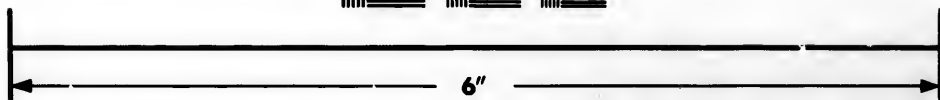
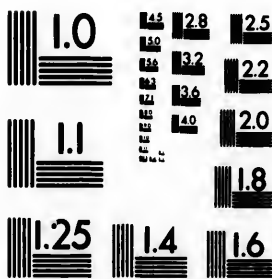

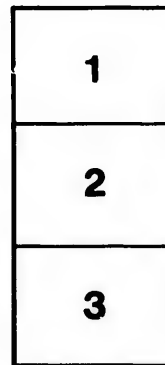

CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

I.

The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rules or Regulations of the Society be repealed, annulled, or altered, except at a Meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment, shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a Member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of

twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

VI.

Officers.

1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

(Executive Committee.)

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredrickton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

4. Special Meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or, in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but so far as may be, alternately at Saint John and Fredericton.

VIII.

(Schedule Committee.)

There shall also be a Schedule Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

1. The President, Treasurer and Secretary or Secretaries of the Society *ex officio*.

2. Three Clerical and five Lay Members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee.

3. The Schedule Committee shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect; and the appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-Laws or Regulations of the General Committee.

4. Five members of the Schedule Committee, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Schedule Committee shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

IX.

(Objects.)

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz.:

1. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships; and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a Fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of Clergymen who are poor ; and towards the education of the children of such Clergymen, and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving Money or Securities as Special Trusts.

X.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

XI.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XII.

(Local Committee.)

1. The members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee ; and so also the members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee ; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

on some convenient day, previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society, to be elected at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

XIV.

(The General Committee.)

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz. : The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman, the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the meeting of the General Committee, the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *pro hac vice* a member of the General Committee), and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committee as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee, to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society; and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:

Firstly. Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly. Secretary's Report to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly. Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly. Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meetings for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held. Provided that in every such case, a report of such adjournment, and the causes therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously. (18th Report, page 24.)

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion, to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission. (22d Report, page 33.)

That the following be the form of draft for a Missionary's salary, to come into effect on the first of October, 1861, and that no draft be paid by the Treasurer, unless presented in person, or endorsed by the person to whom it is made payable, the Treasurer to take a receipt from the party to whom the payment is made on the same.

REPORT.

THE proceedings of this Society, during the past year, may well be regarded by all its members with more than usual interest. New arrangements were required for the maintenance of the Missions in the Diocese. A large amount, within a short period, had been withdrawn by the Society for Propagation of the Gospel; there was no endowment fund to resort to, nor had there been a corresponding increase in the contributions to the Society. To all, therefore, interested in the present and the future state of the Church in this Province, and especially to those appointed to take a prominent part in the work of the Society, the past year has been one of much care and anxiety.

The plan adopted in July, 1870, under the management of a Standing Schedule Committee, is well known to all who read the Annual Reports. It is only just to say that this Committee have spared no pains or labor in the endeavor to carry out successfully the scheme as adopted. They have striven to make a proper adjustment as to the payments from this Society, and of those conditionally required from the several parishes. This has been done after frequent meetings and most careful consultation, with all the information that could be obtained.

The Report of this Committee, which has been generally circulated, will receive due consideration. By carrying out its recommendations a vast improvement may be made with regard to the missionary work. Increased and punctual payments may be secured from local sources, and then the funds of the Society may be more generally applied in reply to the many calls in aid of new missions. To effect this result much exertion and self-sacrifice are called for on the part of all the members of the Church in the Diocese. The grant from the Society for Propagation of the Gospel will yearly be reduced to a large amount, and before a great while it will all be gone. At the same time it is of the utmost importance that a more generous provision be secured for the support of the clergy, while year by year

openings for new missions are found in the larger parishes, and in many remote settlements.

Means sufficient to do all this have been given, by our Heavenly Father, to the members of the Church in this Diocese. Only let them give back to Him, and for His service, a small portion of what He has given to them, and there need be no stay in the onward progress of the blessed work undertaken by this Society.

Meanwhile much encouragement may be found in the subjoined abstracts from the reports of the Missionaries, and Local Committees.

ANDOVER, GRAND FALLS, &c.—Rev. Leo A Hoyt writes as follows:—"I am glad to report an increase upon the contribution list of last year. With regard to the progress of the Church in this Mission I can say nothing. It is not natural to suppose that any progress could be visible in a period of five and a half months, while an enumeration of my own labors would be a species of boasting inconsistent with that charity which 'vaunteth not itself.'

"I cannot close this paper without an appeal for a clergyman at Florenceville. The distance between Woodstock and Tobique is fifty miles. In all this extent of country there is not a clergyman. There is here a missing link, and the omission is more evident, as in travelling over the road we pass through the thriving village of Florenceville. This village, midway between Woodstock and Tobique, and in the midst of one of the most populous and flourishing farming districts in the Province, is so adapted for a centre of work for the Church, that its supply cannot be neglected without a great loss to her interests. In Florenceville, itself, there are not, perhaps, a dozen church families; a fact not to be wondered at when it is remembered that the services held here have never averaged one a year. In the neighborhood, however, there are several stations to be occupied with advantage. Upper Greenfield is a settlement with scarcely a dissenter in the community. Here the building of a church has dragged its slow length along for the last six years. But the slight encouragement afforded by an occasional visit from a clergyman, already occupied in his own mission, is hardly sufficient to advance the work to completion as rapidly as it is desirable. In Jacksontown there has been a Church for many years. But the withdrawal of the assistance of a Curate from Woodstock has caused the service to be bi-monthly, and the Rector would willingly relinquish this station to assist in the support of the new Mission.

"In Glassville there are twenty Church families. The heads of many of these families are communicants. In East Florenceville there are several Church families, though the people here are principally poor, and not to be depended upon for support. In Williamstown there was formerly an interesting Church congregation, but the service has of necessity been relinquished, and the children of many staunch Church families have gone over to the dissenters. Besides these there are isolated Churchmen in every direction, some in important places as Centreville, &c., who might be utilized and rendered a profit to themselves and an advantage to the Church through the labors of an energetic clergyman stationed at Florenceville."

Contributions amount to \$185.33.

BATHURST AND NEW BANDON.—Rev. W. LeB. McKel writes as follows:—"There is little to report from this Mission beyond the discharge of routine duty. Pastoral visitation, from time to time, has been attended to, but must be unsatisfactory to me and to a certain proportion of the people till the Mis-

sion is divided, or help sent to me. The sick have been visited, and such opportunities have been used to lead the thoughts and affections of the afflicted from earth to heaven.

"The increase in the number of the services has, I trust, been productive of increased good. There should be service in St. George's Church, Bathurst, twice every Sunday, and once, at least, in Christ's Church, New Bandon, but the distance between the Churches is too great to admit of it. The Church at Bathurst is open, therefore, twice every alternate Sunday, and the other Sunday I go to New Bandon and return,—holding services in both Churches, and at an intermediate station; thus making three services, and thirty-two miles to travel. By means of a collection on Thanksgiving Day and a grant of money by the Vestry, a bell has been ordered for the Church at Bathurst.

"It is necessary that a new Church should be built at Bathurst, so that the services of the sanctuary may be conducted with decency and in order. A fund is being created for the purpose, and soon we hope to begin the building.

"Last September we were rejoiced by a visit from the Bishop. The day of the confirmation at Bathurst was so stormy that, with two exceptions, the candidates from the country were kept at home. The Bishop confirmed the next day at New Bandon, and the day following at Caraquet, 42 miles from Bathurst. The whole number confirmed was 46, of whom some have since become communicants, and I trust that others will soon follow their example. Thirteen new names have been added to the list of the communicants during the year."

Contributions amount to \$11.05.

