

The Freeman of Tuesday last made The Freeman of Tuesday last made another attempt to weaken the force of our previous articles on the Fisher-ies, and to persuade its readers that ies, and to persuade its readers that no injustice has been done to the The Bishop of Fredericton Maritime Provinces, but unwittingly corroborated our statement, and made our case stronger. We showed by extracts from the Commissioner's last Report that the fisheries of the Maritime Provinces yielded \$8,424,129, while those of Ontario and Quebec yielded only \$2,998.370. We also showed that to protect these small fisheries the enormous sum of \$44,153 was paid to 208 officers, while to protect the larger and more important fisheries of the Maritime Provinces only \$28,269 was paid to 391 officers. That is, our fisheries, which yielded eight and a half millions of dollars, got for their protection but little more than half the sum that was paid for protecting the Ontario and Quebec fisheries which yielded only three millions of dollars. In reply to this the Freeman says that "the money is spent only in the protection of the shore and river fisheries; that Overseers and Wardens can do little ornothing for the deep sea fisheries." This makes out our case precisely. The shore and river fisheries of Quebec are much less extensive than those of Nova Sche and New Brunswick, and if the Freeman's reasoning is corect, a much smaller sum is needed to rotect them; but we find that New Brunswick and Nova Scotia combined got but \$26,295 for protection, while Quebec, which, according to the Freeman, needed it less, got \$29,968.
