converse any day; methods of cultivation must be intensified and must be accompanied by the aid of science. To be successful in agriculture we must have a class of men who will combine theory and practice and take into the field the method and intelligence which make for success in mercantile affairs, manufacturing and other walks of life. The number of young men from our towns and cities who are being trained in our agricultural colleges should effect much good in after life by setting an example of what may be accomplished in this way. These agriculturists of the future are the men who are destined to recover to our so called "worn out fields" the productiveness of former years, and make for example the fine expanse of country to the south of this city, the Chambly valley, produce something more profitable than continual crops of hay.

The question kept before the student at the experimental farm is "how to feed the land while the land shall feed him." The advice of the sage of Chatauqua has been too literally fol. lowed and the Canadian like the American farmer of the day has found it a simpler matter to "go west" and take up new lands than to attempt the fertilization of the old. This is where the higher intelligence and broader culture of our agricultural colleges must come into play. Any person who takes up a billof-fare at a respectable hotel in city or town cannot fail to remark on the long list of vegetables and fruits served up. The rapid accumulation of wealth and the liberal habits of expenditure which we are acquiring from our neighbors are supplying a gradually growing market for the finest food supplies. The difficulties and expenses of transportation are directing the attention of northern horticulturists to the experiment of raising strawberries and other small fruit during the winter under glass

on a scale large enough to make it pay. Fresh small fruits are now in demand at all seasons of the year in the cities and towns all over Canada and the United States. Florida strawberries and Bermuda potatoes, &c., reach Montreal and Toronto in March, and the demand is yearly increasing.

The writer in Harper says: "The larger profit usually results from the manufacture of the most valuable goods. The art of the goldsmith leads more rapidly to the accumulation of wealth than does the blacksmith's forge; and the cultivation of the soil offers no exception to the rule." A young man preparing for any of the liberal professions, knowing that several years must be spent in accumulating the necessary intellectual capital, naturally asks himself what prizes he may hope eventually to gain. Agricultural statistics are not likely to tempt him. The lawyer who has reached the height where Daniel Webster said "there always is plenty of room," the young physician who reaches the goal of his ambition by marrying the heiress of Crossus, the popular clergyman who weekly reminds us of "those things we ought not to have done" at the rate of ten thousand dollars a year, is each of them more tempting to the ambitious youth than the recent agricultural returns which show that the farmers of New York State, differing but little in soil and climate from Ontario,—though there is a great difference in the farmers-realize only about 31 per cent. profit on the capital invested.

Let us see, on the other hand, what has been done in a few known cases of agricultural development. An acre of ground contains 43,560 square feet. It is quite practicable to grow upon an individual foot of that ground a product of flowers, plants, vegetables or small fruits that is worth five cents. At that rate the whole acre would yield a value of \$2,178. It has been donealthough the ordinary cultivator will be slow to believe the statement. A prize strawberry grower realized \$1,700 from the single crop of two acres; and \$2,000 has been realized from the same amount of land. Early cabbage has yielded \$435 per acre; early tomatoes \$585; asparagus \$900 from four acres; and in some cases the yield has brought as high as \$300 per acre. An instance of departing from old methods is given of a farmer near Rochester who five or six years ago experimented with half an acre of his fifty acres in growing cabbages for the city market. The venture was so satisfactory that he gradually extended the area. He now cultivates 30 acres—and realized last year a net profit of \$6,500, and "it was not a very good year for cabbages at that."

The low and gradually falling average yield of wheat has directed considerable attention to that cereal at some of the experimental farms. The Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa reports an average equal to 45 to 50 bushels per acre from Ledoga wheat sown in small quantities in various parts of the Dominion on the 17th May, 1888. This wheat ripened by the 6th August, or eleven days before the Red Fife wheat. Some experiments made by Prof. Blount at the Colorado Agricultural College show remarkable results. On an exact square acre he planted 7½ lbs of hand picked wheat in rows 18 inches apart, and at harvest they threshed out 67 bushels; on a quarter acre, two pounds of selected seed were planted, and the yield was 18 bushels; and again upon 76 square feet he planted 76 grains of extra-fine seed, and the product was 101 lbs, or at the rate of 100 bushels per acre. Here is something for even our economists to ponder over. Farmers will say that it is not possible to attain the above results on any extended scale. Probably not to the average farmer who has too much land to till. He must still sow his six or eight acres a day, with 2½ bushels to the acre. It might occur to one of unusual intelligence that it would be economy to attempt to produce his 100 bushels (what 8 acres usually yield) by the thorough cultivation of two acres only.

