l. Declaration of War against Roumania, Hungary and Finland, December 7, 1941

3. Text of Note from Department of External Affairs to Japanese Legation, Ottawa, December 8, 1941

Ottawa, December 8, 1941

Sir,

The Canadian Charge d'Affaires has today been instructed to inform the Imperial Japanese Government that news of the wanton and treacherous attack by Japanese Armed Forces on British territory and British forces and also on United States territory and United States forces, reached Canada yesterday; that Japan's actions are a threat to the defence and freedom of Canada and the other nations of the British Commonwealth; and that, consequently, a state of war exists between Canada and Japan as and from the seventh day of December, 1941.

As a result of the existence of a state of war between our two countries arrangements will be made to issue special passports enabling you, your wife and family, and the members of your Mission and their wives and families to depart from Canada. Accordingly, I should be grateful if you could furnish me with a list of the names and addresses of the (a) secretaries, attaches, and other officials of your Mission, their wives and families, and (b) Japanese nationals in your household. It is also desired to secure a similar list for the personnel of your Consulate in Vancouver. Due to the existing lack of steamship communication or air transport between Canada and Japan, it may be necessary to make special arrangements for the exchange of diplomatic and consular representatives and personnel. If so, the matter can be taken up at a later date.

- 3. The Canadian Government desire to accord to you and to the members of your Mission, on the basis of reciprocity, every consideration and courtesy compatible with the safeguarding of our national interests.
- 4. Accordingly, sufficient time will be allowed before your departure for the settlement of the personal affairs of yourself and the members of your Mission the storage of furniture, the settlement of outstanding obligations and similar matters; for the sealing of your Archives; and their transfer to the representative of the neutral Power who may be selected to look after Japanese interests in Canada. Diplomatic and consular archives will be placed under seal and will be inviolate. They will be held in Canadian territory for the duration of the war in the custody of the representative of the neutral Power in charge of Japanese interests. I assume that you will inform me, as soon as may be practicable, of the name of this representative.
- 5. The censorship authorities have been instructed not to permit communications by post or telegraph. Facilities for any necessary communications with your Government or with your consular representatives in Vancouver, in English or French, may be arranged with this Department.
- 6. The premises, property and quarters of Consular Officers, as well as of Diplomatic Officers, will not be searched. Members of Consular Office staffs will be treated in the same manner as Consular Officers themselves.
- 7. Special precautions will be taken for the protection of the Legation, your person and property, and the premises in which you live. Protection will also be afforded to the persons and property of the members of your Mission until their departure. Similarly, protection will be accorded the household goods left in storage during the severance of diplomatic and consular relations. It is assumed that pending departure from Canada, the members of the staff of the Legation and Consulate will remain in their respective residences and that you will communicate with this Department on any matter on which you may desire further information or advice.

4. Meeting of Canadian Temporary Great Lakes St. Lawrence
Basin Committee, December 10-11, 1941

The Canadian Temporary Great Lakes St. Lawrence Basin Committee met at Niagara December 10 and 11, to discuss plans for remedial works above the Falls. Joint meetings with the United States-St. Lawrence Advisory Committee were held in Washington on the 12th and 13th December, and a sub-committee was appointed to bring in recommendations for the design and construction of a submerged weir in the Grass Island Pool.

5. Arrangements for Protection of Canadian Interests abroad

Various changes have been made in arrangements for the protection of Canadian interests abroad. Switzerland is now acting as the Protecting Power in all enemy and enemy-occupied countries in which the United States formerly acted for Canada, while the United States continues to assume responsibility for the protection of Canadian interests in non-occupied France and other French territories under the control of the Vichy Government. Switzerland is also acting as Protecting Power in occupied China (excluding Manchuria) and in Thailand. Argentina is acting for Canada in the Japanese Empire and Manchuria.

6. Text of Telegram received by Ganadian Government from United Kingdom Government, December 26, 1941

The following is the text of a telegram dated

December 26 which was received by the Canadian Government

from the United Kingdom Government:

Now that the heroic defence of Hong Kong has come to an end, His Majesty's Government in Great Britain desires to express to His Majesty's Government in Canada their great admiration of the gallant part played by Canada in its defence and their deep sympathy for Canada on the loss of valuable lives.

The loss of these lives, the suffering of the wounded and the removal from conflict of the others by capture have not been in vain. Every day that defence has been maintained has been of the utmost value in preventing the enemy from diverting men, ships and equipment to other areas. It will have secured some respite to our Allies. It has moreover demonstrated to the Axis Powers the unyielding determination of the Empire to frustrate their treacherous aggression. The conduct displayed by the defenders stands as a shining example and inspiration to all of us engaged in this deadly struggle.
