THE IRISH LANDLORDS UNITE IN TRUST FOR SELF-DEFENSE

Organization Against Tenants' Attempt to Force Sale.

JOHN REDMOND'S DECLARATION

He Says the Irish Problem is Dangerous to the Empire—T. W. Russell Predicts War.

Dublin, July 24.—A new Irish land trust, which is called the Irish Land Trust of 1902, has been formed by the landlords as a defensive organization to resist the attempts of the tenants to force the landlords to sell their land. Another object of the trust is to obtain the cultivation of lands from which tenants have been evicted. The Nationalist party is determined to fight the landlords' combine, which has been admitted formed with the object of crushing the United Irish League. John Redmond and his supporters are satisfied that the Duke of Abercorn, the Marquis of Waterford, Col. Sanderson, Smith and Barry, and the other landlords who comprise the combine, are engaged in proceedings which bring them within the law of conspiracy. It is stated that the Nationalist Leaguers have decided to take legal proceedings against the landlords' trust.

IN THE COMMONS.

The House of Commons last night entered upon a series of Irish debates. When the estimates for Ireland came up for discussion, John Redmond, chairman of the Irish parliamentary party, moved the reduction of the salary of the chief secretary, Geo. Wyndham. Mr. Redmond maintained that Mr. Wyndham had done nothing for the country, and that the Irish problem was more dangerous to the empire today than it has been for a quarter of a century.

Mr. Wyndham, in refuting this assertion, declared that he could at present offer no constructive policy, and maintained that there could be no cessation of agrarian strife, no revival of industry and stanching of the flow of immigration, and the union must become intolerable to the Unionists, and the idea of home rule impossible, even to those who cherished it, unless and until the desolating process of social prescription and the miasma of fear which penetrated and paralyzed every nerve of national life were repudiated by the good sense of the people and repressed by the power of the government.

RUSSELL WAS HOT.

Mr. Wyndham's accusation that T. W. Russell (Liberal Unionist) member for South Tyrone, palliated disorder during the Defiance evictions, were repudiated by the good sense of the people and repressed by the power of the government.

Mr. Russell declared that only a man who had sold himself body and soul to the landlords would dare make such a statement. Dealing with the formation of the Irish land trust, Mr. Russell said it would provoke a war, the end of which no man could foresee.

It is the common destiny of man to struggle; let us not shun our share of the common lot. It is not for that I would ask you to go to Africa. But her fields are the most fertile the world ever saw; her riches are inestimable. As Smith and William Penn and all their bright coterie lived and suffered and died to establish this great country, you can go to Africa, ten million of you, and build up for yourselves an empire the like of which the world never saw."

REPLYING TO A QUESTION, the premier, A. J. Balfour, said that the imperial government was still considering its reply to Russia's suggestion regarding an international trust conference, but it was impossible as yet to announce Great Britain's attitude on the subject. As announced in a dispatch July 18, Baron De Stael, Russian ambassador to Great Britain, about ten days previously presented to the British Government a note from W. Witte, Russian minister of finance, which was sent to all the other powers which signed the Russian sugar convention, proposing that these powers should consider in common means to protect international commerce against the artificial depression of prices, not only in wheat, but in all agricultural products, the dangerous processes adopted by trusts, private undertakings or cartels, which tend artificially to influence the international market.

GERMAN TRADE SITUATION.

The Cologne Gazette concludes a page survey of the business situation by saying that production and consumption are coming nearer to balancing each other; that exports are slowly increasing; that domestic trade is showing a hopeful expansion; that rates for money are easy, and that general symptoms indicate a return to normal times. The journal, however, warns syndicates against raising prices unwisely, which action it says might set back the improvement in trade.

THE CREW SAFE.

The steamer Ryndam, which arrived at Rotterdam, had on board the crew of the Norwegian bark Pons Aehl, from Pasphefort, for Llanely, which was reported by the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm. The crew, it is said, were sighted at sea abandoned and on fire.

BOXERS STILL BUSY.

As a result of the attempt of the government to collect a tax which would pay the Boxer indemnity, according to a report by Rev. F. M. Chapin, of the American Board's North China Mission, an uprising has taken place to the west of Lin-Ching. Mr. Chapin says that thousands of troops have been sent to suppress the uprising, but at last, accounts had not succeeded. Mr. Chapin adds that in one district Boxers are still carrying arms and kidnapping Christians, and robberies are frequent.

TO DISCREDIT KOCH'S THEORY.

