Engineer Rust Thinks Toronto is Liable to a Serious Condition of Affairs Any Hour.

Are in a Confused Shape-A Day at the City Hall.

The St. Lawrence Market improvements are looming up in the City Hall in a con-fused shape again. City Engineer Rust fears a water famine at any hour in Toronto, and gave the following reasons to the Works Committee for the faith that is in him:

The committee will no doubt recoilect that a sun was placed in the estimates for the current year to cover the cost of installing a new pumping engine at this station. I feel it necessary to again urge that immediate steps be taken to obtain this additional pumping plant. Since the spring, Nos. 4 and 5 engines have been running twenty-four hours a day, and No. 1 Worthington practically the same time. The boilers of Nos. 1 and 2 engines are very old, and their usefulness has about expired. No. 1 boiler of No. 1 battery gave out this summer, and all of these boilers may fall at any time. Should this occur when Nos. 4 and 5 are shut down for any purpose, the city would be dependent on No. 2 engine, which is itself in need of considerable repairs. This engine is only capable of pumping ten million gallons of water in twenty-four hours at best, which is not one-half the quantity of water the city requires daily. The result would be a water famine, and a total lack of fire pressure, while the high level district would be left absolutely without water. As I have already reported, the cost of running 4 and 5, owing to their low duty and the high cost of the fuel used viz, anthracite coal. Sufficient money is expended in coal alone to pay the interest and sinking fund on a new engine.

The committee will, therefore, see that there is great danger of a failure in our water supply, unless immediate steps are taken to remedy this state of affairs.

Kingston, Oct. 4.—The General Board of the Methodist Missionary Society, comprising the ministerial and lay representatives from each of the conferences in the Dominion, began its session in this city today. The expenditures were: 180,222,24,48, an increase of \$22,252,41 over the previous year.
