## Young Men's Christian Association.



N the eve of the World's Convention to be held in London, England, at which will be celebrated the Jubilee of this world-wide organization, the Ottawa Association closes its 26 th. year. The beginning of the first Association was small and only local in its operation, but its principles and object were found suitable to young men everywhere, and hence the rapid growth and great influence of this movement with returns in the Jubilee year, showing over 5000 associations, with more than half a million of members, and securing the endorsement and support of the Christian public.

The aim of the work is distinctively religious. The first Association, founded by Sir Geo. Williams, originated in a meeting for Bible study and prayer, and while the organization has considerably increased its agencies so as to embrace the development of the whole man, its aim is the evangelization and Christian culture of young men.

In reviewing the year's work, while we are conscious of failure to secure the very highest results, we are able to confidently report that the year has been one of steady persistent effort to secure the greatest good to the greatest number through each department of the work, and the experience of the year will enable us to more perfectly mature our plans for the future.

Financially, perhaps the standing at the close of any one year was never better, owing tor the generous gift of $\$ 1000.00$ by Mrs. H. F. Bronson, to enable all existing liabilities to be met. The expenses for the year have been heavy. Every effort was made to economize, but an expenditure of some $\$ 500.00$ was absolutely necessary, to renew the bath rooms, to ventilate the basement, to put in Physical Director's office, and for renewals to Gymnasium.

Owing to the depression of business, the collections have been more difficult to make than in previous years, but on the whole the work has received the hearty support of the community, and the estimates made at the beginning of the year have been realized. The two principal items of receipts, were membership fees and subscriptions, $\$ 2.677 .25$; and from the general public, $\$ 2,1 \$ 8.25$.

A perusal of the Membership Committees' Report will show that the Assbciation's privil-geŝ are enjoyed by all classes of young men without social or religious distinction.

Besides those who are on membership, there are privileges which are enjoyed by many others: The Free Reading Room is a great boon to many, affording not only an opportunity for young men of the city but a place for the stranger, and often it is the Reading Room that becomes the medium by which he is introduced to helpful associates, and is encouraged to follow the right amidst the temptations of city life.

The Religious work has a prominent place in the programme of each week as will be seen by the report of statistics of the Mission and Devotional Committee. The Bible classes have a large attendance, but the other meetings for men have not been as large as the Committee desire, yet the spirit of activity manifested by the workers, especially during the latter part of the year, shows an interest in this side of our work that cannot fail to influence the spiritual life of young men.-

It was hoped that the change of time for the Men's Gospel Meeting on Sunday from 8. 80 p.m, to 4.15 would secure a much larger regular attendance. The attendance has somewhat increased, owing in a large measure to special arrangements of speakers and subjects. We are indebted to several of the city pastors, to Evangelists and others, who have helped in this meeting from time to time.

The Invitation Committee throughout the year has been persistent in its efforts to bring the mestings before young men, by the distribution of tickets and dodgers, and by personal invitation.

In the Educational work attention has been given by the Committees in charge of this important Department, to make it more efficient in its various branches.

The Librarian's report shows a steady increase in the circulation of the Lending Library, with 164 books added, 70 by purchase, and 94 by gift. This department is now receiving much attention and every effort is being made to build up a Library that will be useful to all classes of readers and students. With the help of those who are interested in the intellectual development of young men, we hope to be able to render valuable additions of historical, scientific, technical and other standard works. Evening Classes in practical subjects are claiming the attention of associations everywhere, and are looked upon as an important factor in the work, notwithstanding that we labor under a disadvantage, because of insufficient room and want of proper equipment to carry on educational work to the best advantage. The result of the season's work is generally satisfactory, while the class in architectural and mechanical drawing shows exceptional attendance and exceedingly good progress.

The Literary and Debating Society has been a feature in the weekly programme of marked interest ; its influence has been such as to develop thought, to acquaint its members with the great political and social questions of the day, as well as literary subjects, and has encouraged the art of public speaking. Several lectures of an educational character were delivered from time to time.

