## DESCRIPTION

OF SOME OF THE

## PRINCIPAL TOWNS AND VILLAGES

## THE TOWN OF WOODSTOCK.

Woodstock proper—that is to say, the government appropriation for the site of the town—embraced that portion of land lying north of Dundas street and west of Ridder street, and bounded by the Thames and the second concession of Blandford; so that, according to the disposition under Governor Simcoe, the "town plot was the extreme westerly portion of the County of York, opposite Oxford, and washed by the Thames."

Except the nucleus of a village formed under the auspices of Captain Drew, R.N., around St. Paul's Church, all else was a comparative wilderness as late as 1832.

The history of Woodstock is the history of most Canadian towns. The progress of agriculture in the neighboring townships, the opening up of avenues of trade, and the introduction of manufacture—these were the instrumentalities to the centralization of influences and the growth of population. It is no fortuitous circumstance that Woodstock owes its gradual progress and its present position. Without mechanical power in our portion of the Thames, without a trade in lumber, or a specialty in any respect, the growth of Woodstock can only be attributed to the influences we have stated, and to the canny perseverance and thrift of our people.

The construction by the government, in 1843, of the macadamized road now, and since the date stated, constituting our main highway from the east to the west, was a very material help to the progress of the place, and after the opening for traffic, in 1853, of the Great Western Railway, an additional incentive was supplied. Still the onward progress of the town was never spasmodic, and the growth attained has supplied few particulars, either to the chronicler of the press or the gazetteer, worthy of note, if we except the movement of the Presbyterian Church in 1838, to organize themselves and to possess the services of a minister of their own faith. In regard to that movement, we may state that a great effort was made by the Presbyterians of Woodstock and Stratford to enjoy the services of the Rev. Mr. Allan, then a missionary in Canada, conjointly, two Sabaths in the month each. This arrangement lasted for nearly two years. Having found the travel through what was then for the most part a dense wilderness, every second week, more than he could well undergo, Mr. Allan, in 1840, resigned his charge of Woodstock.

In March, 1840, the first effort was made toward the erection of a church, and the site chosen was the acre of ground given, in 1837, by Sir Francis Bond Head. The Presbyterians of Woodstock subscribed largely, their means considered; these subscriptions were supplemented by contributions from friends in Zorra and Blandford, and after experiencing many difficulties, a very comfortable church was erected. Even to this day the struggles of those pioneers of Presbyterianism, in Woodstock, are remembered to the honor of all concerned.

In 1843, the disruption took place, and here again the strong will and steadfast purpose of the "sons of the North" were manifest. The emigrations that shook Scotland from end to end extended even to the wilds of Canada, and the little band of Free Presbyterians in Woodstock did not hesitate long as to the course to pursue. Shenston tells us that in furtherance of a separate pulpit and the support of a minister, gigantic efforts were made.

The name of W. C. McLeod, Esq., appears prominent among those interested in the new movement; while the success that crowned the struggle is by the same authority placed, and in no speech of flattery, to the credit of John Douglas, Esq. The Rev. W. S. Ball was the first Free Church minister of Woodstock, and during his ministration a large and influential congregation was created. Not content with this, a tiaclie church followed; and it too, in point of numbers and usefulness, is second to no other place of worship in the town. The Rev. W. T. McMillen, who succeeded Mr. Ball, in Knox church, has greatly enlarged and otherwise improved the means of grace; while the members of the Gaelic or Chalmers church, under the Rev. John MacTavish, contribute additively materially to the capacity of their building.

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St. Paul's, the oldest church in the town, is to be supplemented by a structure of elegant proportions; and that difficulty experienced by the members of the Anglican Church—the place of worship being remote from the congregation—is to be overcome. The new church will be placed on that most admirable site south of Dundas and east of Wellington streets.

The Roman Catholics, though few in number, enjoy ample privileges in their neat church on Wilmott street.

Of manufactures, as we before stated, we have few of note. The barrel factory owned by T. J. Clarke, Esq., has been, perhaps, most beneficial to the town. His Coal-Oil Works is another important bid, and so also the Cabinet Factory of Hay & Son, Miller's Cloth Works, the Ontario Spinning Works, Whitelaw and Huggins' Machine Shops and Engine Works, and the Iron Works Company, in addition to Forrest & Nasmyth's Flouring Mills, Schiobell's Planing Mills, and Richards' Broom and Soap Factories, Collen's Ale, Porter, and Beer Establishment, and Holling and Metcalf's Tobacco Works, all contribute to the good of the town and neighborhood—and these are not all; while the merchants cultivate patronage in city like premises, and by courteous attention and rigid economy, content with most moderate profits, are all successful.

years, for either the evil or the good (let us hope little of the latter) achieved by contemporaries. Its columns, however, indicate management and a long life. The first is owned by Mr. A. Pattullo, the second by Mr. Francis, and the third by F. J. Thissling & Ladlow. All are worked on machine presses two last employing steam-power.

There are two banking establishments in the town—the Canadian Bank of Commerce, under the management of Mr. T. McDonald, Canadian Bank of Commerce, under Mr. W. A. Sampson. Permanent Building and Savings Society is an institution of the highest character, indicating the thrift of the people and the business management. Secretary, Mr. Charles L. Board; and, like every other place in the province, Woodstock has its Masonic Lodges, its Odd-Fellows' Home, Ladies' Lodge, its Y. M. C. A., and its Ladies' Aid and other benevolent institutions; while the streets, public places, and private houses are supplied with a quality of gas new to the Canadian public, greatly reduced price, with public parks and surroundings of beauty, and a residence in the county town of Oxford, can hardly be desired.

## CANADIAN LITERARY INSTITUTE.

This Institution was originated by and is now under the care of the regular Baptist denomination of Canada. Its charter was granted, June, 1857; was first open for instruction in July, 1860; first burned in January, 1861; rebuilt in 1861-2, and reopened in 1862.