Dr. Gernault's second operation on himself in his experiments to disprove Koch's theory regarding human and bovine tuberculosis, continues to excite interest. After tuberculous tumors resulted from his first operation, his second operation is very serious. He said to a visitor today: "I may be dead in seven or eight weeks. As soon as the great issues are opened, I shall get a nerve surgeon to operate. I may lose my arm. I do not wish to commit suicide, but I wish to prove that I am right."

Dr. Gernault is beginning to suffer from his arms, which he himself amputated with tuberculous matter from a cow. The wound is inflamed. He is calmly awaiting the result. He maintains his disbelief in Prof. Koch's theory, and regards as a definite solution of the question as being of paramount importance to mankind. Dr. Gernault took ten centigrams of virus from the surface of the liver of a cow suffering from tuberculosis, which had been seized as unfit for human food, and injected it under the skin of his left arm.

THE MATTER OF NEGRO MIGRATION

Subject of an Interesting Debate in Chicago.

ELOQUENCE ON BOTH SIDES

Bishop Grant Tells Colored People That They Have Won the Right to Stay Here.

Chicago, July 24.—"I'll tell you when the American negro will go back to Africa—when the old oak, that has braved the storms of a hundred years, goes back to the acorn! Ah, talk about leaving a country like this, where, to view her splendid achievements, above all the world, and whither will spread before his feet the proudest deeds of his ages! Tell me this is not my country! I and my people helped to build these 200,000 miles of railroads, we brought forth the corn, the cotton and the rice. By the sweat of our face we have earned the right to sing, 'My Country, This of Thee.'"

A vast audience gathered at Quin Chapel to hear a debate on the following resolution: "Resolved, that for his future good, the American negro should migrate to Africa or some other undeveloped country." There were four speakers, and Bishop Abraham Grant, who presided, closed the debate in the above words.

MR. WOODS' VIEWS.

"We are here to discuss a subject that has baffled the best minds for the past thirty years," began the first speaker, J. T. F. Woods, who has the affirmative side of the debate. "It still baffles the profoundest thinkers of the age. It is not a question of what the negro wants to do. It is not a question of what the Anglo-Saxon wants the negro to do. The question is, what he had best do for his own good."

KING EDWARD STILL MAKING VERY SATISFACTORY PROGRESS

Although Yet Unable to Give Up His Couch.

DOUBT ABOUT THE CORONATION

Londoners Getting the Ceremony Will Not Take Place as Early as August 9.

THE KING'S PROGRESS.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, July 24.—An official bulletin issued today on board the royal yacht Victoria and Albert says: The King continues to make uninterrupted progress, although his majesty is not able to leave his couch, his strength is returning satisfactorily.

BETTING ON CORONATION.

The New York Times correspondent in London says: While the most favorable reports in regard to King Edward's health are received from Cowes daily, many Londoners remain skeptical about the coronation taking place as early as Aug. 9.

The announcement that Westminster Borough authorities have decided not to spend more money on street decorations is regarded as an indication that further postponement is possible.

CONDOLE WITH MRS. MACKAY.

The Prince and Princess of Wales, Lord Salisbury and Colonial Secretary Chamberlain have sent messages of condolence to Mrs. Mackay. The body of Mr. Mackay will be embalmed and taken to New York for burial.

RATHER "PREVIOUS."

A forecast of the result of the conference of colonial ministers federation makes it appear that not much has been accomplished. According to this authority, the chief holds that the colonies were expected are that the prime ministers will henceforth hold conferences every three years, and that the colonies will increase navy. Some of the colonies will grant certain increased preferential trade to England, not in exchange for similar concessions, but as an evidence of Imperial feeling.

Great Britain will not grant preferential treatment, but will make isolated revenue and tariff alterations, for instance, in favor of Australian wines. It is not expected that any action will be taken on the question of ship subsidies.

Lord Salisbury has been gazetted as a Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Victorian Order in recognition of his long, faithful and valuable services.

TRAGIC DEATH OF DR. HORSEY, M. P.

By Bursting of a Flywheel in Sun Cement Works.

STRUCK BY FLYING FRAGMENT

Was Member for North Grey and a Very Popular Citizen of Owen Sound.

Owen Sound, July 23.—Owen Sound was shocked tonight by the tragic accident in which Dr. E. H. Horsey, representative for North Grey in the House of Commons, received injuries from which he died at midnight. Three minutes after 6 o'clock a flywheel on an auxiliary engine in the Sun Portland Cement Works burst, and a flying fragment struck the doctor on the right side of the head, and a flying fragment struck the fatal injury.