It would consequently seem, says our essayist, that the pursuit of agriculture can offer inducements to the business man who would exert his talents in it as a financial enterprise, to the scientist who would combine a profitable avocation with the investigation of the laws of nature, and to the economist who from his observations would add to the general knowledge of how best to conserve the forces of production.

CANNED GOODS.

The opening of the summer season finds the market for fruits and vegetables dull and overstocked in spite of the large and increasing consumption of this class of prepared food. Canadian trade in this respect is in the same condition as that of the United States, with few exceptions. A feature recently has been

the importation into this country of Lima beans and pumpkin, the latter an article which could be packed in any quantity in Canada and the use of which has been markedly on the increase here.

The domestic packing has not given cause for complaint and the tendency has been towards improvement, both as to quality and "get up" but we notice that a note of warning has been sounded in the United States by some of the large meat packers whose business has suffered from the reprehensible practices of small jobbers and speculators in putting up stuff in cans not fit for human food. The facilities for practising fraud were one of the earliest objections to the use of canned goods, and it is in the interest of the trade to insist upon honesty and strict integrity in the packing of every tin placed upon the market. increase in fruit and vegetable canning houses in Montreal and throughout the Dominion, and the establishment of large meat packing establishments in this city makes this matter one of vital importance at the present time. The pack of 1888 was the largest on record and this is particularly true of corn and tomatoes. The wholesale and retail trade is alike well supplied and packers are unable to sell as their stocks are practically a surplus. Prices are depressed and about as low on most of the staples as they ever were. The outlook is not encouraging as prices are not likely to go higher, and in some cases the tendency is lower; holders, therefore, will do well to get rid of their stocks. The outcome of a continuance of this dull trade, as is well said by an American exchange, will be the carrying over into this year's pack of the largest surplus stock ever known

The pack of corn and tomatoes last year was probably fifty per cent. larger than the provious year, which was an average season. To-day tomatoes are selling at 80 cents to \$1 per dozen cans, which is eighteen to twenty per cent. lower than last year. Corn is also selling at an extremely low price. As very few tomatoes or corn are exported, the trade being confined to this country, no relief can be looked for from that quarter. These low prices are not only accounted for by the tremendous pack, but the frozen and poor stock which was put on the market could not be sold but at very low figures. We notice that more complaints of this nature have been made in the United States than on this side. Peaches, which are more largely packed than any other fruit, had an average pack and are quiet. The range, \$2@ \$2.25, is about an average price and much lower than the previous pack, which was exceptionally light and high. No excessive stocks are liable to be carried over to next season. There is a surplus quantity of blueberries, and prices are very low, but the prices prevailing are principally owing to the depressed market in general. A large quantity of this fruit is now put up in the Lower provinces. The California fruit-business the past eight or ten months has been unprecedentedly large in the States and we note a growing consumption in Canada. The sale, however, was not at all equal to the common goods and stocks are larger than last year. Canned peaches and apricots are the most popular and were in much better favor this year than any previous one. A reference to other fruits and vegetables is scarcely necessary-they are in plentiful supply and lower priced than they were twelve months ago.

The market for canned fish presents a decided contrast; there is no over supply and some varieties are scarce and wanted. Mackorel, which is more of a favorite in the United States than in Canada, cannot be had, a thing not known for years. Very little was obtainable for packing purposes during the season, and what was put on the market brought exorbitant prices, which were fully 100 per cent. higher than the previous season. Since the New Year the trade in sardines has dropped off and they have ruled dull. The pack was hardly an average one, and as stocks are light prices are not expected to go lower. In this market lobsters are quoted steady at \$5.50 per case. They are in light supply in Boston and New York, and prices are about 20 conts per dozen higher. Standards are worth \$1.65@\$1.70 in Boston and Nova Scotia \$1.55. Dealers expect to get some lobsters from the Maine coast this year, but last season they obtained next to none from that quarter. The poultry pack will this year be a large one in the States and prices range 10c@15c lower per dozen tins, which is chiefly due to the comparative cheapness of fowl and the dull state of the trade in general Canned roast turkey, chicken and duck is gradually growing into favor in Canada and this business offers an opening for the enterprising, as standard goods of this kind could probably be profitably exported.