It originally occupied but three acres of land, and the fittings were valued at \$21,000; it now covers and occupies thirty-six acres, and the buildings are worth \$50,000; all of which sums were the gifts of the denomination, aided by the business community to some extent. In addition to the subscriptions for stock, some three or four thousand dollars are annually given to pay the salaries of professors in the theological department. The literary department is self-sustaining, so also the boarding school, which is under the charge of a Steward and Matron, and under the direction of one hundred students are provided for. The number enrolled is about 200, probably one third of which have now left. In the literary department both sexes are admitted, attended by persons from various denominations. The institution is designed by its promoters to supply a felt want—viz.: to afford a higher literary training than that at that time obtained at grammar schools, and especially by lady students, to establish a special course of theological training for young men in the ministry in view.

This fine property is located in the southeast part of the town, commanding a fine view of the whole town and surrounding country, which Woodstock is noted. The buildings are well arranged, and present a fine appearance. The property is held in trust by fifteen of whom are elected annually. An Executive Committee manages the financial affairs.

## INGERSOLL.

From 1852 to 1855, Ingersoll was but an incorporated village, the first reeve or executive officer was John Talliford. Then (the present reeve), for two years succeeding, held that distinction, followed, in 1855, by James F. McCarty, Esq. In the two following years, Mr. Talliford was reeve. From 1858 to 1860, Mr. Oliver, Esq., held the position, when he relinquished it. In 1865, Ingersoll took the status of a town, with Adam Oliver, Esq., as first Mayor. In 1866, Mr. Oliver was again chosen to that office, in 1867 and 1868, by Mr. Talliford. In 1869, John Esq., was elected to the position, followed by James McEwan, and 1871. In 1872, Mr. McDonald again took the civic chair, relinquished, in 1873, to Peter J. Brown, Esq. In 1874, C. Esq., was elected Mayor, and occupied the position, with credit and advantage to the corporation, for two years, making, in 1876, for Mr. John McDonald. Thus we see in twenty-four years eight gentlemen have been honored with the position of Mayor.

Oliver's business was established in 1853, and has been of continued prosperity to the enterprising firm, and to the town and neighborhood. Christopher & Brothers are in the same line of business, with an establishment employing a hundred men.

The Woolen Mill of Waterhouse & Bradbury is another ornament to the place, and a further evidence of the "push" characteristic of Ingersoll; while the cabinet factory owned by McIntyre & Crotty is without an equal in the county. Bailey's carriage factory and Eastwood's foundry are other evidences of prosperity.

Like most Canadian towns, Ingersoll is amply provided with churches, and what is of still greater importance, the ministration of the gospel from the different pulpits is not without effect in securing the presence of the great bulk of the people at their respective places of worship on the Lord's Day.

The press of Canada has no indifferent representation in the Ingersoll Chronicle and the Oxford Tribune. The former started in 1855, by the late J. S. ### EMBRO.

When Embro was projected, the future was not overlooked. It occupies an elegant plateau, from which may be viewed the rising hills, the broad expanse of agricultural prosperity, the winding stream, and the distant forest wealth of West Zorra. Its water power has attracted capital, and its business prospects are good. Surrounded by substantial homesteads, there is none of the ephemeral, or "sufficient is the day for the evil thereof" in sight that belongs to Embro. The father of the place, Donald Matheson, Esq., a gentleman whose name will be found in the representation of the County, legislative as well as municipal, has ever taken a deep interest in the welfare of his neighbors, and especially in all that contributes to the growth of Embro. It is a centre between Woodstock and Harrington and Woodstock, and is well situated

two Sabbaths in the month each. This arrangement lasted for nearly two years. Having found the travel through what was then for the most part a dense wilderness, every second week, more than he could well undergo, Mr. Allan, in 1840, resigned his charge of Woodstock.

In March, 1840, the first effort was made toward the erection of a church, and the site chosen was the acre of ground given, in 1837, by Sir Francis Bond Head. The Presbyterians of Woodstock subscriber largely, their means considered; these subscriptions were supplemented by contributions from friends in Kincardine and Blandford, and after experiencing many difficulties, a very comfortable church was erected. Even to this day the struggles of those pioneers of Presbyterianism, in Woodstock, are remembered to the honor of all concerned.

His Coal Oil Works is another important aid, and so also the Cabinet Factory of Hay & Son, Miller's Cloth Works, the Ontario Spinning Works, Whiteside and Huggins' Machine Shop and Engine Works, and the Iron Works Company, in addition to Forrest & Nasmyth's Flouring Mills, Schofield's Planing Mills, and Richards' Broom and Soap Factories, Cullen's Ale, Porter, and Beer Establishment, Holling and Metcalf's Tobacco Works, all contribute to the good of the town and neighborhood—and these are not all; while the merchants cultivate patronage in city like premises, and by courteous attention and rigid economy, content with most moderate profits, are all seemingly prosperous. Mr. P. Slight, we must mention, is pushing to completion a steam grist-mill (the Oxford Mill) which will command attention.

