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The Hour at Which Society Services May be Held.

Lively meeting Between the Lodgemen and Clergymen.

The Chairman's Rejoinder to an Unruly Speaker,

Now Will the Ministerial Association Accept ?

Parades to Start at 4:15 p.m.—Lodgemen Satisfied—An Interesting Discussion.

The joint conference of the lodge representatives and the committee of the Ministerial Association having the Sunday parade matter in hand, which was held in St. Andrew's Church last night, could not truthfully be described as a love feast. There was a preponderance of lodge men in the assembly, about 60 being present, as compared with about one-fifth of that number of clergymen. A number of interesting incidents occurred during the progress of the meeting, and in the end a resolution setting the hour of parade at 4:15 and the time of service at 4:30 was passed. Rev. Mr. Rigsby, however, gave the lodge representatives to understand that it was not likely that the clergymen of the city would agree to the resolu-

On motion, the Dean of Huron took the chair, and Mr. A. B. Munson was appointed secretary. Among the clerical gentlemen present were Archdeacon Davis, Canon Richardson, J. W. Pedley, Walter Rigsby, George Fowler, E. B. Lanceley, Robt. Johnston, Thos. S. Johnston, W. M. Seaborn and Ira Smith.

Among the lodge representatives present were Messrs. Dr. Davis, C. A. Kingston, J. H. Flock, R. K. Cowan, Alex. McDonald, Alex. Stewart, Ed. Fish, James Carter, Robert Cadwallader, Jas. He could hardly blame the boys for wanting to hear the band; when young he would probably have done so himself. As an old military man, he acknow-ledged that the band still had a fascination for him.

An endeavor was then made, at the suggestion of Mr. Pedley, to find out just who were delegates to the meeting and who were not. Several proposals were made as to how this should be done, and finally the chairman asked the Masonic contingent to

Messrs. Flock, Kingston, Davis, Mc-Donald and Galpin stood up. These were recorded, and the Oddfellows were asked to stand up. "How would it be for the gentlemen who called us here to give us

the reasons why they brought us here?" asked Mr. Essery. "We are here in just as good standing as the gentlemen of the other side, and if we go questioning what each other's rights are there will not be anything done. I have been asked to come and hear what you have to say. Hadn't you better say it?" (Hear, hear.) Mr. Stewart-Why, the chairman stated his case a few minutes ago. An effort was made to enroll the names of the Oddfellows, Messrs. Jeffrey, Stewart, Fairbairn, Cowan,

Jackson and others standing up. Rev. Walter Rigsby suggested that to save time the lodge representatives should write out their names and hand them in. said Mr. Stewart, "if you are tired of it already, let us quit."

Mr. Cowan asked if it was unalterably settled that the clergymen would not hold service for the societies at any other than the regular service. Canon Richardson said that it was merely a request for the societies to consider. Mr. Cowan thought that the mat-

ter could be solved by the societies commencing their parades at 4 o'clock The Dean said that even the formation of the parade interfered very materially with the Sabbath school

Mr. Cowan argued that if the parade was held either in the morning or evening it would have the effect of causing people to stay away from their own church. Rev. George Fowler suggested that the resolutions passed by the Minis-terial Association ought to be read and

considered. Mr. Essery said that the ministers began by refusing Christian burial to Christian people on the Sabbath. Then they followed that up by refusing to preach to societies unless they went to church without a band. Now they were told that this had been done at the instance of the Sunday school superintendents. Would it not have

been just as polite to have asked for the views of the lodges concerned at the preliminary meeting as to do so now? They were doing work that the church was not able to do, or had not the courage to face. (Hear, hear.) It was very decent work to be engaged in, and they were going to keep it up, whether the ministers liked it or not.

(Hear, hear.) The speaker urged that the resolu-ions should be read, and went on to say that in the old days Christ preached to everybody, the rich and the ragged, but he was not always looking for a call, and he did not move because his salary was increased.

Wm. Jeffrey, superintendent of the Wellington Street Methodist Sunday school-I think, Mr. Chairman, that this is altogether uncalled for. We are here to discuss another question entirely and there is no such necessity for such sarcastic references. If that is to proceed, we cannot possibly do any business.

Mr. Essery-You had better understand that you are not going to do any business. As for sarcasm, from the newspaper reports there was evidently a great deal of sarcasm displayed at the Ministerial Association meetings. The person who spoke to me does not know enough to stop my voice while we are discussing this matter. He was not a strict Sabbatarian, and even allowed boys to "whistle" on the Sabbath. (Laughter.) He objected to a noisy parade which would gather together a lot of conlookers, who, in the case of St. Andrew's, would lie around under the trees during the service, showing merely a desire to spend the Sabbath in that idle fashion. 




THE CHATHAM CHARGES.

Contractor Graham of London on the Stand-Denies Anything Wrong.

