Miramichi Advance. The Canada Eastern Railway. The transfer of the Canada Eastern Railway to the Dominion Government, which was announced to take place on Thursday last, has been understood, not yet been fully completed owing to some unforeseen contingencies that have arisen in connection with the completion of titles, or as it is popularly put, because some of the law business was not advanced as expeditiously as that of the railway men.

The War.

A Tokio despatch of Friday says: Admiral Hoveya, reports that the Japanese guard-ships near Yentao, south of Sanbantao, near Taitien Bay, Sunday and Monday, captured twenty-six Chinese junk, which were attempting to carry provisions into Port Arthur. They were taken to Taitien and were tried and confiscated. The crews were released.

Last Saturday's Toronto Globe says: It is reported at Paris, from St. Petersburg, according to the London Times cables to the Globe, that only that the line to Mukden has been cut, but that Kuropatkin has also abandoned his positions on the North bank of the Taitse River. The Russian War Office is quoted as issuing, as usual, a reassuring explanation of these occurrences, which, if confirmed, means the annihilation of Kuropatkin's army. The report of the complete evacuation of Liaoyang by the Russians, which came from St. Petersburg, seems to have been premature. The Russians have evidently massed a large part of his men from Liaoyang across the river and masked them on his eastern and northeastern fronts to oppose the advance of Kuroki, who is north of the river, and permit of the gathering together of his shattered divisions.

"While there is no doubt at all that a large number of the Russians have retreated across the Taitse, it is quite evident that they hoped to hold the south side of the river west of Liaoyang, and apparently the town itself, and so withdraw their stores or such part of them as might be hurriedly removed. One can hardly believe the story that it has been set on fire. The Russian forces still south of the river would not withdraw without suffering terrible losses, as the Japanese artillery will be able to concentrate its fire on the bridges during the retreat. Indeed, Oyama, in a despatch to the Tokio War Office, says the Japanese used some of the heavy guns abandoned by the Russians to fire upon and hinder the entraining of the latter at the Liaoyang station. The number of captured guns is not specified. The Official Japanese despatches declare that retreating the Russians, or those of them who crossed the river, were thrown into confusion by the pressure of the Japanese.

The Japanese resumed their attack all along the line Friday morning, and it is evident that if Kuropatkin does finally succeed in breaking away from them, it will be after heavier losses than he has so far sustained. The casualties on both sides already reach enormous totals. From the 23rd of August to Thursday night the Japanese reported a loss of 25,000 killed and wounded. This may have been made good by the arrival of reinforcements of 30,000 men recently reported to have been landed at Newchwang. The Russians admit a loss of 5,000 in two days of the present fighting. The days are not specified, but as they had previously reported losses of 7,000 men on specific dates, they have probably by this time lost as many as their attackers."

Press despatches of Saturday and Sunday indicate that the Russians are in hopeless retreat. The only direct news from the seat of war bearing Sunday's date came by way of Tokio in a report from Field Marshal Oyama saying that Liao Yang fell completely in the hands of the Japanese at nine o'clock that morning, that the Japanese casualties were believed to be heavy and that nothing was known to the Japanese concerning conditions on the right bank of the Taitse River.

The only comfort for the Russians at home was the news conveyed in a report from General Kuropatkin, dated Saturday afternoon, that General Stakelberg's corps of 25,000 men reported on Friday as having been cut off to the westward of Liao Yang had been safely extricated to the right bank of the river.

General Kuropatkin also reported that the greater portion of the army was south of Yentao, five miles northeast of Liao Yang. It is indicated that there has been cessation of fiercer fighting. Kuropatkin reports that his men were not being much interfered with by the Japanese in the near neighborhood of his army.

In St. Petersburg the absence of news is looked upon as heightening the gravity of the situation for the Russians. A St. Petersburg despatch of Sunday says: "Emperor Nicholas this afternoon received a telegram from General Kuropatkin asking for the immediate despatch to the far east of the sixth army corps."

The Russian War Office is able to make the reassuring announcement that the retreat from Liao Yang did not involve the loss of guns and also declares that the abandoned stores were set on fire before the Russians crossed the Taitse river. It appears, nevertheless, that the Japanese were tumbling over each other in their haste to get upon the trains leaving Liao Yang.

General Kuropatkin complains that the growing Chinese corn in the vicinity of Liao Yang greatly interfered with the more expeditious moving of his troops in their retreat. In a despatch of Saturday to the Emperor he says: "Our troops, which were posted at Liao Yang, are crossing to the right bank of the Taitse river."