Few towns in Canada can boast the possession of journals of higher merit than belong to Woodstock. Two of them are venerable with years—the *Sentinel*, dating from 1834, and the *Times* from the year following. The *Review* has not had the opportunity, through length of

time, which is under the charge of a Steward and Matron, and one upward of one hundred students are provided for. midland counties of England than any section of country on this side of the Atlantic. In its primitive state, the towering pines of Blenheim had fellowship in those of Norwich and of Dereham, while the maple leaf was seen in richest luxuriance in the Oxford, Zorra, and Nassau. The earliest records tell us that in days long gone by, Indian tribes of the Chippewas, the Mohawks, and even the Irois, found a peaceful resting place on the banks of the Thames, the Oter and the Ouse. No portion of the county can be classed as unfit for cultivation. A subsoil of rich clay underlies the light surface of the southern portion of Blenheim, and when the last trace of the giant of the forest shall have disappeared, the land will be the most profitably tilled lands will be those from which have been taken our finest deal timber. Excepting the sections indicated, the soil is exceedingly productive. The land is rolling enough to supply a free course for the rains of the fall and spring, and the absence of expanse of marsh, or even beaver meadow, affords a guarantee for the health of the husbandman. No portion of Ontario is so well watered with living springs, and it was but simple justice on the part of Surveyor General Chewett when he pronounced the section of which we are speaking as "the most valuable land in the Province." The exhibitions of agricultural products that may be witnessed annually in every township, tell plainly enough that wheat and barley, peas and oats, and the roots and tubers so essential to profitable farming, all find a genial soil in the well-tilled fields of Oxford; and the rare case of production proof of this, and of the industry and skill of our agricultural classes. Gentlemen familiar with the famed Genesee Valley of the State of New York do not hesitate to pronounce in favor of Oxford for general productiveness and the enduring quality of its soil. Fruit culture has not been neglected, and the annual shipments, to England and to the American markets, make it plain that the harder fruits, such as apples, quince, and pears, are not only a certain, but an abundant and a profitable crop, and an item of very material interest in the economy of the agriculture.

settlement of Ontario, until a comparatively recent date, was like the seam on the sleeve of a coat—all at the outside. To trace the growth in numbers of its inhabitants, the wealth and the influence of the people, is not our purpose. It is enough to know that with but a moderate share of these trials that invariably attend life in the backwoods, about fifty thousand souls find homes secure from any disturbing element, and in the enjoyment of all the blessings of civilization, within the borders of the county of Oxford.

Of the character of the early settlers scant data is afforded. The names of the settlers, and the date of their establishment, are almost wholly lost.

pioneers of our civilization were of that good old stock who stood by the flag of England in the hour of dangers and difficulties—the father of our present Registrar, James Ingersoll, Esq., having, under promise of the tract of country now forming the three Oxford's, established a colony of U. E. Loyalists in the quarter indicated. Unfortunately for Mr. Ingersoll, at a time when all resources were exhausted, and when the helping hand of executive power was much needed, the then Governor, Simon Bolivar, was recalled, and the settlement was left to struggle on as best it could; while Mr. Ingersoll had the mortification to find, shortly after, that all his hopes were blighted by the refusal of the new administration to countenance the prosecution of his colonization.

\* The following from the *Upper Canada Gazette* of September 13th, 1799, in relation to the heroic struggles of the early settlers, and in illustration of the patriotism and sacrifice of the late Thomas Ingersoll, and the late Mr. Elizur Putnam, and others, will not be out of place in the present work having escaped the attention of the editor.

"The settlement from the head of Lake Ontario began about four years ago, excepting the Mohawk Village. In this period, several townships have so far increased in population and cultivation that there are several neighborhoods at convenient distances from the village, and in the course of time, will become towns in themselves."

The first land grants in this township were by Order in Council to John and George Hall, Hon. Robert Hamilton, Robert Robertson, and to the Hon. Peter Russell. It was not until 1834 that the government decided on offering land in this township for sale; although as far back as 1825 we find the names of sixteen residents, with a total of 62 acres of land, out of 63,732, under cultivation; with 5 horses, 20 oxen, 22 cows and 19 young cattle. In 1861, the population of Derryham had reached 5477, being an increase over the census previous (1851) of 1833. Its productions had also multiplied in marvellous degree, and at present it has taxable residents number 873, having a valuation of acres of \$1,416,304 with personal property amounting to \$180,055, and an assessed population of about 4000, with 5911 cattle, 3266 sheep, 1616 hogs, and 1437 horses.

The township of Dorcham may claim to have introduced, into Canada, the making of cheese as an article of merchandise. Following the plan of Herkimer and other American sections, the people of Dorcham adopted the factory system, and, under judicious management, with success that is highly creditable. That manm'eth cheese, forming a prominent a feature of England's great exhibition, inaugurated under the auspices of the "great and good" late Prince Consort, was made in Dorcham by Mr. Hanney, and its size and quality were no small factor in the success of the Canadian exhibit.

leaf was seen in richest luxuriance in the Oxfords, Zorra, and Nissouri. The earliest records tell us that in days long gone by, Indian tribes of the Chippewas, the Mohawks, and even the Erie, found a peaceful resting place on the banks of the Thames, the Otter, and the Ouse. No portion of the county can be classed as unfit for cultivation. A subsoil of rich clay underlies the light surface of the southern portion of Blenheim, and when the last trace of the giant of the forest shall have disappeared, the least productive, while certainly the most profitably tilled lands will be those from which have been taken our finest deal timber. Excepting the sections indicated, the soil is exceedingly productive. The land is rolling enough to supply a free course for the rains of the fall and spring, and the absence of expanse of marsh, or even beaver meadow, affords a guarantee for the health of the husbandman. No portion of Ontario is so well watered with living springs, and it was but simple justice on the part of Surveyor General Chewett when he pronounced the section of which we are speaking as "the most valuable land in the Province." The exhibitions of agricultural products that may be witnessed annually, in every township—plenty enough that wheat and barley, peas and oats, and the roots and tubers so essential to profitable farming, all find a genial soil in the well-tilled fields of Oxford, and the rate per acre of production is proof of this, and of the industry and skill of our agricultural classes. Gentlemen familiar with the famed Genesee Valley of the State of New York do not hesitate to pronounce in favor of Oxford for general productiveness and the enduring quality of its soil. Fruit culture has not been neglected, and the annual shipments, to England and to the American markets, make it plain that the harder fruits, such as apples, quinces, and pears, are not only a certain, but an abundant and a profitable crop, and an item of very material interest in the economy of the agriculturist.