BUCTOCHE.—Rev. A. H. Weeks reports contributions to the amount of \$30.10, and he writes that since his last report he and his people have been gratified and edified by a visit from the Lord Bishop;—the first episcopal visit to the parish of Wellington. The Church here was consecrated on the 24th September, and the day following the Church yard in Dundas, about two acres, was also consecrated. Six persons were confirmed, and three added to the number of communicants. "We are," Mr. Weeks adds, "few in number, and not overburdened with worldly wealth, and it is gratifying to be able to bear witness to the liberal generosity with which the people respond to the call made on them for Church purposes. The agreement made with the Society for the payment of the Missionary will, I feel confident, be punctually fulfilled."

CANTERBURY.—Rev. T. Hartin reports contributions to the amount of \$38.25.

CHATHAM.—Rev. William S. Neales writes as follows:—"In making my report for the past year, I am happy to record the valued visit of the Bishop on his triennial confirmation tour last September. Thirty-nine persons, among whom were several adults, renewed their baptismal vows at confirmation; a proportion of whom partook of the sacrament of the Lord's body and blood on the same day—September 18th; others, of the lately confirmed, have since been received into full communion.

"The work has gone on quietly, but, I trust, not without some good results, though often when we look about more eagerly for fruits of our labors, we are able to discern but little.

"A severe illness, and a tedious course of debility in consequence of it, have greatly interfered with the discharge of my duties as I could have desired, during the winter months. I have to acknowledge my indebtedness to the Rev. G. H. Sterling for kindly taking my services, at great inconvenience to himself, whilst I was laid up. Nor shall I readily forget the thoughtful, yet unostentatious kindness of the late Rev. James Hudson, who was called to his rest on the 26th April of this year. In him our Church loses a faithful, earnest, and self-sacrificing priest, while the Diocesan Church Society has to regret one who always advocated and promoted its interests with great perseverance, and who has collected larger sums of money for its funds,—certainly out of proportion

to the resources of his Mission, as compared with what more favored regions contribute. Our Church in Miramichi is indebted to his labors and self-denial in a larger or smaller degree for five out of six churches now standing in various parts of the County."

The following resolutions were adopted at a late meeting of the Local Committee:—

I. That the Diocesan Church Society has great claims upon our gratitude and support for the assistance which it has afforded to Missionary work in this Diocese in the *past*.

II. That the *present* burden upon the Diocesan Church Society of aiding and maintaining existing missions entitle it to our earnest prayers and liberal contributions.

III. That inasmuch as the true test of vitality in the Church is her Missionary work, all Church people are urged to exercise a larger liberality in order to enable the Diocesan Church Society to extend its operations, and to aid a larger number of Mission stations.

IV. That this Committee pledges itself to a more earnest endeavor to increase the funds of the Diocesan Church Society, both by subscribing to the utmost of their own ability, and by endeavoring to secure contributions from others.

Contributions amount to \$209.89.

DERBY, NELSON AND BLACKVILLE.—Rev. W. Cruden writes that the work of the Church in his Mission is progressing:—"Her services are appreciated by all. When other denominations discern that her great aim is to bring souls to Christ, then they regard her operations in a very different light. In this way can Christians expect to behold that great spiritual unity which the Lord Jesus so earnestly prayed for.

"At the last visit of the Bishop, on the 31st August, 1870, 23 young persons were confirmed.

"It is a mournful pleasure which I have in recording the death of one who promised to be a faithful soldier of Christ. He met his untimely end by a sad accident at the Bark Factory, Derby. He only lived about a fortnight after. To him, however, 'to die was gain.' He received the Lord's Supper nearly a week before his departure. He had learned to live well, and was thus prepared to die well.

"I have much pleasure in stating that Professor Chesley of Nova Scotia, who was with us for a season, greatly improved the Choir, and also the Church edifice at Derby, and he did all this entirely at his own expense. He will always be remembered here with feelings of gratitude.

"We are busy at present preparing to build a Parsonage at Derby. This may hinder our people from making increased contributions to the Society, which amount to \$66.86."

DALHOUSIE.—Rev. James H. Saturley reports as follows:—"The Lord Bishop visited this Mission in September last, when nineteen persons received the apostolic rite of confirmation; eleven of whom have since become communicants.

Next year, if all be well, I hope to be able to report one Church in this Mission, viz.: at Dalhousie. It would have been completed by this time had we been able to get workmen, as we have now sufficient money in the Bank to defray the cost. The interior will be finished in a few days; and the fittings for the Church are all made and ready to be put in their places, so that had we the seats for the body of the Church it would now be ready for use. These we hope to get shortly. There is some work needed to be done to the exterior, but not much. A vestry has to be built, the church painted, and the lot on which it stands levelled and fenced. We shall now I think be able to get some one to do this, and if so, in a couple of months the whole will be complete

The Bishop has kindly presented us with a window for the chancel, which will add very much to the beauty of the Church. The building has been a long time in hand, but it is some satisfaction to reflect, that when it is opened, it will be entirely free from debt. As soon as the Church is finished we hope to begin a Parsonage, and as one of the objects of the Society is to furnish aid for such purposes, we shall be glad, if the Diocesan Church Society can grant something towards it. Our contributions to the Society this year amount to \$52.65, an increase on those of last year."

DOUGLAS AND BRIGHT.—Rev. T. E. Dowling reports as follows:—"It is my pleasant duty to state that the contributions from this Mission continue to increase. Last year \$150 were collected. This year the amount will be \$200.

"Through the kindness of friends, far and near, there would have been no difficulty this year in providing the salary for an assistant Minister, who is sadly needed in our midst,—but fresh laborers for this portion of the vineyard are indeed 'few.' Still we wait in hope for another earnest, hard-working Deacon.

"On Trinity Sunday the roar of fire in the woods, among which All Saints' Church, Cross Roads, is situated, compelled the congregation to leave the service, and work hard to save the building and their houses from destruction.

"But notwithstanding the late calamitous fires, prolonged drought, and scarcity of hay, mainly through the unwearied exertions of a few lay-workers, a new Cabinet Organ has been provided for this Church, as well as another for St. John's Church, Nashwaaksis.

"The position of St. John's Church is an important one, and it is with pleasure I record that the services are now more frequent, and better attended. To a great extent this may be attributed to the regular assistance received from Fredericton.

"The LORD grant unto 'them, and all our other fellow-laborers, 'that they may find mercy of the LORD in THAT DAY.'"

FREDERICTON.—Rev. Dr. Leo reports contributions to the amount of \$851.66.

NEW MARYLAND.—Rev. J. Pearson reports contributions to the amount of \$93.35.

GAGETOWN.—Rev. James Neales writes:—"I send you herewith my statistical account of the Gagetown Mission, not altogether a satisfactory one, for the number of communicants is, I grieve to say, diminished; and as the old members of the flock die, the young do not step into their places, in the front rank of the hosts of God, as I hope and pray they may do. Of my own work I desire to say nothing, but am able to congratulate the Society that, notwithstanding the decrease in our numbers by death and departure, the contributions of the Church to the funds of the Diocesan Church Society are larger than ever before, excepting in the case of the special collection for the Deficiency Fund.

Contributions amount to \$98.05.

GRAND LAKE.—Rev. B. Shaw has forwarded the following report:—"I may state in addition to the form required by the Society, that I made 438 parochial visits, 36 sick visits, and administered the Eucharist to 332 persons. There is nothing of any peculiar interest to report; the work has been going on steadily; the Church at Mill Cove will be ready for consecration in the middle of July; we are now waiting for a Lectern, and then everything will be ready, and, I am happy to say, the Church is out of debt.

"The Church at Lower Jemseg has had two coats of paint, besides oiling the shingles, from a suggestion made to me by a merchant in St. John, who sold me the oil and paint at a reduced price, and I take this opportunity of thanking him for his kindness.

"St. Luke's Church, at Waterborough, is now in the possession of a small

marble font, a present from the Rev. John Pearson, and the people have repaired the fence around the graveyard, and improved it very much in appearance.

"The congregations in Canning still continue very good, and shew the necessity of a resident clergyman on that side of Grand Lake. I trust, the Society will continue the grant made last year, and give us a further opportunity of securing the services of a clergyman for that part of the Mission.

