

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AFFECTING ARE PREDI MARITIMES

Tells of Tariff Reductions Made for Benefit of Consuming Public

PREDICTS VICTORY FOR PARTY IN ELECTION

Charges Meighen With Deception in Attempting Task of Government

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 24—"Far reaching measures of reform, affecting those provinces backed by expert opinion," were predicted by Mr. Mackenzie King at his first meeting in the Maritimes here tonight. The Liberal leader was referring to the two commissions now considering Maritime problems. To the Railway Commission, the last government had assigned the task of revising freight rates and special instructions had been given to consider the claims of the Maritime Provinces in respect to the Intercolonial Rail-way.

At the outset tonight, Mr. King told his audience that from observations of a speaking tour to the Pacific he was able to predict a Liberal victory. The constituency was to be congratulated on the union of Progressive and Liberal forces in the selection of the candidate,

In three successive years, said Mr. King, reviewing the financial record of his government, there were three surpluses in the public accounts of the country. This was done when times were particularly hard. The Liberal leader told of the tariff reductions which had been made for the benefit of those engaged in the basic industries and for the consuming public at large. The only effect of Mr. Meighen's all-round increase of protection would be to increase prices all round. The Liberal party was not in favor of abolishing tariff entirely.

"Some tariff might be essential for the upkeep of some industries," said Mr. King.

The reason the government was able to reduce taxation was bewas able to reduce taxation was be-cause the treasury of the country re-quired less than it did under Conserva-tive administration, said the Liberal leader, in replying to Conservative campaign statements to the effect that the cuts had been made at the expense

the cuts had been made at the expense of the treasury.

The whole customs matter should be investigated by a commission of three judges which would go from coast to coast hearing whatever charges had been made in any port. If the Liberal party was returned the whole affair would be cleaned up.

"It is madness to talk of a general election in time of war, yet that is what Mr. Meighen lays down as his policy," said Mr. King, in dealing with the constitutional question. "How is he going to get a general election if the Governor-General will not grant him a dissolution?"

When Mr. Meighen advised His Excellency that he could form a government he made a statement that was not

"I would say that Mr Meighen did a deceptive thing when he told the Governor-General he could carry on. He knew he could not," said Mr. King. "I have challenged Mr. Meighen to reply to that but he has not done so."

MARITIME RIGHTS The commission on Maritime Rights, he said, had been appointed by the Libreal government.

"Had reciprocity carried, I venture to say that you would not have any Maritime Rights problem at the present time," said Mr. King. "There is a great natural market at your door which you would have today but for the old false Tory cry of disloyalty and appreparation."

What Will The Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King Say Tonight?

1-That the Dominion Government should institute and finance an immediate and aggressive immigration policy specifically for the Maritime Provinces, continuing the same for not fewer than ten consecutive years; and that this policy involve adequate organization both overseas and in the Maritime Provinces.

2-That in the opinion of this conference the Maritime Provinces should be conceded a revision in freight and express rates to modify the disabilities under which they labor in marketing their goods in other parts of Canada, detailed representations concerning which will be made to the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada during the general freight rate investigation now being conducted by that body. (As to this matter, there is needed from the leaders of both parties a binding engagement that any beneficial judgments brought down by the Railway Commission will be implemented by Parliament under the leadership of the party which is dominant after September 14.)

3-Resolved that in the opinion of this conference the equipment of the ports of the Maritime Provinces should not only meet present requirements but be well in advance of those of the future; and that in the interests of the whole country, and as a national undertaking, immediate steps should be taken by the Dominion Government to this end. 4-Resolved that in the opinion of this conference Maritime ex-

porters and importers should, in order to compete in export markets, be granted a substantial reduction in existing rates to the nearest seaport, and the rates so established applied equally to and from Saint John, West Saint John, Halifax, Montreal and Quebec throughout the year. 5-That the Federal Government be urged to make larger annual appropriation for the purpose of developing our fishery resources and for







"It is the Marry-in-Haste People Who Keep the Path to the Divorce Court Hot," Says Dorothy Dix—"It Should Take Six Months Instead of Six Minutes to Get a Marriage License."