The Physical Department has been under the direction of Mr. Geo. H. Close, who responded to a call to the directorship in October. The true purpose of the Association's Physical work has been sought-the symmetrical development of the body as a fundamental side of the "all around" training of men. The aim of the department is necessarily the same as that of the Association as a whole,-to build up young men into all round manly Christians. To do this each of the three natures must be developed and made a symmetrical part of a symmetrical whole.

The work during the past winter has been intended for the majority
of men rather than the development of a few special experts, who would occupy the attention of the Director and tend to discourage the mass of men who are most in need of the benefits to be derived. The work has been truly educative, and aimed at a gradual development of all faculties. Although health and recreation have been the chief objects in view, the development of the higher physical qualities such as physical judgenent, muscular control, grace, agility and courage, has not been omitted. It is the belief of the Committee in charge that this system and arrangement of work has shown a superiority over others, and better adapted to the use of the Association. As evidence of the fact we are able to show larger figures for class attendance, and more classes have been held than for any previous year. Classes have been held for business and professional men students and clerks, juniors, eto., and the evening Educational Classes grew so large at the opening of the season that four nights had to be taken in order that comfortable room might be had by those exercising.

Socially, the air of cordiality and good-will exists. The parlors have had their old time attractiveness and "social evenings" have been com. mon every night in the week.

The Reception Committee have helped to receive and entertain, and the receptions held at different times during the winter were noted for their "special" features.

On December 15th, the Association was honored by a visit from His Excellency the Earl of Aberdeen, Governor General of Canada. He was received by the Board of Directors and conducted through the build-

His Excellency addressed the Directors and members present, and assured them of his good-will and sympathy for the aims and objects of the Institution.

He offered a medal to be competed for by the Junior Gymnasium Class which had given an exhibition of Calisthenic work before him.

Mr. W. C. White, who for nearly two years held the position of Assistant Secretary, resigned in January, to enter Wyoliffe College, Toronto, in order to prepare for Foreign Missionary work, His place has

The Woman's Auxiliary has, as heretofore, cared for the home side of the Association. We are indebted to their kind interest at all times. Renewal in furnishings, furnishing of Physical Director's office, their preparation of provisions, and attendance at the various receptions are but a few of the many things that they have done to help the work.

The Annual Provincial Convention of Ontario and Quebec was held at Toronto. The President, Vic̣e.-President, Physical Director and others, represented the Ottawa Association.

On their return the delegates reported to the members at a reception held in the parlors.

The Junior Department has not received the care and attention it deserved owing to the fact of heing without an Assistant Secretary for so 'long, and a dearth of workers to take an interest in boy's work.

We desire to offer our thanks to those who have, from time to time during the year contributed in anyway towards the success of the work, and to the city press for their support and the publicity they are always willing to give to Association news items.

On the threshold of another Association year, we take up the Jubilee motto chosen by Sir George Williams, (" He thanked God and took cour. age," Acts xxviii 15) knowing that our work is for Him and to Him.
"For to this end we labour and strive because we have our hope set con the living God, who is the Saviour of all men, especially of them that believe." 1 Tim, iv, 10. (R.V.)

The Mission and Devotional Committee in presenting its report for the year just closed，does so with the conviction that though by the blessing of God good has been done，and a number of young men have been led to accept Jesus Christ as a personal Saviour，and others have been helped in their Christian Life，that more might and ought to have been accomplished through the agency of the various meetings that have been carried on by the Association．What is needed，is a more earnest and hearty spirit of consecration，that by the power of the Holy Spirit our Association may be more and more used of God，as it seeks to carry on work for young men by young men．

The Saturday Night meeting is conducted largely with the aim of benefitting Christian young men，though an appeal to those who have not come out on the Lord＇s side is invariably made，while the Sunday p．m． meeting is exclusively a Gospel meeting．

The hour of the latter meeting has been changed from $8.80 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$ ．to 4.15 p．m．，and has been addressed by Mr．Spencer Walton，Dr．W．T． Grenfell，Revd．E．B．Moody，Mr．Budgett Meakin，a number of the city clergy，and members of the Association．

The morning and afternoon classes for Bible Study, conducted by Mr. James Gibson and the General Secretary respectively, have been successfully carried on; also a Workers' Training Class, and open-air Evangelistic Service at Pooley's Bridge.

