Other articles in the pockets were a circular brass check, plain on one side, and on the other bearing the symbol O 23, and containing the letters Vickers, Sons & Maxim, Ltd., Erith; a buckle, evidently belonging to a naval uniform; a private un-stamped postal card addressed to "W. Evamy, 30 Estelle Road, Gospel Oak, N. W.," and a card bearing the name of "Chas M Forshaw, 120 Wymeking Mansions, Elgin avenue,




