ASSESSMENT LAWS.

Correspondents in the St. John papers are busy controverting over the assessment law of that city, no two of them agreeing in anything, but all are in union that there is much room for amendment. This is perhaps the most difficult question with which a free people have always had to deal, not only in St. John, but the world over—but ever since the decree issued by Augustus Caesar, that "all the world should be taxed," and which has been religiously kept ever since, there has not been a person found yet who declared that he should not be overlooked—but any number to assert that they alone have been the victims of the most dire oppression by the assessors. But any assessment law in the world has always been a problem which the wisest have been unable to solve, or to the satisfaction of a living soul. The complaint generally is not that the individual himself has been over-rated, but that his neighbor has been under-rated, and therefore he is making good the deficiency and against which he is determined to kick no matter who he hurts. The study of a law in which everybody had a finger in the making, would be highly interesting, but would it be possible for any two men to agree in the preparation of any law? Doubtful! When the present Judge King was in the legislature he brought in a bill for unifying as much as possible the Assessment Laws of the province. Instead of taxing real estate and personal property at one-fifth of their value, and income at its face, he would place all on the same footing—the same as income at the face, and he excepted from his measure St. John and Fredericton, unless of their own motion they might think proper to adopt the act, which St. John afterwards did. This method perhaps is a fair one, but Fredericton has not up to this time thought proper to fall in with it. But the great difficulty in St. John does not appear to be so much with the law as it is in the ways of carrying it out. One of the writers says he is assessed unjustly upon his interests in bank stocks, bonds, vessels, cash in hand on a certain fixed day, besides his real and personal estate. As nearly all the first named properties are invisible to the assessors, they rest their motion operandi largely upon their imaginations or perhaps more properly speaking upon their belief which their calls of office require them. The aggrieved parties, however, it is asserted, would have no cause for complaint if they would comply with the terms of the law in advance, viz.: by handing into the assessors under oath a written declaration of all the property they possess of whatever description, for their guidance and direction in making up their lists. But in answer to this it is pleaded that no man can tell what he is worth at a given time—the interest upon his mortgages may not be forthcoming, or the value of the mortgage itself greatly deteriorated if the property were placed on the market in depressed times—his bonds in the same manner may be unyielding or at a discount—and so with all his other floating properties, and as the law is explicit and strict, the man feels that his conscience will not allow him to swear that he is worth half that. Here then is the difficulty on both sides.

It has been frequently mooted that as the object of the law is to get at every one who is able to pay according to his ability, why not place everything under the head, Income and Rental, pure and simple; and we notice that one of the St. John writers suggests this very same plan. While no doubt there are objections to this and one incapable of giving more general satisfaction than the present system, it may not be time misspent if we lay before our readers the substance of the plan proposed.

Now at present every man is liable to taxation according to his means; but many persons, it is said, escape on income altogether, hence the deficiency falls upon real and personal estate, which are supposed to have fixed value. If, then, it is said everything were based on income and rental the business would be much simplified and no one could escape, for every person must have an income in order to live, and the amount of it can be got at by his style of living and what is considered his reputed wealth. The Parliamentary committee has decided not to make a contest in Kilkenny.

The loss to Philadelphia vessel owners caused by the recent storm is estimated at \$900,000 at least.

Rev. Frederick H. A. Scriver, I. L. D., D. C. L., the noted biblical and Greek scholar is dead.

Michael Davitt has declined to contest the seat for North Kilkenny, as he believes he will be more useful outside of parliament till the general election occurs.

Annie Allen, of Warrior, Ala., yesterday shot and killed Henry Low at that place. The girl who fifteen years old, claims that Low attempted to outrage her.

The "Ketch Viceroy" has been wrecked near the St. Ives coast, Cornwall. The crew and the boat with a corpse of a man on board was found on her way back.

A dispatch announces the death of ex-Governor Samuel W. Hale at Brooklyn, N. Y., at the residence of his brother, Henry A. Hale. His age was 68 years and 6 months.

The railways of India at the commencement of the present year aggregated 14,177 miles in operation, with 1,272 miles under construction. The increase during the previous year was 615 statute miles, or 87,719 feet. Throughout the world there are 4,416 associations, with 389,169 members.

Two children of Robert Newhall, of Birton, Man., while alone in their parents' house, found a package of gunpowder which they ignited. The explosion set fire to the house, and both children perished in the flames.

A passenger train of two coaches went to the Birmingham railroad Tuesday night and was entirely consumed. All the passengers broke through the windows and escaped unhurt. A passenger train on the road between London and Greenock, France, left the rails at Moran, it is supposed owing to a defect in the machinery. The train rolled over the embankment 40 feet high. Fifteen were killed and 50 injured, three of whom probably fatally and fifteen others critically.

A steady but high wind from the west of Mexico, recently, for the benefit of the President of the Republic, was at the head of the committee in the Queen office. The total loss will amount to about \$40,000.

DIABETES CURED.

Malina Sufferer Another Case From Fire of About \$40,000.

Early Tuesday morning the night watchman in James Dempster & Co.'s planning mill discovered a fire in the mill a short distance from the boiler room. Something being wrong with the alarm it was half an hour before the fire was discovered. The engines were on hand, and the fire had made such headway that the whole sky was brilliantly illuminated. The battle with the flames had lasted less than two hours when the proprietor immediately to the north and south where the mill was situated & Co. cannot account for the origin of the fire. This is the third time the loss has been burned out. They estimate the loss at \$25,000. The only insurance on the mill was \$5,000 in the Queen office. The total loss will amount to about \$40,000.
