THE DIACONATE.

THE CIRCULAR LETTER OF THE NOVA SCOTIA WESTERN BAPTIST Association to the members of the churches of which it IS COMPOSED.

Dear Brothers and Sisters .-

We address you on the subject of diaconal service in the churches. Our object is to suggest the enlargement of the sphere of that rrice in two directions. First, in regard to the duties to be lischarged. Second, in respect to the persons to be chosen.

1. WITH REFERENCE TO THE DUTIES TO BE DISCHARGED.

The duties of deacons, as recognized at present, are to care for he church poor and to assist at the administration of the Lord's As the possessors of the best gifts, they are also Supper. metimes accorded by the tacit consent or by the votes of their rethren leadership in the social exercises and executive work of he church. We suggest the choice, appointment and recognition of bacons for the express purpose of their overseeing as an additional wrice and by virtue of their office the financial affairs of the hurches.

1. We assign as a fundamental reason for this suggestion its Scriptural character. From the account of the original institution the diaconate, given in Acts, we learn that the partial and emporary communism of the church in its Pentecostal days caused s first financial cares. We find, also, that the office of deacon was at once provided by divine legislation to prevent these financial urdens from resting permanently upon the apostles. The reason ssigned was that they might give themselves "wholly to prayer nd to the ministry of the word" which it was not meet that they hould leave. The diaconal office was, we thus see, instituted exercise a needed and official care for the temporaliies of the church in order that the apostles, freed from esponsibility and labor in this department of church work, night devote themselves exclusively to their spiritual functions. he cause of this action was local and temporary, but the need rovided for is universal and perpetual. The church always needs evoted and able financial managers,—always needs consecrated, ficient pastors. The Divine Legislator ordained the two offices bishops and deacons) to perform distinct, equally needed, and prelative functions in the church. It follows, therefore, that as the aconal office was designed to be as permanent as the pastoral, it as also intended to so adapt itself to the varying circumstances of te churches as to answer the purpose of its first institution through-

out all time. It further follows that the churches should not only theoretically but practically so large the sphere of the diaconate as to embrace the general management of all the financial affairs of the churches, and that they should choose and ordain men therets with a view to their fitness for this service. The duty is the mormanifest, when it is considered that the official labors of the diaconate are now obviously inadequate to demand the high qualifications and solemn setting apart upon which the churches now insist, while onerous and important financial duties must be relegated to other special officers, or discharged by pastors to the detriment of their peculiar work.

These inferences are confirmed by a consideration of the qualifi cations which the New Testament requires of those chosen for the important and permanent office of deacon. The brethren were an are enjoined to seek out men of honest report, full of the Hol Ghost and of faith. These were and are to be solemnly set ana to their work. Now, while admitting that high gifts are required for the right discharge of the present duties of the diaconate, i nevertheless follows that while the churches insist upon the scriptural standard of qualification being maintained, they should also require services of the kind and degree while such qualifications presuppose, such services as will secure the object of the original institution d the office. Men of pre-eminent sanctity, honesty and wisdom were then chosen to perform a laborious service for the purpose d meeting a pressing want of the church. By a parity of reasoning the men of whom like spiritual and mental endowments are not required should perform as heavy a work and meet the like financia exigencies of the church of to-day. A great need of the churche now is the efficient management of their financial affairs by permanent officers, spiritually and experimentally qualified to perform the service for which they are chosen. Officers of this character and the qualifications are provided in the diaconate of the New Testament economy. The inference is obvious that these duties should be performed and these ends subserved by them.

The Manual of the churches, the New Testament, gives but little exact information as to the particular duties discharged by deacon in the later days of the Apostles. Nevertheless, we gather from Paul's pastoral epistles to Timothy, additional support for the view The temporal circumstances of the church at Ephesus presented. Timothy's charge, were different from those of the church at Jen Neither large numbers, nor a "daily ministration," we salem. there to burden, but it was necessary to meet other temporal respon sibilities. Timothy was therefore exhorted to give himself whole to a teacher's and a pastor's work, and, that he might do so, w instructed to ordain men of christian truthfulness, sobriety, liberally and conscientiousness, qualities practically implied in the characteristics of deacons more spiritually delineated in the Acts, perform diaconal duties. A fuller knowinge of the practice of apostolic churches would doubtless further andirm, by detailed and exhaustive examples, the fact which the pirit and object of New Testament legislation in the matter of the aconate, so clearly indicates, that the office was designed to manage as temporalities of the churches. But we are given by inspiration may the general organism for the churches, with the functions and the purposes to be fulfilled by each part of that organism stated in general terms, in order doubtless, that the church following the spirit of the divine enactments without violating their letter, might adapt breach freely and well to her varying conditions in all ages.