The past year has been a dull one for pickles. Manufacturers

account for it by the quietness in general trade, pickles bein, luxury and not a necessity like staple canned goods. The 6x-ceptionally dull winter has caused a decline in prices of about ten per cent.

THE NORTH BRITISH AND MERCANTILE.

The annual statement of this staunch old company, to be found elsewhere, gives further evidence of the remarkable growth and prosperity attending its operations for several years past. The business of the year 1888 shows an increase, as compared with the year preceding, of half a million dollars, the net premiums for last year being over \$6,400,000. A table which we find in the Review shows that the revenue has increased in the last eight years by nearly \$1,650,000, while the losses have increased in the same period only \$555,000. After setting aside, as usual, one third of the net premiums of the year to provide for liabilities and current risks, the balance at the credit of profit and loss amounts to \$1,200,000. Out of this a dividend was declared at the rate of £1 15s per share, which absorbed the sum of \$875,000, leaving a balance to be carried forward of \$325,600. After thus providing for the dividend, the paid-up capital and reserves including the dividend reserve with the undivided profits of the company, amount to nearly 124 millions of dollars, and this exclusive of the accumulated life assurance and annuity funds. These figures will afford some idea of the magnitude and success of the company's operations. The dividend and bonus paid for some time past are at the rate of 28 per cent per annum on the paid-up capital of the company. The value of the shares have practically doubled during the last six or seven years. The life assurance branch is also in a highly prosperous condition, but as we have to do chiefly with the fire business of the company in Canada, it calls for no comment beyond the statement that the funds have increased by half a million dollars during the year, and now reach nearly 20 million dollars while the total assets at the close of 1888 amount to 372 millions of dollars. The arrangement perfected some months ago for the transfer to the company of the business of the Scottish Provincial Insurance Co., will be new to some of its policy-holders in Canada, who, as well as the general management and officers, are to be congratulated on the magnificent exhibit made by the company in the condensed report which we reproduce on another page of this

THE SMARDON FAILURE.

The suspension of R. Smardon of Three Rivers, Que., is another feature in the checkered career of that manufacturer. Mr. Smardon began in the wholesale boot and shoe business in this city in 1872, under the style of R. Smardon & Co., which dissolved at the close of that year. The concern immediately blossomed out as Smardon & Young, under which style it was conducted until 1877, when Mr. Young withdrew. In March 1878 Mr. Smardon failed, owing about \$100,000, but recovered the estate on the basis of 40 cents in the dollar. This was accomplished through the assistance of his brother who bought in the assets, and the business was conducted in his name until R. got his discharge in 1880. It is understood that sometime afterwards he again had recourse to his brother, who furnished him with \$5,000. Some three years ago Mr. Smardon gradually recovered his standing and was able to begin reducing the debt to his brother, but the pressure from this source evidently became so great in course of time, that he was again obliged to suspend-in November, 1886. Negotiations were shortly afterwards entered into with the corporation of Three Rivers to remove the business to that city, and an agreement was entered into by which the city agreed to give the firm a bonus of \$35,000, spread over some years. Mr. Smardon accordingly removed his business to Three Rivers somewhat over two and one-half years ago, taking with him a number of his skilled employes from this city. These becoming discontented with their new surroundings, abandoned their considerate and generous employer and returned to Montreal. He was obliged in consequence to get local assistance, and these taking some time to become educated to the business, the work was carried on temporarily at a disadvantage. This, with the enormous expense attached to the removal of plant, machinery, &c., and the construction of the factory, interfered considerably with his profits. The death of his brother also caused the estate to press for the balance due, and so persistent has this been meantime, that only some \$7,000 now remains of the original sum of over \$100,000. When Mr. Smardon moved to Three Rivers he was supposed to have been possessed