"The congregations at the different stations still continue good, especially at the Rapids and Codley's, Washademoak.

"I have not been able to complete subscription list for this year; but I think we shall at least attain to the amount required by Schedule Committee, viz.: \$120."

GREENWICH AND WICKHAM.—Rev. D. W. Pickett writes:—"I have little of special interest to report, beyond that of the services at the several Stations and Churches, at all of which the average attendance has been larger than before, and the collections have also increased. Three services have been held on alternate Sundays;—the third at Greenwich Hill in the evening being much more numerously attended than the Wednesday evening service formerly held there. This change enables me to give them a Friday evening service every fortnight instead of once a week at Paul's Station, where, though the attendants are few, they are chiefly those who have no means of getting to the parish Church. Since May last about \$290 have been raised in Greenwich for special purposes connected with the Church, including a donation of more than \$20 to the Missionary (all arrears of salary being first paid in full.) This will not, I trust, lessen the contributions to the Society, which will amount, at the least, to \$60."

HAMPTON.—Rev. W. W. Walker reports contributions to the amount of \$100.

HARDWICKE, NEWCASTLE, &c.—Rev. George H. Sterling has enclosed the following report:—"Notwithstanding the difficulties and anxieties which we have been called to pass through of late, by the removal from our midst of the late Rev. J. Hudson, whom God has been pleased to call from his labors on earth to the reward in heaven, 'promised to the faithful steward,'—yet thank God, I am able to report \$101.85, forwarded by the late Missionary; \$85.01 from Newcastle, by myself, as well as \$15.14 from Hardwicke, making in all \$208.00.

"From the latter place a very much smaller sum than would have been forwarded, if my salary allowed of my keeping a horse.

"I therefore earnestly hope that the Society will take into consideration the large sums sent from this Mission for a number of years past by the late Missionary, and will be willing to grant, at the least, the sum asked for by His Lordship toward my support. I think I may safely say for the number of Church people in this Mission, that there is a larger amount sent to the Society than from any other in the Diocese. The amount forwarded for the present year will show that my people are still as anxious to advance the interests of the Society as they were when they had not so largely to contribute to the support of their clergyman.

"During Lent there was a service at 7.30 p. m., every Wednesday, with a sermon, and the Bishop's admirable form of litany being used. The attendance at those services was very good.

"I may also say that through the kindness of a young lady, who has acted as organist and leader of the choir, our services have been made much more agreeable. My work in the Mission since October last is as follows:—I have held sixty services, being assisted with twelve. Baptized 13 children, buried 3, and have travelled 1028 miles. So far the work goes steadily on, and I trust that God may give me health and strength for the future, and bless the work in my hands."

HAVELOCK, PORTAGE, &c.—Rev. Cuthbert Willis writes as follows:—"There were 32 persons confirmed by the Bishop last autumn at Portage, and 5 more afterwards on the occasion of the new Church at Petticoillac being consecrated. The congregation here has steadily increased, and the Church, instead of being too large, as was thought, is nearly always filled at the Sunday services, which are three in the month. A Cabinet Organ has been purchased and a respectable Choir got together. It is a subject of regret to me that there is yet a debt of \$450 on the Church. This sum is advanced by a private individual, who firmly believes that the Churchmen of this Province will yet come to our aid and make up the amount required. We are also without Holy Vessels."

"At Portage the attendance remains about the same, and at Havelock our numbers are somewhat reduced by families moving elsewhere."

"The Rev. Charles Medley has, as before, kindly exchanged duties with me on those Sundays on which the Holy Communion was to be administered. He has also on several occasions come at my call to perform the same duty for the sick and dying."

"Owing to sickness this winter and spring I was unable to carry out my programme of services. On several Sundays, and during the whole of Lent, I was confined to the house."

Contributions amount to \$41.97.

KINGSLEAR.—Rev. S. Black reports contributions to the amount of \$50.85.

LANCASTER.—Rev. W. S. Covert has forwarded the usual Missionary abstract, and he reports contributions to the amount of \$35.00.

MAUGERVILLE AND BURTON.—Rev. R. Simonds reports contributions from Maugeville, \$47.97; Burton, \$69.50; Victoria Settlements, \$5.75. Total \$122.32.

MONCTON.—Rev. W. N. Boyer writes that among those baptized during the year were three adults, and that 15 persons were confirmed.

Contributions are \$67.15.

NORTON.—Rev. E. A. Warneford reports contributions to the amount of \$105.17.

PETERSVILLE, CLARENDON, &c.—Rev. Charles R. Matthews has enclosed the following report:—"In making my present report—the *first* in connection with the new state of things inaugurated last summer—I am glad to be able to say, that, as regards this parish at least, the working of the new plan is both successful and beneficial. Our wardens and vestry promptly acceded to it and entered into the necessary obligations. Two meetings were held early in the winter, when with the kind assistance of the Rev. Messrs. Kellogg and Tilley, the scheme was more fully presented to the people as a whole, and the result is, that, not only has the sum required by the Schedule been placed in the hands of the Treasurer, but a deeper interest has been aroused among the parishioners, and an amount one-half larger than usual contributed towards the 'General purposes' of the Society."

"Our new Church is now finished externally and in the course of the autumn we expect, God willing, to occupy it. Nearly \$1600 have been raised and expended thus far in connection with the work. This has not been accomplished without a large amount of anxiety, toil and travel on the part of the clergyman who, as our rural brethren will readily understand, has had to bear the burden and heat of this undertaking from its first inception. It was an absolute necessity, humanly speaking, to the existence of our Church in this parish, else I had not engaged in it; for it has demanded time and energy which could ill be spared from more sacred duties. And I shall be heartily glad when its completion shall enable me to give myself individually to the more direct line of ministerial occupation—'prayer and the ministry of the word.'"

"During the past twelvemonth an unusual number of deaths has occurred in

the parish, and we have had in particular to mourn the loss of one whose unexpected departure was a severe blow to the parish—I refer to Mrs. Chas. Payard. Reared amid the wealth and refinement of the metropolis of America, she had brought to her New Brunswick home a warm and gracious kindness which found its way to all hearts, and her sudden removal from our midst, (for her death was instantaneous), was marked by an outburst of sincere regret and unconcealed grief on the part of all her neighbors. For the Church of her forefathers, and of her choice, she bore a deep affection, and she was always ready to assist in promoting its welfare. Sadly we miss her in all the good works where her assistance was so cheerfully rendered. But we trust that she who was accustomed to lead our praises here, is singing the 'nobler, sweeter song,' and that as she was wont to unite with us around the table of the Lord, now she partakes the new wine of her Father's kingdom. Nor has her loss been without its gain. Touching with awe the circle in which she lived, it has deepened in many hearts a solemnity of thought, and led some, at least, to a profound and blessed anxiety for the welfare of their immortal souls.

"The usual order of worship is still kept up in the two Churches and four outstations which are under my supervision, and I am thankful to be permitted to chronicle a gradual increase in the total attendance. The Sunday School at Welsford I have felt able to entrust to a dear and faithful brother in the Lord, although I exercise still a constant oversight there. This arrangement sets me more free for Sunday labors, and, accordingly I have been enabled to make another of the outstations (Clones) a *Sunday Station*. This gives me now three services every other Sunday.

"Clarendon, in Charlotte County,—my 'ultima thule,'—which can only be reached in the saddle, is still attended. The congregations are growing, and a Sunday School has been started. Through the kindness of the Rev. Mr. Haensel, who freely gave his service, taking charge of my Churches, I was enabled on two occasions last summer to give this far off and neglected people the privilege of *Sunday services*—a ministration which some of them had not enjoyed for more than *ten years*, and for which their gratitude was most touching. But the enjoyment of these services only kindled their longings for a continuation of Sabbath ministrations. 'Could I not come *every Sunday*, or *once a fortnight*?' What could I reply! Already burdened to the extent of my strength, all I could hold out was the hope that in the coming summer I might be able to repeat what I had already done. But the needs of these poor people and of the thousands who, like them, are scattered around the outskirts of civilization, buried in endless forests where 'sound of church-going bell,' or voice of the minister is seldom or never heard, call for the sympathy and the active, self-denying exertion of those whose lines, through God's providence, are cast in the pleasant places of religious privilege and comparative wealth.