2. The second series of reasons for the suggestion that the recognized sphere of diaconal service be enlarged, in the actual practice of the churches, are found, as already implied, in the reciprocal needs and relations of the Churches and their officers or sevents.

The first of these reasons is found in the mutual requirements of churches and their pastors. The churches ever need public eaching and pastoral care by those who shall bring to that work the highest possible, natural and acquired, spiritual and mental qualifiations, and who shall have the fullest possible opportunities of avoting themselves exclusively to the labor of pastors and teachers. This requirement can only be met as ministers have set before them m oper door to large spiritual and mental culture and to entire consecration to their special department of effort in the churches of Christ. To be "workmen that need not to be ashamed, rightly ividing the word of truth," and to have in their measure, the Chief Shepherd's care of the flock of God they must "meditate on these hings," and " give themselves wholly to them." This is a period of devotion to specialities, there is, consequently, a demand in every department of human activity and thought for that peculiar fitness bragery chosen work which an exclusive attention thereto can 4 bestow. The christian ministry can obtain the qualifications making pulpit and pastoral success, and use the powers so acquired ich an extent as to meet the wants of the church in the world by no other means than "waiting on their ministry." To enable them to do this the burdens which now, in many cases, consume more ar less of their time and power, such as the building of churches, aying church debts, raising monies for local expenses, Missions and Education, in fine, all and every responsibility in matters affecting he temporalities of the church must be laid on others. The same conclusion is reached when the growing tendency to secularize the pulpit is considered. This tendency, not so apparent in Provincial thurches as among those of the United States, whose experience we may soon share, is to consider financial abilities and successes as chief or notable indexes of fitness for the ministerial office. Those pular or executive talents which achieve financial success for the ndividual church are allowed an influence in the choice, valuation, and service of a minister which should be given only to those which fit

him to discharge his legitimate duties as a pastor and teacher. The false views and issues and pernicious complications which hence arise to prevent the ministry from fulfilling the Divinely ordained purposes of their office, sufficiently indicate that it is the will and the wisdom of their Great Head that the churches should lay these responsibilities upon other than the pastor, and that they should seek out, find and use the qualifications for the performance of such functions in another class of officers. If He has made any specific provision allowing pastors to devote themselves to their work, and at the same time providing for the necessary, and an efficient oversight and conduct of the financial affairs of the churches, and He has undoubtedly done so that provision is in the office of the diaconate.

The second reason for the extension of the deacon's sphere, is that the churches will thereby recognize that the divine lawgiver has made permanent provision for the efficient discharge of all their functions as churches, and that He has furnished them with all the necessary mechanism and offices. The churches find themselver with financial affairs, needing continued and wise management in the interests of the extension of the kingdom of Christ. They will go onward with confidence to assured success, guided by a "thus saith the Lord," when they see plainly that their Master has legislated or them in this important matter, and that he has taught them to search out the most fervent piety conjoined with the highest practical wisdom within the church, and solemny consecrate it to this service. They will feel that they are perfect church organisms, fitted to discharge every temporal and spiritual function, and that especially in the matter of finances they have a standing, efficient committee of the Lord's own choice and appointment. Thus organized they will enter an era of more systematic effort, an era of fuller development and wiser direction of their financial resources in which they will have greater spiritual blessings and triumphs. Two great and increasing evils then be avoided. The one is known as the church and society con. cation, where the world joins with the churches in the management of their finances and consequently controls their movements to a greater or lesser extent. This state of things cannot obtain, when the diaconate so manage the financial affairs of the churches, that the world cannot assume, nor the churches admit that outside intervention is necessary in order that the Church of Christ may have success in its temporal matters. A second evil which this recognition of the diaconate will go far to remove is that of regarding the financial duties and obligations of the church a having less importance than they really possess. When the churches choose and set apart to the financial departments of church work, the greatest spiritual gifts and highest temporal wisdom which they can furnish, they will consider those departments among the most important of its activities. They will no longer sever, to a great an extent, the worship of God in spirit and in truth from the

The third reason for this suggestion, arising from the relations of the church to its officers, is found in the present aspect of the diaconal question. There is a growing disposition to undervalue the office, to maintain that it was not designed to be permanent and. to advocate its abolition on the ground that it is not a peculiarly high, sacred and necessary office of the Christian church. To the honor of our deacons, be it said, that in the discharge of the duties. at present asked of them by the churches, they purchase to themselves a good degree; but how conclusively would they vindicate their claims to be considered a vital necessity in the church were their sphere enlarged as has been indicated. Their office would thereby be shown to be imperatively necessary for the proper discharge of the spiritual and temporal work of the church. There could arise no proposal for its abolition ; for its holders would perform important and engrossing labors which would otherwise go undone, fall to pastors or be provided for by temporary appointments in either case to be permanent injury of the cause of Christ. It has now been shown that the suggestion made is in accordance.

with the direct and implied meaning of New Testament legislation n this subject,-further, that there are strong reasons for its doption in the present state and exigencies of the church and its theers. Other confirmatory lines of thought might be followed and possible objections met; our aim however is to suggest rather than to discuss.

