FOUNDED 1829.

The College was founded in 1829, after the model of the great Public Schools of England, and continues to be carried on with special regard to the inculcation of high moral principle with sound scholarship, which is the ideal aimed at in those institutions.

Maps and models of the highest excellence are provided, the philosophical apparatus for the elucidation of lectures on Physiology and Natural Philosophy is amply sufficient, while a Laboratory, with all the necessary appliances, enables pupils to become practically acquainted with the science of Chemistry.

A carefully selected Library and a well-furnished Reading-room are open to

the pupils.

A spacious covered Gymnasium, equipped with all the modern appliances, and extensive cricket and play-grounds, adjoin the building, and an open-air skating

rink and a toboggan slide, are provided for winter sports.

The temperature of each class-room is carefully regulated, and the most recent improvements in school furniture are adopted; in short, everything is done to secure the health and comfort of the pupils, and to maintain the high position Upper Canada College holds among the educational institutions of the Dominion.

DISCIPLINE.

The Masters and Pupils assemble in the College Hall every morning at nine, when the College is opened by reading a portion of the Holy Scriptures and prayers; the various classes then retire with their Masters to their Class-rooms.

A course of Scripture Lessons is prescribed for the junior classes; but should any parent or guardian state to the Principal that he has a conscientious objection to his son or ward being present at Prayers or Scripture Lessons, the pupil's presence will not be required.

The course of instruction is so arranged in each year as to prepare and strengthen

the minds of the pupils for the severer work which follows in the next

The system of discipline is such as to call forth only the kindlier feelings of our nature, and to incite the pupils to good conduct and steady application by motives similar to those by which our conduct in after life is regulated. The pupils are gradually and almost insensibly led to form habits of forethought and self-control, and of punctuality and exactness in the discharge of every duty, by feeling on every-side a moderate but steady pressure to keep them in the path of duty. The various honors also are made to depend on good conduct as well as on sound schelarship. Minute reports of the conduct, application, and progress of each pupil, showing his rank in his form, are regularly furnished every six weeks, or weekly, or even daily, if desired. The Principal visits the classes, and frequently subjects them to an examination, both oral and written, on the work done under the various masters.

The Principal will gratefully receive from parents or guardians any suggestions regarding the character and treatment of their sons or wards, and earnestly solicits their hearty co-operation.

EXAMINATIONS.

In addition to examinations held at various times during the session in the different forms, there is a General Promotion Examination, which is held towards the end of June, and immediately precedes the Midsummer Holidays. The pupils who fail at the Promotion Examination, in any or all of the subjects, may, if it be desired, be re-examined, at the opening of the College, in September.

EXHIBITIONS.

Five exhibitions in each of the Departments of Classics, Mathematics, Modern Languages, Science, and General Proficiency in the Fourth and Fifth Forms respectively are competed for annually. The holder of an Exhibition is entitled to free tuition for the year next ensuing the winning of the same. The Examiners for Exhibitions are unconnected with the College.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The College can accommodate from 300 to 350 pupils; and already over 8,000 of the youth of the Province have received their education, in whole or in part, within its walls. Though it is capable of containing so many pupils, the number in each class is strictly limited, in order that the pupils may thus enjoy the combined advantages of private and public school education, and that, by the strictest attention being paid to the peculiar disposition of each pupil, he may be not only imbued with the principles of a high morality, but led to exemplify these no daily life. This desirable object is further secured by the boys being under partial supervision in the play-ground.

The College is divided into Six Forms or Grades, and the regular curriculum extends over a course of six years; though, by steady application and hard study, some boys are able to pass through the Six Forms in five or even four years.

The full curriculum embraces an extended course in Latin, Greek, Mathematics, French, German, English Grammar, Literature and Composition, History and Geography, both ancient and modern, Experimental Chemistry, Physiology, Physics, Botany, Biblical Knowledge, the usual Commercial Branches, with Drawing, Music, Gymnastics, Fencing and Drill Exercises.

Pupils may enter at any time, and at any period of the course; though the best time to enter is at the commencement of the session in September, when the classes are organized for the year.

ENTRANCE QUALIFICATION.

The qualification for admission into the First or Lowest Form is the possession of a fair knowledge of English Reading, Spelling, Writing, and the first Four Rules of Arithmetic. Pupils ought to enter the First Form at about ten or eleven years of age, though they may be received at an earlier age, if qualified, as systematic

early training is very important.

Applicants for admission to the higher forms are subjected, if necessary, to an examination corresponding to the form for which their previous general studies may have fitted them. If above fourteen years of age, they are required to present a certificate of good meral character from the Head Master of the school last attended by them.

FIRST FORM.