Chatham, May 6.-The inquiry into the charges of malfeasance preferred against ex-Ald. Henry Smith by the city council was continued yesterday before his Honor Judge Bell. Mr. Cameron, the London barrister, re-newed his application to represent Mr. Graham, the London granolithic contractor, whose name is associated with that of the accused in the charges made. The judge, after hearing a forcible argument decided to grant Mr. Cameron's request, and the lawyer accordingly cross-examined several wit-

nesses during the proceedings. Mr. Graham, the contractor, was the principal witness. He gave favorable testimony as to the quality of the work at Fifth street bridge, in connection with which boodling is alleged. In answer to an inquiry on the part of the counsel for the city, the contractor said he had bought a \$200 draft from the ex-alderman prior to an agreement that he was to get 30 cents a foot for the Fifth street bridge work. The draft was made on Mr. Wm. Marcollector of customs at Windsor, and accepted by him, but when it matured was not taken up. It had been sued, but Mr. Smyth was not made a party to the suit. Graham declared believed the financial standing of the parties was good, and that his draft would yet be collected. He had no wrongful intention in the transaction, and had never paid or promised to Smyth any payments in consideration of his services as chairman of the Board of Works. Their dealings had been perfectly honest throughout.

The young ladies of the First Methodist Church held a mock Parliament last night, which proved an original, amusing and instructive form of entertainment. Wesley Hall was pretty well filled when the Speaker took the chair, shortly before 8 o'clock. Previous to this, Miss Trebilcock delivered a prologue in admirable style, pre-

franchise, and preparing the audience for the mock Parliament to follow. Miss M. Stevens then announced deputations from the Men's Franchise Association and the Men's Christian Temperance Union, who wished to interview the Attorney-General and his Ministers, and ask for the extension of the franchise to men. Miss Stevens, on leaving the platform, unfortunately fell, and bruised her head painfully,

but soon recovered. The Attorney-General (Miss Hobbs) and her Ministerial colleagues then took their places on the platform to receive the masculine deputation, composed of Messrs. W. S. B. Barkwell, C. G. Powell, Ed Parker, Dr. Holmes, and F. H. Screaton. The gentlemen were accorded a hearty handshade by the Attorney-General. Mr. Screaton, on behalf of the Men's Franchise Association, made a forcible plea for the right of his sex to vote, and was followed by Dr. Holmes, of the Men's Christian Temperance Union.

The Attorney-General suavely replied that personally she admitted the justice of their claims, but her colleagues might differ from her. She promised that the matter would be taken into their most serious consideration. (Laughter.)

The full Parliament (the Ontario Legislature) then assembled, the Speaker (Miss Lou Owrey) wearing a jaunty official hat, trimmed with ostrich feathers. The Government and Opposition were ranged at her right and left, respectively: The personnel was as fol-

Among the petitions received were the following: From the Men's Comfort Association, with 500 signatures, asking that the interval between housecleanings be extended from six months to two years; that bachelors over 30 rears of age be taxed for the support of homeless and neglected children; to compel the London Street Railway Company to lower their car steps to enable women to enter or leave without the use of a step-ladder, or the qualifications of an acrobat; to admit men to the study or practice of law; to prohibit men from slaughtering birds for millinery purposes; to pro-

hibit men from manufacturing crazy quilts, and painting coal scuttles, etc. The Government was asked if it intended to legislate in regard to preventing men from invading such occupations as dressmaking, millinery, etc., and from wearing high hats in public places; if it intended having & curfew bell rung at 10 p.m., warning men off the streets, unless accompanied by their wives; and if a bill would be introduced compelling men to con-

sume their own smoke. The debate on the franchise question then began. Miss Ware moved the granting of the men's petition, in a fluent and well reasoned speech. Miss Fields, with much vigor and eloquence, seconded. Speeches on the Government side were delivered by Miss Harvey, Miss A. Jolliffe, Miss Beaumont and Miss Graham, and on the Opposition side by Miss Belton. Without exception the addresses would have done credit to any deliberative body. The ladies not only expressed themselves Parliamentary debaters. The subject matter was also excellent and many

neat points were scored. The House went into committee of the whole, and passed the Men's Franchise Bill clause by clause, without amendment. The bill carried by 16 to 12, amid much applause. The clever participants were heartily applauded on retiring.

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
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

ELECTRICITY. Moore reported that the most feasible plan to light the pumping station at Springbank by electricity would be to have a dynamo operated by a hydraulic motor, supplied with water from the discharge mains to the program of New Glasgow, New Scotia the discharge mains to the reservoir. By this arrangement (as long as there was water in the reservoir or water being pumped to the city) there would be sufficient pressure to run the motor and operate the dynamo. The estimated cost of a plant constructed thus would be \$300. The estimated cost of producing sufficient power (by steam) to light the pumping station by incandescent lights equal to the present lights, would be about \$25 a year. This would be reduced one-half, as there was a surplus water power in the river at least six

months in the year. Mr. Moore showed that the saving by electricity would be \$18 57 per year. The commissioners instructed the engineer to call for tenders for supplying a motor. Mr. Powell, of Hamilton, did not ap-

pear in connection with his proposition to build an inclined railway at Spring-"I guess he cannot get the necessary capital to back the undertaking," said one of the commission-

Mayor Little notified the board that the street railway company had accepted the Springbank agreement, as amended by the council, and that the papers would be signed today.