The Sun Portland Cement Works, of which Dr. Horsey was the originator and principal stockholder, commenced a few days ago to manufacture cement. The entire plant was working very satisfactorily, and during the past few days Dr. Horsey spent much time in the various departments of the works. Today he was at the works as usual. Late in the afternoon Mr. W. F. Telford, a director of the Sun Portland Cement Company, and a well-known local banker, visited the works. He desired to see the plant in operation. He was with Dr. Horsey, and together they passed from one department to another, watching the revolving rotaries and other ponderous machines which comprise the plant.

IN THE ENGINE BUILDING.

Just before 6 o'clock they entered the engine building, on the north side of the group of buildings comprising the premises. In this building is a ponderous engine of 60 nominal horsepower, on which is a monster flywheel about 20 feet in diameter. From this extend heavy driving ropes, by which the power is conducted to the machinery of the other buildings. Just south of this large flywheel is a small auxiliary engine, on which are two flywheels, each about 4 feet in diameter. This little engine was used for turning the rotaries and other machines of a subsidiary character. Dr. Horsey stood about 4 feet from this engine, and on his left was Mr. Telford. They were talking to each other. Dr. Horsey turned to the chief engineer, Mr. M. Smith, and instructed him to start the big engine at 6 o'clock. Mr. Smith then went over to the small engine to turn off the power. Engineer W. Webb had just entered for night duty.

ONE WIFE, TWO HUSBANDS

Astounding Situation Revealed by Tragedy Over \$18 Hat.

Seattle, July 24.—An astounding situation is revealed by the murder of David Thomas and the mysterious wounding of the woman known as his wife, by H. C. Lake, who committed suicide after shooting both.

The three occupied a pretty house and apparently lived happily together. It was understood that Lake was a bachelor and that the woman was his sister.

Following the shooting, the woman stated that when she refused to allow Thomas to purchase an \$18 hat for her because it cost so much, Lake up-braided Thomas for not getting it anyway, and the shooting followed.

Investigation by the authorities disclosed that the woman was Lake's wife. The couple formerly lived in British Columbia, where Thomas appeared and ran away with Mrs. Lake. Lake followed the couple to Seattle and went to live with them, although allowing his wife to be known as the wife of Thomas.

GUILLOTINE MAY GO

French Senate Threatens to Stop Capital Punishment.

Paris, July 24.—The guillotine seems to be doomed. A war of words now waging in the senate threatens to expiate capital punishment, and with it France's grim and blood-stained instrument of public vengeance.

The crisis was brought on by the case of a man named Bidoux, condemned by the courts to death. Formerly the place of execution was La Roquette, near Pere la Chaise, but that has been voted to public, for it is considered that such exhibitions have no salutary effect upon the morals of the people. The prisoner is confined in La Sante, and it was suggested that the execution take place within the prison walls, but La Sante is by no means anxious for this distinction.

Hence the matter was referred to the senate and the Chamber of Deputies. Several senators have demanded to know why there should be capital punishment at all, if it must be so carefully concealed. The argument for and against has grown so strong that the recapitulation of Bidoux promises to be indefinitely postponed.

CIRCUS TRUST COMING

Positively the Most Stupendous, Unrivalled Aggregation Ever Seen.

New York, July 24.—The circus folk are getting up a trust. Barnum & Bailey's circus, Buffalo Bill's Wild West, and the Forepaugh & Sells circus are to form the nucleus of the combination, which is to be under the control of the Barnum & Bailey trust. Mr. Bailey, of the Barnum & Bailey combination, is not in this country, but he is expected in a short time, and it is believed that without difficulty will be formed without trouble.

The object of the arrangement is to divide the United States, England and Germany up between the three shows, so that each will be able to devote two years to each of these countries, and there will be no opposition.

PAID MAY YOHE!

Strong Family Settled With the Actress—Gets Her Jewels and Cash.

New York, July 23.—Wherever Putnam Bradlee Strong may be, he is now safe from arrest on the charge of grand larceny made against him on Monday by May Yohe, as the Strong family settled that woman's claims against him yesterday.

A sum of money said to be between \$15,000 and \$20,000 was paid to Miss Yohe and her lawyer yesterday afternoon in the office of E. Heider, for two years private secretary to Mayor Strong and for many years the legal representative of the family, and in pursuance of her agreement Miss Yohe and her lawyer went at once to police headquarters, where they told Captain Titus, of the detective bureau, that they no longer wanted Strong arrested. Captain Titus dropped the case in haste.

Friends of Strong believe that he has gone back to Japan. Yesterday Miss Yohe sent a cablegram to the man with whom she pawned a good many of her jewels in Yokohama last year, saying that she would be in that city just as soon as the next steamer would bring her there, Emanuel Friend, the woman's lawyer, emphatically stated that there was no arrangement for Strong and Miss Yohe to meet again at the other side of the world.

