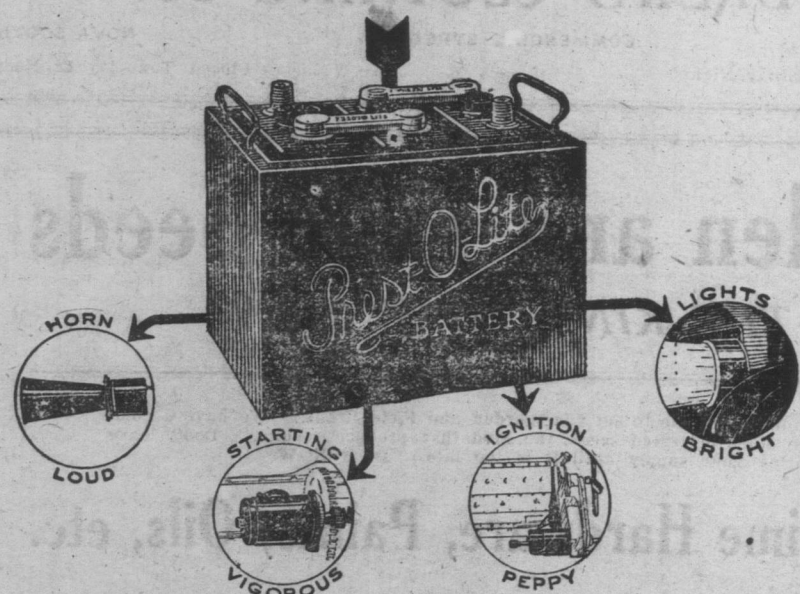

ANNUAL MEETING OF VALLEY FRUIT COMPANY

President Reports Splendid Results Achieved in Past Year

The seventeenth annual meeting of the Annapolis Valley Fruit and Produce Company, Limited, was held in their warehouse at Lawrence town on Monday, June 1st, with a full attendance of officers and members. The President, W. A. Hunt, presided and gave a very pleasing report of the activities of the company for the past year and the splendid results that have been achieved through co-operation and businesslike methods. The Manager, T. G. Bishop, gave a full and comprehensive statement of the finances and spoke of the splendid spirit of harmony that had prevailed, enabling him to carry on the business successfully. Good prices had been obtained for the fruit. Each contributor had received an itemized bill for various varieties as they had been shipped accompanied with a check for the proceeds, some orchardists noting in the report over \$2.73 barrel, tree run clear of insurance, packing and storage. Quite a large quantity of apples were handled for farmers not members of the company. The company buy their own fertilizers, spray materials and seeds at wholesale. About eighty tons were used this spring. Operations have already begun for a large addition to their warehouse, which is needed to accommodate the increasing business of the company. The directors for the ensuing year: W. A. Hunt, Wm. FitzRandolph, T. G. Bishop, R. L. Moore, S. C. Bishop and F. A. FitzRandolph.

FISH HATCHERY A SPOT OF INTEREST
A spot of considerable interest near Middleton is the Fish Hatchery under the direction of Mr. H. Gates. This place is familiar to many of our readers and splendidly adapted for its purpose. A small spring fed brook was dammed and in the pond so formed hundreds of trout from two pounds weight down have a home. Spawns is removed from these and the little fish hatched out can be seen by thousands and thousands in number of shallow troughs both inside and outside the hatchery building. Mr. Gates states that during the present season two and a half million of these fry, trout and salmon have been placed in various lakes and streams through out Western Nova Scotia. Many lakes if properly fished and free from poaching out of season and free from illegal catching through the use of nets would now be real paradise for sportsmen. After three or four years in lakes the small trout grow to two pounds or thereabouts in weight and furnish sport that is worth while. In matters of sport we may get a general observation in Nova Scotia when the millennium comes but not much before—Bridge town Monitor.

NAVAL DISARMAMENT

(Toronto Globe)

The London Nation is of the opinion that any reluctance on the part of Britain to respond to Washington overtures in the matter of further arms limitation will reinforce the big navy agitation in the United States. In addition it points out that the decision to go ahead with the Singapore base threatens to have almost immediate reactions on the Japanese naval program. In discussing the naval problem The Nation says that if the Americans press for a right application of the famous 5-5-3 principle to the minor types of ships, almost insurmountable difficulties are added. The British position is that, having more and longer trade routes to protect, that nation then must necessarily have a preponderance of ships

of the cruiser type, and destroyers. The present ratio of British cruisers compared with the United States and Japan is 1.04, 1.0, 0.2; in destroyers, 0.6, 1.0, 0.3; in submarines, 0.7, 1.0, 0.3. The British proportion of submarines, while below that of the United States in figures, is superior in underwater craft of the larger type. Britain now has in commission 49 cruisers, 120 destroyers, of which the provision that only a certain proportion of the ships should be below a certain age. We should then have a reserve of unscrapped, uncommissioned ships similar to that from which we drew so largely during the war for defensive and subsidiary purposes. Were such a proposal adopted, it is pointed out the British could legitimately accept a lower ratio of minor craft than they would be otherwise justifiable in demanding, and possibly meet any American proposals in the matter even to strict adherence to the 5-5-3 standard now set for capital ships alone.