II. SECOND WITH REFERENCE TO THE PERSONS TO BE CHOSEN. The second matter with reference to the diaconate, to which our attention is directed is the extension of its sphere with respect the persons chosen. Now, only male members of the churches. te put into this service. We suggest the desirability of choosing stable females as deaconesses to perform certain diaconal duties. 1. As first and chief reasons for this suggestion, we adduce Scrip-

anal warrant in the practice of the New Testament churches. Tim. iii. 11, Paul, having previously stated the necessary qualificauss of bishops and deacons, proceeds to designate those of deaconesses well, saying " In like manner women must be grave, not slanderers sithful in all things." True, our version interpreting rather than anslating the passage, renders the general term for women, unaikas by "wives" and thus applies it to the wives of deacons. ut there are logical and insuperable objections to this; besides, a fact thereby implied that the wives of deacons are mentioned, hile those of the more important officer,-the bishop, are not, is aclusive evidence against it. Leading exegetes therefore reject s interpretation and consider the passage as teaching the qualiations and authorizing the appointment of females to an office in church which they already filled. Not so decisive, yet strong as collateral evidence is the passage

in 1 Tim. v. 3-10, which legislates in regard to the support of widows. The "taking into the number" or choice and enrollment, spoken of in the 9th verse of that chapter, is considered to have been ordered that those so enrolled might perform special services in the church for which the attached characteristics fitted them and which their support obligated them to render. Certainly those qualifications were not demanded of all widows needing help as the condition of its bestowment, while they are peculiarly fitting for deaconesses and accord with those required of them in 1 Tim. ii. 11. Eminent expositors plead this passage as indicating a phase of apostolic practice in the matter of choosing deaconesses. missio

Still more decesive confirmatory evidence is found in Rom. xvi. 1, 2. There, Phebe is mentioned as the servant or deaconess he diakonosi, of the church at Cenchra. Paul's commendation of her implies that she possessed a character and was performing a service in strict accord with the requirements of the passages already discussed. The fact of her appointment by a particular, small church argues the general enrollment of deaconesses at that day.

2. The second reason for suggesting this appointment of females is found in the practice of the churches of carlier and later times. From the earlier and better portions of the apostolic Constitutions in which the term deaconess often occurs, we have in connection with a passage which gives instructions as to the choice qualifications and number of deacons the following words "Let the women be diligent in serving the women both in things belonging to message, journeys, aids and service." This gives a view of the opinion and practice of the churches in a time immediately succeeding that of the apostles. A little later in Church History comes the letter of Pliny to Trajan in which he mentions two female servants, or deaconesses of the church which he put to torture.

At later periods the Fathers constantly refer to women as "chosen persons" who like the women who assisted Paul, labored togethe with others in the gospel. The social habits and requirements of the times, as do those of the East to-day, necessitated the setting apart of females to a ministry in things spiritual and temporal among the sick, poor and strangers of the female portion of the churches and communities,—a ministry which did net conflict wit Paul's teaching in Corinthians as to the legitimate sphere of women in the churches. The propriety and scripturalness of having a femal diaconate for the discharge of such duties is unquestioned in earl church history. The office continued far into the middle ages. At later day it was recognized in the Congregational Churches England and the Continent. The Constitution of the earlie churches of that faith and order on this Continent, declared the offic to be of New Testament origin and authority and provided therefor.

8. The present needs of the churches seem to indicate that a apostolic institution should be resuscitated in all, but especially our larger and city churches, there are opportunities for christ usefulness in ministering to the sick and poor, in teaching and gene

missionary work for which many christian females are pre-eminently fitted. Were this recognized as their sphere and they specially set apart thereto by the church, as regular church-officers their usefulness and power would be increased, while this needed service would be always secured and perpetuated. The Roman Catholic church has found a great need in its religious propagandism and met it by the organization of its sisterhoods, a perversion of the office of the female disconate, -we may thereby learn a lesson and employ females in the manner that our Lord has directed in christian evangelism. In all the churches, much greatly needed work which it is impossible or burdensome for a pastor to perform, and much even of the work now assigned to deacons, might be done by one or more deaconesses chosen for this service and receiving the moral and, if necessary, the pecuniary support of the church therein.

This matter, also, is commended to the prayerful consideration of the churches. Both suggestions win their attention inasmuch as they relate to the increase and efficiency of the Churches, and because they have for their basis reasons drawn from present experience, and above all from the word of God.

Appendix.

