Eye-witnesses say that three men or boys, emerging from the woods near Five Fathom Hole, ordered the truck driver to stop, but ignoring this peremptory demand, the man fired, the bullet hitting Garson in the shoulder. It was said there was a woman on the truck also at the time.

EYE-WITNESSES' STORY. The story reaching town today through passengers on Monahan's autobus, which plies between Saint John and St. Stephen, is to the effect that as their bus was stalled on the road, nine or 10 miles out of Saint John, they saw three figures—which at a distance of several hundreds of yards in a hazy rain could not be distinguished as either boys or men—come out of a hazy rain could not be distinguished as either boys or men—come out of the woods and stand by the roadside. MONTREAL, Oct. 14-Leonard Fisheries confirm the statement of A. Brittain of the Maritime Fish Corporation, Ltd., that what is needed to develop our Atlantic fisheries is distribution; and the production will then take care of itself. I talked today with Messrs. Byrne and Matthews, and they were emphatic in declaring that an educational campaign to bring about a larger demand for fish is the great present need; and since it would benefit the dishermen they claim the Government would be as fully justified in devoting money to this cause as to advertising to encourage farmers to standardize their

THEY added, however, that more care should be exercised by fishermen and the smaller shippers in handling and trimming and pack-ing fish, so that the product would be attractive when displayed by the inland retailer. The large corporations, having their own outfit, have rigid rules in this regard, and if the smaller dealers would do the same they would get more for this product. A great improvement has been made in recent years by the big companies with corresponding results



The building is insured for \$20,000, there is \$600 on the furniture in the building, and \$450 on the plane in the public hall. In the city statement of assets the building and land is carried at \$25,847.96.

While no estimate of the loss could be made this morning it was said the replacement cost would be between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

There was no meeting of the City Council this morning, only Commissioners Frink, Bullock and Harding being at City Hall, but an informal discussion on the fire and what had better be done with the building took place. Coommissioner Bullock was of the opinion that as the foundation and lower part of the walls would be in good condition, the walls would be reduced and a new roof put on. In the reconstructed building he would have an assembly hall for the citizens of West Saint John, and possibly some rooms for rental.

The owners of the Empress Theatre license in West Saint John, who were burned out, say that their net-loss will be in the vicinity of \$5,000. There is a comparatively small amount of insurance. The Empress Theatre was first opened as a moving picture place nearly 10 years ago by W. H. Golding and W. C. Smith. Mr. Golding sold his share to Mr. Smith, who later transferred the license to A. C. Smith, Jr., of West Saint John. It was from Mr. Smith the present owners secured the place. Ralph Thorne leased the place, which was managed by Harold Olsen.



Are There Any Girls Left Who Will Resist Kissing? -Why Do Women Prefer Homely Men? - What Manly Qualities Do Women Admire?-Polishing Up Her Uncultured Fiance.

DEAR MISS DIX—I would give half my kingdom, as the saying goes, if I could find a girl who would slap my face when I tried to kiss her. But none of them ever do it. They all "pet" and "neck" and let a man take all sorts of liberties with them; and these girls are not the kind you pick up at dance halls, but the sort I met at chúrch.

What is to become of these girls? Men have no respect for them because they have no respect for themselves.

A PESSIMIST.

ANSWER:

God knows what is to become of these foolish little flappers, but perhaps in His mercy He will save them in spite of themselves. I confess to you that my own heart stands still with fear when I see girls break down every barrier of reserve between the sexes and throw to the winds all the modesty and delicacy that centuries of civilization have built around maidenhood.

I get hundreds and hundreds of letters from girls telling me that it fills them with disgust to have to kiss every Tom, Dick and Harry who shows them any attention whatever, and that their very flesh shudders under the coarse hands that paw them over, but that they have to submit to their indignities or else never have a date and have to spend their evenings solitary and alone at home. They say that if a boy takes a girl to the movies, or to a party, or out riding, that she has to permit these familiarities in payment for what the youth has spent upon her.