The area of operations is almost entirely covered by growing Chinese corn, which greatly impedes the movements of troops. "The retreat of Major General Orloff's detachment yesterday (Friday), was largely due to the fire with which the force was assailed among the corn fields. General Orloff's losses are considerable, one regiment alone losing 1,500 men."

A St. Petersburg despatch of Monday morning says: "There is bitter disappointment tonight, probably the keenest of the whole land campaign, over the situation at the front. Up to the battle of Liao Yang, the retreating from and abandonment of positions, the public and officials thought they knew it was all a part of General Kuropatkin's plan of campaign. Had Liao Yang been abandoned without a fight the public at least would have looked forward patiently to a decisive stand at Mukden, but after a desperate battle with victory for the instant apparently in sight, to find Liao Yang abandoned, its immense stores captured or destroyed, and the retreat continued under the most adverse conditions, severely tries public confidence in the commander in chief."

Even the credulous Russians are growing suspicious of the veracity of many of the reports of victories gained and captures made by their forces. They were elated early in the battle of Liao Yang by the report that forty Japanese guns were captured only to learn a few hours afterwards that there was no truth whatever in the statement. The retreat of the Japanese was not a continuous retreat.

The war events of last week may be said to mark a decisive turning point in the great struggle which has been going on in the east for months. An attack on the Russians from the northeast, pressed by Kuroki's army, the forces of the Japanese, the capture of the city of Liao Yang, the feature of the battle of Tuesday, 30th, in the face of over a hundred Russian guns Kuroki won ground in the valley through which the Taitse runs. By the evening he had forced the Russians back upon the river. The river was in flood however and the Russian guns on the north bank left no hope of rushing the ford.

On Wednesday a practicable passage was discovered higher up the stream, some twenty miles east of Liaoyang, and Kuroki, by the use of pontoons, got over with a force of at least 40,000 men. He at once began to march along the north bank toward the railway. Liaoyang lies south of the Taitse, and the railway leading north to Mukden from Liaoyang is carried over the river on a large bridge. With Kuroki on the north bank of the river and the railroad bridge blown up, Kuropatkin's condition would have been a desperate one. To save his army from being hemmed in and destroyed he gave the order to abandon Liaoyang, retreat across the river and occupy ground on the north side. This involved the abandonment of all the magnificent defences upon which the labor of months had been spent, including miles of trenches, barbed wire entanglements, hidden pitfalls and mines, and the destruction of hundreds of thousands of tons of military stores accumulated at Liaoyang for the use of the army. It rendered useless all the valor of the Russian army which for three days had withstood in a spirit worthy of the best traditions of a great people the almost fanatical attack of the Japanese.

St. Petersburg despatches of Monday are as follows: "It was reported at nine o'clock tonight that General Kuropatkin's rear guard had been almost annihilated, and that the main Russian army was in imminent danger of being surrounded. The war situation to date is: Above the Yentai, and is pushing on toward Mukden. The whole of Field Marshal Oyama's army has crossed the Taitse River and part of it is hanging on to Kuropatkin's flank. A strong flanking column on the east is pushing rapidly north in the effort to head off the Russians. Against this column Kuropatkin has sent out a strong cavalry division to the northeast which it is believed is already in position to check the Japanese flankers, while to the westward Kuropatkin is moving a division towards Shimintsin, 30 miles west of Mukden, to meet any interference that may be attempted from the direction of Yinkow or Newchwang. The Japanese have thrown a strong flanking column across the Taitse river at Benitzu, about thirty miles northeast of Liaoyang, which

is hurrying to the northward and endeavoring to get in between the Russian army and Mukden. It is against this movement that General Kuropatkin has dispatched General Rennenkampf with a strong Cossack division which it is believed is already blocking the eastern high road.

Kuropatkin has three roads by which he is marching towards Mukden, besides the double tracked railway. The latter is chiefly occupied with the transportation of guns and of equipment of which there is a large amount. The soldiers are marching in light order and most of the wounded have already been dispatched north by rail.

A despatch from Kimmintin says: "A Chinese official who arrived from Mukden Sunday states troops are leaving for the north; that there are 18,000 men ten miles east of the city, that the officers and men have become dispirited and much sickness prevails.

The retreating column of Russians between Liao Yang and Mukden is fully fifteen miles long. The Russians have lost by capture and abandonment about 75 guns—some reports place it at 100.