(A) REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee to whom is intrusted this matter, beg leave to report, as follows :---

1st. We believe the Sabbath an institution given, not only to the nation of Israel, but to the whole human race, for it is evident, its observance was required before the delivery of the Mosaic code, as shown in Exodus xvi., hence equally binding on all. And for either the church, or the world, to appropriate the sabbath to the gratification of their natural inclinations is a sin against God.

2nd. We observe, with deep regret, the continued desecration of the Lord's day, by professing christians, as well as by those not professing, in using its sacred hours, given, not merely for rest from labor, but for the improvement of the higher life, by attendance on the word and meditation on God, and the great salvation by him provided, in reading triffing literature, driving from place to place for pleasure, and in visiting friends often to the neglect of the house of prayer. Which in the christian is very derogatory to his profession and detrimental to his growth in grace, and in the world a sure means of heardening the heart against God.

3rd. Your Committee would therefore urgently recommend to all the members of our Churches, to seek to be patterns to the world in the scriptural observance of the Lord's day.

We are persuaded, however, that our brethren were endeavoring to act for the best, and that the Teloogoo field is well adapted to the character and aims of our Independent Mission.

In addition to our Home Mission work, your Committee would express their hearty appreciation of the faithful and judicious efforts that have been put forth during the past year by our Home Missionary Union, through the agency of its Executive Board. It could hardly be expected that all the appointments of our Home Missionary Board would be entirely satisfactory; yet we are assured that our brethren have used their best judgment in all their decisions.

In order that the Home Missionary Union may be able duly to meet its obligations, and, to obviate, as far as possible, the necessity of a special agency for that purpose, your Committee would recommend that during the second quarter of each Associational year, collectors be appointed in each of our churches for the purpose of raising funds to be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Home Missionary Board. We would further recommend that pastors of churches preach missionary sermons at the beginning of the quarter to facilitate the work of securing contributions.

The French Mission still claims our support and sympathy. The labors of our missionary have been blessed during the year. One English and two Roman Catholic converts have been baptized and received into the fellowship of the French Mission and Weymouth Churches.

The new academy building, so much needed for better and large accommodation, is to be completed by the 1st of September. The old boarding house is to undergo immediate repairs, and to be given up entirely to the young ladies during the coming year. and larger aber. The to be given r. In the meantime, or as soon as the building now in processs of erection is completed, the plan for a Ladies' School which was accepted by the Governors a year ago, and approved by the Associations of last year, will be carried into immediate execution.

Under the wise supervision of the esteemed President of the College, its work has been efficiently performed. Twenty-six young men presented themselves for matriculation at the close of the last term, and the prospects are that a year hence the matriculating class will be still larger.

The duties of the Theological Department have been discharged as well as the circumstances would permit.—Much more help however is needed in this department to make it what it should be, and to present a sufficient inducement to our young men to pursue their Theological studies in their own country. To meet this want, as well as to retain the chair of Natural Science, which at present is supported by special contributions, it will be necessary considerably to increase the Endowment Fund. The vital relation of the college to denominational growth and prosperity is quite sufficient to justify is most liberal support.

Your Committee would call attention to the duty of petitioning the legislature for a fair and equitable distribution of money for higher educational purposes. At present the Roman Catholics and Presbyterians are each receiving \$2800 per annum, while the Baptists are receiving but \$400, and the amount apportioned to Horton Academy is less than that given to the Academies of Yarmouth or Picton.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee report that no doubt since the inauguration of the temperance reform, about a half a century ago, the moral interests of the world have thereby been most beneficially affected. Multitudes of far-gone drunkards have been reclaimed-perhaps a still greater number have been saved from the prevalent vice of inebriety -and what is perhaps of still greater moment, the discussion of the teetotal principle has enlightened the public mind with reference to the danger and pernicious effects of indulgence in the use of intoxicating drinks. Your Committee painfully deplore the fact that many professed followers of Christ-members of churches-too often weaken the hands, and render the efficiency of laborers in the temperance cause, to a considerable extent, unavailing. Sad to say, magistrates, who occupy prominent places in our churches, assist officially in licensing the retail of ardent drinks. That professed conservators of christian morality can thus uphold and sanction the most prevalent and debasing vice of the present day, is to us an

enigma which cannot be solved in harmony with the principles and precepts, which are enunciated in Holy Writ with respect to the use of strong drink and the eyils of drunkenness.

The experience of those who have long labored ro promote the progress of the temperance reform, are forced to the conclusion that pledges and membership in tectotal organizations afford no reliable criterion of success.

Your Committee have seen Division Rooms and Lodges of Templars crowded with professed adherents to total abstinence principles—they have seen long rolls of names attached to other combinations with the same alleged object in view—and for a time all seemed prosperous; but ere long defection has greatly thinned the ranks of these pledged reformers. Those who have thus fallen, must have lacked the element of vital piety.

