Scarlet fever being a terribly infectious disease, the sufferer must be isolated from the very beginning, and not allowed to join the family for at least five weeks in the most favorable case. If this rule is rigidly adhered to, it will save much suffering from the spread of this dreaded disorder. No fumigation can be relied on to disinfest articles that have been used in the sick room.

Those that cannot be washed, particularly the mattresses, must be burned; the others boiled in a strong solution of carbolic acid. The floor and woodwork must be washed with the same, and the ceiling whitewashed with lime.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The monotony of waiting is being again relieved by some of our contemporaries by guessing at the strength of parties in the next house of parliament. Government papers put the Tory majority at 23 over the opposition, and the independentists. This is probably the very outside which can be claimed under any pretence; but there are causes at work which may greatly reduce this number, that is, supposing it to be correct as matters now stand.

One of these causes is the final adjustment of the returns. It begins to look as if Mr. King and not Mr. Baind would sit for Queen's. Dunn has not yet made his return, and when he asked advice from the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery he received very cold comfort. As Mr. Baind is counted in the Tory estimate, the majority claimed will have to be put at twenty-one if Mr. King is finally returned. Whether any other seats are likely to be affected by technicalities is at present not apparent, but quite a number are sure to become vacant by proceedings in the election courts, and in some instances a liberal candidate may take the place of a Tory.

In Manitoba the disallowance question is to the fore, and the Hon. C. P. Brown has left the government because Premier Norquay will not join issue with Sir John Macdonald on the disallowance of local railway charters. It is thought that Brown's defection, and that of others, which will follow, will result in the defeat of the local government when the legislature meets. Such a result could not fail to affect the relations of the Manitoba members of the house of commons towards the federal government.

Between Mr. Chapleau and Sir Hector Langevin the rivalry continues to be very keen. The project of shelling the latter gentleman has not as yet met with much favor from the person most interested, but to add to his troubles comes a protest against his seat for Three Rivers, a proceeding which everybody knows must result adversely to him. A sort of Chapleau boom has been inaugurated. There was some talk that he was going to join the liberals to oust Sir John and make a coalition government; but there does not seem to be any ground for such a story.

Meanwhile it seems to be conceded that Mr. Blake will again accept of the party leadership at the hands of the liberals. In view of this some of our contemporaries will feel like withdrawing some of the good things they said about him on the strength of his reported retirement. But what they have written they have written, and "there's an end on it." We have very authority now to claim that Mr. Blake in ability, industry and spotless integrity stands high above any other man in Canadian public life. Our Tory friends were over-ready to hang garlands on Mr. Blake's political tomb. However, we have evidence in Mr. Mackenzie's case that their professed admiration will not prevent them from resorting to all manner of discreditable tactics to do injury to the object of it.

Parliament will assemble on the 13th inst. The prospects of a lively session are good. "We have what makes things warm for his friends, although it is more

than doubtful if he has not lost a great deal of his vigor. He will have to face in the attacks of Mr. Blake something very different from what he was accustomed to when in parliament before. Blake has gained in power, while Tupper has lost.

THE FREDERICKTON AND WOOD.

The position of this company is about as follows as we understand it: As soon as the directors are in a position to give a reasonable guarantee that the road will be built, that is, as soon as they can show available resources sufficient to pay for its construction, the local government will enter into a contract with them. To enable the directors to do this it is necessary for them to obtain a dominion subsidy for the whole of the line. Only twenty-two miles, or about one-third of the whole, are covered by the subsidy already granted. The early construction of the road will, therefore, depend altogether upon what the federal government will do during the ensuing session in the way of subsidizing local roads. Our readers can judge for themselves as to the probability of any public subsidy being granted at present to this road. It has been thought by some that the fact of a subsidy having been given for a part of the road might be taken as a guarantee that the remainder would receive the same consideration; but it must be remembered that the twenty-two miles subsidized are scheduled as a part of the short line.

DISREGARDING THE GEOGRAPHY.

It will be remembered that when the Short Line agitation was at its height, The Gleaner strenuously urged that the interests of New Brunswick and Quebec City were common, and notwithstanding the strong opposition of St. John and of prominent gentlemen in our own city we contended against a southern location for the Short Line, arguing in favor of one north of Moosehead Lake to enter New Brunswick near Woodstock and to have a connection with Quebec. This view was disregarded, but we regret to say that the facts, as they develop themselves, show that we were right.

A terrible explosion occurred, on Tuesday, at Savannah, in coal shaft No. 2, killing six miners. A rescuing party was sent down into the mine, but they were overpowered by gas, and 12 were suffocated before they could be taken out, making 18 dead in all. Most of the victims are Indians.

