The King of Belgium has conferred upon
Mr. Stanley the decoration of the
Order of Leopold.
The son of the British vice-consul at
Rodosto, Turkey, has been captured by
brigands who demand \$7,000 ransom.
At Berlin it is reported that the Grand
Duke Louis of Hesse will abdicate in favor
of his son Ernest under advice of the Em-
peror William. His marriage and
subsequent divorce have compromised his
position.
In the British House of Commons on
Thursday the Under-Secretary of State
said that France had obtained from the
International African Association an
agreement of presentation on the Congo,
which had not been offered to England.
A Halifax boarding house keeper named
Henrick Gullikson and a runner named
Peter Hendrickson, were convicted in the
Police Court on Thursday of inducing
soldiers to desert foreign vessels to which
they belonged and afterwards to get berth
on other outward bound ships. Both were

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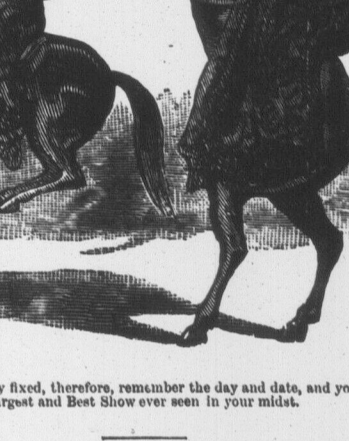
