Metropolis, 26th.

A violent gale followed yesterday's snow storm and continued all night. Span No. 3 of the iron work on the Resolute river bridge, which has been swung during the afternoon and thought secure, was blown down about three o'clock this morning. Weather still continues stormy, with high winds and heavy drifts of snow.

Caracquet, 26th.

A large number of rioters assembled outside Hon. Robert Young's residence yesterday, bent on lawlessness and mischief, but on finding out that Mr. Young and several others were inside well armed and otherwise prepared to receive them, they left, threatening to increase their numbers and return to the attack some time to-day. The rioters were armed with guns and sticks.

During the riot last week, two constables were proceeding towards Caracquet on business not at all connected with the rioters, when just as they were entering the place, the gang met them, enquired their business, and made them produce their papers. This did not satisfy the horde of ruffians, who coolly proceeded to pinion the constables back to back, and then turning the horse's head in the opposite direction, started them off home again. After proceeding a short distance the rioters were lawfully released from their uncomfortable position.

Three of the rioters, Elsie Lanthin, Gustave Lanthin, and Joseph LeBouillier, were taken this morning by Sheriff Vail, who arrived at 2 a. m. with eight men from Bathurst. The Sheriff will probably remain until the weather moderates, as it is almost impossible to pick up the storm. Meanwhile he may pick up a few more of the gang.

Commutation of Lepine's Sentence.

(Special to the Tribune.)

An extra of the *Canada Gazette*, issued yesterday, contains the following letter from the Governor General's Secretary: "I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor General to inform you that His Excellency has been under his full and anxious consideration the evidence and other documents connected with the trial of Ambrose Lepine, who has been capitally convicted before a Court of Assize held at Winnipeg, of the murder of Thomas Scott on the 4th day of March, 1870, at Fort Garry. Although His Excellency entirely agrees with the finding of the jury, and considers the crime of which the prisoner, Lepine, has been convicted, was nothing less than a cruel and unjustified murder, he is of the opinion that the subsequent circumstances, and, notably, the relations into which the provincial authorities with the prisoner and his associates, are such as, in a great degree, to fetter the hands of justice. It further appears to His Excellency that the case has passed beyond the Province of Departmental administration, and that it will be best dealt with under the Royal Instructions which authorize the Governor General in certain capital cases to dispense with the advice of his Ministers, and to exercise the prerogative of the Crown according to his independent judgment and to his own personal responsibility. I have, therefore, in compliance with the order of His Excellency, to inform you that it is His Excellency's pleasure that the capital sentence passed upon the prisoner Lepine, be commuted to two years imprisonment in the penitentiary, and that he be set at liberty on his parole of conviction, and permanent forfeiture of his political rights. His Excellency desires that the necessary instrument for giving effect to this commutation be forthwith prepared."

Holocausts of the Sea.

The recent fiery destruction at sea of the emigrant ship *Cospatrick*, involving so great a loss of life, suggests how little has yet been done to render ocean voyaging as safe a thing as it ought to be. Getting back only to Noah and his Ark, we may call it nearly six thousand years since the art of navigation became familiar to mankind, and yet, for all we know to the contrary, Noah's precautions were every whit as practical as our own, in regard to providing against a conflagration amid the "waste of waters." One would suppose that where water was so abundant fire was a peril not so much to be apprehended; and as it rained incessantly while Noah enjoyed his marine excursion during the deluge, perhaps we may admit that he was not so imprudently called upon to protect, seriously, about the fire question. But frequent conflagrations at sea are more especially to be expected now that steam vessels supersede sailing ones to so great an extent on every ocean; yet where are all the ingenious contrivances to diminish the fire-risk we have a right to look for under the circumstances? Sailing vessels should, by all means, be exempt from many of the dangers of fire that beset the steamers, and necessarily surround a steamer, and one might fancy that since it is not an impossibility, their managers would render a ship's burning at sea a thing unheard of, if only to demonstrate their superior safety for passengers' transit. But that desirable state of improvement has not yet been reached, though it is to be hoped that it will not be deferred much longer.

Pacific Mail Scandal.