The settlement of the county of Oxford was not rapid. Indeed, the settlement of Ontario, until a comparatively recent date, was like the scan on the sleeve of a coat—all at the outside. To trace the growth in numbers of its inhabitants, the wealth and the influence of the people, is not our purpose. It is enough to know that with but a moderate share of those trials that invariably attend life in the backwoods, about fifty thousand souls find homes secure from any disturbing element, and in the enjoyment of all the blessings of civilization, within the borders of the county of Oxford.

Of the character of the early settlers scant data is afforded. The pioneers of our civilization were of that good old stock who stood by the flag of England in the hour of dangers and difficulties—the father of our present Registrar, James Ingersoll, Esq., having, under promise of the tract of country now forming the three Oxfords, established a colony of U. E. Loyalists in the quarter indicated. Unfortunately for Mr. Ingersoll, at a time when all resources were exhausted, and when the helping hand of executive power was much needed, the then Governor Simcoe, was recalled, and the settlement was left to struggle on as best it could, while Mr. Ingersoll had the mortification to find, shortly after, that all his hopes were blighted by the refusal of the new administrator to carry out the assurances of his predecessor.\*

\* The following from the *Upper Canada Gazette* of September 12th, 1799, in relation to the heroic struggles of the early settlers and in illustration of the patriotism and sacrifices of the late Thomas Ingersoll, and the late Mr. Elisha Putnam, and others, will not be out of place in the present work, having escaped the attention of other writers.

The settlers from the head of Lake Ontario began about four years ago, excepting the Midway Village. militia, and now, with railway facilities to all quarters, is in a position to command remunerative figures for its products.

The following, in respect to the early settlement of Blenheim, is from Sutherland's *Gazetteer of Oxford*. He says:

"Mr. Horner's advent to the western part of Canada was under the following circumstances: In consequence of services rendered to Colonel Simcoe, during the American Revolutionary War, by a Mr. Watson, an uncle of Mr. Horner—in remembrance of those services, the Colonel, on his appointment as Governor, invited Mr. Watson to come and settle in the colony, and to bring all his friends and relations with him, and, as an inducement and a reward for those services, he was promised a whole ownership. In virtue of this promise, Mr. Watson accordingly sent a son to Canada, who, accompanied by his cousin, Mr. Horner, arrived in Blenheim in 1793, and to facilitate their speedy settlement, the Governor constantly ordered that three concessions of the township of Blenheim should be surveyed for them, in which, after the survey was made, a site was chosen for the erection of a mill, which was required by the Governor should be established as one of the conditions of their absolute right to the lands granted, and as an encouragement to future settlers. After making the selection for the mill site, both the emigrants returned to the States. Horner alone came back to Canada, which he did with a view of settling in this county, bringing with him from Albany, N. Y., the materials and men to erect the mill in question. At this time the locality of his intended settlement and the surrounding territory were unmarked by a single feature of civilization. There was then no road communication from Niagara (then called Newark, and the seat of government) to York (now Toronto), and the usual mode of travelling and the transportation of goods was by boat along the lake shore, so that the only approach to the county was by such route. Mr. Horner having conveyed his materials, etc., all the way by water from near Albany, rowed in his boat to the beach of Burlington Bay, in the neighborhood of where the city of Hamilton is now situated. His cargo was thence carried to Blenheim on sledges, roughly improvised for the occasion, and drawn by oxen. Mr. Horner's mill was the first saw-mill erected in the county, but he seems to have been unfortunate in his mill speculations, for the dam of his first (the saw-mill), which was in working order in 1795, broke down before it had been in operation at all, and the grist-mill, which he subsequently erected, was destroyed by fire in 1809, and never rebuilt."

The inland position of the County of Oxford and the sparsity of its population, at the time of Canada's struggle with the neighboring Republic, deny us the opportunity of supplying our readers with tales of patriotism or incidents of individual heroism, common in the Niagara peninsula and in the West. Our agents, who were instructed to gather and note with fidelity every incident that might go, in after years, to make up Canada's domestic history, have sought in vain for material for sketch-work; and romance in a work of this character is out of the question. We have, however, been struck with the fact that eleven persons are each reported as "the first white child in the county." An aged negro in South-Norwich astonishes the section with the assertion that she was Washington's nurse; while she indicts with feminine obstinacy to the truthfulness of the story of the hatchet and the cherry-tree. A writer such as Mayne Reid would have no difficulty in procuring texts for works of fiction in the hunting scenes enjoyed by the first settlers, and related by their sons. But there is a marvellous sameness in all these, and the man of business who consults this Atlas to be instructed, not for amusement, would care little for the details of bear fights or the pinches of the back settler against the ravenous wolf. The hardships of "going to mill," the frolics at weddings, and the incidents attending, as it were, the dawn of civilization, amusing and instructive—all are, are so much akin to similar stories from the pen of Mrs. Stoddard, in "Roughing it in the Bush," that we must deny them a place, referring the curious to the very interesting book just mentioned. Oxford never was the settled home of the "son of the forest," and of Indian traditions we have few; and, strange to say, thourly, in his Gazetteer, passes these unnoticed. An incident of early life, in connection with the mercantile pursuits of our present Registrar, Mr. Ingersoll, may not be out of place, as illustrative of Indian character and the white man's difficulties. It was long, long ago, at the dullest time of the year, when an Indian in iron walked into Mr. Ingersoll's store on the banks of the Thames (now the town of Ingersoll), and sought to barter her baskets and other handiwork for camp supplies, the warriors of the band being then absent in the West. Mr. Ingersoll, at the time, was in no mood for Indian supplies, as his stock was meagre in the extreme, and strips of cloth hanging from the ceiling were required to hide the nakedness of the shelves; while the latest news from York conveyed the depressing information that the bateaux, carrying the supplies for imperial wants and for the necessities of the settlers, were, by an adverse wind, forced to seek safety in putting back to the shelter of Presque Isle.