THE only way to stop divorces is to keep people from wanting divorces. To reform marriage we must begin at the right end and prevent unwise and unsuitable marriages.



After a couple have got to the point where they hate each other with that complete and absorbing hatred that can only be engendered by enforced companionship, no earthly good is attained by keeping them bound together. They bring out all the worst that is in each other's characters, as a hot poultice brings out the measles, and it doesn't make a bit of difference whether this state of affairs is the result of a deadly sin or deadly boredom. The canker is there, and the only humane thing is divorce—the surgeon's knife that cuts away the festering sore and that gives healthy parts of the heart and soul a chance to live.

BUT it is better to prevent the disease than it is to cure it, and any one who will devise a way of stopping the hasty and idiotic marriages that are foredoomed to end in misery and broken homes will have done society an incalculable benefit.

Many remedies have been suggested. One of the latest is that in every community a commission of five good and intelligent men and women should be appointed who shall pass upon every marriage license and decide whether it shall be issued or not.

OF COURSE this plan will never be adopted, but it has its good points, for all of that. In the first place, while the Matrimonial Committee was debating whether John Jones and Susan Dough had the financial and physical qualifications that entitled them to enter into the holy estate and were temperamentally suited to each other, it would give John and Susan themselves a chance to think it over.

It is the marry-in-haste people who keep the path to the Divorce Court hot. If it took six months instead of six minutes to get a marriage license half of the men and women would change their minds and withdraw their applications before the time was up. And those who still wanted their "glory ticket," as our colored friends say, would prove that the matrimonial knot is not always a slip-knot.

ALSO, the advantages of having the calm and dispassionate opinion of five persons, with a veto power, on a marriage is too obvious to need pointing out. What follies they would save their fellow creatures from committing! What mistakes they would prevent! From what abysses of regret they would yank the unwary! What a life-saving station they would be! For love is a madness that temporarily clouds one's faculties and renders common sense nil and judgment void.

Would such a committee grant dotty grandpa, with his millions, a license to marry a flapper? Not much.

Would they give an elderly widower with six children a legal right to bring trouble home with him in the shape of a wife as young as his own daughter? Nay, verily.

WOULD they let Cholly Addlepate commit himself to paying alimony for life by tying up with an elderly soubrette old enough to be his mother? Not a chance of it!

Would they snatch out of the jaws of disaster the generous-minded youth who is about to enslave himself to the doctor's bill and the sanitarium by marrying a sickly woman? There's not a doubt of it.

Would they head off from certain misery the girl who feels that she has a mission to make a Keely cure of herself by marrying a drunkard? Every time.

Would they write "held up for further consideration" on the back of every marriage license in which a young couple proposed to go and live with their in-laws? They would.

EVERYBODY but the rich old man knows that he is bringing trouble on himself when he marries an 18-year-old instead of a 58-year-old. Everybody knows that the widower's young wife and children will fight. Everybody knows that the drunkard's wife will come whining to the Divorce Court. And everybody knows that virtually every young couple who live with their in-laws are slated for trouble.

What a blessing if there could have been some power that could have saved all of these matrimonial fools from their folly before it took place, instead of trying to rescue them from it when it was too late! For the time comes when men and women look at their marriages through other people's eyes and recognize the plain idiocy displayed in their choice.

If the glamour of love lasted it would be enough to marry on, but it is only a passing illusion. After it is gone there must be something to stay the heart and stomach on or marriage is a failure. There must be suitability and compatibility and bread and butter in the larder. And it is because people so seldom consider these necessities in marriage that so many marriages end in divorce.

OF COURSE, it will be argued that no committee, however wise, could pick out satisfactory husbands and wives for others, because nobody can tell what it is in another human being that fires our fancy. Granted. It is also conceded that every man and woman should be allowed the right to choose his or her own mate. But undoubtedly it would make for the general happiness if this choice could be done under guidance, and it would save them much suffering if they could be kept from committing a matrimonial blunder that every one but themselves could see was bound to end in disaster for them.

But, alas, the one subject about which no one ever takes advice or listens to reason is marrying. Even the experience of others hangs no red lantern at the edge of its pitfalls. Cupid is amenable to none, not even the fool killer, and so the hasty and ill-advised marriage and subsequent divorce are ever with us.