"In conclusion I beg to say that in addition to the services mentioned in the tabular report, I have married one couple, attended twenty-one funerals, and made 533 sick and pastoral visits."

Contributions amount to \$ 4 25.

PORTLAND.—Rev. Canon Harrison regrets that, owing to the pressing demands in this parish for local Church purposes, no contributions are reported this year. He hopes to have a more favorable statement at the next meeting of the Society.

Rev. W. Harrison Tilley has since reported a contribution from himself of \$10, and from the Rector of the parish \$1; in all \$14.00.

PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES.—Rev. E. A. W. Hanington reports as follows:—"Having very little to relate in connection with the past year's labor in this Mission, my report must be of necessity brief. The services of the Church here (thank God) been sustained without any interruption caused by ill-health or bad weather, and while I have opened a new Station where a few Churches en assemble once a month, it is satisfactory beyond degree to be able to state that the average attendance at regular Sunday services and Lenten lectures has exceeded that of any previous year of my ministrations here.

"I have, as usual, advocated the cause of the Diocesan Church Society, and with as much success as the most sanguine could expect. The amount contributed to the general funds for this year is \$95.58, and not more than this can be expected or obtained except in cases of special need—such as last year."

QURENSAURT.—Rev. W. H. Tippet has inclosed the following report:—"I send you enclosed the following statistical returns required; also a list of my Sunday services for the current year. From this you will see how my services are disposed amongst the various Stations of this Mission. These, I am thankful to say, I have generally been able to give according to my published list.

"One Sunday I was ill, and three absent and doing duty elsewhere, and on two others, the breaking up of the roads prevented any travelling, or the wind and cold was too severe for me to face it. The congregations at Bear Island have been particularly large and attentive, though at present without a Church; and during the season of Lent my lectures, in which I endeavored to press home upon the consciences of my hearers, with particular earnestness, the present duty of repentance towards God and faith towards our Lord Jesus Christ, seemed at least to be received with much seriousness.

"The most noticeable work in the Mission, however, has been its extension to two new settlements, marked on my published list as 'Temperance Vale' and 'Maple Ridge.' The latter of these is 25 miles distant. I had visited it before, but the roads were too rough to admit of my supplying it regularly.

"These, however, have been sufficiently improved to admit of my travelling to it in my wagon, and finding the settlers willing to guarantee something towards the expense of serving them, I have been regularly visiting them once a month with much encouragement, and there is a sufficient number of Churchmen there to make me hope, that as the settlement advances, they will be able to pay such an amount to the Society as to enable the Missionary to consider it a permanent Station.

"The 'Temperance Vale' Settlement is also equally new, and owes my visits to it very much to the earnest efforts of an excellent young man from St. John, formerly belonging to the Rev. George Armstrong's congregation, and who, though struggling through the laborious work of early settlements, did not forget 'the one thing needful,' and could not rest until he succeeded in bringing me to the settlement, and taking all the steps required to make it a permanent Station. It is 20 miles from my Parsonage, but I am able to hold an evening service in the school-house every fourth Sunday. Three years ago there were but two Church families, the remainder being Baptists, but others have come, and the less prejudiced of our Baptist brethren attending, our congregation has never been less than 40, and has reached 60 sometimes. They kindly take care of me and my horse for the night as well as their limited and moderate accommodation allow. I administered the Holy Communion a short time since, for the first time, to six persons in the log-house of the settler referred to, and I can truly say that never in my Missionary experience did I ever more fully feel the gracious solemnity of the occasion.

"Nothing could be humbler than our surroundings. It was in the early morning, about eight o'clock, as being most convenient both to priest and people, and we were almost literally under the shade, as within the stillness of the primeval forest.

"The work has been begun here auspiciously, and I hope and pray that the time will soon come when this solitary and remote settlement will have a small church rising in its midst, in which our worship may be more worthily sustained. Were the Society in a condition to make grants for Church building, I certainly should apply to it for aid for this object; meanwhile I shall be glad to receive private donations for it.

"A beginning has been made towards erecting a Church at Bear Island, but the movement is too young for me to say anything about it in this report.

"I cannot close, however, without saying how gratified I feel with my people for promptly responding to the new requirements of the Society, more especially in a year in which many of them have been sufferers by the drought and raging fires of the last summer. There were very few farmers in this parish who cut over one-third of their usual yield of hay in 1870."

The contributions to the general purposes of the Society are \$78 54.

RICHMOND.—Rev. W. Henry Street writes as follows:—"On the 6th November last I took charge of this Mission; since then I have striven, with the grace of God, to carry on the good work of my zealous and able predecessor, Rev. J. Dinzey, confining myself to the portion of his former field which comprises the Mission of Richmond.

"I have, thank God, much in the parish to encourage me in the work which has fully occupied my time during the last eight months.

"The sad want of suitable buildings for Divine worship will, I trust, be supplied this summer by the completion of the one at Richmond proper, and another at South Richmond.

"Arrangements have already been made to proceed with and complete the work on the former.

"To meet the demands of the Society and to finish the Churches, one of which is already in debt, is no easy task for a Mission having no local endowments. Again, the almost total suspension of railway traffic at the Richmond Station, which was formerly a thriving locality, must seriously affect us. Many have already left the Station and the property in which they had invested all their means."

A grant is earnestly solicited in aid of the Richmond Church.

Contributions amount to \$92.96.

RICHIBUCTO.—Rev. N. A. Coster is happy to report an increased amount of contributions, viz.: \$64.52.

ROTHERSAY.—Mr. C. H. Fairweather reports contributions to the amount of \$102.15.

SACKVILLE AND DORCHESTER.—Rev. G. Goodridge Roberts writes that the contributions from these parishes will, at least, be as much as those of last year, exclusive of the special collection for the Deficiency Fund. They are \$202.

Mr. Roberts also subjoins the semi-annual returns recommended in the report of the Schedule Committee for the year ending June 1st, 1871, and writes that there were 23 persons confirmed in September last.

"At an Easter Monday meeting," Mr. Roberts adds, "several families applied for pews in St. Ann's Church, and there were none vacant. I therefore proposed that the Church should be enlarged, and that all the sittings should be made free. I am happy to say that this proposal was unanimously acceded to. All the pewholders have agreed to give up their pews, and, I hope, before winter sets in, to have open seats throughout, and God's House free for rich and poor to worship in on an equal footing. May the blessing of our dear Master, 'who though He was rich, for our sakes became poor,' rest upon this change!"

ST. ANDREWS AND CHAMCOOK.—Mr. G. D. Street reports contributions as follows:—St. Andrews \$175.27; Chamcook \$73.87; McAdam \$2; total \$251.14.

Rev. F. Parridge, Assistant Minister, reports with regard to the work at Chamcook as follows:—"The condition of the Church at Chamcook is, on the whole not very different from what it was at the time of my last report. During a large part of the year the congregation was augmented by a number of young men who were employed in the neighborhood. These, however, have now left us. I held a Bible Class for some weeks, which was very well attended, a fair proportion consisted of young men. At the end of the Bible Class on each evening, I gave them some instruction in the history and meaning of the Prayer Book. I found them much interested in this subject, and believe that it has resulted in a more intelligent use of the Prayer Book in the service of the Church, as well as in a higher appreciation of its beauties and associations. I hope to resume the classes after my vacation.

"If we can form any opinion of the spiritual life in our people from their constant attendance at the Lord's Table I think the prospect this year is very encouraging. The average attendance at the Holy Communion, which has been more frequently administered during the past year, has been 22, and there seems no sign of decrease. The whole number of communicants in connection with the Church at Chamcook is thirty. Some of them attend the celebrations at the parish Church when they have the opportunity.

"The intention of adding a Chancel to St. John's Chapel is not abandoned, though it may be some time before the work is completed. It will be observed that the contributions from Chamcook are not less than those of last year.