Mr. Ingersoll was in the set of wringing his hands at the gloomy prospect before himself and his neighbors when the squaw opened the matter of an exchange of commodities. In a manner quite unusual and quite unexpected, Mr. Ingersoll declined to traffic, advancing the fact that his stock was low. The squaw feeling the dignity of her tribe insulted, and seeing her hopes blotted, for she had travelled more than thirty miles on her commercial mission, drawing herself up to full stature, with a look unlike

wheeled toward the opened door and left the shop, remarking in tolerable English, that "Mr. Ingersoll might well be proud of his——big store."

It was not, as we intimated, in participating in the defence of the country, that the plowers of Oxford spent the dawn of their existence in the wilds of Canada. It was in the less exciting struggle to subdue the forest, and to open up avenues of communication to the outer world, that years of toll and hope were spent; and many of those sturdy men, sturdy in intellect as well as in loyal resolves and energy, yet live to see their sons in places of prominence in all the walks of life. Indeed, it is a circumstance creditable to the people of East Niagara and of the Zorra, that a greater number of young men of the Mathesons, the Camerons, the Sutherlands, the Murray, the McKeans, the Olivers, the McKays, and the Munros, grace our pulpits, the courts and the counting-room, than of any other section of the country, numbers taken into account. In common with every section of Canada, Oxford has increased marvelously in wealth and importance—reference to the schedules elsewhere supplied will demonstrate this—under the influences of our domestic institutions,

#### THE REPRESENTATION OF THE COUNTY OF OXFORD.

Before entering upon the subject of the representation of the County of Oxford, it may not be out of place to state that, in 1792, Leamington was issued by Lieutenant Governor Simcoe, dividing the Upper Canada into counties, and apportioning the representatives.

The following are the names of the counties, with the representatives they were sending to the House of Assembly: Glengary, 2; Stormont, 1; Dundas, 1; Grenville, 1; Leeds, 1; Ontario and Addington, 1; Prince Edward, 1; Lennox, 1; Northumberland, 1; and York, 1; Lincoln, 1; Norfolk and Essex, 1; Kent, 2—making in the whole, nineteen, and fifteen representatives. At this time there was no County of Oxford, the Township of Oxford having been surveyed "in the territory it was, as we have before stated, probably part of the County of Norfolk, which a few years later composed with the County of Oxford and Middlesex, the district of London.

There is no official list to be found of the members elected in the different counties above enumerated during the first and second sessions, 1792 and '93. The following names are given as those who were elected in 1792, and, we believe, are correct:

The Hon. D. W. Smith, having been elected to represent the County of Norfolk, Oxford, and Middlesex, in 1800, may be supposed to have represented the County of Norfolk in the first two Parliaments.

In 1798 an act was passed for the better division of this parish, (see map, III, chap. 5), from which we extract the following:

"The townships of Burford, Norwich, Derchiar, Oxford, Blanford, and Blenheim do constitute and form the Township of Oxford."

Another act of the same Legislature passed on the 4th of April, 1800, for the more equal representation of the Commons of this parish, states that:

"The counties of Oxford, Middlesex, and Norfolk shall, to be represented by one member."

Under this act, those three counties were represented, from 1804—i.e., in the third Parliament, by the Hon. D. W. Smith, fourth Parliament, 1804 to 1808, by Benjamin Malory.

During the fifth, sixth, and seventh Parliaments—i.e., from 1808 to 1812—the counties of Oxford and Middlesex are found to be represented by one member—the members elected being, in 1808, Hon. J. H. Ingersoll; in 1810, Mahlon Burwell; in 1812, Mahlon Burwell. It was not until 1840 that the County of Oxford enjoyed within itself

administration of justice was secured through the medium of a resi-  
dent judge, with the appearances belonging to a county town. The  
late John Arnold, Esq., was, by appointment of the Crown, the first  
Judge. Under the act 8th Vic. chp. 13, it was necessary that the  
county judge should be a barrister of five years' standing. Mr. Arnold  
by this act became incapacitated, and the office was bestowed, in 1845, on  
David Shank Macneque, Esq., who has continued the discharge of the  
duties of that office in a most efficient manner up to the present time.  
The office of Registrar for Oxford was first filled by Thomas Horner,  
Esq., a gentleman who had taken no inconsiderable part in the settle-  
ment of Oxford, and who had represented its people in more than one  
Parliament. Mr. Horner was succeeded by James Ingersoll, Esq., in  
1834. The duties of the office from 1800 to 1850 were not onerous,  
long intervals appear between entries, and, as a consequence, the emolu-  
ments of the office were insignificant in the extreme. Indeed, when the  
office fell to the present incumbent, James Ingersoll, Esq., and the Regis-  
try Office was convenient to his own place of business in Ingersoll,  
the revenue from it and from the Post-Office—for Mr. Ingersoll was in  
early days a very centre of administrative forces—was barely sufficient  
to compensate him for the assistance he provided and for the stationery  
he consumed.

The office was removed from Ingersoll to Woodstock, in 1848, and  
Mr. Ingersoll (to the satisfaction of every person) has enjoyed health  
and vigor, aided by an efficient staff, for the very creditable discharge  
of the responsible duties of that office up to the present. The new Regis-  
try Office has not yet been occupied, but promises increased facilities  
with greater security.

The office of Sheriff of Oxford was first bestowed on James Carroll,  
Esq., who resigned in 1802, when Andrew Ross, Esq., was appointed.  
Mr. Ross's death, in 1873, made way for George Perry, Esq. The  
office of Clerk of the Peace was first and for many years filled by  
Wm. Lapenierre, Esq., who, resigning in 1803, was succeeded by F. H.  
Ball, Esq., who is also Crowe County Attorney and senior member of  
the law firm of Ball, Matheson & Ball, and since this sketch was penned  
has been appointed one of the Queen's Counsel for Ontario.