On Tuesday evening the following despatch reached St. Petersburg the terrible condition of the roads rendered so sudden by the rains which fell yesterday and today and cut up by lumbering and heavy transport trains. Long lines of commissary wagons drawn by steaming mules, horses and even bullocks, are straining their way north along the soaked and cut up main road from Yentai. Behind them come long trains of artillery and bank of them Gen. Kuropatkin's army. The Japanese are hanging on Kuropatkin's flanks, keeping the Russians engaged in continuous rifle fire. The progress of the retreat has been slow, owing to the necessity of first getting through the baggage and guns, but the heads of the commissariat are already passed through Mukden and are continuing on their way to the north. The main Japanese army is marching up along the road eastward of the Russian lines of retreat, which converge at Mukden. Another Japanese force is also leading for Mukden from the westward, coming from the direction of the Liao river.

Marshall Oyama seems to be making a race for Mukden. He evidently has great superiority in numbers, especially in artillery. As the booming of the Japanese cannon which are in place 14 miles from Mukden. The skies are black and the air is stifling with the sense of suffocation, which is felt here before a storm breaks.

NEWS AND NOTES.

Miss Margaret Anglin, the actress daughter of the late Hon. T. W. Anglin, has bought a beautiful home in Surry, England.

The Japanese have offered to let their Russian prisoners work at building a harbor at Matsuyama, to "pass away the time," and earn the usual wages, with which they will be able to buy themselves luxuries during their imprisonment.

A Belmont despatch of 30th says:—"Shea Senover and Lydia Rider, of Arishat, C. B. from West Point, P. E. I., for New Richmond, P. Q., to load railroad ties, went ashore Aug. 22nd at St. Mary, 12 miles from Miramichi, during thick weather, and are lying about 200 feet apart. Captains and crews reached here last evening."

Robert East, of Harcourt, Kent Co., was arrested on Monday by Constable Andrew Ferguson and taken before Stipendiary Magistrate Watson on a charge of criminal assault on Emma Mersereau, a girl of twelve or thirteen years. East was committed for trial in the Circuit Court, Tuesday night, while allowed too much liberty, he took freedom leave and left the village.

Thirty thousand acres, or 47 square miles, believed to be the most valuable land held over in Maine is now to be transferred last night by the N. O. Shaw Lumber Company, of Bath, to the Hollingsworth & Whitney Company. The tract included nearly all the Lilly Bay and Academy townships bordering on Moosehead Lake, and the land is covered with valuable spruce hemlock and hardwood.

It is now believed that the projected pulp mill at Calais, Me., will be projected. Frank H. Todd, of that city, has completed the necessary preliminaries for the conveyance of the timber lands which the projectors demanded to assure the required supply of pulp wood, and it is now expected that at an early date ground will be broken for the erection of the plant. The mill will be erected at Sprague's Falls, a short distance above the city. The St. Croix Valley abounds in spruce and other timber suitable for pulp making and the supply is sufficient to last for an indefinite period. Paper Trade Journal, Aug. 25.

In the Coronation cup matches at Sydney "Cibon" was the first race from the "Cobalt" by about three miles. In the second, on Monday, only Cibon finished race, Cabot was missing with an accident before she had gone over the first leg of the course. After a well contested race, during which Cibon kept the lead, the halcyon of Cabot broke and her mast fell overboard, putting her out of the race. Cibon, which was three quarters of a mile ahead, finished about sixteen minutes faster than on Saturday. The Gable's new paper will be in position for the third race on next Saturday.

Among the passengers on the Montreal express to-day was Mr. William C. Porter, of Dorchester. Mr. Porter, who is a son of Mr. John R. Porter, ex-governor of Dorchester, is a graduate of the University of Mount Allison, will spend a few days at his home and will then proceed to Fredericton, where he is to become the curate of St. Ann's Episcopal church. He will be ordained in Fredericton on Sunday, the 18th inst. After graduating from Mount Allison, Mr. Porter spent some time in the Diocese of King's college, Windsor, and since then has been acting as lay reader at Fort Fairfield, Me., St. John Globe.

Lord Strathcona, the Canadian High Commissioner in London, in his annual report as Canadian trade in England, says that the Canadian pulp and paper trade is not satisfactory. He says that an importer, who has long been connected with Canadian interests, regrets that those who have suitable timber lands and water power consider themselves to be making a profit at little or no profit, when if they would make the necessary further outlay and manufacture paper instead of pulp they would reap a reasonable profit from a steady trade. This, he says, is a loss to the pulp mills, for while the year two or three pulp mills have closed, more than one of the mills making paper have added to their capacity.