"During the past year the services have been kept up as frequently as possible at McAdam Junction. The sick have been visited there and the children baptized. There seems a great desire on the part of the people at this Station for a continuance of the services."

ST. DAVID AND ST. PATRICK.—Rev. J. S. Thomson reports that the Church in this Mission still continues in a wholesome state, and is evidently gaining on the affections of the people. "I lose," Mr. Thomson adds, "communicants every year by emigration or death, but I always have the pleasure of filling their places supplied by others, and the young are evidently more interested in the affairs and doctrines of the Church, and more anxious for the salvation offered through the merits of Jesus Christ. I have been much occupied of late in visiting the sick and dying, and in administering the Holy Communion to them."

Mr. Thomson has since reported that the contributions will amount to \$50.

ST. GEORGE, PENNFIELD, &c.—Rev. R. E. Smith is happy to report an increased amount of contributions, in all—\$200.

Mr. Smith adds, "The new scheme for collecting the Rector's salary has operated satisfactorily.

"We have to lament the loss by death of two prominent members of the Church, Dr. Thomson and Abraham J. Wetmore, Esq.

"The Rectory—a handsome building, which cost about \$3000, was completed last autumn; we have occupied it since that time.

"The Church work has been much the same as usual. Three services have been held on the Sundays with good attendance. During the winter we had services with a lecture or readings on Wednesday evenings. There are three Stations which are attended to as time and weather permit.

"The number of communicants is 87; baptisms, 57, 5 of whom were adults. Three persons who had been privately baptized were received into the congregation.

"The Sunday School in St. George is in good condition; from 50 to 60 children in attendance every Sunday. They have a good supply of books, purchased by their own collections and a generous donation from Miss Thomson.

"Christ Church, Pennfield, is undergoing a thorough renovation—open seats taking the place of square pews.

"Miss Thomson has generously given the sum of \$1,240 towards a local endowment fund, requiring the parishioners to make up the amount to \$1000 before using the interest."

ST. JAMES.—Rev. W. Armstrong reports contributions to the amount of \$175.

ST. MARK.—Mr. Thos. B. Hanington, Secretary of this Committee, reports the present amount of the contributions as \$390.79, to which he expects a further sum will be added.

ST. MARY'S.—Rev. W. Jaffrey, the Missionary at St. Mary's and Stanley, writes, that his parishioners have subscribed the full amount required by the Committee towards the general funds of the Society, but in setting them to do so he has delayed the payment of a portion of his own salary, consequently cannot at present draw for the Society's quarterly allowance. He hopes, however, no difficulty may arise from the delay.

The parish of St. Mary's makes application for a grant of \$55 towards their Endowment Fund, that amount being now in the hands of the Society, arising partly from a sum contributed by St. Mary's towards that object some years ago.

The amount from the Mission will be about \$95, about \$25 more than usual.

SHEDIAC.—Rev. George S. Jarvis, D. D., reports contributions to the amount of \$78.37, including a subscription of his own, \$40.

Dr. Jarvis requests that the following statement may be published in the Annual Report:—

"The Diocesan Church Society last January withdrew the grant for a Curate to Shediac, which had been allowed for 25 years successively. I have no longer to allow a stipend in aid, I am enabled at last to become a life member of the Society. It was impossible to have done so before, for I assisted the Society's funds in the period mentioned to the amount of \$24.00 for the above object. I feel the loss of assistance very much, but must submit to it in the present reduced state of the Society's finances. I am happy to say that the contributions at Shediac this year exceed those of last year from Shediac, Wellington and Dundas united, by six dollars. These two last-named parishes now constitute a separate Mission. In addition to the amount of contributions above named, a bequest to the Society of \$90 is expected to be paid in six months with interest."

ST. PAUL'S, PORTLAND.—Rev. W. H. DeVeber reports contributions, for general purposes, \$660.00; Widows' and Orphans' Fund, \$40.00. Total, \$715.

SIMONDS.—Rev. G. Schofield writes as follows:—"My parishioners have complied with the directions of the Schedule Committee to raise \$120 a year, in addition to the contributions of the Society. I think this amount is as much as they can contribute. It is five times as much as they raised a few years ago. As soon as the parish is able to give more and receive less, I shall certainly not wait to be notified by the Committee, but shall gladly ask for this honorable promotion."

Mr. Schofield subjoins the usual Missionary report. Contributions amount to \$112.57.

ST. STEPHEN.—Rev. E. S. Medley writes: "I have done what I could to recommend the Society's good works to the prayers and alms of all true Churchmen here.

"The Local Committee desire to express their hearty interest in the objects and welfare of the Society, and especially at this time of urgent need they trust that increased offerings from the whole body will enable the Society to maintain and set forward the work of the Church.

"They sincerely regret that their own offerings (though a decided increase on former years) are not larger, but the Church in this parish has to sustain the dignity of being 'self-sustaining,' and in addition has this year to complete the repairs on their Church consequent on the serious damage done by the heavy gale of 1869.

"I am glad to be able to forward to the Treasurer \$55, being the proceeds of freewill offerings at God's altar from the Priest, the congregation, and the Sunday School children."

SPRINGFIELD AND JOHNSTON.—Rev. G. Rogers has inclosed the following report:—"While on the one hand I know of nothing seriously to discourage the Society's Missionary, yet on the other I know of nothing unduly to exalt him. I am thankful to say that I have been enabled to perform my usual duty on all occasions, although during the winter I frequently had reason to fear that my strength was not equal to the work of this extensive Mission. The spring has reassured me, and I trust with renewed health to be devoted more faithfully than ever to the service of my Lord and Master.

"The congregations at the parish Church, Springfield, vary but little year by year. A growing aversion is manifested towards the antiquated and unsightly structure. By the sale of Church lands the Corporation will have a larger yearly sum at their disposal than formerly. I sincerely hope and trust, therefore, that a unanimous desire will be shown not only to improve the present inconvenient construction, but also to add to the comfort of the worshippers.

"At Centreville our congregation is always a large one. The Methodists still kindly allow us to use their Chapel. Our hymn book has been introduced; a number of copies have been purchased, and is greatly preferred to the Psalms of Brady and Tate.

"During Lent Divine service was held every Wednesday evening with a lecture. These services were well attended.

"While at Johnston there has been no perceptible increase in the congregation, there has been a very laudable interest manifested by its members in providing for the decent worship of Almighty God. Two Chancel chairs have been provided, a handsome communion cloth has been purchased, and sufficient carpet has been promised to cover the Chancel floor, as well as kneeling cushions for the communicants. I hope the day is not far distant when some wealthy Christian will remember our wants, and supplement the efforts of our poor brethren at Johnston by a gift of communion vessels.

"I cannot allow myself to omit the mention of the very commendable manner in which the Churchwardens at Johnston have exerted themselves at considerable labor and expense to regain possession of over two hundred acres of rich land that had been taken from us, and for seventeen years held possession of without the slightest compensation by its occupant during the whole of that time. It had been a source of continual annoyance both to myself and to my predecessors, which I am happy to say has now been satisfactorily settled."

Contributions amount to \$121.75.

SUSSEX AND STURDOLV.—Rev. Charles S. Medley has forwarded the following report:—"I suppose the boldest Missionary of our Church Society had some

doubts about the working of the new scheme, which was adopted by the General Committee in July last, and I confess when I came to face the difficulty in practice, I felt not a little anxious as to whether the people in this Mission would make up a sum which was so far in excess of what they were accustomed to. I am more than thankful, however, to be able to report that the amount required by the Schedule Committee has been willingly paid without any very great apparent trouble. At Sussex we still continue to work on the offertory system with success, and I think I may say with the general approval of the people. Formerly the offertory collections averaged \$1.40, where now they average \$6.29 for the present quarter. At Dutch Valley, where Mr. Bliss, I believe, gave up his services because the people did so little, they now make up \$54 by subscription list; and at Studholm the sum of \$120 is raised by the same method. The offertory collections at the two last named places are devoted to the general purposes of the Church Society and the necessary Church expenses. On the subject of the needful funds, therefore, I trust my doubts and fears are removed.