To me it seems a frightful price to pay, a sorry bargain for any girl to barter away the bloom of her untarnished maidenhood, to give her self-respect and dignity for an evening's entertainment. I might understand a girl giving herself to a man for the sake of a great passion. But I can't understand a woman's selling herself for diamonds, and pearls, and limousines, and riches, and luxury. Much less can I understand how any girl can hold herself so cheaply as to be willing to buy a few attentions from men for whom she cares nothing at the price of all her fineness and delicacy.

For the girl who lets every man kiss her and fondle her is coarsened and vulgarized. She is no longer the immaculate white bud. She is a rose with mud spattered on it, a rose bruised and stained by the handling of

And the chief fault lies with you men, Mr. Pessimist. You degrade the girl, and then you despise her for it. You make her complacence the price of your attentions, and then you deplore the fact that she pays it. Which isn't just.

DEAR MISS DIX—First. Why do women "fall" for some men, while other men better looking, better dressed and equally intelligent never seem to make a hit? nd. Why do women seem to favor plain men more than good

Third. What qualities do women like in men?

ANSWER:

First. Some men have what we call "a way with them" that ingratiates them at sight with women. It is a question of personal magnetism, and what that consists of nobody knows. My own individual opinion is that it is a little feminine streak in men that gives them an intuitive understanding of women that other men

It is the something in a man that makes him gay and companionable; that makes him notice a woman's dress and the new way she does her hair; that makes him pay her just the little compliments she is hungering to hear; that makes him remember anniversaries and observe little niceties in his conduct with her; that makes him bring back an old woman's youth to her by flattering her and pretending to flirt with her.

But while this kind of man may be universally popular with women, women are not so apt to fall in love with him as they are with the man of a more virile type. They fall in love with the cave man, and he breaks their hearts because he uses cave-man tactics in dealing with them and because he has no manners of the carpet knight.

Second. Women fall in love with homely men oftener than they do with handsome men because, for one thing, they feel that beauty is their own prerogative, and they resent a man's poaching on their preserves.

Also the homely man, knowing he has no beauty, makes more effort to make himself agreeable than the handsome man does. He burns incense at women's feet instead of expecting women to burn incense at his.

Third. The qualities women like in men are manliness, reliability, strength, intelligence, modesty, tenderness, sentiment, fineness of feeling.



School Plans To Carry On Burbank's Work

PLANS are being made by Leland Stanford University to take over and perpetuate the work of Luther Burbank, famous throughout the world as "the plant wizard."

Burbank has been carrying on his work for over 50 years. Most of it was done upon a 18-acre farm at Sabestopol, Sonoma county, Calif.

He is now an old man and for two years has been getting the farm into shape to turn over to some recognized scientific organization. According to William G. McAdoo, a member of the special committee handling the matter for Stanford University, the university plans to raise a special endowment fund which will make it possible for research workers to continue Burbank's experiments indefinitely.

The Sebastopol farm at the present time includes more than 18,000 hybrid walnut trees, over 1,000 new hybrid plum and prune trees and many varieties of new hybrid cherry trees.



ARCTIC RADIO PLANT OPENED BY CANADA

"Cat-Eyed Lil"

Will Send Messages From Mouth of Mackenzie River.

Canadian Press Despatch

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 14-The Arctic Circle is now in daily touch with civilization, through the formal opening to the public by the Department of Interior and Department of National Defence, of the most northerly commercial radio station in Canada.

This station is located at Aklavik, at the mouth of the Mackenzie River. and lies 1,300 miles north of Edmonton and 125 miles beyond the Arctic

The new station, in conjunction with others in the north, will supply a communication service for the northwest Arctic and the Mackenzie basin, and will undoubtedly, it is said, prove of great value to the many trading and transportation companies operating in that district. The country, it is pointed out, is very rich in furs, the yearly export running into many hundreds of thousands of dollars. There are also evidence of rich mineral deposits, but this resource has yet to be developed.

The oil wells at Fort Norman, 300 miles south of Aklavik, are already being developed, it is officially stated, and fuel oil and gasoline can now be obtained locally practically within the Arctic circle.







FULL DEVELOPMENT LIKELY IN 25 YEARS

Canada Visioned Getting Fuel Independence Over U. S.