Your Committee, therefore, are of opinion that the Christian Church is the most efficient temperance organization—that the pulpit is the best platform for the legitimate discussion of temperance principles—and that preachers of the gospel are the most successful temperance lecturers. Your Committee do not say that a prohibitory law, or the propriety of licensing the retail of ardent drinks, should be discussed in the pulpit on the Lord's Day ;—but they do say that when vital godliness is successfully taught, pure temperance principles are necessarily propounded. A religious professor, who is an habitual frequenter of drinking saloons, and who indulges in the use of intoxicating liquors, can scarcely be considered a sound church member. While we refrain from suggesting that total abstinence should be a test of Church membership, we cannot but believe that those indulging in the use of the intoxicating cup, are by their example undermining the interests of religion.

According all praise to the active leaders and steady workers in the Temperance Cause, outside the pale of the Church, and frankly admitting the great good they have done; yet without the aid of religious principle, their efforts would have been comparatively feeble and ineffective.

Impressed with these facts and views, your Committee cannot too strongly urge upon our churches—pastors and people—to uphold temperance by example,—by the inculcation of religious principles —and by imploring the aid of Him who has intimated that drunkards cannot inherit the Kingdom of Heaven.

CONSTITUTION

Yova Scotia Western Baptist Association

ART. 1-This body shall be called the N. S. Western Baptist Association 2.—It shall be composed of delegates appointed by the Churches of which they are members, together with delegates from Corresponding Association Each Church connected with the Association shall have the privilege a sending one delegate or more, but no church shall be entitled to send me than five in addition to its pastor.

8.—The objects of the Association shall be, the collection of statistical as other information from the churches; the cultivation of mutual acquaintant and fraternal union; the promotion of individual godliness and the spiritu prosperity of the Churches; and, in the use of scriptural means, the enlarge ment of the Recement's Kingdom.

4.—The Association shall meet annually on the 3rd Saturday in June, a 10 o'clock. A. M., at such place as it may appoint, and the services shall be commenced with public worship. Should the interests of the body seem a demand it, a special meeting may be held at any time intervening, on regusition therefor being made by five of the churches through their pastor.

5.—The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, all of whom shall continue in office until the election of the successors.

The Moderator shall preside in all the meetings; nominate all committee of not more than three, unless otherwise provided for, take the direction of all the religious services, and call special meetings pursuant to requisition.

The Clerk shall record all the transactions and prepare the Minutes for publication.

The Treasurer shall receive all monies and other property contributed for any of the purposes of the Association and dispose of the same according to the will of the donors, or, when the will of the donors is not expressed, according to the vote of the Association.

6.—Each church connected with the Association shall send annually a Letter, containing an account of its history during the year preceding, specifying the number added by baptism, by letter, and by restoration; the number removed, by dismission, by exclusion, and by death; and the whole number then in fellowship. If any church shall neglect, for three successiv years, to send such a letter, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from the Association, unless two or more members shall request its continuane, and shall engage to enquire into its standing and report at the next meeting of the Association.

7.—The Association may receive any church which shall apply for admission by sending a letter and delegates, and shall give satisfactory evidence as w its faith and order.

8.—The Association shall not in any case, interfere with the internal cocerns of the churches, but it may dissolve its connection with any church which, after proper examination, shall be judged by the Association to have departed essentially from the Baptist faith and practice.

9.—The religious sentiments of this Association are those expressed in the "Declaration of Faith and Practice of the Baptist Churches in Nova Scotia"

10.-This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-think of the number present at any annual meeting. R

RULES OF ORDER.

RULE 1st.—At each annual meeting the Letters from the Churches shall at once handed in ; from which the clerks shall immediately make out a list (Delegates.

2nd.—After religious worship the officers shall be chosen. The choice of Moderator shall be made by ballot.

&d.—At every sitting business shall be opened and concluded with prayer. &h.—Brethren invited to a seat with us. may speak on all subjects under mideration, but vote on none.

8th .-- No subject shall be discussed without a motion thereon being first adeand seconded.

\$th.—Every speaker shall address the chair; and no person shall speak there than twice on the same subject, unless by permission of the body.

7th.-When a church is received into the Association the Moderator shall be to one of its delegates the hand of fellowship.

8th.—At the commencement of each sitting the Minutes of the last one all be read and corrected, and of the last before the final adjournment.

9th.-All resolutions shall be presented in writing.

10th.-Motions made and lost shall not be recorded unless so ordered at time.

11th.—No delegates shall be allowed to leave the Association before the miness is finished, without permission of the body.

12th.—These rules shall be distinctly read from the chair at the opening the Session.

