Washington, July 10—The story of the remarkable growth of the country's explosives manufacturing industry since the European war started is told in figthe European war started is told in figures made public by the Federal Bureau of Mines, showing a production of explosives last year, exclusive of exports, totaling more than 500,000,000 pounds, au increase of about 44,000,000 over 1915. Statistics of the 1918 output of explosives are not given, but exports were valued at \$188,069,898.

Battering at French Line

London, July 9-Evidently the German high command has decided that France is the weakest link in the allied chain, and is determined to concentrate the most pressure on General Petain's army. The British have been singularly free from enemy attacks recently, and it appears that the Germans have about given up hope of making any very remarkable gains against the British, who are just now in splendid condition and ready for any offensive the Kaiser's chiefs may launch. At the same time the Germans have been hitting sharply on the French front, and today's news is no exception. So far the Teuton attacks have been fruitless, but the crown prince is stubbornly ham-

Rarly yesterday morning the Germans made four separate and simultane ous attacks launched at as many sectors along the Aisne. At several places the French had to give ground before the onrush of the enemy masses, but

generally they maintained their positions.

Around Froidmont farm the Germans pierced the French first line and held their gain for several hours until the battle turned in France's favor. The net result of the enemy's attack is practically nil. He gained nothing, and on the other hand suffered terrible losses. Amsterdam, July 9-The Austrian caibnet, the Lokal Anzeiger