of a fair working surplus, nominally amounting to about \$25,000. This, with the proportion of the bonus paid him, some \$20,000, was supposed to have left him in good shape, and he would, doubtless, have been able to work through and prosper had it not been for the pressure from his brother's estate, and the other disadvantages above recited. To those of his creditors and intimate friends acquainted with the circumstances, the suspension towards the close of last week was no surprise. present direct liabilities are about \$50,000. In view, however of the straightforward character of Mr. Smardon, notwithstanding his checkered career, and the forthcoming balance (\$15,000) of bonus still unpaid, which he is to receive at the rate of \$3,000 a year, the creditors have agreed to the extension required, viz: that they be paid in full in 12 monthly instalments, beginning 1st of August next, with interest, but without any other security than that furnished by the firm's own paper. Much sympathy is expressed for Mr. Smardon in his present circumstances, and especially as in all his difficulties there has been no indication whatever of anything partaking of the nature of fraudulent accommodation, or other means occasionally resorted to by men forced into difficulties.

ACCOMMODATION FOR SMALL TRADERS.

A city man writes us as follows: The manner adopted by some of the banks presses severely on needy borrowers. One or two instances have come under my notice. A banker discounts a lot of bills, charging six to eight per cent., according to the necessities of his client. He retains twenty per cent of the proceeds as a margin and perhaps pays a part in sterling exchange or silver, which the borrower has to dispose of at a loss. How long can a business firm stand this? Banks have been known to discount a sixty-day bill, charge seven per cent. interest per annum and one-half per cent. commission, drawee has remitted, and when drawer has paid draft, in say, less than a week, the bank has refused to allow any rebate. It is a fact that a discounter of paper in this city could not get cash on a \$600 note for a client, but when it was changed to \$6,000, he procured the money easily. The drawers afterwards paid about ten cents on the dollar on a quarter of a million of liabilities. These instances (and others quarter of a million of habilities. These instances (and others might be cited) indicate that respectable small firms often suffer hardships even in a banking centre like Montreal when, in fact, they should be dealt with at reasonable rates. Some one remarked the other day that. "the judicious manipulator of champagne and cigars, or the swell who spends more money than he can afford stands a much better chance of a good bank account than the honest, quiet living merchant who is trying to make both ends meet and keep up a small life insurance policy." Whilst we cannot agree altogether with such an extreme view, the past experience of small but solvent traders gives ground for dissatisfaction in certain quarters.

BUYING TO ADVANTAGE.

To manage in all cases so as to get the lowest prices possible or full value for your money is an art, and, as a correspondent in "Mixed Stocks' says, he who can get the bottom figures on the merchandise he orders is an artist. To the ordinary buyer, the one who simply orders but does not buy, this article is particularly addressed.

There is a limited class of storekeepers who put such implicit faith in a travelling salesman that few questions are asked concerning the quality of the goods to be billed; and still another class who prefer to deal with the house direct, in the erroneous belief that the traveller's expenses are added to each particular bill the latter sends traveller's expenses are added to each particular bill the latter sends in. To the former class of buyer we would say, "test the agent in every way you can. Do not hesitate to compare other prices with his even though he has a strong hold on your friendship, There is no friendship in business in these times, when every one has to fight, and fight hard, too, to make a living. To the latter class we can only say that no wholesale house can do business long if either higher or lower prices are charged on mail orders than on orders sent in by their travelling men. Good buyers may properly he divided into two lower prices are charged on mail orders than on orders sent in by their travelling men. Good buyers may properly be divided into two distinct classes, the quiet buyer and the bulldozer. It is far more necessary for the latter to be thoroughly posted on the quality of goods to be bought and the ruling prices than the former, yet to be a first class buyer of either class, one should know what he needs and can sell and have a fair knowledge of values. It is a difficult matter to tell which is the best buyer of the two, although we are inclined to the belief that bulldozing does not pay in the long run. It is more than likely that if a very low price is obtained by this method it will create ill-feeling on the part of the salesman and cause him to "get even" with the buyer at the first opportunity. Thus, we say, that unless the buyer's position is impregnable, unless he is so fortified in his knowledge of goods and prices that no one can take advantage of him, he had better let bulldozing alone. The fundamental principle or good buying is keeping inviolate the figures quoted by different houses or their travelling salesmen. Every buyer has his preferences, on good buying is keeping inviolate the figures quoted by different houses or their travelling salesmen. Every buyer has his preferences, and all things being equal he will give his order to the travelling man or house he is best acquainted with, and very often this friendship extends into giving away others quotations. We cannot too strongly condemn the policy of telling a favored travelling man the price quoted by a compatitor or of shoring him an involve force of the strong of the strong him an involve force or the strong him and the strong him an price quoted by a competitor, or of showing him an invoice from a