The caboose and two freight cars were thrown off the track, and the engine of the second train was partially smashed, but did not leave the track. Traffic was delayed until about 10 o'clock in the morning.

That an accident of this kind should occur here seems peculiar, as the block system is in use between Copetown and Hamilton, and under this system a train could not leave Hamilton until the former had left Dundas.

It is said the engineer of the second train ran past the semaphore, which was set against him at the western limits of the yards.

109 DROWNED!

Death List of the Elbe Disaster Is Growing Longer.

Hamburg, July 23.—It is announced that 109 persons were drowned by the sinking, Monday morning, of the steamship Primus, of this port, after a collision in the River Elbe with the tug Hansa, of the Hamburg-American Line.

AFTER FASTING 62 DAYS

Mrs. George at Last Succumbs to Starvation.

Cancer of the Stomach Was the Cause—Most Pitiful Case.

Chesterfield, Ind., July 24.—After a fight with death for sixty-two days, during which no morsel of food passed her lips, Mrs. Amanda M. George on Monday succumbed to starvation. At the age of seventy-eight, with a vitality which was a puzzle to doctors and laity alike, she had for three months apparently set the grim destroyer at defiance.

Mrs. George's fast was neither for sensation nor on prescription of her doctors. It was compulsory, and the absolutely declining of her appetite till finally no liquid but water could be swallowed was, according to her physicians, caused by a cancer that gradually ate her life away.

Mrs. George was a spiritualistic medium and regarded as one of the best in the state. For years at her home on Massachusetts avenue, Indianapolis, she had gone into trances and revealed secrets, past, present and future, for visitors. An intense believer in the return of the dead, she had spent each summer in the Spiritualist Camp, and this season had again been invited by the Indiana Association of Spiritualists to her cottage in May and was shortly joined by her daughter, Mrs. Ella Phipps, of Chicago. Mrs. George complained of stomach trouble, and refrained from food for a few days, hoping thereby to correct it. Instead of recovering every attempt to feed her caused the same agony, and the old lady tried soft diet, only to find that this, too, seemed beyond the possibility of her digestion.

The doctor she was told that cancer of the stomach was her trouble, and she bravely resigned herself to slow death by starvation. It was expected that she would not long survive, but as day after day passed her strength held out wonderfully. At the end of two weeks without nourishment of any kind save the allowance of water, which never at any time was more than fourteen spoonfuls a day, she was still able to walk. Later she took to her bed, and in vain the daughter prepared tempting dishes to coax the unfortunate woman's appetite. She was unable to taste them. At the end of thirty-seven days she was so weak that she was unable to raise her hand above her head and could not speak above a whisper. Her eyesight failed, but she never lost consciousness and lay awaiting death a latter-day martyr of the most pitiful description.

POLICE CHIEF MURDERED

Shot Dead While Making an Arrest at Elkins, W. Va.

Five-Year-Old Child Made Drunk by Parents—Deaf Mute Killed.

POLICE CHIEF MURDERED.
Elkins, W. Va., July 23.—Chief of Police F. H. Wilmot, of this town, was murdered last night at Womelsdorf, near here. He was in the act of arresting two negroes, when a third man shot him from ambush. This is the third murder of an Elkins chief of police within a year, the other victims having been Robert Lilly and Page Marshall.

MADE CHILD DRUNK.
Montreal, July 24.—Sarah Jane Huston, five years of age, lies at the General Hospital in a critical condition, suffering from alcoholic poisoning, the result of whisky given to her by her parents when they were both drunk.

DEAF MUTE KILLED.
Deseronto, Ont., July 23.—John Earl, a deaf mute, aged about 35, was accidentally killed by a Bay of Quinte train near Deseronto Junction this morning. Earl came from Brockville, to which place his remains will be sent this afternoon.

THE CHILDREN PERISH.
Baltimore, July 23.—A gasoline stove exploded at Pinto, Md., today in the home of W. M. Peckert. The house was consumed and two children, six and four years of age, were burned to death. Mrs. Peckert barely escaped with her life, and her young baby was seriously burned.

FOUR TEACHERS MURDERED.
Washington, July 24.—The war department received the following cablegram regarding school teachers who have been missing from Cebu since June 10: "John E. Wells, 299 Montgomery avenue, Providence, R. I., and his cousin, Louis A. Thomas, same address; Ernest Hager, 1413 Vine street, Cincinnati, Ohio; Clyde A. France, Berca, Ohio, missing; Cebu, murdered by Ladrones; bodies recovered. Leader of murderers killed. Eight others captured by the constabulary."

