NO ONE TO TAKE FORTRESS

Special Army Will Be Sent From Japan to Attack Port Arthur.

Washington, D.C., June 20.—An explanation of the Japanese ultimatum to the Russian government, especially with reference to Port Arthur, is contained in an article that has reached this city from a source believed to be absolutely reliable. The Japanese ultimatum, which was issued on June 18, is intended to isolate Port Arthur, but do not contain an attack on the place by General Oku's army. The actual work of reducing Port Arthur will be conducted by another Japanese army under the command of General Nogai, which will be landed on the peninsula at a point about 10 miles from Port Arthur, and considerably nearer Port Arthur. On the first of June the Japanese fleet will have been ready at one of the Japanese ports to embark the army, and it is said that the vessels are being readied by the Vladivostok squadron of this number.

CANADA AS A TEACHER.

Harold Spender Thinks That She Can Instruct Great Britain.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, June 20.—Harold Spender contributes an article to The Daily News on Lord Dunsford and the Canadians. He quotes a remark made to him by the chief of the Canadian mission in London, that the attitude of the colonial conference, when he rejected all imperial conference over the world, is a lesson to Great Britain. He says that the Canadians are trying to impose upon the British a complete and absolute defense scheme of the Sir John Brodie kind. That is why Sir John Brodie is so much interested in Lord Dunsford's plans. The latter's apology makes it clear that his dismissal was necessary if Canada was to continue to be a free nation. Canadians twice resisted American invasions without any help from Great Britain. They were impudently sent to officers, whom they have been dismissing wholesale from the war office, to look after these invasions and they have done it with a good deal more to teach us than we can learn from.

GETTING READY FOR THE 12TH.

Excursion Will Come From Buffalo—Parade as Usual.

The County Orange Lodge last night discussed the preparations for the celebration of July 12. Excursions will be run from Buffalo and a large outside parade is expected. The celebration will be much along the lines of last year. The parade will start from the Queen's Park and go to the Exhibition grounds. The work of the local committee is at present on their feet. The arrangements for the day are being completed. The parade will start at 10 o'clock and will be a most successful one.

SIEGE OF A CHATEAU.

Strikers' Desperate Act of Vengeance and a Heroic Defence.

Paris, June 20.—Scenes which recall the terrible days of the Revolution are being acted out at the chateau of Hazebrouck in the north of France, last night. Fully 1500 infuriated workmen stormed the chateau with the object of burning it down and killing its owner. For a few days the men at the chateau worked as if they were on a strike, and as the employer, who lives at the chateau, refused to give in to their demands, they became desperate. They began by firing at the chateau last night, and amid the greatest excitement decided to march on the chateau, burn it down and kill its inhabitants. At 9 o'clock they again met in the market place, and with lighted torches, and flags of straw and canvas, and a banner, formed a body 1500 strong, and marched off towards the chateau, singing the "Marseillaise" and the "Internationale."

The penalty clause was carried on a standing vote of 39 to 26. Mr. Galligher then moved that the committee rise and report progress and ask leave to sit again. Another vote was taken, resulting in 37 to 37, and Chairman McDonald broke the tie by voting against the motion that the committee rise and report progress. The following clause carried on a vote of 41 to 34.

Again Mr. Galligher moved that the committee rise and report progress, his object being to defeat the bill. The motion was defeated on a vote of 35 to 35.

Then the opponents of the bill made a new tack. Hugh Guthrie moved that the bill should come into operation a year hence. The motion was lost.

Mr. Fitzpatrick pleaded that further consideration of the bill be postponed till the minister of inland revenue could be present. The suggestion the house declined to accept.

A vote was then taken on the preamble of the bill which carried on a vote of 41 to 32.

The bill was then reported to the house.

When the motion to adjourn was made in the house late to-night, Mr. Lancaster asked for an assurance from the government that the bill to amend the Steamship Inspection Act would be made a government order.