The Week of Prayer for young men was observed between the 12 th and 19th. of November, meetings being held each evening. Special sermons were also preached by a number of city pastors.

The remaining services undertaken by the Association are those at the Hospital and Jail, which have been regularly kept up.

Sunday Morning Brble Class:-This Class, conducted by Mr. Jas. Gibson, meets every Sunday morning at 9.45. During the year ending April 30th, there have been held 52 Sefaions, showing a total attendance of 1821, and an average of 35 . The lessons are from the "International Sunday School Series." There has been a steady increase in attendance during the last four months of the year, and the uverage reached during this period is in advance of any previous corresponding months. The majority of this class is composed of young men who teach in schools in the afternoon, and this fact proves how valuable and profitable as well as interesting is the instruction given in this class, not only in receiving a thorough knowledge of the lessons, but a knowledge how to impart that knowledge thus acquired to others, which latter is as essential to successful teaching us the former. It is the testimony of many of the members that help derived in attending this class is almost inestimable in their Sunday School teaching.

Jail Work :-The work in this department for the last year has been steady.

The attendance at our Sabbath Morning Sorvices averaged about five.
Quite a large number of prisoners were transferred to the "Central," their term of confinement here was therefore short.

A few prisoners have been helped-food and clothing provided. We believe that the kindness shewn both in and outside of the Jail will not bo forgotten. We cannot, however, provide shelter, this is searcely within the province of the Y. M. C. A's work. But if some good Christian people would open a home to receive such, where advice and assistance could be obtained, thanks from many hearts would be given.

It is a pity that men who have no homes should be left to wander our stroets or seek shelfer in the Police Station during the cold days and nights of winter.

A few illustrated papers, such as the Christian Herald, Band of Hope, and British Workman, would by gladly received, as the prisoners are often very hard up for reading material.

## REOEPTION COMMITTEE.

Another milestone in the journey of life has been reached and with it an opportune time to "sum up what has been done and what there is to do." When presented beside reports of other Committees, the report of the Reception Committee does not present the same quantity of figures; the work of this Committee is not one the success of which can be shown
by figures, its work, its only direct work is to point young men to a loving Saviour ; its indirect work is to extend to all who enter our rooms a hearty weleome ; these aims during the past year have carried out, not as well as we had wished but as well as the energy at our disposal would permit. During the year members of this Committee have been on duty 166 evenings ; family worship was been held at the closing of the rooms with an average attendance of 9 .

A number of receptions were held during the past year at which the members of this Committee were present and lent their assistance; among the more interesting and successful of these was the "Mystery Re. ception "given on the 13th of last October.

A reception was also given to our Physical Director which proved a very pleasant evening. Our New Year's reception was largely attended and evidently much enjoyed by the visitors, the "Motto Grotto," and cave "historic" were novel and very instructive additions to this day's pleasures.

The closing reception is too fresh in our memories to require to be dealt with at any length, it is enough to say that the programme of the evening was sufficiently rare and interesting to entertain the large number of members and their friends who attended. On July 27th our Annual Moonlight Excursion down the Ottawa on the "Str. Empress" took place. The Reception Committee were present in full force to attend to the social side of the outing, the Club also assisted the Auxiliary at the Garden Party at the residence of Mrs. McLeod Stewart.

## INVITATION AND TRAOT COMMITTEE.

At the end of another year your Committee feel grateful for the growth of the work committed to their hands. During the yeav several new mem. bers have been added to the Committee which at present numbers twentyfive (25).

Many have been brought into the Association by this Committee. eight (8) interesting Committee Meetings were held with an average attendance of twelve (12), reports of the different branches of the work were disoussed and some suggestions given by members were acted upon.

The regular invitation work has been carried on for the respective meetings at eight ( 8 ) of the principal hotels and also the street corners, about thirty thousand $(30,000)$, invitation slips have been used, and also seven thousand ( 7000 ) for Mr. Walton's special meetings, but as it has been emphasized other years, the telling work has been the hand to hand or personal invitation.