Your Committee to whom were referred the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Baptist Missionary Union report :----

That whilst presuming upon the correctness of the payments and receipts as stated in the account, yet they consider the items extended to much in detail and too much unclassified to be easily understood. They have therefore endeavoured to condense and arrange the payments and receipts under different heads, so far as they could do so without the aid and assistance of the treasurer, who, had he been resent, would have aided in the placing of items under their roper heads, of which they were doubtful. But we recommend in huve that the Board condense their account for publication, and mange the payments and receipts for the various services of the ward under suitable heads.

Especially would we recommend that the Book and Tract departand be separated from the other account, so that a knowledge of sfinancial state may be readily apprehended. And to do this they uggest that an inventory of the stock on hand at the date of this mount be taken, to make a starting point for future operations.

They regret that they had no method of arriving at the true ate of the Board's financial standing, as no statement is made of adebtedness to Missionaries, Agents, or Publishers. ope will be avoided in future. This they

They recommend that the Financial year of the Board close on last day of May in each year hereafter, and that no receipts or syments be entered on the accounts after that date. And in subitting their accounts they would suggest that so far as possible all amounts due for missionary labor or otherwise be stated; and to that an approximate estimate be made of the probable amount at will be required to carry on the work of the board efficiently for e year to be entered upon.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT or THE Y. S. Baptist Home Missionary Union.

The Executive Board of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union beg to present their third Annual Report. At their first session atter the Anniversary of the Union, the Board elected the Officers of last year. They were soon, however, compelled to lose the valuable services of their Treasurer, Samuel Brown, Esq., whose feelle health rendered his resignation imperative. The Board were successful in soon finding a suitable successor in the person of P. D. Kinney, Esq., who had been one of their Auditors. The removal of Revds. J. H. Sanders and P. R. Foster to other fields of labor was felt to be a severe loss to the Board. These brethren had been connected with the Union in its incipient state, and had worked laboriously and efficiently as members of its executive. Their places, however, were soon taken by other men, good and true.

General Agency .- As your Board were pushing on their work as sapidly as possible, they were surprised and sorry to learn that their General Agent intended very soon to resign his position. As they had not expected such an event, they had not provided for the contingency. The work of a General Agent seemed to the Board to be so important at this early stage in the history of the Union that they with much regret were forced to accept Bro. Wallace's resignation. But they could not attach any blame to him, inasmuch as he felt. that domestic duties rendered such a course on his part absolutely necessary. The Board immediately endeavored to secure the services of a General Agent but were unsuccessful in their efforts until the first of January last, when Rev. D. Freeman, A. M., consented to undertake the work. As the field supplied by their missionaries during the past Summer did not yield the returns which the Board anticipated, they felt the urgent necessity of making a direct appeal to the churches for financial aid. The General Agent was therefore instructed to make the collecting of funds a prime object with him in his work. During the Winter and Spring the Agent visited the counties of Annapolis, Kings, Hants, and Halifax. He presented the claims of the Union faithfully and met with considerable success. Your Board, however, regret to say in this connection, that very few seemed to feel the question coming home to them with power, "How much owest thou my Lord?" After Bro. Freeman had closed his labors in the counties named above he passed into Cumberland, thence to Colchester. There he did a very excellent work in exploring destitute fields, and assisting some of the pastors in holding extra religious services. As the churches were beginning to gather funds for the Association, he thought it

not wise to prosecute the work of collecting for the Board. The information concerning the Union and its work which he presented so intelligently to the churches, and their duty in the matter of benevolence which he so forcibly exhibited, must in due time produce beneficial results.

Theological Professorship .- At the last Annual Meeting of the Union, the Executive Board were instructed to surpervise the collecting of a thousand dollars per Annum to pay the salary of a Theological Professor in Acadia College. Your Board requested their General Agent to solicit subscriptions for that object. He entered upon this work so energetically and succeeded so well in getting pledges that your Board were confident that the amount needed could be quite easily raised. At the time of the Convention held in Portland, St. John, Rev. D. M. Welton, A. M., was unanimously elected to fill the new Theological Chair in Acadia Your Board heartily concurred in the appointment, College. Professor Welton has been doing good work for the Denomination in his new sphere of labor, as the following extract from his report will show. He says :-- " The work which I have performed under your auspices during the past year has been divided between the College proper and the Theological Department. In the former, Rhetoric Elocution and the Monthly Essays written by the Freshman and Sophomore Classes, were assigned to 'me." * * * " During the last term I have instructed a portion of the Senior Class in In the latter, i. e., in the Theological Department, I German. have given one lecture a week in Homiletics, dividing the time equally between instruction on the preparation and delivery of sermons and the criticism of plans of sermons prepared by the students.

About thirty young men, members of the College and Academy, have more or less regularly attended these lectures, and, if I may be allowed to say so, have manifestly profited from them.