Smallpox Down East.
Toronto, July 23.—Smallpox has reappeared in South-Santagene, which we described after its outbreak on July 7. Two cases are reported, and the doctor in charge says one case is as bad as any he has seen. The cases are traced to an outside source.

RIVAL ELECTRIC LINES

Two Companies Want to Build From Windsor to Leamington.

Windsor, July 24.—Two electric lines are projected from Windsor to Leamington, a distance of about 35 miles, and there is a big fight on between the rival companies. The one will secure the necessary franchises in the terminal points and through the several intervening townships.

The Windsor and Lake Shore Company was first in the field with a proposal for a line to run between Windsor and Leamington via Essex and Kingsville. After a lot of dickering with the Windsor council the company was given a franchise, and claims also to have franchises all along the route, from the original company, flashed a telegram from Engineer Newman, of Windsor, to the effect that the contract for the work had been signed, and a lot of dickering was declared to stand the completed next year.

But the council did not put through the franchise and the company is declared to stand the better show of winning out.

IRISHMEN PICNIC AUG. 7

Date Has Been Decided Upon and Great Time Is Assured.

The Irishmen's picnic will be next. The members of the Benevolent Society met last night and decided to hold it on Thursday, Aug. 7. Remember the date. It will be a great day at Port Stanley, for everybody will be Irish on the 7th, and to be Irish on that day is to be happy. The 7th and 29th bands and Dayton's orchestra will help with their music to make the day enjoyable, and a fine programme of sports will be carried out.

An Open Verdict.

New York, July 24.—The jury in the Latimer case yesterday brought in a verdict declaring that Latimer was killed by a pistol shot wound. No accusation against anyone was made by it.

Suicide of J. E. Rush.

Windsor, Ont., July 23.—News has been received that John E. Rush, 23 years old, son of Postmaster Rush, of Essex, has committed suicide by hanging at Briscoe, B. C. Young Rush's mind has become deranged. It is said, by a disappointment in love. Rush went west about four years ago.

Low Water in Gulf of Mexico.

Washington, July 24.—Lieut. Foster, in charge of the New Orleans branch of the United States hydrographic office, has reported that a recent survey of the Gulf of Mexico near the mouth of the Mississippi River shows only 25 fathoms of water, where there was 60 fathoms at the time of the previous survey. Lieut. Foster is puzzled over the phenomenon. Many believe it was caused by the recent earthquakes in the West Indies.

Getting Well of Lockjaw.

New York, July 24.—Treated by a recently discovered process, Joseph Tiernan, the 11-year-old son of Michael Tiernan, formerly a member of the New York baseball team, is believed to be recovering from lockjaw at the Harlem Hospital. Antitoxin in small doses is being injected into the spinal cord, between the second and third vertebrae of the lumbar region. Previously antitoxin had been injected into the brains through a small hole bored in the skull.

BACK FROM AFRICA

The Hero of Hart's River and His Comrades Warmly Welcomed.

Quebec, July 23.—The special I. C. R. train with the returning Canadian troops from South Africa arrived at Levis at 5:30 this afternoon. Quite a number of people went over to greet the men on their return. The R. C. G. A. band, which had been specially ordered, assisted in tendering the welcome to the returning South African heroes.

Most of the officers of the garrison and the different regiments of militia of Quebec were at the station, and the returning Canadian troops were most enthusiastically received. All are in excellent health and spirits. Lieut. Evans in command, and Major Merritt second in command. The men all speak well of the officers.

Lieut. Carruthers, of Kingston, the hero of Hart's River, has little or nothing to say, and expresses wonder at the fuss the Canadian newspapers have made over his little exploit. Capt. A. F. Ashmead and Surgeon Lieut. Lorne were most cordially welcomed by hundreds of friends and admirers from Quebec. Surgeon Lieut. Lorne was attached to the Canadian hospital at Klerksdorp, South Africa.

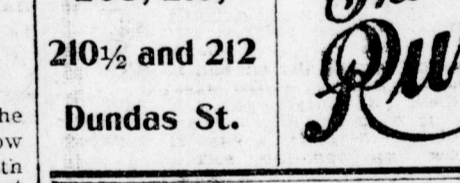

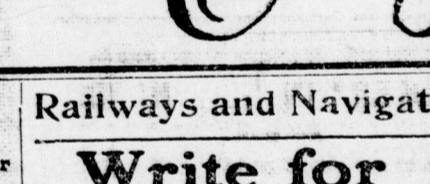

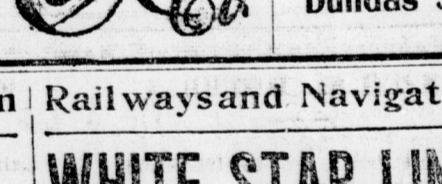
