Lieut.Commander J. C. Colwell, the United States Naval Attache, has since investigated the matter, and has made a report on the subject to the United States Government. The facts learned strongly tend to show that Havana harbor was mined, and they unquestionably prove that Spain purchased mines for that purpose. The firm of Lattimer, Rhodes & Clark, electrical engineers, during 1887-1888, filled a large order for Spain of a lot of mines in which were used 14½ tons of guncotton. The work was done under the surveillance of General Fernandez and Captain Bustamento: The latter was then the head of the Spanish Torpedo School. By the order of these officers, the mines were divided into four consignments, for Havana, Ferrol, Cadiz and Carthagena. The mines were manufactured under the direction of J. P. Gibbons, after Gibbons' patents, which are described in Shamen's book on torpedoes and mines.

Glibons, from whom a report of the Associated Press obtains the information, and who furnished Lieut. Commander Colwell with a written statement of the above facts and outlined his theory of the explosion which wrecked the Maine, was then employed by the firm as superintendent of the torpedo department. Gibbons, who is a former sergeant of engineers, and a Government inspector of torpedoes, believes the Maine's first explosion was caused by what is technically called a ground mine, containing 500 pounds of guncotton. several of which were manufactured for Spain.





RAILWAY NEWS.

Owen Sound Truckers-Presen to Mr. George Pipall.

Superintendent Leonard of the Canadian Pacific has refused to again engage a number of truckers and freight handlers that were employed by the C.P.R. at Owen Sound last summer, and went on strike for bigner wages. Mr. Leonard's action has laid him open to considerable criticism, which comes principally through the columns of the Owen Sound press, and from these articles it appears that Mr. Leonard allowed the dismissed strikers to remain at Owen Sound all winter in the expectancy of obtaining employment from the C.P.R. during the season of navigation.

A World reporter waited upon Mr. Leonard yesterday and interviewed him regarding the discharged men. Mr. Leonard was seen in his office, and was engaged in reading one of the many adverse criticisms which his action has called into print. Mr. Leonard stated that some time during the second week in October of 1897 he was in Owen Sound, and found the affairs of the company running smoothly. On his return from Owen Sound, however, he received a telegram that 150 truckers employed to load and unload the boats and cars at Owen Sound had gone on strike to have their wages increased to 15 cents an hour. As the Canadian Pacific were taken at a disadvantage, Mr. Leonard allowed the men the wages demanded, but states that he told the men before the 15th of November, 1897, that they were dismissed from the company's service and would not be again employed. Mr. Leonard stated also that the truckers at Owen Sound were being paid 12½ cents an hour, when they went on strike for 15 cents; 150 men were engaged from about April 1 to Nov. 15, and that about 20 of that number were employed all the year round; the men were allowed overtime. The truckers in the Toronto freight sheds were paid 11½ cents an hour.
