Bishop Hamilton, who was raised to the episcopate to have charge of the four midland provices of Japan, de-livered a graphic sermon at St. Alban's Cathedral last night before a congregation which filled the edifice.

Church there was on a vast scale, he said. The four provinces had a population of six millions, of which about one in a thousand was a Christian. The land area was 300 miles in length by 50 wide. The church missionary society in England was withdrawing from the field, leaving it to the Church of England in Canada to man and support. This would require an addition of \$6000 a year to the previous annual contri-bution, but he had not doubt about it

being forthcoming.

The attitude of the government authorities of Japan to the two ancient religions, and also respecting Christ-ianity was that of benevolent neutraltry. The people were not rushing in crowds to hear the gospel preached, but when they were visited they listened aftentively. There was no hostility, and the knowledge of the gospel was gradually being extended to all parts of the country.



Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert were visited and a trip of 176 miles inland was taken from Prince Rupert to the head of rail on the Pacific coast. Mr. Chamberlin found the track graded as far as Aldermere, but track-laying held up for lack of men. In the opinion of the Grand Trunk officials 4500 men are needed to man the equipment which is now placed to connect Fort George and Prince Rupert. It is expected that track will be laid from the coast to Bulkely Summit, 60 miles east of Aldermere, before winter sets in.

Harvest Prospects. Mr. Chamberlin was impressed with the harvest prospects thruout the west. "All the country needs is a little clear, dry weather to allow harvest opera-thons to proceed, giving the largest crop in the history of the country. "At Fort William the Grand Trunk has largely increased its yard accomnas largely increased its yard accommodation for handling grain and there is now trackage at Fort William for 2000 cars. We expect the 2.500,000 bushel addition to the elevator to be

Serious Grain Blockade. Mr. Chamberlin predicts a more serious grain blockade this year than has ever occurred before, but points out that it is the facilities for removing the grain from the terminals and not the railways that are at fault. "I do not hesitate to say," Mr. Chamberlin observed, "that the three railways are in a position, as far as rolling stock is concerned, to move all the grain they will be asked to handle, but it cannot be removed from the ter-minal points. There is now at Montquantity of last year's grain awaiting removal, and our company has a great many loaded cars standing idle. with proper despatch.

Million Mark Would Have Been Reached if Weather Had Been More Favorable -Many Improvements Needed for Next Year, and Management Will Consider at Once.

An advance of ten thousand in the attendance over that of last year at are ready to consider any fair offer. the Canadian National Exhibition, which closed its gates to the public Saturday night, brought the figures for this year up to 926,000. The million mark, which looked so easy of accomplishment at the outset, was not reached, but this was not surprising, and the wonder is that so creditable a showing was made in view of the fact that while there were no day long rains, there was no day until the closing day when showers of greater or less proportions did not visit the fair. The record of the previous year, when the weather conditions were the best in many years, was broken, and that was a deal to do.

It had to be a bigger and a better

fair in a bigger and better Toronto to get away with this increase, and there is no question as to the improvement at the Exhibition, both as to crowd handling facilities within and without the grounds, and in the exhibits shown the grounds, and in the exhibits shown to those attending. Giving some idea of the magnitude of the fair and the costly nature of the exhibits comes an estimate from the individual exhibitors, who placed the worth of the exhibits of manufacturers alone at well over a million dollars.

Better Buildings.

Then there was a betterment in buildings. The new government build-ing allowed the country itself to show forth the material evidences of its various sections, while this left the other buildings clear for the setting forth of private exhibits. The Exhibition this year assumed more strongly still the role of the educator, and in this regard the exhibits of both the provincial and city Hydro-Electric Commissions were marked leaders, while the railways did much in this

The revenue from this year's Exhibi-tion, too, will far exceed that of next year for the prices of all concessions were raised and every inch of avail-

able space was taken up.
Improvements Needed. Once more the passing of the fair has shown that it is still far from perfect. As Controller Foster pointed out at the directors' luncheon on the closing day, there are many improvements needed. First of these, unless it be the question of restaurants, is that of the urgent need for an eastern entrance. There was the same congestion before the big new Dufferin street gates that there had been to the old. The depressed tracks removed much of the element of danger, but that did not remove the discomfort and inconvenience of the impossibility of providing adequate street car transpor quate street car transportation.

The Strachan avenue road, which was used as the main vehicular entrance, is used as the main vehicular entrance, is nothing short of a disgrace and, poorly lighted as it is, proved a menace to the crowding motor cars, while these were frequently held up for altogether unreasonable periods at the level crossing, which still remains a bar to a clear road into the Exhibition at the east.

More Benches. Then there is the urgent need for increased seating capacity on the lawns about the band stands and upon the promenade and lawns fronting lake. The need for more and more easily recognizable information bureaus upon the grounds was shown by the many inquiries made for information upon matters of such heed as the lora-tion of a telegraph office.

The entertainments were of a better class than heretofore, but could easily yet be vastly improved. The greatest attraction was the nightly tattoo of the cadet contingents from the corners of the empire, but one of their best at-tractions was passed up by the authorities, who on only two occasions allowed the cavalry cadets from Saskatchewan to go thru with their musical ride. The space was occupied by horses in process of being judged, and while this feature has many friends it might easily be put thru in a special or smalle ring, for during its progress the ma-jority of those hardy enough to face an afternoon show before the grand stand,



YNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occapied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may precempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his

Originally British It Was Backed Up by Naval Demonstration Off Vera Cruz.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7 .- It is announcethat an American syndicate with headquarters here has purchased the long-standing Manning and Mackintosh claim against the government of Mexico, and will press a demand for payment. The claim, with interest, now amounts to \$105,180,000.

The Manning and Mackintosh claim was originally British. It was the subject of diplomatic negotiations between the Mexican Government and the government of Great Britain in the reign of Queen Victoria, and the British Government made a naval demonstration of Vers Cruz in 1862 to support Government made a naval demonstra-tion off Vera Cruz in 1863 to support a demand for its liquidation. The president of Mexico appointed a com-mission, which, after seven years, ren-dered a report in favor of Manning and Mackintosh.