"Nor have I great reason to be discouraged with the fruit of my imperfect labors. The congregations are good in all the Churches, general interest seems to be awakened, the worship of God I trust is more thought of than the mere words of man, and the number of communicants has been increasing steadily, though perhaps not quite as rapidly as I could wish. The chief point of regret is the small number of baptisms as compared with the number of births in the Mission. A baptism in God's House is the exception rather than the rule as it should be, and I grieve to say there are very many who regularly attend the house of prayer who cannot yet see the need or the blessing of entering into covenant with Him, who is our common Father. Of course this may be attributed in part to the influence of the Anabaptists, but I am sorry to say this is not the only influence against the work of the Church, and we must only hope and pray that in God's own time the evil may be overcome. I only mention this subject lest it might be supposed some negligence of the Missionary was the cause of the small number of baptisms during the past year.

"We have again opened our Sunday Schools during the summer months, and the number of the teachers and scholars is not less than last year. At one we have about 50, at the other 25. This, in a country place, is not to be despised, and I trust real good may be done by the work in which teachers and taught shew a good will and a ready mind.

"My services at Sussex Station have been given up for the present, as the Baptist brethren required their meeting-house, and I have been unable as yet to get another building. The congregations were so large at this place that I do not intend to give up the hope of commencing the work again as soon as an opportunity serves. At Studholm we are on the eve of building a new Church, the old one being very cold in winter, and much out of repair. It is not, however, so unsightly a building as the ancient fabric at Sussex, with which we seem too well satisfied. At Dutch Valley an addition has been put to the Church at some expense, which will give us more room, and act as a sort of porch in winter. We have also a very simple but effective stained window and some new furniture, the gift of the Bishop, which makes the building a little more like a Church, and the people are much pleased with it. I have a new opening for a Station at the Paper Mill, about 10 miles from Sussex, and I hope soon to begin regular weekday services there. This is on the road to Mechanics' Settlement in Albert County, a place which I visit occasionally, and where I always find a hearty and attentive congregation. On my last visit the people presented me with \$11 as a proof of their good-will. I wish I could get some of those good gentlemen who say there are no Church people in Albert to come with me to this Settlement; I do think they would be convinced to the contrary. They may not be the rich sons of earth, but if they are poor we have no right to neglect them. More and more do I feel the necessity of a Missionary in that County, and I do humbly trust that the Church Society will not only grant a stipend, but send a shepherd to the scattered sheep of Christ's flock there without further delay."

Contributions amount to \$254, to which a little more may yet be added.

TRINITY, ST. JOHN.—Mr. Sturdee reports that the contributions are not completed. They will not exceed \$300.

UPHAM.—Rev. S. J. Hanford writes as follows:—"I am thankful to be able to report that the contributions from this Mission amount to \$150.41, the sum designated by the *Schedule Committee* for the Mission, and I may add that, though collecting this amount, mostly in small subscriptions, gives me considerable work, yet I have no reason to complain of the willingness of my people when called upon.

"I am happy to state that the Mission having entered into the requisite agreement with the Diocesan Church Society for the Missionary's stipend, there has so far been no difficulty in fulfilling the same.

"My Mission consists of *three* parishes or more—Upham, Hammond, and St. Martin's—each differing in circumstances, and with no common bond of interest; so that each has for itself made a separate agreement with the Society, and will separately pay to the Society. This has already been done by Upham for *three quarters*, Hammond for half a year, and St. Martin's its share. This may be somewhat inconvenient to the Society, but I see not how at present it can be avoided.

"We are all quite of opinion that the payments should be made yearly, or at least half-yearly, it being altogether out of the question to think of calling upon people every quarter for a portion of their small subscriptions."

WESTFIELD.—Rev. E. S. Woodman reports contributions to the amount of \$90.00.

WESTMORLAND.—Rev. D. M. Bliss, in inclosing the returns for the parish, writes:—"I am glad to say the amount is somewhat larger than it was last year, and as the people recover from the heavy loss sustained in the destruction of the dykes they will respond more freely to such calls. With one or two exceptions the parishioners evince an increasing interest in the cause of the Church Society.

"Six adults were baptized and confirmed when the Bishop visited us last fall. There are several now under instruction."

Contributions amount to \$65.15.

WOODSROCK.—Rev. T. Neales writes that at a meeting of this Committee the following resolutions were passed:—

1. This Committee cannot meet again without renewing their expressions of sincere regret at the loss which they have sustained in the death of their late respected Rector—Rev. S. D. L. Street, who ever showed himself an active and sincere supporter of the interests of the Diocesan Church Society.

2. This Committee views with pleasure the recommendations of the Schedule Committee towards making each Mission, as far as possible, self-sustaining, and they are ready and willing to co-operate to their utmost ability, with the Diocesan Church Society, in carrying the proposed measures of the Committee into effect, and in meeting its requirements with promptness.

"With regard to the Mission," Mr. Neales writes, "An increase of work done cannot be reported, as the death of the last Rector has been to the Parish a great loss, without any corresponding gain. I am now left, single-handed, to carry on the work of a Mission, which before, two clergymen were here to accomplish. This work is therefore of necessity, but imperfectly done; and, where it not for the hearty aid and sympathy of the parishioners themselves, I should feel quite unequal to the duty before me. I am forced to relinquish the weekly Sunday services at Jacksontown, and can only manage to get there every alternate Thursday, and on Sundays, every alternate month. On this section of the Mission, the late change presses most heavily. At the Settlements where services have been established for more than two years, I still continue a monthly service during the week.

"The Sunday School is still under the care of Mr. James McCoy (Principal of the Grammar School), assisted by three male and seven female teachers.

"Great assistance has been afforded me in collecting for the Society by Messrs. G. H. Ketchum and C. H. Bull, besides the help received from several ladies in the parish.

"I may also add that since the change a year ago of pews for free seats in St. Luke's Church, and the devoting the collections to the general purposes of the Church, the offertory has increased at the rate of about 150 per cent. for the year." Contributions amount to \$300.

It will be seen that the sum total of the contributions from the foregoing reports cannot be exactly stated. The full amount may be regarded as very nearly \$7000.

The Society will observe with especial interest the improvements going forward in the several Missions, and the great amount of labor which is being done by the Missionaries.

Every Churchman in the Diocese must, however, see the insufficiency of the contributions, and the very limited means provided for the necessities of those engaged in their blessed Master's work. In a country like this, with the lately increased expense of living, the life of a clergyman is sufficiently trying, when encouraged by the warmest sympathy of the laity, and with a competent provision for all temporal wants.

During the past year two of the older Clergy, well worn by many years in the Missionary work in this Diocese, have gone to their rest. The names of the Rev. S. D. Lee Street, Rector of Woodstock, and of the Rev. James Hudson, Missionary at Newcastle and Glenleg, will long be closely associated with the proceedings of this Society. Active and untiring in their special charges, few have done so much to extend the usefulness of this Society. Much exposure in their Master's work, no doubt, in each of these instances, hastened on the last great change, at a comparatively early period of life, and brought those labors to a close, for which so little, in the way of earthly reward, had been provided. And so the older Clergy are passing away; and might not the members of this Society be reminded that valuable lives could perhaps be lengthened by timely assistance in large and extensive parishes? In this way too, important points for Missionary Stations might be occupied in those villages rising up all over the country, and especially along the lines of railways. In many such places the ministrations of the Church would be welcomed even by those who do not profess to be her children, if they were readily and duly afforded. Therefore it is that the Society calls upon the Church in this Diocese to remember and act upon the charge given by her Lord and Head, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."

It appears from the accounts, that the payments for General Purposes, say Missionaries' Salaries, Pensions, Contingent Expenses, &c., &c., have exceeded the income applicable to those purposes by the sum of \$766.09. This deficiency has been met by applying that amount of the funds accruing from investments to the ordinary expenses of the Society. The above cash balance of \$1,089.84 is therefore short by the sum of \$766.09 of the balances due to special funds and investments, which are as follows:—

Read by the Secretary applications for grants from this Committee.