At the commencement of the year we received about thirty thousand $(80,000)$ Gospel tracts, (assorted) from Sterling, with usual cost of about $\$ 35,00$.

On May 7th we commenced our barge work, and during the six months, tracts were distributed on five handred and twenty eight (528) boats and barges, several song services wefe held and Scripture addresses given to which the men listened attentively.

During the year we had the pleasure of having Mr. J. S. Potter, Missionary of the Upper Canada Tract Society, with us on Sunday morning, and many of the members who accompanied were very much benefitted by his more experienced way of dealing with men on boats and barges.

Tracts were also distributed at twenty-eight (28) open air meetings in front of the Building, and also at Pooley's Bridge and other points.

The Boxes placed in the railway shops and granite works are kept supplied with tracts and invitations.

The Church Directory in connection with the hotels is carried on by one of the members of this Committee. A neat Card with a list of City Churches, and a cordial invitation to the rooms is addressed to guests remaining over Sunday, about 700 of which have been used with good results.

## REPORT OF MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE.

The Membership Committee beg to offer the following report of their labours for the year ended 30th April, 1894. After appointment, several meetings were held ; the roll of members revised and lists of names given to a number of active workers to remind the members of the annual fee being due. A considerable number of our members have been called on with satisfactory results, but the Committee feel that if a more careful attention could be given to this matter, our roll would be kept up better than it is at present. A more real individual responsibility to Christ and His cause is needed in this work. May all who take His name, volunteer for a more consecrated work this year.

The membership applications for this year, 210 , have been examined and some interesting faots gathered fram them, viz:-82 voluntarily sought admission to our ranks. 8 active members introduced 52 applicants for membership and about 30 different workers introduced the remainder, 76. The denomithational order is Presbyterian, 68 ; Methodists, 52 ; Episcopalians, 45 ; Baptists, 22 ; Congregationalists, 9 ; other denom. inations, 14. 98 of the total 210 are Chureh communicants. Under business head, they are as follows :-Students, 45 ; Olerks, 23; Civil Service, 22 ; Machinists, 11 ; Painters, 9 ; Merchants, 7 ; Carpenters, 7 ; Teachers, 6 ; Agents, 4 ; Woodworkers, 5 ; Druggists, 3 ; Book-kerpers, 2; Messengers, 2 ; Tailors, 2 ; Commercial Traveller, 1 ; Blacksmith, 1; Barber, 1; Paperhanger, 1; Moulder, 1; Waiter, 1; Coachman, 1; Watchman, 1 ; Doctors, 8 ; Occupations not given, 51.

Some of these facts make it safe for your Oommittee to say that if the members who have not been exerting themselves in the past were to exercise a little more onergy and zeal in looking out for new members, much larger additions would certainly be the result.

## REPORT OF PHYSICAL CULITURE COMMITTEE, 1893-1894.

In presenting the annual report of this department of the work, your Committee desire to express thankfulness to our Heavenly Father for the large measure of succels with which He has blessed us. We are also pleased to be able to report the most successful season's work in our history. Not only have the results been as satisfactory as in previous years, but a decided advance has been made all along the line.

Your Committee in last year's report indulged the hope that they would be able to adopt a graded system in the class work, such a system has been introduced and with gratifying results. Our hope has thus fan been realized. "The greatest good for the greatest number" has been the motto. Never in our history has there been the same real and lasting interest in the classes than during the past season. Never have so many members taken advantage of the instruction given. Never has the system of instruction been so well adapted to our needs. This system has been tested by the leading associations throughout the country, and as in theirs, 80 our experience proves it to be the right one.

The following pieces were added during the season to the gymnasium equipment:-Horse, Storming.board, Buck, Medicine Ball, Jumping Boards ; also a new set of Dumb Bells and Indian Clubs, and a rack in dressing room.

During the winter the Senior Showshoe Club re-organized. Tramping out 8 times with an average attendance of 8 , Junior S . S. Club took 7 tramps, average attendance 8 .

