BY ACCLAMATION.

In addition, 11 Nationalists and 3 Irish Unionists were elected yesterday by acclamation.

The proportion of net gains by the Unionists yesterday was larger than or Saturday, but the seats won are normally Conservative, and gave relatively small majorities for the Government in 1906. The results indicate that Scotland doubt that the Government will make another clean sweep in

SCOTLAND'S IMPOSING VOTE.

The Ministerialists are amazed at their own successes in Scotland. Even their abnormal vote in 1906 has been exceeded in six of the seven ridings heard from. Churchill has a lead of 6,408 votes over the nearest Unionist, compared with a majority of 2,709 in the by-election of 1908. Central, East and South Edinburgh give an aggregate Liberal vote of 20,595 and a Unionist total of only 8,988. The Unionists hold West Edinburgh by 450 majority, against 306 in 1906 and 1,535 in 1900. The Unionists may do better in the counties, where the landowning interests are a power.

Churchill's majority is a reward for his strenuous services as a campaigner. He is credited with much of the Ministerial success in Lancashire, to which he devoted most of his attention, speaking twice a day for a fortnight just before polling. UNIONIST HOPES.

The great majority of the English counties are to be heard from, and the Unionists expect greater gains in these because of the powerful influence of the nobility and great landowners in the rural districts. The Ministerialists say that the Covernment is sufficiently secure to stand considerable losses in the counties.

TWO MINISTERS DEFEATED.

The first members of the Ministry to be defeated are Colonel Seely, under colonial secretary, who vesterday lost his seat in the Abercromby division of Liverpool, and R. K. Causton, paymaster-general, who failed in Southwark West. Colonel Seely is one of the most promising of the younger Returns From British Elections Today Announce Two Nationalist Ministerialists, and a seat will probably be found for him later.

Sir William Robson, who is re-elected in South Shields, was the attorney-general in the last cabinet. He is one of the most effective debaters and speakers in his party.

A sensational story of robbery and threatened murder came to light at the police court this afternoon, Thomas McDonald and Robert Hibblethwaite, alias Densmore, were tried on a charge of attacking George Baines, of Beaconsfield avenue, in his bedroom at the Hodgins House, King A HEAVY SENTENCE bedroom at the Hodgins House, King street, beating him terribly, and robbing him of his gold watch and a sum of money, on Saturday last.

Mr. Baines is a brother of Mrs. Wesley Scott, who was recently acquitted of a charge of murder, and both Mrs. Scott and her busband were in court this morning, and were keenly inter ested. They also attracted a great deal. of attention.

Robert Hibblethwaite, alias Densmore, and Thomas McDonald, the two young men found guilty this atternoon by Magistrate Love, are liable to a sentence of fourteen years and a whipping.

"It is easily the most serious robbery we have had in London in ten years," Chief Williams told The Advertiser in the court room.

The prisoners were found guilty, and remanded for sentence.

Hibblethwaite has told the authorities that his father lived in London many years ago.



ICE GORGE SMASHES AND MENACES ALLEGHENY

The Ohio River Is On the Rampage and Pittsburg Expects Serious Floods.

Pittsburg, Jan. 19.—Tons upon tons of water are pouring into the Ohio from the Allegheny River where, thirty miles above this city, the ice gorge at Freeport broke last night. The Allegheny, its bank full of soft spongy ice, crumbled into small floes by its tumble over the dam after the gorge let go, is rushing by the city and forcing the Ohio River up at the rate of two feet an hour.

For two months the gorge had been For two months the gorge had been forming at Freeport. Ice fifteen inches thick had piled up fifteen feet high, and as the recent snows on the Allegheny water shed melted with the high temper-atures of the past 48 hours, water was held back until it had reached a depth held back until it had reached a depth of seventeen feet and covered acres of lowland around Freeport. The warm rains had disintegrated the solid ice, and while it was menacing in appearance no dauger was feared. Shipping was secured, however, and the boats were removed from the Allegheny around it to the Monongahela. No trouble was experienced lost night.