SECTION 5 SUB-SECTION (a) OF THE MOTOR VEHICLE LAW STATES;

It shall be unlawful to carry on a motor vehicle any lighting device of over twenty-one candle power, equipped with a reflector, unless the same shall be so designed, deflected or arranged that no portion of the parallel beam of reflected light when measured seventy-five feet or more ahead of the lamp shall rise above 42 inches from the level surface on which the

2 Every motor vehicle while in use on a public highway shall be provided with good and efficient brakes, also with a suitable bell, horn or other efficient means of signalling, and shall, during the period from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise, display two lamps showing a white light or white lights visible within a reasonable distance in the direction towards which the vehicle is proceeding and a suitable lamp carried on the rear of the vehicle, throwing a white light towards the registered number and a red light directly back of the vehicle. No tail light is required on motor cycles.

SUB-SECTION (b) STATES:

On and after the coming into force of this Act no spot light shall be used unless the same is placed on the right side of the motor vehicle and such spot light shall be so attached as to, at all times, throw its glare towards the right side of the road. The throwing of the glare of the spot light towards the centre of the road or to the left of the driver, so as to interfere with an oncoming vehicle, shall be deemed an offence under this Act and the person guilty thereof shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars.

SUB-SECTION (c) STATES:

The number plate on the front shall be as far forward it distinctly visible, and the number plate on the back shall be so placed that the lower edge thereof shall not be lower than the body of the motor vehicle; provided that this subsection, so far as it relates to the position of the number plate on the back shall not apply to motor trucks or other motor







LLANDOVERY CASTLE TALE IS RECALLED

Tablet Bears Tribute to Nurses Who Died in War

The name of Nursing Sister Anna Irene Stamers, of Saint John, who was drowned with a small group of other wartime heroines while escaping in a lifeboat from the sinking hospitalship Llandovery Castle, torpedoed by a German submarine, is one of those gracing a huge tablet unveiled yesterday in the corridor of the Canadian Parliament, adjoining the main doorway into the House at Ottawa. Sir Henry Drayton, acting Premier, officiated.

CONVENTION CEREMONY The unveiling of a memorial to nurses who gave their lives in war service was most impressive, according to despatches. It was one of the opening ceremonials of the all-Canada convention of the War Nurses' Association. Ottawa is at present being visited by hundreds of wartime nurses from all parts of the Dominion. The convention is to continue several days. Among the delegates are several Sisters belonging to the religious orders of the Catholic church.

THE SAINT JOHN GIRL

Mrs. Lavinia Stamers, mother of the Saint John heroine, and Mrs. John Addy, sister, were present at the ceremony yesterday. Nursing Sister Stamers was a daughter of the late Benjamin A. Stamers who conducted a navigation school here. She secured her nursing training in the General Public Hospital. When war broke out she gave up a lucrative private practice and joined the colors.

THE GREAT TRAGEDY

One of her early appointments was to the staff of the big white hospital liner Llandovery Castle, carrying wounded men from Frence and Belgium to English bases. It was while crossing the infested waters to England that the large ship, though shimmering white and bearing Red Cross markings, was fired upon. It sank quickly and the nurses, who were among the last to leave the vessel, scrambled into a boat swinging from the davits. One report stated the enemy opened fire in the darkness upon the lifeboats once they were successfully floated in the turbulent sea. The incident of the sinking drew from the press of the world expressions of horror. Two Saint John men were in the Llandovery Castle as members of the crew, but were saved.

LOCAL MEMORIALS

Tablets in commemoration of Nursing Sister Stamers' heroic death were afterwards placed in her church and Sunday school, the Central Baptist, and in the Nurses' Home of this city, the latter being subscribed for by the Saint John Nurses' Association.

The Ottawa tablet bears the following inscription in its base in dull old gold letters:

"Treeted by the nurses of Canada, in remembrance of their sisters who gave their lives in the Great War, 1914-1918, and to perpetuate a noble tradition in the relations of the old world and the new.

"Led by the spirit of humanity across the seas, woman by her tender ministrations to those in need has given to the world the example of an heroic service, embracing three centuries of Canadian history."


