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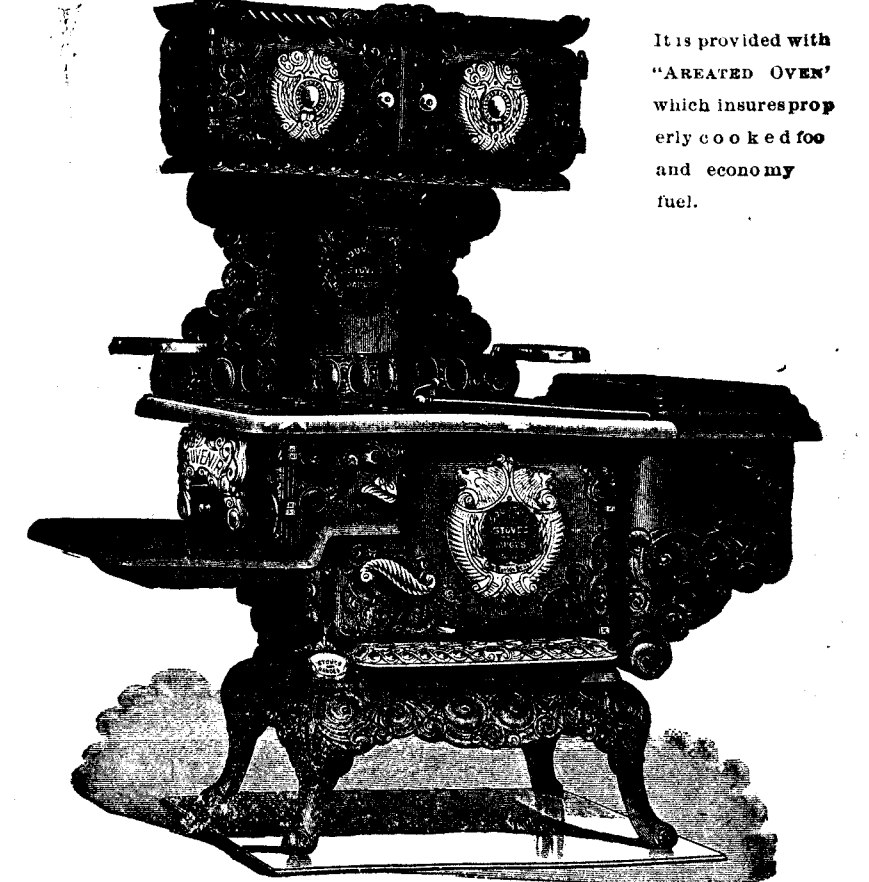

Death of Marshal MacMahon.

A distinguished figure in European
politics disappeared by the death of
Marshal MacMahon, Duke of Magenta.
The deceased soldier was of Irish des-
cent, and was descended from an Irish
family who had risked and lost all, in
common with a good many other Irish-
men, for the Stuarts. Marshal Mac-
Mahon was born at Sully, July 13, 1808.
He first saw active service in Algeria, in
1830. He took part in the expedition to
Antwerp in 1832. As Gen. MacMahon
he commanded a brigade in the Crimea,
and his brilliant successes there are
historical. He commanded the first
French Army corps in the Franco-
Prussian war, and was chief in command
at Sedan, where he was severely
wounded. He was elected President of
the French Republic in 1873, on the
resignation of M. Thiers and held office
for nearly six years. Before his death
Marshal MacMahon was engaged in
writing his memoirs.

The Wishing-Chair.

At the World's Fair there is a "Wish-
ing-Chair," which is built exactly like
the famous old Wishing-Chair in the
Giant's Causeway, County Donegal,
Ireland. The chair is a big flat rock
surrounded by other rocks, in the midst
of which it nestles as snugly as if it had
been built there, instead of being placed
there by nature.
The story of the Wishing-Chair is
that any one who sits in it and makes a
wish will have his wish fulfilled inside of
a year. At the World's Fair the Wish-
ing-Chair is occupied by some one all
the time, and many are the wishes that
are made there. One little girl wished
that her dolls would all turn into candy,
so that she could eat them. And a cunning
little boy who had to be helped into the
chair wished that he could live in a
circus-tent and feed the animals peanuts
every day of his life. It is said that the
Wishing-Chair sometimes disappoints
people by not fulfilling their wishes; but
when that is the case, it is because they
have changed their minds about wanting
the wish gratified. The Irish people,
who are to be seen in the chair every
day, almost always wish for better times
for their native land. And surely we
can all hope that all good things will be
theirs.