Read a petition from the Church Wardens at Dalhousie with reference to certain glebe lands. On motion, it was resolved that the same be referred to the Executive Committee with power to make a conveyance under the Seal of the Society, if found in accordance with the law and terms of the trust.

Rev. J. Pearson, from the Committee on a provision for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, presented a report, which he read; on motion of the Rev. W. H. Tippet, it was resolved that the same be received.

Rev. Dr. Lee, from the Schedule Committee, presented a report, which he read; on motion of Rev. G. Schofield, it was resolved that the same be received.

On motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis, the following alterations or additions to the Constitution of the Society, of which due notice had been given, were adopted.

- I. That there be a new Article VIII. as follows:
(SCHEDULE COMMITTEE.)

There shall be a Schedule Committee, to be composed of the following members, viz:

1. The President, Treasurer and Secretary, or Secretaries of the Society *ex-officio*

2. Three Clerical and five lay members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee.

3. The Schedule Committee shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-Laws, or Regulations of the General Committee.

4. Five members of the Schedule Committee, three of whom shall be laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Schedule Committee shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

(The numbers of the present Articles, VIII. to XIV., to be altered in accordance with the insertion of the foregoing.)

II. Also the following addition to Article VII.:

4. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or, in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but so far as may be, alternately at Saint John and Fredericton.

III. Also the following addition to Article XIV.:

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meetings for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held. Provided that in every such case a report of such adjournment and the causes therefor shall be made at the Anniversary meeting.

The Lord Bishop signified his assent to the foregoing changes in the Constitution as follows.

On motion of Mr. I. Allen Jack, it was—*Resolved*, that the report with reference to a provision for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy be now taken up and considered.

On motion of Rev. J. Pearson, it was—*Resolved*, that it is desirable that the principle involved in the management of the Widows and Orphans Fund, and submitted in the report of the Committee, be approved, and the details now considered.

The several clauses to the scheme proposed were then discussed by the Committee, and in some instances amendments were proposed and carried.

Towards the close of the discussion the Lord Bishop entered the meeting, and took the Chair.

On motion, the following plan for a provision for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, with the rules and regulations annexed, was adopted by the meeting.

PROVISION FOR THE WIDOWS AND ORPHANS OF THE CLERGY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. THE CHURCH SOCIETY of the Diocese of Fredericton, in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund, to be called "THE CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND," which shall consist of the present capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities), of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises, and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these Rules; and this Fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen, in accordance with these Rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed, whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund, shall within six months from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant, after such period of time, shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman, being a member of this Fund, shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates, serving under a Rector, or other assistant Clergymen, shall not, however, be required to make a collection, but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days; and all congregational collections must be sent in before the first day of May. If this Rule is not complied with, the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee, and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrear.

5. Upon compliance with the above Rules, the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund," a yearly pension of One Hundred Dollars to the widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during her widowhood.

6. If the widow die, or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age, the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the Will of a Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee, in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension, to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act, or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application of the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these Rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the S. P. G., shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the Rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon

the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the amount of the average annual collection from his Parish or Mission, being a sum not exceeding Forty Dollars in all.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connexion with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payment as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The pensions shall be payable half-yearly, on January 1, and July 1, in each year; the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

14. The Treasurer of the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY** shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed statement of the income, payments, and invested money, shall be published in the Annual Report of the Diocesan Church Society.

15. The Secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener, if required by him.

16. None of the above Rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY**, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, July 5, 1871.

The Committee met pursuant to adjournment.

PRESENT :

The Lord Bishop, in the Chair.
The Clergy and Lay Delegates.

The Committee proceeded to the discussion of that portion of the printed report of the Schedule Committee marked C. Whereupon, on motion of Mr. Jarvis, seconded by the Rev. W. H. DeVeber, the following clauses were adopted and passed.

Whereas it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries ;

Therefore Resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the Missionary's stipend.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Schedule Committee, who shall have at all times all such and the like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in session.

3. That the Schedule Committee annually present to the General Committee of the Society on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing Resolutions, and subject to the following regulations :

(a.) The Schedule Committee (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop), shall forthwith after the annual Meeting communicate with the Wardens or other lay members of the Church in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagements (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission for the year.

(b.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Schedule Committee before the first of October then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on 1st January then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Committee before the 1st of January then next, all payments to the Missionary's salary, through the Society, shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof: Provided, that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure he shall, if stationed for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to com-

ply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Schedule Committee, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions. Provided also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Schedule Committee, on special application, to draw on 1st April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d.) Where such engagement is entered into, the Committee shall forthwith notify the Missionary who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e.) The sum required of the Mission shall in such case be remitted by the Wardens quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, and may consist either of money or written receipts of the Missionary, for produce furnished to him at the market rates: Provided that two months grace (but no more) may be allowed the Mission to make up such sum; that is to say, the sum required for the quarter of the ensuing year, ending 30th October, shall be remitted before the 1st September, and for the following quarter before the 1st December next.

(f.) Should the Missionary give any such written receipts for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him, after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g.) Should the sum required from the parish not be remitted as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall forthwith, on the expiration of the two months grace, give notice (C) to the Missionary, requiring him to give notice (D) of withdrawal of stipend as such Missionary, and all such stipend shall be thereupon withdrawn pursuant to such notice; and unless the sum agreed to be paid for the quarter shall be forthwith remitted, no stipend shall be payable for such expired quarter beyond the amount agreed to be contributed on the part of the Society; and none whatsoever for the succeeding quarter: and the Committee shall appoint a deputation to enquire into the causes of such default, and shall report thereon at the next meeting of the General Committee.

Provided that in any case, on a Mission ceasing to be in default, though after the period for withdrawal of the stipend shall have arrived, such Mission may be reinstated by the Schedule Committee if they shall see fit so to do, under the regulations and conditions herein contained.

(h.) In the case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Committee shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(i.) It shall be optional with the Schedule Committee to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly payment, at any period in advance, and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply, generally, to any such Mission.

(k.) The Schedule Committee shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules, and regulations, as may in their opinion be required for their guidance, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That in every case of a Clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, he shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society according to such form as the Schedule Committee may from time to time require, half-

yearly, on or before the first days of December and June in each year, a return for the preceding half year, shewing—

- (1.) The general limits of his Mission.
 - (2.) The extent thereof in square miles.
 - (3.) The estimated number of members of the Church of England living therein.
 - (4.) The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease, and Missionary Stations respectively, within the Mission.
 - (5.) Whether or not there is therein a parsonage house belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.
 - (6.) The extent of Church and Glebe land connected therewith.
 - (7.) The income from such Church or Glebe land for the year ending 1st April last.
 - (8.) The amount contributed therein towards the support of the Missionary, from sources other than the grant through this Society.
 - (9.) The number of public services on Sundays and in the week respectively.
 - (10.) The average congregation in each place of worship.
 - (11.) The number of Communicants.
 - (12.) The number of Baptisms.
 - A. Infants.
 - B. Adults.
 - C. Total.
 - (13.) The number of Communicants.
 - A. Added.
 - B. Removed.
 - C. Deceased.
 - D. Present members.
 - (14.) The number confirmed,
 - (15.) Marriages.
 - (16.) Burials.

- Which returns shall be laid before the Schedule Committee forthwith, and before the General Committee on the first day of their meeting; and no grant shall from henceforth be payable to any Missionary in default of rendering any such statement or return so long as such default shall continue.
6. That the Schedule Committee shall, so soon as may be, after the first day of December in each year, make up from such returns, the printed returns and statement required annually by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and forward the same, reporting specially to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel any Missionary who may be in default.
 7. That those of the Clergy within the Diocese, not receiving stipends through this Society be requested to forward to the Secretary in like manner, on or before the 1st day of June in each year, the returns numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19, in order that a complete return of the Diocese in these particulars, may each year be published with the Society's Report, as hath been heretofore in part only accustomed.
 8. That the Schedule Committee in conjunction with the Lord Bishop shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and laymen for each Deanery, which each deputation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat (not interfering, however, with the usual semi-annual collections, and annual canvasses of the Mission on behalf of the Society); and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's support; such deputations reporting to the Schedule Committee, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.
 9. That the Schedule Committee, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to enquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission, and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the parishes receiving aid from or through the Society.
 10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these Resolutions to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, requesting their concurrence therein.