As it is not deemed advisable to blend the study of Theology proper with the regular College course, only partial course students have been left to engage in this. Of these the number has been somewhat small—the class consisting of Messrs. Goudey, Parry, Carbonell, Spencer, and one young lady,—Miss Masters.

Three lectures a week have been given, and three of the principal divisions in a systematic course have been gone over, namely, Bibliology, Theology, and Anthropology." * " I should hope another term to be able also to give some instruction in Church History and Pastoral Duties to those requiring them." * " I four Baptist brethren in New Brunswick would endow a Theological Chair, and the present instructors in theology were relieved from assisting in the Arts course, something very respectable might be done, and we might hope to arrest the annual exodus of our young men to Newton."

teen received. The causes are evident. The failure of parties to pay their subscriptions, the erection of Academy buildings at Wolfville, and the unusual financial pressure, are among the number. But your Board are not discouraged with reference to this matter. They regard the work of Professor Welton as among the most important branches of enterprise in which the Union is engaged. If our ministerial students are to be retained in our own Provinces it will be done mainly by giving them a good Theological mining at home. The influence of the Theological Professor for good will soon be felt by the churches through the labors of our ministerial students. Your Board therefore regard any disturbance of this department of the Union a very long step in the wrong direction.

French Department .- Your Board are pleased to report that a good deal of work has been done in this department, and some success has been apparent. The Missionary has been toiling on, sometimes almost discouraged, then again cheered with good tidings. His work has evidently been blessed. Copies of the Holy Scriptures given away years ago have been brought to him with the request that he would explain the doctrines they teach. The truth is spreading gradually, slowly, but certainly, and success is sure to The hand of persecution was raised against the Missionary come. and the converts to the truth, but this opposition turned out rather to the furtherance of the Gospel. Several of those that joined in this work have been brought to acknowledge the truth as it is in Jesus, and some of them have died in the faith, blessing God for the French Mission and its Missionary. Others of the number are quietly helping on the work of the Lord.

The little meeting house at St. Mary's Bay, commenced last year for the accommodation of the French and English families residing in that locality, has been carried towards completion. It has already been opened for divine service. When completed it will be a great convenience and blessing to the inhabitants of that place. The French Mission premises at Tusket and Saulnierville are kept in good repair. One house is rented; the other is occupied by our French Missionary.

Your Board believe that a mission should soon be established among the French population in the Eastern part of this Province. And just as soon as sufficient funds can be obtained for the purpose, they would recommend that the work be commenced there.

Book Department.—Your Board still feel the importance of having a pure Baptist literature circulated extensively in this Province. They regret that many of our churches do not seem to be alive to this matter. They are pained to learn that a large number of our Sabbath schools are still chiefly supplied with books published by Pædo-Baptist and so-called Union Societies. Many of these books teach unmistakably Pædo-Baptist doctrines. Possessing as we do so rich a literature, the foregoing fact is to be deeply deplored. If our children are to be taught the truth, as we believe Your Board and enabled to report that they have done a large amount of work in the book department during the year. More than five thousand volumes of sterling literature have been put in circulation. Cramp's Baptist History, Carson on Baptism, Spurgeon's Sermons, Bunyan's Pilgrim, The life of Judson, Theodocia Ernest, Mary Bunyan, Grace Trueman, Infidel's Daughter, and works like these have been placed in many hands. Essays on Baptism and Close-Communion, in pamphlet form, and tracts teaching our denominational views have been circulated, not only by the hundred but by the thousand. Other religious tracts in English, German, French, Swedish and Norwegian have been distributed in great numbers.

Your Board were called on to accept the resignation of J. Albert Walker, Esq., on the first of December last. He had been in commission nearly seven months. Although he did not meet with as much financial success as the Board anticipated, yet they believe he did a good work. The books sold and given away by him were of superior quality. Their teaching will be felt the effects will undoubtedly be seen before many days. Bro. Walker visited more than five hundred families, with many of whom the Scriptures were read and prayer was offered. He likewise distributed more than two thousand pages of tracts. Although your Board believe this department to be of very great importance they did not think it advisable to use their funds to any large extent in carrying it on. They believe it will be nearly self-sustaining. They did not there. fore appoint a successor to Mr. Walker. Gardner Tufts, Esu, still continues to traverse the counties of Digby, Annapolis and Kings. He labors energetically, and his efforts to circulate extensively a pure Baptist literature are being crowned with considerable success. Your Board cannot but express the belief that if the Baptists of Nova Scotia saw clearly their duty in regard to placing denominational teaching before their children in the Sabbath School and in the family circle, a great work would be done for the truth by the book department.

