



Chicago, Sept. 7—With the railway shopcrafts policy committee of ninety summoned to meet in Chicago next Monday, hope of an early or partial settlement of the rail strike was in the U. S. renewed today.

These hopes were founded on principally the call for the union's policy committee meeting and statements by strike leaders of the possibility of separate agreements with 52 of the Class A roads, representing approximately 85,000 miles.

Meanwhile labor leaders in the east joined in demands for the impeachment of Attorney-General Daugherty and Judge Wilkerson because of the injunction.

Although talk of a general strike of organized labor as a forcible protest against the injunction was persistent at Atlantic City, members of the executive council expressed opposition to such a sourse, declaring that "public sentiment was sufficient to win the battle."

THE CANADIAN RAILWAYS ACCEPT; MEN MAY FIGHT

Ottawa, Sept. 7—Acceptance of the award of the board of conciliation in the main shopmen's dispute and announcement of intention to put into effect the recommendations of the board have been received by the labor department from he C. P. R., Canadian National and Grand Trunk railways.

Toronto, Sept. 7—James Simpson, the shopmen's member of the board of conciliation, believes the 80,000 affected employes will fight the majority award. He submitted a minority award which stated that the board did not properly inquire into the wage reduction.

Soubrette, Headed for a Star Part, Suicides Over Sweet-


New York, Sept. 7. — What Lillian Gay, a nineteen-year-old soubrette at the National Winter Garden Theatre, on the east side, intended as a gesture to frighten her sweetheart caused her death when she swallowed a bottle of "Cinderella" fluid, used by actresses to keep silver slippers shimmering. She knew that the fluid contained potassium cyanide, according to her sister, Mildred, a chorus girl in the same company, but she did not know that one drop of the poison is enough to kill five men.

She had just finished the morning rehearsal, and her singing and dancing were so vivacious that the manager, Nick Elliott, and Morton Minsky, one of the owners of the theatre, were about to offer her a star part in their new show. While these two and a group of performers were predicting a meteoric Broadway career, she stepped out on the fire-escape, which looks down on Houston street, and saw by the curb the motor car of her sweetheart, Dominick Russo, known as the east side Valentine. There was no one in the car, but.

ton street, and saw by the curb the motor car of her sweetheart, Dominick Russo, known as the east side Valentino. There was no one in the car, but, with significant pantomline, she lifted the bottle to her lips, shrieked and staggered into the theatre.

Russo, who is about twenty-three years old, was called up from the lobby soon after the stricken girl had been carried into an upstairs office and physicians sent for. When he saw her he wept and beat his head against the wall. He said that they had quarreled because he had delayed in getting a diamond ring he had promised for her birthday, two weeks ago, and that some one had been circulating reports that he had been going around with other women. Ten minutes later the girl died, and Russo tried to hurl himself out of the sixthstory window. Down in the lobby he tried to snatch a revolver from a policeman in order to kill himself.

Miss Gay and Russo, who is a jewelry solesman, had been friends for two vears, according to Manager Elliott. She lived at 104 Emmett street, Newark, and went home every night with Russo in his car. According to the dead girl's sister, Mildred, they quarreled frequently, but quickly made up.

Pay \$6.84 in An Ontario Hydro Town for Current That Would Cost \$43.69 Here

Four Dollars For Electricity That Would Cost \$24.27 at Rates Charged by New Brunswick · Power Company—A Striking Statement by Engineer Kribs That Should be Read Carefully by Every Consumer in St. John.

Gordon Kribs, Electrical Engineer for the New Brunswick Electric Power sion, yesterday gave out the following statement on rates for electricity in force in the Ontario hydro area which will no doubt be of absorbing interest to the consumers of electricity in St. John. The comparison between Ontario rates and those being charged by the N. B. Power Company should stimulate the full advantage of the opportunity to secure the Musquash current at cost. For instance, Mr. Kiths shows how one consumer in a certain Ontario town who uses all kinds of electrical appliances pays from \$4.00 to \$6.84 a month for electricity which at the N. B. Power Company's rate would cost from \$24.27 to \$43.69 a month. The cost for a similar service in St. John, with the Musquash

fifteen or twenty kilowatt hours of electricity for use in the the home,

Under the high rates, at present in force, this would undoubtedly be the case, but it has been the experience of the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario that as the rate per kilowatt hour is reduced the individual consumer uses more electricity. He finds that it is less expensive to use electricity than gas for cooking. He finds that it costs so little to use the electrical conveniences designed to lighten the burden of the housewife that he purchases and uses them.

Electric irons, toasters, coffee percolators, vacuum cle machines, air and water heaters, cooking ranges and numerous other devices are being used in Ontario homes. Electric stoves for cooking are being installed in such large numbers that the manufacturers are hardly able to keep up with the demand. This is all due to the low do rates in force in the Ontario hydro municipa

As an example of the increase in the use of electricity in the home der the influence of reasonable rates we might cite the case of the city of London, Ontario, which has the same population as St. John.

It will be thus seen that in 1920 the average user in London used as much electricity in his home as the largest user in St. John. In other words none but the wealthiest people of St. John can afford to use household appliances which the ordinary household user in London has come

In the Ontario municipality mentioned above the rates in force in 1913 were 4c, per 100 sq. feet floor area and 4.5c, a k. w. hr, and they are now reduced to 3c, per 100 sq. feet floor area with a k. w. hr, charge of 3c, and 1.5c.