The Hon. Mr. Justice Allen, from the Committee with reference to Glebe Lands, presented a report which, on motion of the Hon. Mr. Justice Fisher, was referred to the Executive Committee.

On motion of Mr. Frith, it was—*Resolved*, That the Treasurer be authorized to carry into effect the recommendations contained in the report of the Loan Committee.

On motion of Mr. G. D. Street, it was—*Resolved*, That the thanks of this Society be given to the gentlemen controlling the various lines of Railway and Steamers, for their kindness and courtesy in permitting the Clergy and Lay Delegates to pass on their lines at reduced charges, during the present week.

Mr. Jarvis gives notice, that he will move, at the next Annual Meeting of this Committee, a resolution to give power to the Schedule Committee, upon the order of the Lord Bishop, to issue notes of suspension of services in any Mission, in default of payment towards the Missionary's stipend, and restore the resolution to that effect adopted last year.

Mr. Frith gives notice that he, or some person for him, will move at next Annual Meeting to add to the objects as follows:—

11. Aid to Foreign Missions of the Church of England: with the understanding that subscriptions for this object may be limited to any organization in connection with the Church of England, but if not so limited, will be forwarded to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, for the general purposes of that Society.

Mr. Wilkinson gives notice that at the Annual Meeting of this Society in 1872, a motion will be made to alter the 11th Article of the Constitution, so that the 1st section of that Article shall read as follows, viz.:—

XI.

Local Committee.

Sec. 1.—The members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of each Mission, constitute a Local Committee, and in those cases where a Missionary is in charge of several Parishes, each of the Parishes, with the approbation of the Missionary, may form a Local Committee, and so also the members

residing in any district of a parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish, there being in such district a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop, may at the desire of such Clergyman, and with approval of the Bishop and Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee, and in that case the district shall for the purpose of the Society be considered as a separate Parish.

And so as 3d section will read thus:—

Sec. 3.—Each Local Committee contributing \$100 and upwards annually to the funds of this Society shall be empowered to depute two lay-members of the Society to be elected at the annual meetings of the Committee to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee. But in all cases where less than \$100 is contributed by any Local Committee only one lay delegate shall be appointed.

Moved by Major C. W. Raymond, seconded by Mr. W. Wilkinson, and resolved unanimously,—

That the Society with much regret records the death, during the past year, of two of its oldest Missionaries,—the Rev. S. D. Lee Street, for forty years Rector of Woodstock, and of the Rev. James Hudson, Missionary at Glenelg and Newcastle; and of an earnest and useful Lay Member, John Wilkinson, Esq., of Fredericton.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Justice Allen, seconded by the Hon. Capt. Robinson Owen, R. N., it was resolved unanimously, that Mr. W. M. Jarvis be one of the Vice-Presidents of this Society.

The Lord Bishop addressed the Meeting, and after singing the Doxology and the benediction from his Lordship, the Society adjourned.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 1, 1871.

The Minutes of this Committee, the meeting of which was held at St. John, July 8th, 1870, are published in the 35th Report, page 52.

The Committee met at Fredericton, on the 5th October, 1870, when the following accounts were passed:

Messrs. Barnes & Co., for printing Circulars, and the Annual Report,	\$172 00

The Treasurer submitted statement of his Account, made up to 1st October instant.

The Secretary read a letter from Rev. G. T. Carey, Grand Manan, with reference to that Mission; when it was resolved that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the stipend of the Missionary at Grand Manan up to 1st January next.

It was resolved that the Loan Committee be directed to take such steps as may be necessary for the collection of Mr. Plant's mortgage.

Mr. Jarvis, from the Schedule Committee, presented a Report, which he read, and which was received.

The next meeting of this Committee was held at St. John, on the 4th January, 1871.

Mr. Jarvis, from the Schedule Committee, submitted a Report, stating that all the Parishes and Missions had complied with the requirements regarding the payment of the Missionaries, with one exception. The Report, on motion, was received.

On a letter being read from the Lord Bishop, with reference to the stipend of the Missionary at Andover, it was resolved that the Rev. W. H. Street be allowed to draw the salary for the Mission of Andover, up to 31st December last.

It was also resolved that the salary of the late Rev. S. D. Lee Street be paid to his widow, on furnishing sufficient authority, up to 31st December last, his death having occurred

near the close of the quarter; and that the pension of £50 sterling to Mrs. Street, be paid from 1st January instant.

The Treasurer submitted a statement of his Account, made up to 1st January instant, and also a statement of the probable balance up to 1st April, 1871.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 1st March, 1871, when a statement of the Treasurer's Account to this date was presented, together with a statement of the sums paid by certain Parishes, agreeably to the requirements of the Schedule Committee, and also a statement of the probable amount required for the April quarter.

Read by the Lord Bishop, a letter from the Secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, with reference to the "block sum," and the necessity of an immediate application for the renewal of the grant. It was on motion resolved, that the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to make such application, and such a statement with reference to the requirements of the Mission in this Diocese, as his Lordship may see fit.

A letter was read by the Secretary from the Church Wardens of the parish of Woodstock, with reference to a grant from the Society in aid of the support of the said Mission; when it was resolved, that the grant from the Society for Woodstock to the Rev. T. Neales for the quarter ending 31st March, inst., be at the rate of \$400 for the year, on condition of a contribution from the parishioners of a like sum.

Read an account of Messrs. McMillan for blanks, account-books, stationery, &c., furnished for the use of the Treasurer and of the Schedule Committee, amounting to \$50.05, which was ordered to be paid.

Certain forms for returns from the Missionaries were submitted to the Committee, when it was resolved, that the same be referred to the Schedule Committee to report upon the same at the next meeting of the General Committee.

It was resolved that a Committee be appointed to make the necessary arrangements for the meetings of the Society to be held in Fredericton in July next, and that the following gentlemen do compose the Committee:

Rev. Dr. Lee, Mr. J. S. Beek, Rev. E. A. W. Hanington, and Mr. W. Carman.

The Committee met at St. John on the 7th June, when a report of the proceedings of this Committee during the past year was read by the Secretary, and it was resolved that an

abstract of the Minutes of this meeting be added thereto, and the report be laid before the General Committee.

An account of the Secretary for postage, stationery and other incidental expenses, from 1st October to this date, amounting to \$20.96, was read and ordered to be paid.

Mr. Jarvis, from the Loan Committee, reported that Mrs. Hall's legacy of \$800 will shortly be paid in for investment; that no change in the securities have taken place during the past year, and that proceedings have been taken to secure the payment of the Plant Mortgage.

On motion, it was resolved that the report be received, and upon the payment referred to being made, the Secretary be requested a to give a discharge of the same, under the seal of the Society.

The Treasurer stated that his annual account will shortly be prepared, and that the deficiency will be less than was anticipated.

Mr. Jarvis, from the Schedule Committee, presented a report, which on motion was received.

It was ordered that the meetings of the Committee be held in future at half-past four o'clock.

The Committee met at Fredericton on Friday, the day after the Anniversary Meeting, in the Madras School Room, at 9 o'clock.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read.

The Report on Glebe Lands, referred to this Committee, was read, when it was Resolved that a Committee be appointed with power, at their discretion, to take steps to carry out the recommendations in the report, and that Mr. I. Allen Jack, Mr. J. R. Ruel, and Mr. G. A. Schofield do form the said Committee.

It was Resolved, that the application with reference to the grant towards the local endowment of the parish of St. Mary's be referred to the Loan Committee to inquire into the same, and to report at the next meeting of this Committee.

It was Resolved, that the Committee of Arrangements for the meetings be authorized to draw on the Treasurer for the amount of expenses incurred.

It was Resolved, that 3,500 copies of the Annual Report be printed, and that the Rev. W. H. Deveber, the Rev. Dr. Lee, Mr. G. S. Smith, Mr. W. Carman and the Secretary, be a Committee to attend to that duty.
