

CHINESE IMMIGRATION IS LEGAL

Hundreds of Claims Are Being Filed Which Uncle Sam Will Be Asked to Pay.

New York, Oct. 11.—A Washington dispatch to The Tribune says that a new phase of China's policy of retaliation against the United States because of its exclusion laws is disclosed as the result of the Chinese government's collecting claims of damage for the deportation of Chinese immigrants, for presentation to the state department. The claims are filed with the United States government in the name of the Chinese government, which does not restrict immigration, is the only country that has taken such a course since the treaty of 1868. Every Chinaman who is deported is accompanied by a statement by the Chinese government to file a claim with the United States government, stating the material loss and personal suffering entailed.

These claims average over \$100 each, and are now being put through the channels of the state department. The United States government will not admit the validity of the claims, it is understood, until the Chinese government has agreed to the Hague tribunal for a settlement of the claims.

Legation officials explain the collection of the claims on the ground that they will make clear before the world the attitude of the Chinese government towards the United States. The Chinese government argues that the treaty of 1868, known as the "Treaty of Commerce and Consular Rights," which especially provides for limiting the immigration of Chinese to the United States, but which did not exclude them altogether, was abrogated, according to the Chinese, by a United States congressional act, passed in 1888 excluding Chinese laborers.

This law was made by the United States against the protest of China, and was, therefore, only a unilateral act, and not an international contract. The Chinese say, however, that it made void the previous treaty, and that the United States is bound to honor the latter.

In presenting these claims, and offering to submit them to the Hague tribunal, the Chinese government seems to draw a comparison between the exclusion law and the claims filed against the United States by Great Britain in 1882, in the Bering Sea controversy. In that case the United States refused to allow British fishermen to fish in the Bering Sea. Great Britain gathered the claims, presented them, and an international commission awarded damages of \$472,151.

OF INTEREST TO LABOR MEN CONSPIRACY IS NOT PROVEN

Conviction of Officers of St. Catharines Union for Depriving Man of Work is Quashed.

The court of appeal at Osgoode Hall yesterday gave decisions in three out of six important criminal cases. AN INDIRECT INFLUENCE.

Local Canadian Club and the Affairs of Civic Life.

Succeeds to Management of Trusts and Guarantee Co.

MURDER IS NOT PROVED

Jury Out Only an Hour—Noisy Spectators Arrested for Contempt of Court.

Hamilton, Oct. 11.—(Special)—"Not guilty" was the verdict given by the jury in the Fieldhouse murder case this evening, and James Nealon, Michael O'Connor and Stanley Davis, the three young men accused of the crime, were discharged.

The crowd in the courtroom gathered about to congratulate them. Nearly a joint in cheering, whistling and stamping their feet, Judge Meredith was indignant, but in spite of his remonstrances, the young men were allowed to go.

The judge ordered the arrest of two of the crowd, John Smith and John Jones, and the judge threatened to commit them to jail for contempt of court, but they did not carry out their threat, however.

The trio were accused of murdering Fred Fieldhouse, a young Englishman, who met his death in a street row on June 18. They were charged with the murder of Fieldhouse, and there was nothing to show conclusively who had struck the blow that fractured Fieldhouse's skull.

The judge's charge was rather against the accused, but it took the jury only about an hour to decide that they were not guilty.