The First Form begins the study of Latin. The pupil learns in this year the principal portions of the Latin Accidence; while at the same time, he is occupied in translating short sentences from English into Latin, and from Latin into English. Under the English Master, he is exercised in the Literature lessons of the Fourth Reader, Writing, English Grammar, Elocution, Spelling, Dictation, Composition; he studies also the outlines of Canadian History, the Map of the World, and the Geography of Canada and the United States. In Arithmetic he is trained to minute accuracy in the Simple and Compound Rules, Tables of Weights and Measures, and Fractions; Mental Arithmetic is a daily exercise. He also begins the study of French. In this form great importance is attached to teaching the pupil how to prepare his lessons at home. For the home preparation of lessons an hour will generally be required.

SECOND FORM.

When promoted to the Second Form, the pupil continues under one of the Classical Masters, his Latin Studies, by reading extracts from Phædrus, Cornelieus Nepos, etc., and by continuing the translation of English into Latin, with daily repetitions in Grammar. In English he is still drilled under English Masters, in the Literature lessons of the Fourth Reader in Reading, Spelling, Dictation, Grammar and Composition. He now begins the systematic study of the Public School History of England and continues the study of the History of Canada. To Modern Geography he devotes two lessons per week, and learns the leading facts, both physical and political, of North and South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, and Oceanica. He also reviews the Geography of the Dominion of Canada and of the United States. Under the Mathematical Masters he reviews the work of the preceding year in the Simple and Compound Rules, and is exercised in the Greatest Common Measure, Least Common Multiple, and Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, while Mental Arithmetic forms daily exercise. He begins the study of Algebra in the Winter Term, and masters the four Elementary Rules. Having, in the First Form, overcome to some extent the difficulties of French pronunciation, he now begins the systematic study of the French Grammar. At the same time he is exercised in the French Reader. In this Form the older pupils may substitute Book-keeping for Writing, if they are otherwise qualified to enter upon that subject. To avoid crowding, the Second Form is, like the First, divided into two parallel divisions, A and B, doing substantially the same work. Division B is generally composed of the older boys of the form.

In this form, as in the First, great importance is attached to teaching the pupil how to prepare his lessons at home. Two hours are generally required for the home preparation of lessons.

THIRD FORM.

When promoted to the Third Form the pupil continues his classical studies by reading such authors as Casar. Exercises in Latin Composition and Latin Grammar are regularly prescribed. The Grammar is revised, and much additional information is imparted, suitable to the increased knowledge of the pupil. The study of the Greek language is now begun, and he is made familiar with the Grammar to the end of the regular verbs in μ_t , while he is occupied with various Grammatical exercises. This subject is optional: those who take it need not take French and German; those who omit it must take French in this form, and both French and German in the higher forms. In English he studies the Literature lessons of the High School Reader and is practised in English Elocution, Spelling, Diotation, Grammar and Composition. In British History, he begins, after a brief resume, where he left off in the Second Form, and completes the Public School History of

England and Canada. In Modern Geography he carefully revises the work of the preceding year—much information being added, both physical and political; and studies minutely the maps of Europe and NorthAmerica. In Arithmetic, under the First or Second Mathematical Master, the work of the two previous years is revised, while he is made familiar with the Unitary Method, Percentage, Conversion of Currencies, the Metric System, and Miscellaneous Examples, involving a knowledge of Arithmetic generally. In Algebra the First Four Rules are revised, and he is practised in G.C. M., L.C. M. and Factors. The study of Euclid is entered upon, and the first 15 or 20 Propositions of the First Book mastered. In French the lessons consist of oral exercises, Composition, Dictation, Bué's First French Book and easy prose. Writing, as in the First and Second Forms, continues to be a regular part of the Third Form work. In this form as in the two previous forms, regular part of the Third Form work. FOURTH FORM.

In the Fourth Form the Classics read are, in Latin, a selection from Virgil and Cæsar, or an oration of Cicero, and in Greek, a portion as Xenophon's Anabasis, while there are frequeut exercises in Latin Composition, and in the Latin and Greek Grammars. Instruction is given in Roman History from the beginning of the First Punic War to the Death of Augustus, in Ancient Geography (Italia and Greecia), and in Antiquities. The pupil's studies in English Grammar and Composition are advanced; he also reads, critically, one of the English Classics prescribed for junior matriculated irto the University. In Modern History he is made conversant with the periods of the Tudors and the Stuarts, and with the History of the Literature of the same periods; and, in Modern Geography, he is made minutely acquainted with the various countries of North America, including the West Indies. Arithmetic he enters upon advanced work, and revises that already done; while in Algebra he reads McLellan's Elements to the end of chapter xiii., and in Euclid he completes and revises the First Book, and adds the Second, with easy problems to ensure an accurate knowledge of both Books. In French, he continues the oral exercises, conversation, dictation, translation of easy sentences into French, reads Souvestre, Un Philosophe sous les Toits, (chap. i. iii.), and uses De Fivas Grammar for the study of systematic Grammar. German is begun in this year, and considerable progress made therein. Writing, Book-keeping, Commercial Arithmetic, and Commercial forms are also taught.