MONTREAL, Oct. 14—Leading engineers of Canada and the United States, delegates to the convention here of the American Society of Civil Engineers, today staged an argumentative battle on the subject mentative battle on the subject of the exportation of Canadian waterpower to the United States.

The discussion followed remarks by Ira W. McConnell, vice-president of the Dwight P. Robinson Company, of New York, who endeavored to show that this exportation would be beneficial to both nations, arguing that there are hundreds of millions of kilowatt hours "running to waste" every year in Canada. To this assertion Julian C. Smith, vice-president of the Shawinigan Water and Power Company, replied that there is no waste so long as no development and no

WOULD BUILD UP U. S. provide the United States with a sup-ply of low priced energy which would serve to build up industrial communi-ties in direct competition with Cana-

PREDICTS DEVELOPMENT. Mr. Smith said also, if the combined power requirements of the Provinces of Quebec and Ontario are met without regard for provincial distance of the International boundary will be underf development within 25 years to meet wholly requirements, so that within a generation Canada, instead of having surplus power, would be contending with serious power shortages. In conclusion Mr. Smith said: "If the most desirable and largest water power sites in Central Canada are developed primarily for exportation purposes, the industrial progress of this country will be thwarted. It will never be possible to recover such power."

WOULD CONSERVE COAL Mr. Smith said also, if the combin

WOULD CONSERVE COAL.

Defending the exportation of Canadian power to his country, Mr. Mc-Connell said that it would conserve coal and diminish the amount of labor employed in the United States in expersing power rather than reduce employed in the United States in generating power rather than reduce the cost of power. Waste of United States coal is detrimental to Canada as well as to the United States, he contended, because Canada now imports 22,000,000 tons for use in connection with the development of only 15 per cent. of the water power in Quebec and Ontario, so that it might need to import 150,000,000 tons if all water power were developed and used internally.

COAL CHANGES SOUGHT.

Mr. Smith answered this argument by stating that while it was generally known how indebted to the United States thet Provinces of Quebec and Ontario were for consideration during critical times of coal shortages, the Canadian government's federal fuel board was endeavoring to reduce coal importations by suitable coking of bituminous coals, by the importation of British coal, by a more extensive use of Canadian coals from the Western and Marltime provinces, and by the substitution of hydro for steam generathed energy. He believed that gradually the two provinces were becoming less and less dependent on United States fuels.

"The people of Canada would indeed be in a sorry plight if in 25 years hence their continued industrial development and domestic comfort were not only dependent upon the availability of U. S. coal, but also on the return of their own exported hydro power," said Mr. Smith.

After a wait of several hours, he went to their home and found his wife, who had returned. Screams aroused the neighbors and the police who forced an entrance, found Mrs. Winters dead with three stab wounds and her husband bleeding from a self-inflicted injury. The police say he confessed to the murder.







Within a few minutes the fire spread through the interior of the building and it was not long before long tongues of flame were shooting through the roof. When this caved in the blaze had everything its own way and the efforts of the West Side fire department, aided by one of the motor chemical pumps from the city proper, were largely confined to preventing a spread of the conflagration.

One or two other places in the neigh-orhood caught fire from the flying barks but these slight blazes were safly extinguished. All the places on the east side of the burning building were wet down thoroughly with water. 3 Will Stand Trial

STARTED IN FILM.





PROFESSOR GASSED ON DISCOVERY EVE

Seeking Insecticide That Would be Harmless to Human Lungs.

LONDON, Oct. 15—An important advance in scientific knowledge is believed to depend on the recovery of Professor Howard Maxwell Lefroy, now lying unconscious at St. George's

now lying unconscious at St. George's Hospital.

Saturday evening he was working in his "secret room" in the Imperial College of Science and Technology, at South Kensington, when he was overcome with gas and pulled out just in time to save his life. This is the second time this year Lefroy has been gassed while at work, and this time his assistants believe he was on the eve of a great discovery. He is a professor of

entomology and for some years has been searching for an insecticide which, while fatal to insect life, would be innocuous to human lungs.


He has been experimenting with lewiste, which would have been used in the war if it had continued a few weeks longer, and is considered the last word in destructive gases. 