At half-past four on Tuesday morning about 60 undisciplined men forcibly entered the jail at Yorkville, South "Aro" and broke out the prisoners. Among the inmates were John Good, Bailey Bowdler, Fredrick Thompson and Moses Lipscombe, negroes, charged with the murder of John Lee Good, a young white lad in December last. Taking the prisoners one mile north of the village they hanged them to limbs of trees. These men organized a conspiracy in the fall of 1886 to steal cotton and to murder, if necessary, to conceal their crime. They killed young Good. The prisoners were to have been tried this week, but the henchmen got ahead of the law.

Canadian.

Chief Justice Cameron, of Ontario, and Stuart of Quebec, have been made knights bachelor.

The Manitoba legislature meets on the 14th inst. It is thought the conservative government there will scarcely last through the session.

Arrangements are being pressed forward with all possible speed to hold the Halifax ladies college in connection with the Presbyterian church in September.

At a recent meeting of the Halifax city council the resolution was adopted to prepare a list for the present session of the Nova Scotia legislature to confer the franchise on the right to vote at elections.

An arrangement was entered into on Saturday night between the Builders' Union and the Builders and Contractors' Association of Toronto, to the effect that wages of April 1st to March 31st, 1888, shall be 15¢ per hour.

Messrs. Matheson, Harley & Co., dry goods of Halifax, have assigned to Thomas Jones and J. S. Macdonald, the latter representing the English creditors. Their liabilities were set down at \$34,000; assets, nominally six times as much.

The attorney general of British Columbia states that the government has commenced an action against the Canadian Pacific railway company for \$50,000, the amount of the bond guaranteeing the completion of the railway to Coal Harbour by December 31st, 1887.

Cardinal Taschereau, on his arrival at Quebec from Rome on Tuesday, was met by a large number of the clergy, and a procession of the faithful, who were driven in a state carriage to the residence, where he gave the benediction and conveyed the pope's blessing to the Catholics of Quebec.

Archbishop Lynch, in a pastoral to the clergy on the subject of extravagance in funerals, says the church permits a crown of flowers as a sign of heavenly joy upon the head of children only who have not attained the age of reason. A simple pall is all she allows on the coffin of the funeral of those who have reached the age of reason, and enjoins the clergy to see that these rules are strictly carried out. The pastoral calls, also, for the better observance of holidays.

Provincial.

Messrs. Sutherland & Creighton, of Newcastle, have dissolved partnership. Mr. Sutherland retires.

A valuable gold watch, the gift of Mr. Gray, of the Hestingshio Indian settlement, to the most popular of the I. C. I. express train conductors, has been presented to Conductor McKenna, who received 1000 votes.

Mr. John McIntosh, Glasville, Carleton Co., has been presented by the agricultural department at Ottawa, with a beautifully illuminated Chrono, in token of the prize received by him on the 25th of the colonial exhibition.

In the application made by the trustee defendants in the suit of Daniel & Boyd v. Colley et al. to have the decree set aside so as to restrict the property from passing into the hands of the receivers to that mentioned in the bill of sale under which the plaintiff claims, his honor, Judge Palmer refused to grant it.

NEWS CONDENSED.

Cable.

The Pope has issued a brief urging temperance.

The great permanent infantry barracks at Aldershot were burned yesterday afternoon.

Two attempts were made to blow up the Spanish government building at Madrid, on Saturday.

The Roumanian government has refused to allow the Russian refugees found at Bucharest.

It is stated that General Boulanger intends soon to replace all the civilians now in the French war office by military men at present in active service.

The Russian government has placed at the disposal of the police £25,000 to be used in unravelling of the Nihilist conspiracy in Russia and £12,500 to be used for the same purpose in foreign countries.

The Dauntless has sailed from Queens-town for Southampton where she will be employed on the coast of Norway. She will afterwards visit the Azores and then proceed home.

Russia has declined France's invitation to participate in the exhibition to be held in Paris in 1889 on the ground that she cannot assist in celebrating an event she detests. Russian subjects are forbidden to send exhibits.

Constantine Dorey, who threw down his arms and refused to obey orders, and take part in the arrest of Father Ryan of the Hestingshio, has been dismissed from the forces. The government have decided not to prosecute him.

Nearly eleven thousand carpenters at Cincinnati went out on strike on Monday for nine weeks, they for \$2.80, and eight hours on Saturday.

Wright & Potter's printing establishment in Boston was destroyed by fire on Monday. Their loss is estimated at \$70,000.
