ROBBER BAND IN AUTOS HOLD UP CHICAGO FLYER; STEAL REGISTERED MAIL

Guns and Bombs Used in Spectacular Raid-Clerks Compelled to Pick Out Valuable Pouches at Command of Robber Chief-All Make Getaway.

(United Press.) Chicago, Ill., June 13.-Forty-two sacks of registered mail, containing cash and bonds estimated at between \$1,000,000 and \$2,500,000, were seized last midnight by a band of between 20 and 25 men, who held up the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul mail train near Rondout, Ill., 30 miles north of Chicago. Gas bombs were used by the bandits on two cars when the mail clerks refused to open the doors. The bandits worked for more than an hour sorting out the mail sacks. The police said one of them was shot accidentally by a comrade. After the robbery the bandits

sped away in automobiles. Hundreds of police and citizens armed with shotguns and other weapons, searched the territory between Chicago and Mil-

FUSILADE OF SHOTS

A little before midnight, as the mail train approached Rondout, someone pulled the signal cord. When the train was stopped, a band of men rushed out of the darkness, some firing revolvers. Bullets crashed through the windows of several cars and whistled about the ears of the engine crew.

The train was made up of 11 cars, the third from the engine carrying most of the loot. When the car crew, consisting of Jacob Weiss, T. A. Johnston, F. M. Cunningham and R. M. Peterson, refused to open the doors, a fusilade of shotgun and revolver fire was turned on the car. Then a tear gas bomb was hurled in. The heavy fumes drove the crew out.

A second car was entered in the same way. The bandits forced the clerks to sort out the sacks and deliver the money sacks. In the meantime other members of the gang kept guard over the train crews, while still others of the robbers ransacked the remaining cars. Sometime after midnight the bandits, using several automobiles, speed away.

Leader Orders Certain Sacks.

The pouches sought were found only in the middle coach. The leader of the robbers, a stocky fellow, wearing a gray suit, donned a gas mask and forced one on the chief mail clerk to the car.

"I strongly advocate, in addition to commercial union, particularly with the British West Indies, that the Government either make over ships of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, or purchase or lease other ships to provide cold storage, which is absolutely necessary for the tropical trade," added Mr. Logan.

Mr. Logan advocated the placing of Canadian trade agents in all the larger islands, and also free admission through Canadian sea and river ports of all goods coming to Canada from these southern countries.

He finally suggested that the Minister of Trade and Commerce and the Minister of Railways with representatives of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and of farmers and producers' associations and newspaper men should visit the West Indies at an early date and become acquainted with the situation and conditions.

The former undertook to prove that even if the rates the Canadian Government Marine charged were fifty percent. more than they were they would still not pay. He said the company lost nine millions last year, and it was about time that the Government woke up to the fact that they should get clear of them. We should have at least 15 knot boats on the route to compete with the United Fruit Company. When the Government built our boats they never considered what they were going to do with them. They were no good for Canadian trade and he advocated selling them and investing a few millions in ships suitable for this trade.

W. A. Black of Halifax said he did not think any member of the House would put anything in the way of any arrangement with the West Indies which would be for the benefit of Canada and particularly to the maritime provinces. To carry out what was in the mind of the member for Cumberland would be very expensive. It would require quite a number of lines of steamers. We could not undertake to trade with Cuba if we coupled another island with it. The same would apply to Porto Rico, to Haiti and to San Domingo. Those islands would probably require two separate lines of steamers. The United States controlled their trade to a large extent and Canada could not obtain any privileges there.

Member Takes Part.

Ottawa, June 12.—A plea for the development of trade between Canada and the West Indies was made by H. J. Logan, Liberal member for Cumberland, this afternoon when the estimates of the Trade and Commerce Department were taken up.

He said that for the year ending March 31, 1924, the total trade of the West Indies with the United States and Canada amounted to \$859,701,689. Of this amount, the trade with the United States totalled \$814,703,260, and with Canada but \$54,998,429.

Imports from the West Indies to the United States in 1923 were valued at \$483,428,475. In the same year imports into Canada from the West Indies amounted to \$35,592,096, while exports from Canada were valed at only \$19,406,333. The increase in United States trade with the West Indies amounted to \$224,197,599, or nearly 40 per cent., while the increase in Canada's trades was but eight per cent.

"I advocate the cancellation of the present trade agreement between Canada and the West Indies, and entering into a new arrangement of commercial union, such as exists between the United States and her tropical possessions, said Mr. Logan. He stated that the United States maintained more than 70 consular agents in the West Indies, who are realy trade agents, while Canada maintains only two trade agents in the West Indies.



L. A. Taschereau, Premier of the province, declared here yesterday.

Referring indirectly to the difficulty experienced in securing a jury in the Banque d'Hochelaga murder trials at Montreal, the Hon. Mr. Taschereau, admitting that every man has a right to his own opinion in a free country, nevertheless took full responsibility as Attorney-General of the province for this statement: "Montreal must be protected. We have a reputation to keep up here and we do not want statistics to show that it is in the Province of Quebec that the most crimes are committed and repression is the least effective." He asked for the support of public opinion to aid the Department of Justice in applying the law.

The Hon. Mr. Taschereau's speech made a deep impression, revealing as it did the official view of the recent experience in the Montreal Court of King's Bench. The Premier spoke at a banquet organized by the County of Terrebone and the Town of St. Jerome following inauguration of the court house erected here, now that St. Jerome has become the chef-lieu of the judicial district of Terrebonne.

Financial Budget

W. B. Snowball of Chatham presented the report of the finance committee. The budget for the voluntary funds of the whole church this year is as follows: Missionary, \$1,225,000; educational, \$150,000; evangelism and social service, \$75,000; religious education, \$40,000; church and parsonage aid fund \$5,250. Total, \$1,495,250.

The assessable funds are superannuation fund from circuits and missions, \$260,000; from ministers and probationers, \$140,000; general conference fund, \$48,000; total \$449,000.

The total budget of the departments for next year is \$1,943,250. This is a little less than \$4.80 per member.

Reference was made to the remarkable liberality by which the funds of the church had been sustained, particularly through this period of financial stringency in some parts of the country. But while the aggregate seemed large. It would be very easily obtainable under the tithing system. This system, the report stated, was recommended strongly not only because it would remove friction from the financial machinery of the church, but because it would return in spiritual blessing to those who practiced it.

Apprecaition of the splendid management evidenced in the carrying on of the St. John Municipal Home was voiced yesterday afternoon by the visiting members of the city and municipal manner, and the Board of Commissioners was indeed a most capable body of business men. 