Mr. Fossett was Clerk of the County Court from 1840 to 1853; he  
was succeeded by James Kintrea, Esq., who held the office until 1864,  
when James Canfield, Esq., was appointed. Mr. Canfield is also Clerk of  
the Surrogate Court.

The office of County Treasurer was first given to Hugh C. Barwick,  
Esq., who discharged the duties until 1854, when James Kintrea took  
charge of the accounts and the finances of the county. In 1860 on Mr.  
Kintrea's removal from the county, the office was bestowed on the pres-  
ent occupant, H. P. Brown, Esq., who had been a successful manufac-  
turer, and also a prominent municipal officer.

Prior to 1848, magistrates in Quarter Sessions conducted the business  
of expending moneys for public improvements. On the introduction of  
municipal institutions—i.e., township and county councils or corporations  
—under the auspices of the Baldwin-Lafontaine administration, all  
matters pertaining to public works and local government passed into  
the hands of the people, whose representatives compose the councils  
of those corporations; and so well satisfied are the people with the system,  
that no attempt has been made to abridge the power or circumscribe the  
scope of popular action. Thus it is that means are found for the better  
development of the country, the construction of public works, and  
the extension of our comprehensive system of education. On the introduc-  
tion of municipal institutions the Hon. P. H. de Blaquiere was ap-  
pointed by the Crown as Warden of the district. An able and a popular  
man was Mr. de Blaquiere, and traces of his administrative parts  
and of the wisdom and patriotism of the gentlemen composing the  
councils of the people in that early day, are still extant.

for sketch-work; and romance in a work of this character is out of the question. We have, however, been struck with the fact that eleven persons are each reported as "the first white child in the county." But there is a marvellous sameness in all these, and the man of business who consults this Atlas to be instructed, not for amusement, would care little for the details of bear-fights or triumphs of the buck settler against the ravenous wolf. The hardships of "going to mill," the frolics at weddings, and the incidents attending, as it were, the dawn of civilization, amusing and instructive—all are, so much akin to similar stories from the pen of Mrs. Moodie, in "Roughing It in the Bush," that we must deny them a place, referring the curious to the very interesting book just mentioned. Oxford never was the settled home of the "son of the forest," and of Indian traditions we have few; and, strange to say, though, in his tinseetter, passes these unnoticed. An incident of early life, in connection with the mercantile pursuits of our present Registrar, Mr. Ingersoll, may not be out of place, as illustrative of Indian character and the white man's difficulties. It was long, long ago, at the dullest time of the year, when an Indian matron walked into Mr. Ingersoll's store on the banks of the Thames (now the town of Ingersoll), and sought to barter her baskets and other handiwork for camp supplies, the warriors of the band being then absent in the West. Mr. Ingersoll, at the time, was in no mood for Indian supplies, as his stock was meagre in the extreme, and strips of cloth hanging from the ceiling were required to hide the nakedness of the shelves; while the latest news from York conveyed the depressing information that the battaoux, carrying the supplies for imperial wants and for the necessities of the settlers, were, by an adverse wind, forced to seek safety in putting back to the shelter of Presque Isle.

Mr. Ingersoll was in the act of wringing his hands at the gloomy prospect before himself and his neighbors when the squaw opened the matter of an exchange of commodities. In a manner quite unusual and quite unexpected, Mr. Ingersoll declined to traffic, advancing the fact that his stock was low. The squaw feeling the dignity of her tribe insulted, and seeing her hopes blasted, for she had travelled more than thirty miles on her commercial mission, drawing herself up to full stature, with a look unlike

was established. Embro lacks connection by rail with Woodstock, on the one hand, and St. Mary's on the other. Embro has two good local papers, the *Planet*, conducted by Mr. Dawson, and the *Review*, by Mr. Hay.

## BEACHVILLE

This is one of the oldest villages in the western portion of the county. At one time it was the post town for the entire neighborhood, including Woodstock. The improvement of the county by railway facilities crushed Beachville's prospects entirely; still it is a clean, neat settlement, with churches, stores, etc., and has a daily mail east and west, and to Embro.

## PLATTSVILLE

This is by far the largest and most important village in Blenheim. It contains close upon five hundred inhabitants. It is situated on Smith's Creek, on the quarter town line, in the twelfth and thirteenth concessions. It contains two good general stores, two large flouring mills, a saw mill, a foundry, a flax mill, a large cabinet factory, two stores and two shops, a post office, and enjoys the advantage of a number of excellent mechanics of different arts. One drawback is the distance—four miles from a railway station. This immediately neighborhood has a grist mill and a saw-mill, on the third concession, owned by Mr. W. Laycock, while Mr. Christian Fry, on the eighth, and Mr. Shoemaker on the twelfth, offer great advantages. A few, Esq., late Warden of the county is the capitalist whose energy is contributing to the advancement of Plattsburg.

## SPRINGFORD

This village derives its name from a fording of the small stream that passes through the section. Its population is about four hundred. Two general stores are owned by A. L. Wilson, Esq., whose prosperity is the result of eighteen years of successful operations, with an average business of \$20,000 a year. Mr. Henderson, the Postmaster, is also the proprietor of a general business. It has three hotels, a good brick school-house, two churches, Methodist, Episcopal and Baptist, a cheese factory, making from seventy to eighty tons throughout the season, also a very extensive brick and tile manufactory, and a tannery. Springford is on the Brantford and Port Burwell Railway, and is growing into importance. Cornell, a station on the Canada Southern Railway, is three and a half miles from Springford.

