Meaing of Grand Trunk Shareholders.

President Sir Henry Tyler's Policy Sustained

By an Overwhelming Majority - The Retiring Directors Re-elected.

TORONTO, April 28.—A cable dispatch received to-day from London says:

"The meeting of the Grand Trunk Railway shareholders which was adjourned from April 4 was held here to-day, when the policy of the president, Sir Henry Tyler, was confirmed.

"The retiring directors, Lord Claude Hamilton and Messrs. Gillespie, Heygate and Lethbridge, were re-elected by a vote of 47,230 to 20,799."

London, April 28.—The poll taken at the adjourned meeting of Grand Trunk chareholders to-day resulted in the reelection of Mr. Heygate, Mr. Gillespie, Mr. Lethbridge and Lord Claud Hamilton as directors by two votes to one. An attempt was made to hold a meeting to attempt was made to hold a meeting to discuss Tupper's further charges and the general policy of the Board, but it was announced that the meeting was merely called for purposes of the poll. Tupper was not present. Sir Henry Tyler has sent e Times a reply to Tupper's last letter, but it has not yet appeared.

THE FEELING IN MONTREAL. MONTREAL, April 28 .- Nothing but satisfaction is expressed here over the result of the Grand Trunk Railway meeting in London to-day. Mr. Wainwright said to-night they had anticipated this result, as the Grand Trunk had done nothing wrong either toward the country or shareholders. He explained that at the meeting a fortnight ago while there were 500 persons night ago while there were 500 persons present only 70 had remained to vote after the reports had been adopted. The action of Sir Henry Tyler in adjourning the meeting for a fortnight, he said, showed the fearlessness of his course and confidence in the result. Though he had sufficient proxies the result of the voting to-day showed he had the meeting with him, as the proxies were not required.

He hoped reasonable counsels would prevail and thus maintain harmony all around. He said that if before the bill reached the House of Commons the Colonial Legislature passed an act which in the Government's opinion was sufficient to secure the observance of the modus vivendi of 1891 and to enforce the decision of the arbitration commission on the lobster question, and, in regard to the treaties existing between England and the treaties existing between language. France, the Government would not proceed with the bill. But if such an act was not passed by the Colonial Legislature, it would be necessary to pass the Imperial Government's measure as rapidly as possible. The

ment's measure as rapidly as possible. The Government was ready to consider with the Newfoundland delegates the terms of the bill which they suggested might be discussed. But difficulties of an international character required careful, handling, and the passage of the Colonial Act should not be delayed until the terms proposed by the Imperial Bill were settled. The Government saw no difficulty in giving Newfoundland representation on the Arbitration Commission. In fact the Government had requested the colony to name a delegate to act on the present Arbitration Commission, but the colony had refused to do so. "The colonists may be assured," said Lord Knutsford, "that we should not further press any of the subsidiary points referred to arbitration until the Imperial Government had fully consulted the colonists."

Intelligence has been received here to the effect that a number of the vessels in Fortune Bay have forced the blockade and taken bait to St. Pierre. There were as many as 100 vessels in Bay d'Este, and, though there have been angry mutterings and smothered threats, it was not anticipated anything would come of it. Last week, however, 40 craft boldly weighed anchor and made sail. The bait protection fleet did everything to prevent the vessels from going out, but beyond capturing one "laggard" nothing else was done, as far as can be learned. The bait squadron were taken by surprise. They squadron were taken by surprise. They had not time to read the Riot Act—and the police had only blank cartridges in their guns—not that it was even intended to fire guns—not that it was even intended to fire on the men, it being supposed that the "helmeted horde" of constabulary would be sufficient to awe them into subjection. But with starving families and herring \$6 per barrel in \$t. Pierre the men were willing to take their chances and go. No doubt their names have been taken, and they will be duly dealt with later on.

want of bait, and compelled to admit that they cannot carry on the bank fishery inde-pendent of supplies from the Newfoundland coast. They now offer \$5 per barrel for her-ring without avail, and large numbers of their banking vessels are lying idle, every effort to obtain supplies having completely failed.
The price held out by the French naturally proves a strong temptation to the people at Fortune Bay, and it taxes the utmost energies and all the resources of those engaged in the bait protection service those engaged in the bait protection service to prevent smuggling. In one or two cases violence has been used by owners of crafts. The other day a boat in charge of a police officer overhauled a craft bound to St. Pierre from Bay-du-Nord. It was commanded by a man named Baracada, who was ordered to heave to, but he defied the summons. A boat was launched from the steamer, and was rowed alongside, and when the police officer jumped on deck, three hands offite craft stepped up to him, and, lifting him up in their arms tossed him overboard into the sea as unconcerned as they would a bag of hay. The crew of the officer's boat rescued him not much the worse for his ducking, and the steamer, then took possession of the craft and towed her into Harbor Bakes, where the

law-defying individuals were handed over to the care of the authorities. On the Government being appraised of the situation at Fortune Bay and the extraordinary efforts of the French to obtain bait, the Lady Glovet was ordered to join the Fiona, and the steamship Hercules, with ten constables on board, has also started for the scene of danger. In addition to these precautions, a gunboat has been ordered from Halifax.

ODESSA, April 28.—Jewish families have been ordered to quit Kieff. The well-to-do have already gone, but the poor artisan classes are in the greatest distress. Many arrived on the Austrian frontier in a destitute condition, but the Austrian officials refused to admit them. The police accept no excuse, raiding the city with the utmost severity. LIQUOR AND THE LAW. The Chatham Planet professes to believe that nothing can be done in the way of restricting, limiting or putting down the consumption of intoxicating liquors by legal means. Surely our contemporary can hardly be serious in that argument. It is rather odd that the average oppon-

ent of prohibitory liquor laws always falls back upon moral suasion as alone necessary to promote the sobriety of the people. But if moral suasion were the only requisite to the protection of the community, why is it assisted so frequently by the will of the people, crystallized into legal enact-ment? We have a similar experience in South London, in which no city licenses have been issued, and where no licenses ever will be issued if we interpret the spirit of the populace. Who will say that South Lonon is not better without drinking places than it would be with them?

The opposition to the existence of drinking resorts in residential portions of cities and towns is also strong in the United States, and in many places a movement is on foot having for its object the keeping of the sale of liquor to the business portion of the corporation, so long as it is licensed. The theory, and we believe it is a correct one, is that while the topers will go a long way to get their favorite tipple, those who have not cultivated an appetite for intexicating liquors, especially the young, will be exempt from much temptation if taverns and saloons are kept as far as possible from them.





Liquor Dealer's Bequest to His New York, April 28.—Goodness pays

sion just rendered in the Court of Appeals, said to be the first of the kind ever given there, although the principle involved has been passed upon by other tribunals we believe. The facts are as follows: On March 20, 1869, William Storey, a wholesale liquor dealer of Buffalo, told his nephew, William E. Storey, then a lad in knickerbockers, that he would give him \$5,000 if he would not smoke or drink until he became 21 years of age. The uncle added several other conditions, even coffee, cards and billiards being tabooed. As the old man made his money in appetizing liquors his injunctions to his nephew were the more remarkable. The incentive of a golden reward caused William to lead an exemplary life. On Jan. 31, 1885, he attained his majority, and wrote to his uncle claiming the \$5,000. The uncle replied, acknowledging the indebtedness, but said he desired to hold the money on interest until a future day. Soon after Mr. Storey died, and his executor, Franklin Stdway, refused to pay the claim. The case was tried in the Supreme Court and judgment recovered for \$9,585 89, principal and interest. This judgment was reversed by the General Term, but this week was sustained by the Court of Appeals, and