During the work of April the Lacrosse Club re-organized, also a Foot Ball Club.

Under somewhat altered conditions, as to size of teams and rules of play, we revived the game of basket-ball, and very general interest was taken by the members of all the classes. An interesting series of matches being arranged, proved a pleasant feature of the season's work, several games being keenly contested.

We are indebted to Drs. Hanna and Cousens for exceedingly interesting and valuable medical talks given to the members on the floor of the Gymnasium. We trust that these informal "lectures "will become a permanent feature in connection with the work; average attendance at each, 62.

The Juniors gave an impromptu exhibition on the occasion of His Excellency's visit to the Gymnasium on December 15th, who, to show his interest in the work, gave two prizes for punctuality and attendance, which were won by, E. D. Steele, and W. D. McCann. The Seniors gave a short exhibition on New Year's day, as a contribation to the entertainment of our friends on that occasion. The Closing Exhibition is of such recent date, that it requires but brief mention, 50 members took part in the different exercises, and all acquitted themselves creditably. The event was a fitting close to our most successful season.

## EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

As usual the bulk of the work of this Committee was at the beginning of the season, when classes were to be arranged and an efficient staff of teachers secured. The following will give a brief account of what was accomplished in this direction.

The Commercial classes were under the direction of the Ottawa Business College ; Mr. Garvock, took charge of Freehand and Mechanical Drawing ; Mons. Fleury taught the French Class ; and Mr. Byshe, conducted the Vocal Musio.

There were 112 students entered. The number of entries in all the subjects was 160 , and the total attendance. 1439. They were divided as follows :


The French class was not quite as well attended as in former years, although the percentage was good. Book-keeping was up to the average. Owing to theillness of the teacher who could only attend 8 out of the 24 classes, the percentage in vocal music was low. The Freehand and Mechanical drawing was an unqualified success. Over one-half of the number of students who entered had their fee returned, having attended $85 \%$ of the classes. In conneetion with this class, 4 special sets of graded drawing copies, 2 architectural, 2 mechanical, which had been specially prepared for Y. M. C. A. classes by the Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, were secured.

Talent, which would otherwise have lain dormant, has frequently been aroused, and students have thus been fitted to occupy better positions.

Several lectures were given and well attended. A series by Mrs. Mountford, under the joint auspices of the Y.M.C.A. and Y. W. O. A. which proved not only a financial success, but were highly instructive, particularly to Bible students.

One by Dr. Ami, subject "Canada at the World's Fair," which was illastrated by dissolving views.

## LITERARY AND DEBATING SOCIETY.

The Literary and Debating Society once more makes its bow to you, and it doess so, at the close of the season 1893-94, with feelings of thank fulness to Him whose guiding hand through a most pleasant and profitable
winter, enables us now to report gladly and hopefully upon this branch of the Association work.

At the outset, with regard to our progress and what we have accomplished, we may say with becoming modesty, that during the season of 1898-94, the Y. M. C. A. Literary and Debating Society fllurished, and if evidence were necessary to substantiate the claim, we could point with pride to many young men who derived marked benefit from connection with the Society, and furthermore, we would refer you to the following facts as vrrification of our contention.

The Society conducted 20 regular meetings and 8 open debates throughout the season, making 23 in all; being an increase of three regular meetings over last year with the same number of open debates. The average attendance at the regular delates was 27 , and at the open debates 225 . The grand total attendance during the season was 1,184 .

It will therefore be seen that in truth the Society has a just claim to a share of the honor attached to the Association as a whole. The season's programme has embraced a diversity of subjects which it is not possible to speak of here, but it is enough to mention that the debates were attended from time to time by aldermen, doctors, lawyers, judges, senators, and others of intellect and worth, thereby proving the importance of the discussions carried on, and establishing a record which should widen the Society's beneficence when another season rolls around. The literary evenings were not perhaps as frequent as they should have been, but good, live questions seemed to be more appreciated. Great pleasure and inştruction were derived from the three lectures delivered by A. Nugent, B.A., our critic.