## OTTERVILLE

The first settlement was made here in 1807, on a government grant to John Earle and Paul Avery, who were also given some machinery for the erection of grist and saw mills. These men sold to Messrs. Cook and Galloway. In 1811 and 1812, Peter Hamilton and William Hardy started a furnace for the smelting of iron, about a mile from the village. At that time engineers were engaged in a survey of the river, with the view of securing navigation up to the smelting works. In 1810, Peter Avery, the first white child in the township, was born. In 1833, Mr. Asa Durkee started a tannery, and to this day carries on the business, every year extending his operations, and increasing the number of his friends. The enterprising firm of Messrs. Bullock are extensive dealers and valuable aids to the county round. The present population is 800, and the prospect is that this number will be rapidly increased through the opening of travel north and south, by the construction of the Port Dover and Lake Huron Railway, the advantages of the Canada Southern Railway and the splendid water power enjoyed for manufacturing purposes. At present Otterville has two sawmills, one wooden factory, one flour and two shingle mills, a cabinet and match factory, a tannery and turning establishment, with mills in the immediate neighborhood. Its churches are models of neatness, and its school house is one of the best in the county, all watched over by a journal, the *Argus*, conducted by Mr. Holland.

## DRI MBO.

This village is situated about the centre of the township of Blenheim. It contains four general stores, one foundry, one tannery, two extensive brick manufacturing establishments with all the trades necessary for a community. It has five places of worship, two medical men and an excellent public hall. It is an important station of the Buffalo and Goderich and the Credit Valley Railways, with the village of Waverly contributing to its growth. Drumbo has two mails daily *via* railway—shot from Toronto coming *via* Stratford. Mr. Henry Mumma, in addition to his extensive business, is the Chief Magistrate of the place. Drumbo is the head-quarters of Captain Pattullo's rifle corps attached to the Brant Battalion.

## WOLVERTON (FORMERLY WARSAW)

This is a pretty little village, on Smith's Creek, on the eighth concession of Blenheim. It has a splendid flour mill, a general store, and planing mill, with one of the best and most English-like houses in the county a credit to the section, and to the proprietor, Mr. F. Meier.

## WASHINGTON

This is a small village on the middle town line, in the twelfth and thirteenth concessions. It has a general store and post office, etc., and the inhabitants are engaged in the erection of a temperance hall, and pronounce strongly against the traffic in liquors.

## RICHWOOD

This is another small village in Blenheim, two churches and business places, with a post office.

## CANNING

If age gave importance and dimension, have been long ere this a city. It is six miles from Canning was erected, still its growth is a post-office and stores, with the other wealthy agricultural section.

## PRINCETON

This is a place of many years' growth, from the Governor's road to the new greatly injured Princeton.

Still at no time were the prospects present. It is situated on the line of the Grand Trunk, twelve miles from Woodstock, and about It has two good general stores, three blacksmith shops, a very extensive tanning, tannery, tailoring establishment commercial and mechanical, that can be spacious hotels. Its schools are excellent, bodies have places of worship. Princeton receives four mails daily; has the command of the Division Court, of which J. ## EASTWOOD

Next to Embro, this is the most important village in the county, and its increasing wealth of its agricultural classes has a post office, general stores, church, Maplewood, Brookdale, and Youngsburg with Embro, which is the dist-

## LAKESIDE

This is a village in the township of West Zorra. It has an abundant supply of water, and is quite a resort in the summer. It has a small store, post office, Medina, Kintore, Dornoch, and Thame.

## RICHWOOD.

is another small village in Blenheim. It has postal facilities, stores and business places, with a good school house, largely at

the route to Ingersoll, the latter being a place of importance. Lakeside contributes a corps of rifles to the Twenty-second Battalion, and Thamesford one of infantry to the Twenty-sixth or Middlesex Battalion. The Lakeside company is under the command of Major Munro.

## CANNING.

It gave importance and dimensions to a place, Canning should even long ere this a city. It is sixty years since the first mill in it was erected; still its growth is not forward. The village has office and stores, with the other necessities for an old and agricultural section.

## PRINCETON.

It is a place of many years' growth, but the withdrawal of travel the Governor's road to the new road from Brantford in 1843, injured Princeton.

At no time were the prospects of Princeton better than at present. It is situated on the line of the Great Western Railway, 4 miles from Woodstock, and about seven miles from Paris. It has two good general stores, three grocery stores, three wagon blacksmith shops, a very extensive drug store, owned by Mr. King, tannery, tailoring establishments, and all the accommodation serial and mechanical, that can be desired, with comfortable and various hotels. Its schools are excellent. The following religious have places of worship—Episcopal, Lutheran, and Presbyterian. Princeton receives four mails daily, has a large town hall, and an office Division Court of which J. Cowan, Esq., is Clerk. It was in the neighborhood of Princeton that the late Thomas Horner erected the first in the county. Here he died, remembered for his public usefulness domestic virtues. Princeton exercises, through its public men, no influence in the township and in the county, and it is represented in defence force of the country by an efficient corps of rifles, under command of Captain Williamson, with Mr. F. Galbraith as Lieutenant.

## EASTWOOD.

It is a small place on the Great Western Railway, about five miles from Woodstock. It has an extensive grist mill and a very large stave barrel factory—the former owned by Mr. A. Burrows, the latter by John Beard. It has a post office, carriage manufactory, store, and grinds

## INNERKIP.

This is a village in East Zorra, and on the line of the Credit Valley Railw., distant from Woodstock about eight miles. It has two stores, a hotel, and the services of two medical practitioners. It is in the heart of an excellent agricultural section, and a very considerable trade is carried on. Bright, Retho, and Chesterfield are also lively ages in the neighborhood.

## STRATHALLAN.

There has been little attempt made in the last few years to increase proportions of Strathallan. The agriculturists of the neighborhood are too equal for that, and Mr. Lappan, with his store, the post office, and a large and comfortable hotel, may be said to be the place in itself. It is the head quarters of one of the companies of the Oxford Dragoons, and the strength, efficiency, and appearance of that corps, at annual training indicate the interest the people take in an important in our economy.