house other than the one he represents. Very often in arguing the question of price with a salesman, a storekeeper will bring out an invoice of some competing firm to convince the former that his price is high. Just what a salesman wants; he not only looks at that one particular item, but takes notes in his mind of others, and after an hour or so until the fact of having shown the bill is forgotten, he an hour or so until the fact of having shown the bill is forgotten, he will casually ask the merchant if some article which appeared on the invoice is not wanted. Naturally, the storekeeper wishes to keep posted and asks the price, and one is given much below that billed by the competing house. This is not done in the hope of receiving an order for the article in question, but for the sole purpose of creating prejudice against the other firm and inspiring confidence in himself. Unless the storekeeper is on his guard he is apt to think he has been swindled, and sees in the salesman present and the house he represents the only honest merchants in business. Of course, all travelling salesmen are not up to such tricks as these, but any number of them are, and it is poor policy and not strictly honorable to 'give away' prices or show invoices under any circumstances." y' prices or show invoices under any circumstances."
"In conclusion," says our contemporary, "keep all quotations to

yourself, and let yourself be known as the man who gives his orders to the lowest bidder, and very soon no man or house will quote anything to you but 'way-down' prices."

Mr. Ryan began business as commission merchant and insurance agent in Montreal about half a century ago and succeeded in amassing considerable wealth. He afterwards became member of the Legislative Council for Victoria, and was for many years a director of the Bank of Montreal. He had reached the unusual age of 85 years, and his handsome military figure was conspicuous on our streets until within a few weeks on his death. He is succeeded by Mr. Edward Murphy in the Senate. Mr. McDougell, who was also for years, highly succeeded by his death. McDougall, who was also for years highly successful in his business, has a large number of connections in this and Three Rivers. He exceeded the years alotted by the Psalmist.

After setting aside, as usual, one-third of the net premiums of the year, to provide for liabilities on current policies, the balance at the credit of profit and loss account for 1888 amounts to £240,125 17s 9d. This includes the unappropriated balance, brought forward from 1887, of £41,470 14s 7d.

LIFE BUSINESS.—During the year 1888 there were issued 1,146 policies, assuring £1,134,941, the new premiums on which amount to £43,389 9s. 11d. In 1887 the number of policies was 1,057, the sums assured were £740,429, and the new premiums were £28,074 7s. 5d. The net amount insured in 1888, after deducting sums re-insured, was £814,041. The new premiums, after deducting those paid to the re-insuring offices, were £35,808 6s 7d. The net amount insured in 1887 was £701 129, and the new net premiums were £26,482 14s. 7d. We income of the life branch, from premiums and interest, amounted. 1887 was £701 123, and the new new premiums were £25,462 145. 7dt.

The income of the life branch, from premiums and interest, amounted in the year 1888 to £512,383 1s. 5d. During the year 301 deaths, by which 368 policies emerged, were proved, and 18 endowments matured. The sums which thus became payable amount, with bonus additions, to the sum of £340,347 2s. 1d, after deducting re-assurances. It will be seen from the balance sheet annexed that the life assurance was an enterprise to £3273 085 178 8d. At December 31 1887, the fund now amounts to £3,873,085, 17s. 8d. At December 31, 1887, the amount of the life assurance fund was £3,772,579 2s. 11d. There was thus an increase during the year of £100,506 14s. 9d.