A detailed minute Return of the Fourth Form work will be found in the Upper Canada College Exhibition Circular, to which intending competitors for Exhibitions are referred.

SUMMARY.

During these four years the pupil remains mainly with the same Classical, the same French and German, and the same Writing and Book-keeping Master; and during the last two or perhaps three years he has remained under the same English Master. If he has been diligent, and has accordingly passed the necessary Promotion Examinations in June, he has acquired a good knowledge of the elements of Latin and Greek; he is also well acquainted with some of the great English Classics, and knows somewhat of the English Language and Literature; he has made a special study of the Histories of the British and of the Roman Empire; he has been carefully led over the principal countries of the world, and has acquired a knowledge of many facts and principles of Physical and Political Geography; and he has been practised in most of the rules of Arithmetic, and taught to apply them. In Algebra and Euclid he has received valuable training, and in French he is able to read any ordinary author, while a solid ground-work has been laid in German to ensure rapid progress in the ensuing year.

In the Fifth Form the Classics read are Ovid, Virgil, Cicero, Cæsar, Xenophon, and Homer; while the Greek and Latin Grammars are again carefully revised, and numerous exercises are exacted in Greek and Latin Prose Composition, as tests of the accuracy of the pupil's knowledge. To the work in Ancient History, already detailed, is added a portion of Grecian History and the minute Physical and Political Geography of Italia, Greeia, and Asia Minor. In Modern History, the reigns from William and Mary to George III., inclusive, are studied, together, with the lives and writings of the leading literary men of the same period. In Modern Geography, Europe and North America are reviewed. In English, a careful study is made of the Pass Matriculation Work of the University (which is the same in all departments as that required by the Law Society), while English Grammar is made the basis of the study of Comparative Philology, the knowledge acquired by the pupil of the Classical and of the Modern Languages being brought to bear on the study of the Science of Grammar. English Composition and Literature are still prosecuted.

The whole of the Arithmetic is reviewed both in the Fifth and Sixth Forms, and McLellan's Algebra read, and, according to the ability of the pupils, supplemented by his exercises in Algebra. In Euclid, from four to six books are learned, and the knowledge acquired is tested by numerous problems and written exercises. In French, the whole of De Fivas Grammar is reviewed, and the pupil's knowledge is made as thorough as possible by frequent practice in translating into French; Corneille (Horace), Bennachose (Lazare Hoche), or some other similar French author, is read. French conversation continues part, of the regular work. In German, the pupil's grammatical knowledge is enlarged, and he reads one of Schiller's works. He also practices translating into English at sight easy passages

from Latin, Greek, French, and German authors.

A more fully detailed statement of the Fifth Form work will be found in the U. C. College Exhibition Circular, to which intending competitors for Exhibitions and candidates for admission to the Sixth Form are referred.

SIXTH FORM.

In the Sixth Form the pupil reads Virgil, Cicero, Horace, Ovid, Cæsar, Livy, Xenophon, Homer, Demosthenes, etc. In the Modern Languages he makes a similar advance in reading Lamartine, Souvestre, Cerneille, Dumas, Schiller, Grimm, etc. The whole Grammar of the Classical and the Modern Languages is studied more minutely, and great attention is paid to translation into, and translation at sight from these languages. In English he studies Composition, Philology, critically analyses certain poems, and reads the Constitutional Histories of Great Britain, Greece and Rome, with frequent reference to those of the United States and Canada. The work done in Classical and Modern Geography, and Mathematics, has been already detailed; in short, the Pass and the Honor Matriculation work of the University of Toronto constitute the regular course of this form.

THE COMMERCIAL AND SCIENTIFIC, OR MODERN DEPARTMENT.

It will be seen from the preceding survey of the work done in the various forms that the aim of Upper Canada College is to give a thorough education. In the First and Second Forms the studies are mainly English, as it is conceived that an accurate knowledge of the mother-tongue is the best foundation for the rapid and successful acquirement of any foreign language. After passing through the Second Form, the pupil's course is directed according to the time which will probably be devoted to further scholastic training.