Enlarged sphere of operations.—The last anniversary of the Union added P. E. Island and Newfoundland to our Home Mission field. As P. E. Island seemed to be a very inviting sphere for missionary operations, your Board decided to occupy it at once. They accordingly appointed Rev. D. McDonald as General Missionary for the eastern part of the Island. He has been laboring at St. Peter, East Point, Souris, Dundas, Grand River, Georgetown, and Montagu Bridge. In several of these places he met with the most signal success. No less than one hundred and thirty-nine have been baptized by him and added to the Church bince the first of August last. Brother McDonald aids the Board very materially by giving information and advice. Rev. T. A. Kidson, a most successful missionary, was appointed to the western Part of the Island. Rev. J. I. Burgess was appointed to Cavendish and vicinity. Several other brethren have gone to the Island to spend there their simmer vacation; hence that important field is for the present fairly supplied.

Your Board intended to establish, during the year, a mission in St. John's, Newfoundland. They failed, however, until very recently, to obtain a suitable person to explore the field. They merely express the belief in regard to this matter that their successors should undertake mission work in Newfoundland as early as practicable.

Important points held.-Your Board are pleased to report that much success has attended the efforts of their missionaries at very important points. Annapolis, the former capital of the Province. has had, until very recently, neither Baptist Church nor Baptist preaching. During the past year a beautiful house has been opened for divine worship. Large congregations have been gathered by the able pulpit ministrations and faithful pastoral efforts of Rev. T. A. Higgins. The Sabbath School is also large and flourishing. In view of what has been accomplished in this field on so short a time, your Board thankfully exclaim, "What has God wrought"! Mission work has likewise been very successful at Shelburne. This old town, where the ancestors of many of us found their first home in Nova Scotia, your Board considered too important to be neglected. They determined to hold it. Success has attended their efforts, and very soon the cause there will be self-sustaining. Cow Bay has been supplied during the year with superior ministerial labor. Guysboro and Manchester were occupied by one of our best workers. The absence of regular pastoral labor from those churches for several years left them sadly unproductive. They are now in fair working order. Port Hawkesbury has been supplied part of the time. The Board regret the failure of brethren appointed there to occupy the field. They regard the place as very important, and feel that it must be supplied with suitable ministerial labor.

Efforts to retain Ministers.—The Board felt the importance of sing all the means in their power to retain in these Provinces our young ministers. They therefore wrote to Newton Theol. Instituion to induce our young men there to return. Several complied with the Board's request and are now at work in their various fields of labor. The Ministerial Students in Acadia College and Horton Academy, with scarcely an exception, have been appointed to mission stations or introduced to pastorless churches. The Board wished in this way to assist the churches and encourage he brethren. The following is a list of the missionaries and their fields of labor.

SUMMARY.—It will appear from the foregoing list that 30 missionaries and agents have been in commission during the year, 20 of whom have been re-appointed. Together they have travelled 45,697 miles; preached 3180 sermons; statended 2560 other meetings; made 16,140 family visits; distributed 50,222 pages of tracts, 94,299 pages of books; received 14 subscriptions to the "Christian Messenger"; baptized 302; built or carried to completion 2; meeting houses; organized 1 church, and 5 fabbath Schools; established 3 Woman's Mission Add Societies, and performed 1264 weeks' service, equal to 244 years. Collected on the field \$4750.83.

In addition to the appointments which the Board have made, they introduced Rev. A. E. Ingram, of Mahone Bay, to the Church at Newport, and Rev. Edward Roberts, of England, to the Bridgewater Church. They are glad to learn that Pastors and Churches are pleased with each other.

In conclusion, your Board wish to record their heartfelt thanks to Almighty God for His great goodness to them, their agenta, and missionaries, during the past year. Their lives have been precious in His sight. Only two-and these young men were ailing when first employed by the Board-have passed away since our last annual meeting. These brethren-Aaron Ross and Joseph H. Pipes-were cut off in early years, but they did their work and have gone to their reward. Another cause for gratitude is found in the fact that although there has been an unusual stringency in monetary matters, more than Ten Thousand Dollars have been in the treasury of the Union since the anniversary of last year. As your Board remember that this sum is nearly Four Thousand Dollars more than was received the year previous, and more than three times the amount raised in any one year by the three Home Mission Societies when separate, they would devoutly say, "Hitherto the Lord has helped us."

In reference to the future, your Board regard the outlook as very hopeful. The commercial horizon is dark, it is true, but clouds will not always obscure the sky. With a prospect before the Union of doing so much for the Master, your Board cannot suggest the idea of retrenchment. Other religious societies are being equipped more completely for Home Mission work. We cannot afford to be behind them. Fires which our fathers kindled in desolate places can we suffer to be extinguished or to be fed by other hands? Gardens which they began to plant, can we allow to lie waste or to be tilled by others because they are more faithful than we? Let us rather with prayer and faith go up and possess the land. And soon the field will be clothed in beauty and the harvest will be bountiful.