Annuity Business—In the annuity branch 271 bonds were issued, securing the sum of £16,223 is. 11d. yearly of immediate annuities, £800 yearly of survivorship annuities, and £407 4s. 2d. of deferred annuities for which the Company received the sum of £164,615 12s. 2d. by single payment, and £156 2s. 3d by annual premium. In 1887 the number of bonds was 210, securing the sum of £11,770 3s. 11d. of immediate annuities and £2,123 2s. 6d. of survivorship annuities for which the Company received the sum of £15,024 annuities, for which the Company received the sum of £125,024 6s. 2d. by single payment, and £788 18s. by annual premium. For nearly twenty-eight years he devoted himself with untiring energy to the affairs of the Company; and while not only his immediate colleagues of the London board, but also his co-directors of the Edinburgh board, gratefully acknowledged the successful results of his efforts and the high-minded principles by which these were actuated, the shareholders from time to time listened with gratification to the reports of the vast increase of business which he was able to give. It was to Mr. Cater that was mainly due the amalgamation of the old North British with the Mercantile Insurance Company, tion of the old North British with the Mercantile Insurance Company, and following on it the vast increase of business and prosperity which has attended the amalgamated company. The directors therefore take this opportunity of placing on permanent record their sense of the great obligations under which the Company lies to him, and of the respect due to his memory—a feeling in which they do not doubt that the shareholders will sincerely join. The directors have to report the death of the Right Hon. Henry Richard, Lord Wolverton, one of the extraordinary directors, which followed soon after the death of his uncle, the Right Hon. The stock market was not quite so strong this week; some holders were disposed to take their profits, and there was talk of money being scarcer. Merchants and Commerce were in good demand but Ontario and Montreal were easier. Merchants deserves the strong character it has born for some time. A large sale of \$45,000 land grant Canadian Pacific bonds was made at 1094, and more were wanted at the same price. A feature of the week has been the tender by the lessees of the Montreal Telegraph Company of a six per cent dividend, but it was not taken into consideration. Richelieu has been in good demand at 591, sellers offering pretty freely around 60. Gas was weaker on attempts to realize, and the 'bulls' will evidently have to buy more or let it sag. Canadian Pacific has been fairly active and is well thought of on the Paris bourse, where it has recently been listed. The reported traffic receipts of late have been large and the winter expenses unusually light. There has been no recent advance of any account, the favorable conditions noted having, probably, been discounted by the rise which occurred some weeks ago. To-day being a holiday there

MONTREAL WHOLE SALE MARKETS.

Montreal, Thursday Evg., May 30, 1889.

Business has been fair for the season in most lines of staple goods and in fact favorable comparisons have been drawn between May this year and last both as regards volume of trade and cash remittances. This is doubtless due, in part, to the earlier and more promising season this year. Some districts of the country are still bad with little likelihood of improvement until the fall. The weather has been decidedly cooler with rains and has been beneficial to the principal growingcrops, except at some points where frost has struck in and injured fruit and vegetables. damage has been done either in this Province or Ontario. Wheat and flour is again lower on the week and the loss of profits to holders during the past tew months must have been heavy. Considerable profits have also been wiped out on cheese, which, after selling at 111c in November last, declined 1c@11c in

early spring, with carrying-over expenses and high spring freights to be taken into calculation. The condition of British and European trade centinues good, and this will tend to keep up the prices of imported merchandise of all kinds. Goods of donestic manufacture are steady, and the chief point to note in prices is the downward tendency in the produce markets.

ASHES.—Receipts continue moderate. The demand for export is disappointing, and prices are easier, only choice first pots would now bring \$4.00, seconds \$3.50. Poarls nominal at about \$5.10 for first sort and no demand. Receipts since 1st January 1,260 bris, pots, 215 bris\pearls. Deliveries, 998 bris pots, 169 bris pearls. Stock 29th May, at 6 p.m., 507 bris pots, 164 bris pearls.