All pupils likely to enter a professional career, and especially all intending to continue their education at any University are strongly recommended to take the Classical Courses in Forms III., IV., V., and VI. Many pupils, however, who are not likely to remain in any educational institution beyond their sixteenth year, or who desire to enter the Civil or Military Service or to engage in Mercantile pursuits, in which classical attainments are not necessary, ought, in justice to themslyes and to the College, to be entered in the Commercial and Scientific, or Modern Department, in which neither Latin nor Greek is taught, and in place of them, an acquaintance with Commercial Forms, Book-keeping, Commercial Arithmetic, and Chemistry is imparted. Parents or Guardians, with the sanction of the Principal, are enabled to select either of these two Departments as that to which their boys are to belong, and thus to suit their education to the natural bent of their minds and to their prospects in life. The obligatory subjects in the Modern Forms are English, French, History, Geography, Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Writing, and Book-keeping.

The Classes for Gymnastics and Military Drill are free. An Annual fee of \$1 is charged for the use of the Gymnasium, Reading Room, Skating Rink, and Toboggan Slide.

COLLEGE BOARDING HOUSE.

Fee (inclusive of Tuition)...... \$70.00 per term, or \$210.00 per year. A fee of \$1 per term is charged all boarders for medical attendance.

N.B.—All fees, whether for Board or Tuition, are payable strictly IN ADVANCE to the Bursar of the Institution.

Boys entering during any term are, after a certain period, charged only for the unexpired portion for that term, at the above rates.

After one week from the commencement of the term, pupils are not allowed to attend

College until the fees are paid.

No deduction in Tuition Fee is made for withdrawal or absence of a pupil. An abatement of \$4 per week is allowed boarders for absence through illness for any period exceeding four weeks.

THE BOARDERS

Occupy the Boarding House and Supplementary Boarding Houses, all of which are situated in the grounds. The Boarding Houses are under the immediate supervision of the Superintendent—one of the regular Masters of the College. A Lady Superintendent attends to the domestic comforts of the boys, and has special charge of their wardrobes. A Master resides in each of the Supplementary Boarding Houses, and the pupils in them are subject to the same control, and are card for in the same manner as those in the Boarding House proper.

The discipline and general conduct of the Boarding Houses are supervised by the Principal, whose care it is to look after the well-being of the boarders in

every way.

For purposes of discipline, the boarders are divided into two divisions, and are promoted from a lower to a higher division strictly in accordance with their standing in College. The houses are furnished with bath-rooms, and the boys are required to use the baths regularly.

During the evening and morning study hours, the pupils are aided in the preparation of their lessons for College by the Resident Masters, with assistance from

some of the other Masters.

On Sunday, all boarders, whose guardians do not object to it on religious grounds, receive instruction in the Boarding House Sunday School. They also attend the religious services of the churches to which they belong, accompanied, as far as practicable, by the Masters. Seats are provided at the expense of the College.

In cases of illness, the Medical Officer of the College is called in by the Principal, or by the Superintendent. If any other physician is called in it is at the expense of the parent or guardian.

For the convenience of boarders living at a considerable distance, it has been arranged that they may remain in the building during the vacation at Christmas and Easter; but a special charge of four dollars and a-half per week will be made in each case.

The Boarding House is conducted as an integral part of the Institution, and the charges are as low as is compatible with the liberal style in which the establishment is conducted—profit not being the object, but the supplying of a need felt by the country at large; namely, a well-managed boarding house, in which, while the boys enjoy all the advantages of the educational system of Upper Canada College, their parents may feel confident that the physical and moral culture of their sons is a subject of serious attention. The fee of \$210 includes board and tuition, washing, attendance of College Physician and the charge for a seat in church.

Every boarder is required to bring with him a certificate of good conduct from the Master or Tutor under whom he has been previously educated; he must also be provided with bed and bedding, and a suitable number of towels, still list of which, together with the enumeration of the contents of his wardrobe, is to be given to the Lady Superintendent. Mattresses of the size requisite for the bedstead which the Boarding House supplies, namely, six feet long by two and a half broad, can be readily obtained in the city. One month's notice is required before the removal of any pupil.

A limited number of the Day Pupils residing at a distance from the College may have the privilege, on paying a small additional fee to the Steward, of dining in the College Boarding House at a quarter to one o'clock.

MILITARY DRILL.

A Drill Association is organized among the various forms of the school; boysover 14 years of age, who are qualified physically for the work, may join the Rifle Company—a uniformed infantry company formed in accordance with the regulations of the Militia Department of Canada, and under the supervision of the Deputy-Adjutant General of Militia. The cultivation of an erect bearing, of a spirit of proper subordination to authority, and of a manly esprit de corps is the design of this department. The uniform, which each member purchases for himself, consists of a grey Norfolk jacket trimmed with scarlet; trowsers same material; Glengarry forage cap with College badge, and leather leggings. The company is furnished, free of charge, with belts, bayonets and Peabody rifles. The armoury is thoroughly fitted up with racks for rifles and lockers for clothing, There are also an outfit of bugles and drums for a Company band.