## TAVISTOCK.

This village can hardly be called of the County of Oxford, the major portion lying in the County of Perth. It is a progressive place, has stores, a post office, a good hotel. It is about fourteen miles from Woodstock, and enjoys the advantage of two railway stations, the Buffalo and Goderich Railw. and the Port Dover and Lake Huron Railw. At one time it will be a distributing point for the salt of the Goderich region.

## HARRINGTON.

Next to Embro, this is the most important village in West Zorra. Its population is on the increase, and its sources of prosperity, in the growth wealth of its agricultural classes, is unmistakably improving. It is a post office, general stores, churches, and hotels, with mills, etc. Brookdale, and Youngsville all post villages, connect Harrington with Embro, which is the distributing point.

## LAKESIDE.

This is a village in the township of East Nissouri, on the westerly of West Zorra. It has an admirable sheet of water for pleasure purposes and is quite a resort in the heated term of our Canadian summer. It has a small store, post office, place of township meetings, etc. Elmdale, Kintore, Dornoch, and Thameford are post villages, lying on

## BURGESSIONVILLE.

On the line of the Port Dover and Lake Huron Railw., and midway between Norwich and Woodstock, is a thriving village. It has a daily post, several factories, and an admirable hotel, owned by Mr. E. O'Neill, Jr. Lying between Burgessville and the north of East Oxford are situated three post villages, Oriel, Vandear, and Oxford Centre, giving abundant facilities of stores, manufactories, etc., to that wealthy section.

## HOLBROOK.

It is a post village on the Woodstock and Norwich gravel road, about equal distance between the places named. It has a cheese factory, a general store on the co-operative plan, enjoys a daily mail from Woodstock, and has a very convenient and comfortable Presbyterian church. J. W. Nesbitt, Esq., is President of the store company, and is the popular Justice of the Peace and issuer of marriage licenses.

## MOUNT ELGIN.

This is a village in Dereham, on the Ingersoll and Port Burwell macadamized road. It is in the heart of the dairy interest of the county, has a good store, a daily post, and all other necessities. Culoden and Verchoule are post offices between Mount Elgin and Woodstock.

## SWEAOBORG.

This place was formerly called Flosshawn, but when mail accommodation was given the name was changed. It is five miles from Woodstock, in West Oxford, and about the same from Beachville. It was an important lumber section, and yet contributes considerable. In time, Sweaborg will attract attention from the beauty of the surrounding scenery and streams of limpid water. Mr. Orr's mills are important helps, and Smith's saw mill, south, is an establishment of importance. It has two good stores, an excellent school, and is rapidly improving.

## NORWICH.

From present appearances, Norwich bids fair to rival the most progressive of the towns of Oxford. It is nearly half way between Woodstock and Simeon, and is the centre of the most wealthy portion of the county. It was the resting place of that company of Quakers who contributed so materially to the well-being of the community, and whose descendants still cultivate broad acres and ornament the society of the township. The Port Dover and Lake Huron Railw. and the Brantford and Port Burwell Railw. cross each other in Norwich. It is the centre of our great fruit section, and the cheese business of the county is well represented in the neighborhood. Norwich has large manufacturing establishments, its present size taken into account; good stores, connection with Woodstock and Brantford by post routes; churches, schools, and benevolent and charitable societies, and might, had the Quakers not rebelled against jail and courthouse, have been the county town. It is the residence of Gilbert Moore, Esq., President of the Port Dover and Lake Huron Railw., and of Dr. Carroll, President of the Brantford and Port Burwell Railw. Its incorporation under legislative authority took place last January, and its municipal affairs are under the management of a council, separate from that of the township. Lately a weekly newspaper, *The Standard*, was started by Mr. H. G. Pilcher, and under favorable auspices. The typographical appearance, the selections, and the general tone of the paper are all indicative of culture. An office of the Division Court is in Norwich; J. Barr, Clerk. Mr. Benson Lossing, yet an active and intelligent resident, claims to have plied the axe that felled the first tree cut down in Norwich. The agricultural exhibitions in Norwich are evidences of long accumulated wealth, and there is a thirst that is exceedingly pleasant to notice in the homesteads of the Norwich people. Dr. Cook, a former representative of South Oxford, resides in Norwich, and is a pillar of strength to every enterprise. The Royal Canadian Bank has an agency in the town.

## THISONBURG.

This is an important point in the southwest corner of the township of Dereham. At one time it was the head quarters of a very extensive lumber trade; even yet no inconsiderable supply of that article is produced. It has had the advantage of the capital and great business push of Mr. Tilson, whose name it bears. Dereham Forge was at one time the name of the place, and iron ore from the neighborhood was melted and manufactured. The Canada Southern, the Air Line, and the Brantford and Port Burwell Railways touch Tilsonburg. It has many good stores, several extensive mills and factories, much enterprise in its prominent men; a weekly newspaper, published and edited by W. S. Law, Esq. It lies on the Ingersoll and Port Burwell macadamized road, and is a distributing office for Brownsville, Houghton, and other points in Elgin and Norfolk. Mr. Bain is, and has been for some time, the Reeve of Tilsonburg. The medical and the legal profession are both well represented in the town.

As this is the earliest record, and one that gives, with but a very few exceptions, the entire list of the then inhabitants of Oxford, with the extent of their real and taxable property, we feel that its presence in this compilation is a necessity. The reader will not fail to notice the absence in this list of the names of the most prominent gentlemen of the first colonization—viz.: that of Mr. Ingersoll and Mr. Putnam. The records of the Township of Toronto, in the County of York, years before this enumeration was made, mention the removal of Mr. Ingersoll from Oxford, where he died broken-hearted. His residence in that section was near what is now known as Merigold's Point, on Lake Ontario. In 1826, however, we find Mr. Charles Ingersoll and his brothers, Thomas and James, among the partners of the early struggles of their father. Of Mr. Putnam, we have no trace.