Dany Product and Provisions.—The make of fodder cheese this spring has been small, and grass cheese was on the market ten days to a fortnight earlier than usual. Opening-prices are fairly low and the demand is light. There is said to be every probability of a lower range of values. We notice that our exporters, with possibly one or two exceptions, have returned from England. Or looking back we find that the English market is down 6s from the opening. Now cheese started at 50s@52s and has declined to 45s 6d. At Ingersoll, Ont., on the 28th inst. 4,100 boxes were offered; 700 sold at 8c and 500 at 8j.c. In Canton, N.Y., sales were made at 7j.c. There were sales during the week in the Montreal market at 8c@8½c for finest, and we now quote 8c@8½c as extreme as it is a gradually drooping market. Butter has been easy in tone, and there has been a good local demand. Offerings are increasing, but prices are not low enough for exporters. Eggs have mot the usual demand, and at the close are only selling in small lots, buyers being supplied. Receipts were ample. In provisions jobbing lots have been selling at quotations, and there have been no large transactions and no developments of importance. Pork and lard were chiefly in demand, smoked meats being dull. At Liverpool, tallow advanced to 26s. Chicago provisions were active but weaker. Pork sold at \$1.70 June, \$1.80 July, \$11.87 Sept. Lard, \$6.67½ June, \$6.72½ July, \$6.82½ Sept.

Day-Goods.—The complaints of a falling off in cash receipts seem to have abated as the month nears its end, and we hear that the average receipts for May were fully up to the standard, in fact some tell us that they were considerably in excess of the same month last year. The outlying districts of the city have furnished a good many orders, and dealers there are satisfied with the business done;

down town trade has also been a full average. Travellers on the road have been taking orders freely for winter goods, which the retailers throughout the country appear to be willing to place exceptionally early this year. This is no doubt due to the prospect of an advance in prices owing to the enhanced cost of the raw material. Domestic manufactures keep steady and in demand, and we hear of no changes since the recent advances noted in staple lines. Foreign goods are not arriving to any large extent, but the steamers are bringing enough to keep up a good assortment. In dress goods at New York mohairs in black, grey and cream secure the best patronage, with colored cashmeres and all-wool Henrietta cloths in second choice. Printed challies and fancies generally were quiet to the verge of stagnation. Prices, save in the case of broken "fancy" lots, now marketed at reduced figures, remain firm and unchanged. There was a light supplementary demand advanced through the mails for fancy cassimere suitings and summer-weight worsteds, in which classes, however, desirable goods are practically out of the market.

FLOUR AND GRAIN.—The flour market has again been dull and in buyers favor. Supplies are large and there is scarcely any demand, even if concessions are offered. Little has been exported to date. Prices are a shade off on several grades, and we also reduce the price of oatmeal. Grain in this market is lower and still tending downwards. Manitoba wheat is being offered more freely for future delivery. The revised quotations will be found elsewhere. The loss of profits on wheat and flour during the past few months has been very disappointing to holders. Grain freights from this port are 2s. 3d. Liverpool and 3s. London and Glasgow: flour 11s. 6d. to Liverpool and 14s. to Glasgow. During the past few days the Chicago market has been fairly active and prices recovered slightly. June wheat sold at 79c, July at 77c and Septembor at 74gc. The market was dull at New York with but slight variations. In the States of the wheat and corn belt, the weather has improved the condition of the principal crops, although frost has caused some damage to corn and vegetables in Minnesota. Excessive rains and cool weather over the Middle Atlantic States has generally improved grain. Wheat in sight on this Continent and affort is 36,796,000 bushels, a decrease of 1,522,000 with a week ago and of 15,089,000 with a year ago.

Greenes—One of the cargoes of Barbadoes molasses, sold to arrive, has come to hand and the owners having faith in the market are not offering but prefer to store. Other reported sales are lots of 200 and 100 puncheons at 45c. A lot was bought, last week at 44c and re-sold almost immediately at 45c. Local dealers are asking 46c for moderate sized quantities. Other molasses are nominal with little doing in them. Some c mmon St. Kitts has been selling at 38c. Sugars have ruled slightly higher in New York and the position looks firm. One of the local refineries which shaded prices last week has restored them. The cut was about to mean they are stored them. The cut was about to mean and buyers are looking around more than they were but are not inclined to buy much at present. The season has not sufficiently advanced yet for new Japan teas to be under offer. The market in Japan is reported steady. There is nothing to report in blacks and the market is steady but not active. General trade is reported fair and payments are not so poor.