REMARKABLE DEVELOPMENTS—EXCITEMENT AMONG THE LOBBYISTS—THE PACIFIC MAIL ENQUIRY—ABERT'S DISCLOSURES.

Mr. Abert, the uncle of the imprisoned recusant witness, Irwin, having received counsel to the effect that he was bound to answer the questions put to him by the Ways and Means Committee, and the House having ordered that he should answer or stand in contempt, went before the Ways and Means Committee on Monday and gave the names of the following persons to whom he had paid money in the Pacific Mail matter: Joseph McFarland, correspondent of the *Philadelphia Press* and Boston *Globe*, \$25,000; A. W. Randall, ex-

Postmaster General, \$5000; William B. Shaw, correspondent of the Boston *Transcript*, \$15,000; A. B. Corwin, \$1500; J. M. Morris, late editor of the *Chronicle*, \$1500; J. G. Berret, for self and Sam Ward, \$7000; J. H. Hersey, \$11,000; H. G. Fant, \$9000; O. J. Averill, \$9000; Charles Abert, \$5000; Donat Platt, editor of the *Capital*, \$5000; John Boyd, supposed to be Assistant Doorkeeper of the House, \$1000; H. G. Fant, \$1000; S. E. Chittenden, supposed to be ex-Registrar of the Treasury, \$5000. Irwin, for whom Abert disbursed money, says Col. Platt never was in the employ of the Pacific Mail. On the contrary, he fought it personally and in his paper from first to last. After the subsidy was granted he loaned Col. Platt the money, as he had loaned him money before, being a personal friend, and that some months after the subsidy was repaid in full. Each of the gentlemen named above soon have an opportunity to explain to the Committee what services he performed and with whom, if anybody, a division of the money was made.

The Wood Trade.

Farnworth & Jardine's Wood Circular, dated Liverpool, Dec. 31, states that the arrivals from British North America during the past month have been 81 vessels, 24,566 tons against 87 vessels, 29,951 tons during the corresponding month of last year. The consumption of nearly all kinds of wood during the past month has been satisfactory, considering the hard frost we have had for the last fortnight, which has considerably impeded business. Stocks, with very few exceptions, compare favourably with last year, but there is a general distrust in the trade about the future, which will operate against business for some time to come.

CANADIAN WOODS.—There has been a fair demand for Yellow Pine timber and prices have been satisfactory; Red Pine has been in very limited request; Oak is rather scarce, and the stock is heavy. For elm there has been more inquiry, for fresh parcels. For Ash the demand is limited. Birch is advancing in value, but stocks are still too heavy to admit of much further improvement. Pine deals are heavy in stock, but the market is very bare of first quality, which are much wanted. Staves continue very dull of sale, and prices without change. Lathwood is in fair demand. SPRUCE AND PINE DEALS.—The quantity of spruce deals coming forward at the close of the season is greater than was expected, consequently the late harvest has been at lower prices; the consumption, however, has continued fair, and the stock is the same as last year. Pine deals are in fair demand, and prices are a little lower in price than spruce, and are difficult to sell, stocks are ample. Birch is improving in value, though rather quiet than it was a month ago. The aggregate tonnage from the British Colonies to this date in 1872, 1873 and 1874, is respectively 265,551, 325,378, 348,688.

A Sensible Judge.

A remarkable case occurred in the Chester Assize Court the other day. A woman having been found guilty of the murder of her husband, Mr. Justice Brett, in an address to the prisoner, dwelt upon the evidence of her husband's long continued brutality received with exemplary forbearance, of special consideration, and that on the day of his death, of the momentary passion which had moved her to throw a sharpened steel at him, without (the Judge believed) any intention of striking him. It did strike the man and the wife immediately ran for assistance, and did all she could to save him. "All the real justice in the case," continued the Judge, "was on your side, all the real wrong on your husband's side. I would be no party to it. I will not allow it to be said by anybody that you are a convicted felon, for a conviction is not complete until a sentence is passed, and I mean to pass no sentence at all. I shall merely ask you to enter into your own recognition to come up for judgment when I call upon; and nobody in the world will call upon you—God forbid they ever should." The address was interrupted by loud cheering in the court, which was renewed when the prisoner left the dock.