In conclusion we beg to submit that in all our actions and efforts the broad and ennobling principle that all men are hrethren, which we felt to be in keeping with our surroundings, was given special prominence, and this principle was endorsed and furthered by every officer of the Society.

## ROOMS AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The Roons and Library Committee commenced the year with a feeling that there was considerable work to be done in their partioular province, and consequently considered and discussed many plans for the improvement of the rooms and extension of the Library. While we have not had the pleasure of seeing all our plans carried out, we feel that it is better to aspire to great things even though we fall short, than to be satisfied with a low aim ; and yet looking over the past year we realize that something has been done, and although in some parts of the building only a commencement has been made, we confidently look under the guidance of our Heavenly Eather for a completion of all necessary work.

The front door of the building had never given satisfaction, the hall being too dark if it was shut, and a great deal of cold coming in if it was left open in the winter; to overcome the difficulty the Committee had the panels cut out and plate glass inserted in their place, thereby giving the front part of the building a puch more cheerfal appearance, a coat of paint was given to the front steps and walls and to the reading room. We also had the stairway to basement enclosed in order to keep down the noise from the Gymnasium as much as possible, this was a much needed improvement. In connection with the Gymnasium, an office for the Physical Director was built, with windows so arranged that he can see every part of the floor without leaving his office, a large ventilating shaft has been carried from the basemont and part of the floor laid in cement. We hope to cement floor all through the basement in time.

The Comsittee had hoped to see a full suite of porcelain lined baths in place, but in this we were not successful, however we succeeded in having one placed in position and it has been nuch appreciated.

The change carried out in the front office makes it more convenient and also gives more ruom.

In the early part of the year stock was taken in the Library and a complete record of the books obtained, particulars of which appear in the Librarian's Report. Daring the year $\$ 66$ was spent on new books, of this $\$ 31$ was from special contribution. While we are thankful for this amount we know that in order to keep the Library up to a proper standard a much
larger sum will be required each year, and hope for better things in the future.

We have also to acknowledge with thanks, gifts of books from friends of the Association. We might mention a few. Mrs. Whiteaves, Mr. R. W. Martin, J. G. Bourinot, C.M.C., L.L.D., D.C.L. Agricultural (Statistical Records.) No. of books drawn for home reading 775.

## YEARLY REPORT OF JUNIOR DEPARTMENT COMMITTEE, MAY 1 ist, 1894. <br> -

While in the Y.M.C.A. we recognize the varions needs of young men and endeavour to adapt our institution to meet these requirements, it is equally necessary and perhaps more needful that we cater to the physical and intellectual development of our boys if we would influence them morally and spiritually. With this end in view the Committee arranged a number of outings and excursions which they believe have been productive of good. During the summer months eight outings were held on Saturday afternoons, with an average attendance of ten.

But the greatest feature was the summer camp.
In July, 8 seniors and 22 juniors spent three of the pleasantest weeks of their lives under canvas at a beautiful spot on the bank of the Ottawa river, opposite the village of Quyon. The Committee in charge felt that it could not speak too highly of the good conduct of the boys.

Nothing oceurred to mar their pleasuse, while each boy will carry with him memory of many pleasant incidents to brighten his pathwayo through life.

The annual pie-nic was held in the latter part of August, at Besserer's Grove. The day was wet, and much sympathy was expressed for our welfare by the friends left behind us. We are happy to relate that we fail to remember a boy who did not enjoy himself or whose appetite failed him on account of the weather.

During the Winter there were on Saturdays, seven snow shoe tramps with an average attendauce of eight.

An evening in March was spent very pleasantly and profitably while Messrs. Mills and Morde gave a talk to boys, illustrated by lime-light views.

The Friday evening meetings have had an average attendance during the year of 23 . They have been conaucted on the usual plan and good results have been manifest.

The total attendance at the Bible Training Classes was 77.
It is unnecessary to refer to the junior work in the gymnasium except to emphasize if possible, on the minds of those present, the value of the instruction received there.

In presenting this report the Committee feel that while much has been done there is room for a much greater work than has yet been acomplished, and ask that the Committee about to be appointed may have the prayer of all members of the Association.
